## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To vote by Australian ballot for all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to assessors.

Article 3. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,605.00 for town officers' salaries, or act thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 for town officers' expenses, or act thereon.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 for election and registration expenses, or act thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for Town Hall expenses, or act thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for forest fire expenses, or act thereon.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$700.00 for the support of the police department, or act thereon.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 for the support of the fire departments, or act thereon.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the support of the board of health, or act thereon.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$25.00 for general highway expense, or act thereon.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$6,000.00 for town road maintenance, reserving \$1,000.00 of the same for calcium treatment, or act thereon.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for street lighting, or act thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for snow removal, or act thereon.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for timber salvage, or act thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the town library system, or act thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the town poor, or act thereon.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for old age assistance, or act thereon.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$10.00 for Memorial Day exercises, or act thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to hold Old Home Day and raise the sum of \$100.00 for the same, or act thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds, or act thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the cemeteries, or act thereon.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the town beach, or act thereon.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for interest of temporary loans, or act thereon.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for legal expenses, or act thereon.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid or Town Road Aid (T. R. A.) for the ensuing year and raise the sum of \$2,082.00 for State Aid or \$745.91 for T. R. A. or act thereon.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$800.00 for the support of a District Nurse Association for the ensuing year, and authorize the establishment of a District Nurse Association, or act thereon.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division of the state, or act thereon. (Chapter 211 of laws of 1939).

Article 32. To see if the town will vote to accept the deed to the Atherton property, bordering on the Spofford school property, and turn the same over to the School District, or act thereon.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for a town office, or act thereon.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for town business equipment, or act thereon.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for chairs for the town hall, or act thereon.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to repair the drain damage, and the catch basin, on the land of Herbert Jordan, caused from overflow of water from a town sluice, so as to stop land erosion on the aforesaid land, and raise money for the same, or act thereon.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region, or act thereon.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,250.00 as the town's share of a State Aided bridge on the West Chesterfield road, or act thereon.

Article 39. To see if the town will vote to insure its firemen under the (Firemen's retirement act) and raise \$120.00 for the same, or act thereon.

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the purpose of straightening and widening the road leading from John Belleviews to Fritz Richters and authorize Selectmen to pay out the same.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Annie M. Brown, the income from the same to be paid to the C. W. C. A. for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Calvin P. Gilson lot in said cemetery and to be known as the Calvin P. Gilson trust fund.

Article 42. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 under the will of Emma P. Farwell, the income thereof to be expended as needed in the perpetual care and maintenance of the Farwell burial lot in Spofford Cemetery.

Article 43. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1939

---

Proceedings of the annual meeting of the voters of the town of Chesterfield called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 14, 1939.

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, E. James Winslow, at nine o'clock, and the polls were declared open for voting by Australian Ballot for all necessary town officers for the ensuing year under Article 1.

At ten o'clock, Assistant Clerk Richard G. Chickering and Assistant Moderator Norman J. Langmaid took their oaths of office before the Moderator and took over their duties of being in charge of the balloting. The Moderator then called the meeting to order for business and the Warrant was read by the Clerk.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Motion made and carried that the Selectmen act as Assessors for the ensuing year.

Voted that the Selectmen be allowed the privilege of hiring a Surveyor of Wood and Lumber to assist for a part of the time in assessing.

Article 3. Voted that the Tax Collector act as in past years in collecting taxes.

Voted to allow a two per cent discount on taxes paid on or before September 1, 1939, the net tax thereafter and to charge ten per cent interest after December 1, 1939.

Article 4. Voted to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 5. In the absence of the Chairman of the Budget Committee the report of the Budget Committee was given by John Mansley.

Voted that articles requiring additional appropriations be balloted upon.

Article 6. Motion made and carried that each article be voted on separately.

Article 7. Voted to raise the sum of \$3,490.00 for Town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 8. Voted to raise the sum of \$450.00 for the support of the Fire Departments.

Article 9. Voted to raise the sum of \$250.00 to fight forest fires.

