

This has been brought about by the citizens of Campton as a whole in making appropriations for the past few years. With the combined interest of the lot owners Campton will have one of the most attractive cemeteries in this vicinity. When the grounds are once in good condition the expense of labor will be comparatively small.

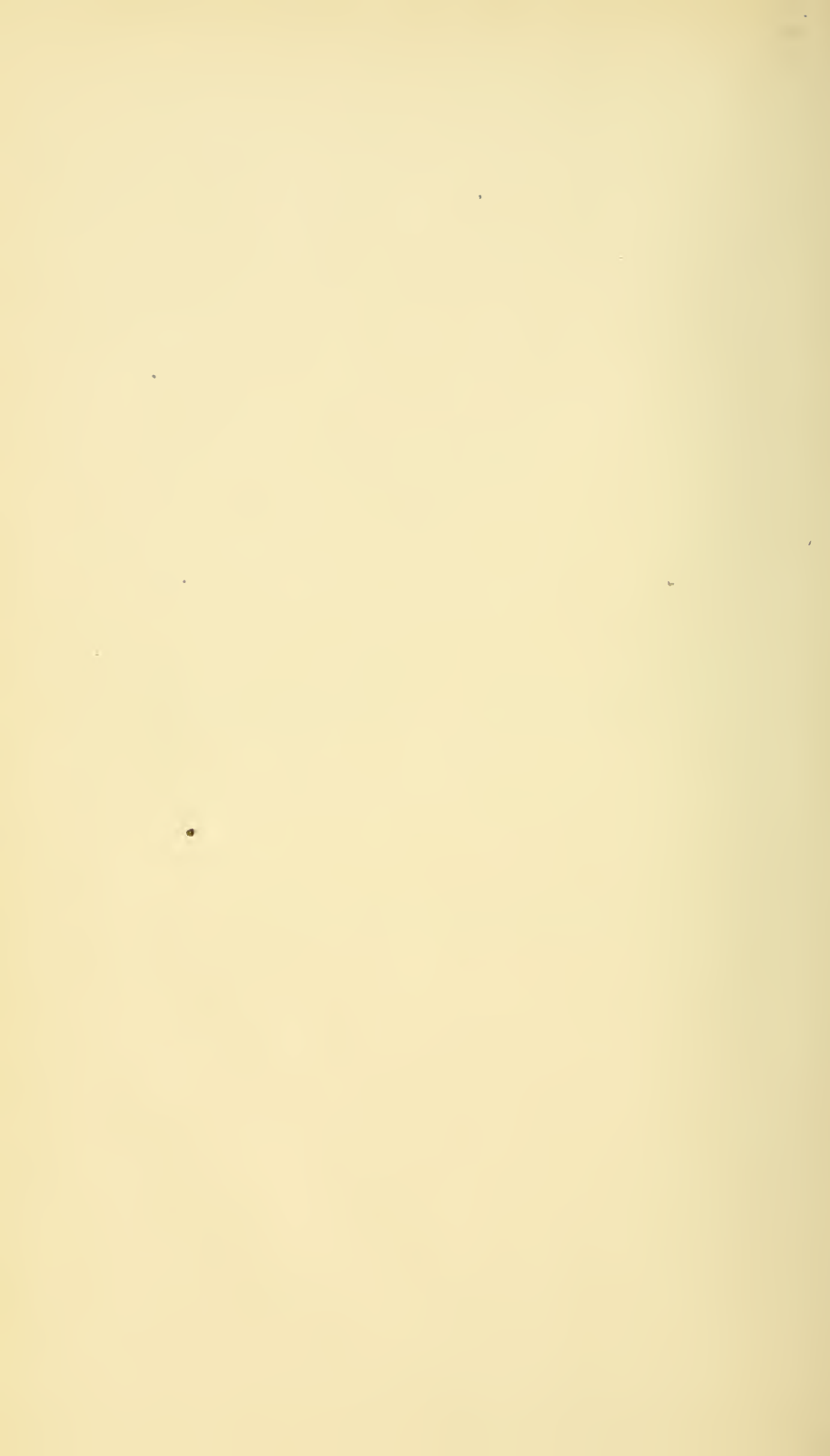

SCHOOL REPORT.

Owing to the resignation of Dr. H. A. Cheney, Chairman of the Board, the duty of reporting on the school work devolves upon me.

During the past year we have had twenty-three weeks of school in each district, where two terms were taught. Schools No. 8 and 10 were united, the summer term being taught in No. 8, and the fall term in No. 10. In No. 11 there was no fall term, the pupils coming to No. 2.

Through the successful efforts of some who were interested in the school, sufficient money was raised to give No. 3 another term with the same teacher employed in the fall.

In some cases the cost of conveying pupils has been more than in other years, for the reason that no one could be found to do it for less.

The school house in No. 9 has been shingled and in No. 10 only one half needed shingling and that has been done. Other minor repairs have been made, as they were needed.

The work done by teachers and pupils has, for the most part, been satisfactory. We find the same tendency in our schools that characterizes us as a nation; the desire to rush on to new achievements, too often regardless of the why and wherefore of what is done. One reason for this may be found in the fact that the majority of pupils today, leave the district schools much younger than those of a few years ago. Our registers show that for the fall term, out of 151 pupils registered, but eight were over 16, therefore parents, as well as teachers, should be sure that the work is being done thoroughly in the brief time given to the district school. They should also see that no time is lost. Many parents seem to think that a few days, or even a week's

absence, does not amount to much, but from a teacher's standpoint it does. It means that the pupil must rejoin his or her class and not know what the others have gone over, or that the teacher must form a new class for their benefit. In either case the child loses interest in the work.

We have been able to secure from the state an appropriation of \$189.34 which will be used to lengthen our schools this year. If our average attendance had been better we would have been entitled to more.

We have in our town quite a large foreign element, and our registers show that a *very large* per cent. of the absences are due to this element.

The state law for truancy, according to the State Superintendent, who surely ought to know, is very cumbersome and not easily applied, therefore there will be in the warrant an article asking for some action in regard to a by-law better suited to our needs.

As our appropriation is apportioned according to our attendance, in justice to those who wish to attend school regularly, we should take some action in the matter.

We would urge our resident teachers to attend the Summer School held for two weeks each year, in Plymouth. While teachers from other states deem it a privilege to be allowed to attend, paying car fare and board to do so, our teachers surely ought to avail themselves of the opportunity of coming in touch with the minds of some of the foremost educators in New England, at little or no expense, as no tuition is required.

In conclusion we ask for the cooperation of one and all in our endeavors for the spiritual and moral, as well as intellectual, upbuilding of those who in a few years will occupy the places of the men and women of today.
