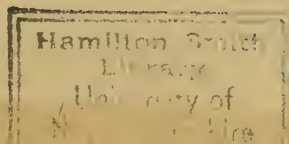

**To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bennington in the
County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to
vote in Town Affairs:**

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, in said Bennington, on TUESDAY, the FOURTEENTH DAY OF MARCH, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

3 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Highways and Bridges.

4 To see if the town will accept State Aid for Class V Roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.

5 To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for State Aid roads and raise and appropriate money for the same.

6 To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary, in anticipation of taxes.

7 To see what action the town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the town for the non-payment of taxes.

8 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to buy a small pump which would supply water to the Booster tanks at times when it is not possible to drive the trucks to the water.

9 To see if the town will vote to pay the firemen the following: 75c per hour fighting fires, 50c for attending each meeting.

10 To see if the town will vote to revise the By-Laws of the town hall.

11 To see if the town will vote to fix the wage rate of the janitor of the town hall.

12 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to put a hydrant half-way between the residence of George E. Edwards and Arthur Diamond.

13 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire.

14 To see if the town will vote to adopt the new Non-Partisan Ballot System for the election of town officials as provided in the Revised Laws of New Hampshire.

15 To see what sum of money the town will raise for statutory requirements and to carry the articles, and appropriations of the School District into effect.

16 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

- 5 To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
- 6 To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7 To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8 To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the

payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

9 To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

1 long blast to shut off water.

Alarms may be telephoned in to Antrim 16-2.

The fire company consists of 3 firewards and 23 men.

The Firewards would suggest: 1, that the town purchase a small pump which would supply water to the booster tanks at times when it is not possible to drive the trucks to the water.

2, that the firemen receive the following pay: 50c for attending meetings; 75c per hour for responding to fire calls. In cases of non-attendance, without reasonable excuses we would suggest that the members be fined as follows: 50c for each meeting not attended and 75c for each fire not attended.

If all persons having hand chemicals belonging to the town, will bring them to the fire station we will refill or exchange them. These chemicals should be refilled once a year.

I hereby submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

In September 1943 the enrollment was as follows: Miss Cashion's room, grade I, 10; grade II, 11; grade III, 8; Miss Cilley's room, grade IV, 8; grade V, 11; grade VI, 14; Mrs. Cody's room, grade VII, 5; grade VIII, 11. There has been little change in enrollment since the beginning of school. 14 pupils are transported to school by Mr. Forrest Lowe. 22 pupils are attending high school distributed as follows: Peterboro 10, Hillsboro 11, University of New Hampshire 1 (special undergraduate work in agriculture). By grades the enrollment is: grade IX, 6; grade X, 8; grade XI, 5; grade XII, 3.

GENERAL REPORT

A radical change took place this year at the Pierce School, in that, by court order, the two year high school was permanently discontinued. After obtaining an overwhelming majority vote at the annual school meeting in March, citizens went through the required legal procedure and on May 10, 1943 the Superior Court handed down the following decision, "There being no appearance, the petition is taken pro confesso and it appearing that the educational interests of the district require the discontinuance of said school, the prayer of the petitioners is granted and said school is discontinued. This decree to become effective June 30, 1943."

From all appearances at the present time, this was a move in the right direction. All but two of the pupils capable of attending grades 9 and 10 are actually doing so. It is even doubtful if these two not attending would do so if a high school was available at Bennington.

The Pierce School itself is running in an excellent manner. In fact people who have visited it recently tell me that it has not operated as well for years as it does at the present time. Let us hope that this improvement may continue through the years.

The schools are continuing their efforts to help in the war. Most of the pupils purchase war saving stamps each week at the school. Posters concerning the war are made and studied during school hours. The boys and girls have worked willingly in various programs suggested by the government.

Most of the parents and pupils cooperate to the fullest degree in matters of attendance. In fact some are so zealous that they send pupils to school when they are so ill that they should be home in bed. However, there are a few parents, either selfish or unconcerned, who keep their children at home when they should be at school. Technically the only reason a child of compulsory school age may be absent is because of illness. Certainly he should not be kept out to work or go visiting.

This war, which impinges its effect upon all of us, is apt to be in progress for some years. We know that we will win but victory does not seem possible for some time yet. Our children must be trained to solve the terrific problems facing a post war world. We in the school are attempting to do this by giving them a sound basic training, at the same time inculcating in them ideas of decency, kindness, and consideration for others.

These schools are your schools where your son and daughter are attending. Try to become better acquainted with them by making occasional visits. Let us, the teachers, superintendent and schoolboard, know what your problems and wishes are. We are endeavoring to create the best schools possible for Bennington.

In conclusion I want to thank the teachers, schoolboard, parents, and friends for helping me to maintain good schools in Bennington.

Grades 7-8: Arthur Harrison, Maurice Wilson.

The percentage of attendance maintained by each room to January 21, 1944 was: Grades 1-2-3, 94.007%; Grades 4-5-6, 95.214%; Grades 7-8, 93.516%.

There have been 41 cases of tardiness during this period of 20 weeks. A sincere effort is being made to correct this condition.

The school has been sponsoring a weekly sale of War Savings Stamps and a tin can collection. The 77 pupils have purchased \$530.20 worth of stamps since September 1943. Grades 1-2-3, \$69.80; Grades 4-5-6, \$412.50; Grades 7-8, \$47.90. This gives an average of \$1.39 per pupil per month.