Article 10. Voted to raise the sum of \$150.00 to buy tools and build tool boxes for forest fire fighting equipment.

Article 11. Voted to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for snow removal.

Voted to postpone the previous articles and take up Article 28 next.

Article 28. Voted to rescind the Town's vote of January 13th, 1939, raising \$1,000.00 for timber salvage and raise instead thereof the sum of \$300.00.

Article 12. Voted to raise the sum of \$6,000.00 for highway maintenance.

Article 13. Voted to raise the sum of \$744.02 for Town Road Aid for the ensuing year.

Article 14. Voted to raise the sum of \$1,400.00 for the support of the poor.

Article 15. Voted to raise the sum of \$500.00 for old age assistance.

Article 16. Voted to pass over the article.

Article 17. Voted to pass over the article.

Article 18. Voted to raise the sum of \$250.00 for repairs to the New Boston bridge, said sum to be taken out of the surplus now on hand.

Article 19. Voted to pass over the article.

Article 20. Voted to raise the sum of \$600.00 for the support of the Police Department to maintain some sort of patrol protection.

Article 21. A motion to raise the sum of \$1,917.00 for street lighting in order to supply the light on Cross street in Spofford Village which was voted to be removed as an unnecessary expense to the Town at the meeting held March 8, 1938 did not carry in the affirmative.

Voted to raise the sum of \$1,917.00 for street lighting.

Article 22. Voted by a show of hands to pass over the article.

Article 23. Voted that if Old Home Day is to be observed an Old Home Day Association shall be formed and the sum of \$100.00 be raised for its use.

Voted to adjourn for dinner until 1:15 o'clock.

Article 24. Voted to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the Town Beach.

Article 25. Voted to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the support of the town libraries.

Article 26. Voted to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the support of the new library.

Article 27. Voted to pass over the article.

Article 29. Voted to accept the additional gift of Morris Friedsam of \$500.00 making a total of \$5,000.00.

Article 30. Voted to pass over the Article.

Article 31. Voted that the Selectmen put the Town lock-up in proper condition to take care of tramps.

Article 32. A vote by ballot on a motion made by Paul M. Penning and supported by Albert D. Berry to accept the Article as read and amended by Albert D. Berry resulted as follows: Whole number of votes cast 96, necessary for choice 49, Yes had 54 and No had 42. The ballot was declared by the Moderator as carried in the affirmative. By this vote the Town accepts the offer of Mr. Morris Friedsam of a gift of \$1,000.00 to the Town, the same to be used for the purchase of furniture and furnishings for the new library building, and for the purchase of books, magazines and other supplies, upon the agreement on the part of the Town to have the new library building and the Town library under the control and management of a board of Trustees named and elected in accordance with Mr. Friedsam's offer on file with the Town Clerk. This offer as amended is as follows:

To the town of Chesterfield,  
Chesterfield, New Hampshire.

I am prepared to give to the Town of Chesterfield, the sum of \$1,000.00 and possibly more if circumstances require it, the same to be used for the purchase of furniture and furnishings for the new library building, and the balance, if any, for the purchase of books on the condition that:

1. The Town will vote to turn over the control, government and management of the public library and the library building and grounds immediately adjacent to said building, to a Board of Trustees of seven persons who shall serve without compensation, three of whom shall be the Selectmen of the Town of Chesterfield as elected from time to time, and three of whom shall be appointed by me, one from each village or

section of the Town, and a seventh person who shall be elected annually by the six Trustees; and any vacancy caused by death or resignation of the three Trustees named by me, shall be filled by the remaining Trustees named by me, or their successors.

2. The Town will agree to do any other acts and pass any votes incidental to the conditions enumerated above to carry the same into effect.

Upon notice of the acceptance of my offer by the Town, I shall be ready to pay over this money.

MORRIS FRIEDSAM.

Article 33. Voted to accept the sum of \$200.00 under the will of Eliza M. Estey the use and income thereof to be expended as needed in the perpetual care and maintenance of the Sidney S. Wright Burial lot in Spofford Cemetery in said Town.

