Commissioners' Report

To the Citizens of Grafton County:—

We herewith submit our report of the affairs of the County for the year ending December 31, 1905.

The appropriation for the current year was \$40,000, \$5,000 less than for last year. The money received from the License Commissioners was also approximately \$5,000 less, but notwithstanding this all the regular bills have been paid, all necessary repairs made on the Court houses and at the County farm, new steel shelves and record boxes put into the office of the Clerk of Court at an expense of \$1,050, the indexing of the Probate records completed at a cost of \$421.28, and \$3,000 paid on the indebtedness. This leaves an indebtedness of one note of \$15,000 and outstanding orders which had not been presented for payment amounting to \$291.96, while the cash on hand, bills due the County farm and personal property at the farm amount to \$33,498.31, making a surplus above liabilities of \$18,206.35, a gain in surplus of \$3,355.26. If this policy is continued until the County is out of debt it will be a saving annually in interest.

The indexing of records in the office of the Register of Probate has cost the County \$1,257.63 and is a credit to the office as it is undoubtedly the best in the state.

The cost of supporting paupers and dependent soldiers of the farm has been less than in former years, but owing to higher prices paid for help and supplies and the new law requiring Counties to keep all prisoners in the jail and House of Correction without pay has made the cost at the

farm more. The net Court expense is about the same as in former years.

The farm has produced and sold cream, during the year, to the amount of \$3,744, which is the most it has ever produced. The live stock on the farm consists of 7 horses and 1 colt, 120 cows, 20 heifers, 19 calves, 2 bulls, 1 pair oxen and 78 hogs and shoates, and the produce raised on the farm, as inventoried December 31st, 1905, was 275 tons hay, 200 tons ensilage, 20 tons straw, 825 bushels oats, 150 bushels corn, and a large quantity of vegetables.
