TOWN MEETING WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bethlehem in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Building in said Bethlehem on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for highway purposes.
- Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the services of a district purse.
- Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money during the current year on the credit of the Town to pay current indebtedness in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the removal of garbage.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for Town Road Aid.

- Article 10. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for White Pine Blister Rust Control.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to adopt the Budget Act.
- Article 12. To see what action the Town will take in the appropriation of a certain sum of money for war purposes in Town defense.
- Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the White Mountain Region Association.
- Article 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate towards the maintenance of the Littleton Hospital for the ensuing year.
- Article 15. To see what action the Town will take in abating the property tax of the Bethlehem Country Club and authorize the Selectmen to act thereon
- Article 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board:

I am pleased to submit the following report relative to your schools:

The school enrollment to date is 186, the smallest during the past fifteen years. Of this number 49 are in the senior high school, 29 in the junior high school, and 108 in the elementary grades. The present membership is 144. The total enrollment for the past ten years is as follows:

The reduced enrollment this year is due largely to the fact that some families have moved from town to be near war production factories in which adult members of the families are employed. There is little likelihood that the enrollment or average membership will increase until after this war is over. Attendance in the elementary grades has been seriously affected this year by an epidemic of measles.

The medical inspection report for last year showed that 149 pupils were examined and the following defects noted and reported to parents: Underweight 23, defective vision 12, defective hearing 2, defective teeth 90, diseased tonsils 4, cardiac disease 1. Miss Bryant reported corrections as follows: dental 58, vision 11, tonsils 2, underweight 8. All pupils examined had been vaccinated. Miss Bryant also reported that complete physical examinations were given members of the athletic groups. Hot lunches were served during the winter months to all pupils who stayed at school during the noon hour.

The school board has adopted this year the program of the Agricultural Marketing Administration known as Penny Milk. By this plan the school board has contracted with the Agricultural Marketing Administration to furnish milk to school pupils at one cent a half pint bottle—the Agricultural Marketing Administration to pay the producer's cost and the school district to pay the cost of distribution. Mr. P. R. Lyster has the contract with the school board to furnish the milk. About 100 bottles are being distributed each school day. The school district must pay the difference between the cost of distribution and the amount of collections from the pupils.

The surplus food commodities also distributed by the Agricultural Marketing Administration are being sent to the schools this year through the State Board of Public Welfare. The school board made application for apples and some other food products that can be easily prepared and served at the noon lunch period or at recess. Apples and some other products have been received. The only cost to the district for these products is the freight from Concord.

The program of studies in elementary grades and in high school remains practically the same as last year. The high school has not the physical equipment for practical arts courses to adopt much of the program recommended for those departments as war emergency courses. Teachers have been given suggestions for relating many phases of the war effort to the subject matter of their classes. In this respect they are doing well. Knowledges and skills that will better equip young men soon to enter military service and young women about to assume new civilian responsibilities must replace some of the learnings of the old curriculum. Teachers must not hesitate to give large allotments of time to the new, vitally important information.

In his headmaster's report Mr. Betz relates the interest of the pupils in the scrap collection and in the purchase of war savings stamps. Much praise is due Mr. Betz and the teachers for the success of their efforts.

Teachers throughout the nation have participated in the registration of civilians for the purchase of sugar, gasoline and fuel oil. Bethlehem teachers have spent many hours in these and in other civilian duties. Headmaster Betz has been very active in the organizing and administering of all phases of registration. He has also assisted the rationing board in additional duties. and the draft board in the selective service registration. Bethlehem, like other communities, should be proud of the cooperation of its teachers in all of the civilian duties they have been asked to assume -- registration for the rationing and for selective service. collection of scrap, work of the Red Cross, purchase and sale of war stamps and patriotic leadership in community defense organization. Professionally they have been alert in the study of war news and of the war effort of the government and have tried to keep their pupils alert and well informed.

Several changes in the teaching staff have been necessary during the past year. Miss Rosalie Rushlow, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers College, was selected to succeed Miss Davison as teacher of English and French; Miss Dorothea Hiltz, a graduate of Boston University, was selected to succeed Miss Telfer in the commercial department; and Miss Nancy Klingensmith, a graduate of the State Teachers College in Millersville, Pa., with teaching experience in Pennsylvania and Maine, was selected to succeed Miss Adams in the junior high school. These teachers are doing well in their respective positions. Recently, Mrs. Nora Tomes has resigned to accept a position as a special

teacher in Abington, Mass. Mrs. Betz has been enlisted for the remainder of the year in the third and fourth grades. Mrs. Betz taught very successfully for five years in Laconia after her graduation from Plymouth Normal School. You are very fortunate in having secured two teachers with successful experience, and two good beginning teachers for these vacancies. The teacher situation throughout the nation is critical.