Article 34. Voted to accept the sum of \$400.00 under the will of Ellen M. Shumway, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care of the Ellen M. Shumway lot located in said cemetery.

Article 35. Voted to accept the sum of \$100.00 from the estate of Addison M. Brown and Lenna S. Brown, the income from the same to be paid to the Chesterfield West Cemetery Association for the care of the Addison M. Brown burial lot in said cemetery.

Article 36. Voted if the Selectmen find it necessary to appoint any officers, said officers must be legal residents of the Town of Chesterfield. This vote declared by the Moderator as carried in the affirmative if such a vote is legal.

A motion made and supported that if it is legal, in view of what has happened, that the town vote to do away with the Budget Committee but not the Budget Act, did not pass.

The Articles all having been disposed of it was voted to adjourn at 2:10 p. m. The Moderator declared the polls would be open for balloting until 3:30 p. m.

At 3:30 o'clock the polls were declared closed and the count of ballots cast resulted as follows:

For Selectman. Clifford E. Chickering had 105 votes, Harold E. Randall had 105 votes, Chester M. Burnham had 6 votes, H. J. Plante had 1 vote, Richard Chickering had 1 vote, Albert Thomas had 1 vote. The Moderator declared no election.

For Town Treasurer. Ada W. Allen had 190 votes, Wallace Record had 2 votes, Imogene L. Chickering had 1 vote. Ada W. Allen was declared elected.

For Tax Collector. Harry E. Winn had 196 votes, Chester M. Burnham had 1 vote, George Goodridge had 1 vote. A. D. Berry had 1 vote, Henry J. Plante had 1 vote. Harry E. Winn was declared elected.

For Spofford Road Agent. Walter J. Post had 180 votes, George Goodridge had 6 votes, Donald Wellington had 2 votes, Nelson Ball had 1 vote, Frank Whorfe had 1 vote, George E. Joslin had 1 vote. Walter J. Post was declared elected.

For Center Road Agent. William E. Nurse had 106 votes, Roger C. Spaulding had 117 votes, Henry C. Chickering had 1 vote. Roger C. Spaulding was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Road Agent. Lyle B. Chickering had 106 votes, Newton E. Darling had 115 votes. Newton E. Darling was declared elected.

For Fireward. Shirley G. Bevis had 164 votes, Fred J. Stoddard had 37 votes. Shirley G. Bevis was declared elected.

For Trustee of Town Library. Albert D. Berry had 179 votes, Newton E. Darling had 1 vote, John Mansley had 1 vote, Paul M. Penning had 1 vote. Albert D. Berry was declared elected.

**For Auditors.** Harold E. Randall had 179 votes, Daniel P. Schlichting had 173 votes, George E. Joslin had 1 vote, Paul Penning had 1 vote, Merle Cobleigh had 1 vote, Agnes Chickering had 1 vote. Harold E. Randall and Daniel P. Schlichting were declared elected.

**For Budget Committee.** Albert D. Berry had 128 votes, Henry C. Chickering had 109 votes, Floyd M. Fuller had 134 votes, Maurice L. Amidon had 3 votes, Fred Humphrey had 1 vote, John Mansley had 1 vote. Albert D. Berry and Floyd M. Fuller were declared elected.

**For Trustee of Trust Funds.** William E. Nurse had 176 votes. Shirley G. Bevis had 1 vote, Viola Tuttle had 1 vote, Paul M. Penning had 1 vote. William E. Nurse was declared elected.

**For Sexton Spofford Village Cemetery.** Walter L. Deselle had 182 votes, Byron Davis had 3 votes. Walter L. Deselle was declared elected.

**For Sexton Center Cemeteries.** Percy Rowe had 182 votes and was declared elected.

**For Sexton New Boston Cemetery.** Paul E. Welcome had 170 votes, Louis D. Herrick had 4 votes, Newton E. Darling had 1 vote, Wallace Shippee had 1 vote. Paul E. Welcome was declared elected.

**For Sexton Pattridge and Atherton Hill Cemeteries.** Frank Whorfe had 178 votes, Frank Guyette had 2 votes, John N. Ball had 1 vote. Frank Whorfe was declared elected.

**For Spofford Constable.** Nelson H. Ball had 47 votes. Lyle P. Blake had 78 votes, Frank J. Guyette had 46 votes. William D. Pierce had 32 votes. Lyle P. Blake was declared elected.

**For Center Constable.** Henry C. Chickering had 178 votes, James J. Atema had 12 votes, Albert D. Berry had 2 votes, George White had 1 vote. Henry C. Chickering was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Constable. Harold E. Randall had 188 votes, Shirley Bevis had 2 votes, James Atema had 1 vote, Richard G. Chickering had 1 vote, Walter Dunbar had 1 vote, C. K. Lewis had 1 vote, Fred J. Stoddard had 1 vote. Harold E. Randall was declared elected.

For Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Chester M. Burnham had 189 votes, Louis W. Chickering had 171 votes, George W. Goodridge had 169 votes, George Fuller had 1 vote. Chester M. Burnham, Louis W. Chickering and George W. Goodridge were declared elected.

For Fence Viewers. Carl A. Castle had 183 votes, John L. Castle had 171 votes, Richard G. Chickering had 17 votes, Chester M. Burnham had 6 votes, John Furlone had 4 votes, Henry Chickering had 2 votes, George Fuller had 2 votes, George S. White had 2 votes, Kenneth Fales had 2 votes, Paul Welcome had 1 vote, Arvid Pearson had 1 vote, Fred Ball had 1 vote, Edward L. Welcome had 1 vote, Ernest Hoyt had 1 vote, Donald Wellington had 1 vote, Nelson Ball had 1 vote, William E. Nurse had 1 vote, A. H. Post had 1 vote, R. C. Chickering had 1 vote, William D. Pierce had 1 vote, Ralph Mulligan had 1 vote, J. Fossey had 1 vote, John Mansley had 1 vote, Maurice Friedsam had 1 vote, Harold E. Randall had 1 vote, Olin Butler had 1 vote, John Nurse had 1 vote. Carl A. Castle, John L. Castle and Richard G. Chickering were declared elected.

Article 1. To vote by Australian ballot for one selectman for three years.

Article 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Town charges.

Article 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to fight forest fires.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for forest fire fighting equipment.

Article 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the police department.

Article 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the fire department.

Article 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the Town beach.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for highway maintenance.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid or Town Road Aid (T. R. A.) for the ensuing year and raise the sum of \$2,079.00 for State Aid or \$744.02 for T. R. A.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise one-eighth of one per cent of its assessed valuation to avail itself of State or Federal aid in hurricane reconstruction of Town roads and bridges.

Article 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for street lighting.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for repairs to the New Boston bridge.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for snow removal.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed \$200.00 for the purpose of spraying trees for forest tent caterpillars, the same to be expended in the proportion of two to one with private citizens.

Article 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the public library.

Article 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the new public library.

Article 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of the poor.

Article 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for old age assistance.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the Town's share in participating, along with the 37 other towns, in the Monadnock Region.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for the same.

Article 21. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for cemetery repairs and maintenance.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its vote of January 13, 1939, raising \$1,000.00 for timber salvage and raise instead thereof the sum of \$300.00.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$49.28 (forty-nine dollars and twenty-eight cents), the same to be paid to the Treasurer of the Trustees of Trust Funds in said Town, to balance the accounts of the Trustees.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to rescind its vote of March 14, on Article 13; to wit; Voted that the Selectmen put the Town lock-up in proper condition to take care of tramps.