The table headed Bethlehem School Finances shows school costs from 1927 to 1942. While the total costs are more than they were fifteen years ago, the costs for the actual operation of the schools are about the same, the number of pupils is about the same, and the cost per pupil (for current costs) is about the same. The difference in the total costs is caused by the bonds and interest charges in the building. This year the expenditures will be somewhat more than last year. Some savings will probably be made from the amounts listed in the budget for this year. The year should close with a balance of about \$200.00. The budget recommended for next year is slightly less than the probable expenditures of this year. An appropriation of \$28,000,00 should be enough to balance it in June. 1944.

Last summer some interior painting was done and incidental repairs were made. The draperies in the auditorium were cleaned, and the clocks were inspected. Since the opening of school the heating system has been carefully inspected and minor needs provided. To date the building repairs have not been a large item of annual expenditure. As the building grows older more repairs will be necessary each year. This should not be a large item, however, until after the bonds have been retired. With the debt and interest charges removed more money can be spent on building maintenance and the total cost will still be greatly reduced.

I am glad of this opportunity to express my sincere appreciation for your kindness and your help during the weeks last summer I was not in the union and not very active in the work of the school system. You and Mrs. Howland and Mr. Betz and school board members and teachers in Littleton and Dalton did everything necessary to complete the last school year and to carry on during the summer — and convinced me that all was well — and that was encouraging for the road ahead. I thank you.

Headmaster's Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The following is my sixth annual report and summary of work. The total enrollment in the high school for the present school year is forty-nine. The total enrollment for all grades is one hundred eighty-six. The membership as of January 1, 1943, for the high school is forty-two, and for all grades, one hundred forty-four.

This year a large number of pupils lost much time from school as a result of a serious epidemic of measles and mumps. While this unfortunate situation could not be helped, it followed that the school program has been seriously interfered with. Credit should be given the teachers who gave much of their time in seeing that this work was made up. Incidentally, this is the first time in a number of years that the pupils have been exposed to an epidemic of such seriousness. In spite of sickness the percent of attendance has been fairly good and the number of tardinesses low.

The standards set by the State Department of Education were fully met during the past year.

Because of the war our school activities, upon which we have always placed much emphasis, have had to be severely curtailed. While it is believed at first that interscholastic basketball must be done away with, arrangements have been made to play a limited schedule with other nearby schools. Because of the small attendance at the games it has placed a drain on the Activities Association. Fortunately, however, we had in the treasury a balance of \$124.41 at the beginning of December of this year.

Already the demands of the war have had their influence on the school program. School as usual must inevitably be out for the duration. As the war continues this influence will increase. The duties of the men in a mechanized army call for considerable emphasis on mathematics and science. It also calls for

greater physical endurance than any war has previously done. What is just as important, it calls for a type of mind that can rely on its initiative. This training and these qualities must be stressed more than ever before, although they have always played an important part in our schools.

Although our well known extra-curricular activities have had to be curtailed and in some instances changed, we are attempting to replace them with other activities. Through a suggestion of the Student Council and work of the boys and girls, a skating rink has been built and maintained which is proving very popular. Where once the pupils remained indoors during the noon hour a large number are now found out-of-doors enjoying themselves in a healthy sport. I wish to thank the Bethlehem Sand and Shovel Company for the use of their equipment which was donated in the construction of the skating rink.

To take the place of basketball for girls a physical education class is held once a week. Unless the girl is properly excused she is expected to attend this class. Miss Cyr, who has charge of the girls, is doing an excellent job of maintaining interest and giving them needed physical exercises. It is hoped that more time may be devoted to this program.

Your boys and girls did an excellent job in the scrap drive conducted in Bethlehem. About sixty tons of metals and rubber were collected. The sum of \$165.43 was realized from the sale of this scrap, and does include the scrap collected and sold at the Maplewood, the money from which was donated to the Boy Scouts in town. The above sum was expended as follows: \$40.00 to the Daniel Webster Council, Boy Scouts of America; \$12.00 for construction of the skating rink; and \$113.43 toward the purchase of a radio-phono-

graph-recording instrument. Incidentally, the school placed among the first ten of all schools in New Hampshire that took part in the drive. There was no expense in collecting the scrap as several citizens generously donated their trucks.

The sale of stamps and bonds is very encouraging. At the present time nearly fifty bonds are owned by the pupils in school, a large percentage of which were bought as the result of systematic buying of war stamps. Everything is being done to encourage the sale of these stamps.

Assemblies are being held once a week. The programs at these meetings include moving pictures, outside speakers and other activities conducted by the pupils themselves. The major emphasis of these programs is usually the war.

Under the direction of Miss Agnes Corfield a band has been organized. Already ten boys and girls are busy rehearsing and the results are very promising. Mrs. James Turner is giving valuable assistance in giving lessons.

Although we have lost two teachers we were fortunate to replace them with teachers who have had teaching experience in the past. On the whole the teachers are doing an excellent job. Not only are they very conscientious about their work, they are also carefully checking to see that the work is well done. To stress again what I have already repeated many times in the past, high school pupils on the whole are expected to do two hours of home preparation every school night. Even with the studying that is done in school this is not too much to expect if the pupil is to get the most out of his school work. Like the farmer, no pupil can ever say that his work is done.