Article 17. Voted on motion made by Susie Morris and supported by Ruth Berry to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted on motion made by Agnes Chickering and supported by Walter J. Post to raise the sum of \$500.00 for old age assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted on motion made by Albert D. Berry and supported by Daniel Schlichting to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the town's share in participating, along with the 37 other towns, in the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted on motion made by Frederick Robinson and supported by Walter J. Post that we do observe Old Home Day, that we raise the sum of \$100.00 for same, and that we form an Old Home Day Association. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted on motion made by Morris Friedsam which was supported to raise a sum of money not to exceed \$500.00 to put our cemeteries in a presentable condition. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted on motion made by Susie Morris and supported by Walter J. Post to rescind the vote of the town of January 13, 1939, raising \$1,000.00 for timber salvage and raise instead thereof the sum of \$300.00. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted on motion made by Walter J. Post and supported by Frederick C. Robinson to raise the sum of \$49.28 (forty-nine dollars and twenty-eight cents), the same to be paid to the Treasurer of the Trustees of Trust Funds in said town, to balance the accounts of the Trustees. The meeting was called to order by Moderator E. James Winslow at nine o'clock a. m. on Saturday, April 22, 1939, and the polls were declared open for balloting for Selectman. At three o'clock the polls were closed and a count of ballots cast resulted as follows:

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TOWN LIBRARIES LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

---

Since the opening of the new library building on August 31st, 1939 there have been many hours generously contributed to help in getting the new system established.

It seemed advisable at this time to revise our system to coincide with those used throughout the state and especially by those libraries which came into existence by the aid of the New Hampshire Library Commission, as is the case of the Chesterfield Public Library.

Perhaps some do not know and many have forgotten that the library was organized in 1894.

The present group of trustees and the librarians (except for Mrs. Amidon of West Chesterfield) are all new in this undertaking so perhaps we have been slow in showing much change or improvement but it is our aim to get all of the books sorted and re-catalogued so that more frequent exchanges and better service will be possible.

We shall be interested to receive suggestions and your choice of new books will be appreciated altho' we may not be able to comply with all requests because the book budget is limited.

There are some changes in library rules this year, some are here-in mentioned.

Loan period is for two weeks and may be renewed for two weeks.

Fines are five cents per week for over-due books.

One new book to each patron and not over six books at one time.

159 books were purchased in November and were catalogued and 50 sent to each branch library. At least half of these were books for the juvenile department.

Seventy-two books were purchased in February but these will not be ready for circulation until later, because of so much work to be done on the books from the Spofford branch.

It is the plan of the trustees to return the Albert Field books to the Spofford branch as soon as possible after a permanent location has been obtained.

Because of the various changes it is impossible to give an accurate book inventory or circulation this year.

## BY-LAWS

---

### CHESTERFIELD LIBRARY

#### Board of Library Trustees

#### Art. 1. Name

The library shall be known as the "Chesterfield Library."

The Spofford branch shall be known as "Spofford Branch of Chesterfield Library."

The West Chesterfield branch shall be known as "West Chesterfield Branch of Chesterfield Library."

The Chesterfield Library in Chesterfield village shall be known as "Chesterfield Library." app. 1-5-40

#### Art. 2. Object

The object of the Library is to promote and foster the best in education, reading for pleasure and the general and moral betterment of Chesterfield through the use of books.

The Trustees shall consider all questions for the benefit of Chesterfield as a town and not for the benefit of any particular village or section. Inasmuch as the branch libraries at Spofford and West Chesterfield are regarded as permanent and essential parts of the library system it is understood and agreed that such branches shall be supported and maintained.

Chesterfield Library shall forever be a Free Public Library as required by law, but certain portions of the buildings may be set aside for the display of articles of historical interest to the Town of Chesterfield, or for special museum purposes, upon majority vote of the Trustees. app. 1-5-40

### Art. 3. Officers

The trustees shall be the Selectmen as elected by the town from year to year and in addition, four trustees named in accordance with Mr. Friedsam's conditions, voted by the Town at its March 1939 meeting, which conditions are as follows:

Art. 32. By this vote the Town accepts the offer of Mr. Morris Friedsam of a gift of \$1,000.00 to the town, the same to be used for the purchase of books, magazines and other supplies, upon the agreement on the part of the Town to have the new library building and the Town Library under control and management of a board of trustees named and elected in accordance with Mr. Friedsam's offer on file with the Town Clerk. This offer as amended is as follows:

To the Town of Chesterfield,  
Chesterfield, N. H.

I am prepared to give to the Town of Chesterfield, the sum of \$1,000.00 and possibly more if circumstances require it, the same to be used for the purchase of furniture and furnishings for the new library building and the balance, if any, for the purchase of books on the condition that:

1. The Town shall vote to turn over the control, government and management of the public library and the library building and the grounds immediately adjacent to the said

buildings, to a board of Trustees of seven persons who shall serve without compensation, three of whom shall be the Selectmen of the Town of Chesterfield as elected from time to time, and three of whom shall be appointed by me, one from each village or section of the Town, and a seventh person who shall be elected annually by the six trustees; and any vacancy caused by death or resignation of the three trustees named by me, shall be filled by the remaining trustees named by me or their successors.

2. The Town will agree to do any other acts and pass any votes incidental to the conditions enumerated above and carry the same into effect.

Upon the acceptance of my offer by the Town, I shall be ready to pay over this money.

(Signed) MORRIS FRIEDSAM.

The three trustees originally named by Morris Friedsam and their successors shall hereafter be known as the Friedsam Trustees.

The trustees shall annually elect a chairman, treasurer, secretary and librarians. app. 1-5-40

Art. 4. Duties of Officers

The chairman shall preside at all meetings. In the absence of the chairman the Trustees shall elect a chairman pro-tem.

The secretary shall keep a true and faithful record of the proceedings of the meetings, issue notices of meetings, shall have custody of the minutes of the meetings and other records of the Trustees and receive and answer all communications.

The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds in the hands of the Trustees, keep a true and accurate account of the same, deposit them in some bank approved by the Board of Trustees and pay the funds out as voted by the board and upon a signed order of the chairman, secretary and treasurer. The treasurer shall furnish a Corporate Bond for the faithful performance in such amount as the Trustees vote. app. 1-5-40

Art. 5. Committees

The committee authorized to sign orders for the payment of bills shall be the chairman, secretary and treasurer but may pay only such bills as are voted by the Trustees. Special committees shall be elected by the Trustees, and in the absence of such election may be appointed by the chairman. app. 1-5-40

Art. 6. Meetings

The monthly meetings shall be held at the library on the first Thursday of the month at 7:30 in the evening Standard Time.

The annual meeting shall be held at the library on the first regular meeting following the annual town meeting.

app. 1-5-40

Art. 7. Quorum

Four members shall constitute a quorum and any member absent from a meeting may vote upon any subject to come up by letter to the secretary.

Art. 8. Use of Building

The library building shall not be used for any other than library purposes excepting with the written consent of four trustees and then only with the presence of the Librarian or appointee.

By-laws may be amended, adopted or repealed at any regular meeting by a majority vote of the trustees, provided notice of changes has been mailed to the trustees at least ten days previous of the meeting. app. 1-5-40

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

The year 1939 has been a year of much activity as well as a very expensive one, living conditions in several camps have been improved, some sewage near Spofford lake has been improved, and more has to be changed, many dead animals thrown from vehicles into the highway have been taken care of including calves, cats and dogs. Any information leading to people doing this will be appreciated. One man was found dead in the woods from natural causes.

Some cleaning and improving was done on the canal at outlet of lake, a bad odor still exists there in the summer. There have been several cases of chicken pox in town and at present there are two cases of scarlet fever under quarantine.

We have several cases of venereal disease under treatment which the town is bound by law to pay for. Anyone knowing of such cases should report them to the Health Officer or local Board of Health. 29 licenses to sell milk, 9 of which were issued to buy and sell milk at \$2.00 each as follows: C. J. Fossey, Byron Davis, William Manch, Harry Nosek, George LaPlante, John Redding, Henry Chickering, Ora Underwood, Windham County Co-operative Milk Plant, Brattleboro Vt.

Several water samples were taken and sent to Concord, N. H., for analysis.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I herein submit my seventh annual report as superintendent of schools.

The American system of public schools is today facing the greatest challenge of a century in the scholastic training of its youth during the formative period of life.

For half a century, to my knowledge, we have heard echoing down the stream of education the slogan "Back to the Fundamentals."

Admitting that this slogan has laid a firm foundation for our educational structure and also that it is highly essential today, yet we note in the rapidly changing conditions of the world, greater emphases must be placed on the preservation of American institutions.

Indeed, our pupils must drink more deeply and more freely from the fountain heads of Liberty and Freedom, viz. the Bill of Rights and Magna Charta of English history and from our own Constitution.

It may be true that the pupils under a dictatorship are as well trained in so-called fundamentals but they do lack the major part of that education which is needed for citizenship under our form of government. Democracy's slogan is onward

to the most helpful conditions of living for the masses and of opportunities for participation in a democratic society. The founders of our republic believed education essential to the success of democracy. The experience of a century and a half in representative government confirms that belief so strongly that we may say without fear of contradiction that "Our public schools are our first line of defense"; "Our education is the bulwark of the citadel of Liberty."

When the cataclysm of arms in Europe has spent itself and we approach the world-wide renaissance of modern living, we must have our leaders prepared. They must be endowed with the highest type of citizenry, a type which implies the closest cooperation, supplementation and coordination of three vital elements of society, viz. the school, the home and the church.

History tells us that in all great emergencies the great bulk of leaders come from rural sections of the country. Let us hope that Chesterfield may furnish its quota.

**SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING OF THE TOWN OF  
CHESTERFIELD, N. H.**

Town Hall, March 14, 1939

---

The meeting was called to order at 2:20 p. m. by Mr. Floyd Fuller, Moderator pro tem, and the Warrant was read. The Articles of the Warrant were disposed of in the following manner :

Article 1. To choose a moderator for the coming year. The motion was made and carried by voice vote that Daniel P. Schlichting be Moderator. The new Moderator came forward and the oath of office was administered by Floyd Fuller, Moderator pro tem.

Article 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year. Moved and carried that Norman J. Langmaid serve as District Clerk for this year.

Article 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years. Moved and carried that the Clerk prepare and cast one ballot for the name of Alice L. Spaulding. This was done and Alice L. Spaulding was elected a member of the School Board for the next three years.

Article 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year. Moved and carried that Evelyn Winn be elected School Treasurer for the ensuing year. She was elected by voice vote.

Article 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officer or agent of the district. Moved and carried that we pass over this article.

Article 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen. and pass any vote relating thereto. Moved and carried that we pass over this article.

Article 7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Moved and supported that the Town Auditors serve as School Auditors. Following a short discussion, this was carried by a voice vote.

Article 8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of the public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report. Attention was called to page 141 in the Town Report, wherein the sum of \$13,263.77 was asked by the School Board. Moved and carried that this amount be raised.

Article 9. To see if the Chesterfield School District will instruct the School Board to approve the schedule adopted by the Union School District for tuition to Keene High school as follows:

1939-1940	\$80.00
1940-1941	\$90.00
1941-1942	\$100.00 and thereafter

It was moved and carried that we pay to the Union School District the sum of \$80.00 for the one year 1939-1940.

Article 10. To see if the Chesterfield School District will authorize the School Board to purchase water rights for the West Chesterfield school, and raise money for the same.

Agnes Chickering spoke about the possible purchase of water rights for the West Chesterfield school; saying that these water rights to a spring could be purchased for the sum of \$200.00. Several men present gave advice and counsel as to what was best to do. Finally, after due discussion, it was moved and carried that the sum of \$35.00 be raised: of this amount \$25.00 to be used to pay for the water rights to the well for one year; the other \$10.00 to be used to defray incidental expenses; and a report on this matter be brought in next year.

At this time School Treasurer, Evelyn Winn; the newly elected member of the School Board, Alice L. Spaulding; and the District Clerk, Norman J. Langmaid, were called and received separately the oath of office administered by the Moderator.

There being no other business to come before the District, the meeting was declared adjourned by the Moderator at 3:00 p. m.
