ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT
State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 10, 1959, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners, and any other town officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, one Highway Agent, one or more Auditors, one Library trustee for the term of three years, one Cemetery Commissioner for the term of five years, one Trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary Town officers.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V highways, as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945, and to raise and appropriate the sum required for this purpose.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the Town, as recommended by the Finance Committee in its budget report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for the purpose so determined, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing Notes or Orders to provide for the current year's expense in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks by mail, or at the time they examine the taxable property.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Collector's deeds.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a budget Committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next Annual Town Meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 10. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

To the Citizens and Taxpayers of the Town of Haverhill:

The end of another year has come and with it the final statements of 1958. These detailed statements will be found on the following pages of our Town Report.

Perhaps the most important item during the year was the repairing and painting of the Haverhill-Newbury bridge. This bridge was in very bad shape. It was repaired and painted by State workmen at a cost of \$6000. Half of this amount was paid by the Town of Newbury, Vt.

The South Newbury covered bridge is a question. The arch on the Newbury end has broken off and at a meeting of Newbury and Haverhill Selectmen and two Vermont State Engineers it was thought advisable to close the bridge for the present, at least. The Engineers estimated the cost of repairing to be at least \$20,000 and the Selectmen did not feel that the Towns should be obligated for so much. \$20,000 was considered a low estimate.

We feel that our Road Agent Maurice Horne has kept the roads in very good shape. On seeing the appropriation of \$27,500 for roads, it seems like quite a lot of money but when one considers that Woodsville is paid 40% of that amount in cash (\$11,000), leaving a balance of only \$16,500, it is a small amount for the miles of Town roads our Road Agent has. Woodsville takes care of their own roads and streets, therefore the 40% which is estimated by Town—Woodsville Precinct valuations.

We wish to thank the Citizens and all Town Officials for the fine cooperation they have given us.

WOODSVILLE FREE PUBLIC LIBRARY

Report of the Librarian

During 1958 there were 19,642 books circulated, 3,000 more than the previous year.

A summer reading club was organized among grade pupils and 1,246 books circulated in this project. Certificates and ribbons were awarded the winners from each grade. Cathy Page read the largest number of books, thereby winning an atlas for the 6th grade. Forty of the younger children enjoyed a weekly story hour, with films furnished twice by the N. H. Library. There has been close cooperation with the schools and both grade and High School classes received instruction in library usage.

National Library Week was observed in March with poster and essay contests sponsored in the schools. The library was open daily and exhibits arranged.

The Librarian attended an area meeting in Hampton and the annual meeting of the N. H. Library Association in Laconia. Two of the trustees, Rev. A. W. Altenbern and Mrs. G. H. McGaw, also attended that meeting together with sessions of the N. H. Library Trustees Association. On Nov. 25 an area meeting for librarians and trustees was held in the Woodsville Library with 22 present from 4 towns, and 2 speakers from the State Library.

At the last meeting of the trustees Mr. H. B. Knight retired from the Presidency after serving many years. He was succeeded by Mr. U. J. Samaha, who in turn was followed as Treasurer by Mr. Russell Martin. Two trustees who gave many years of faithful service have passed away—Mr. Ira W. Mann and Mr. M. W. Field.

The public is invited to make increasing use of the library which has considerably increased its facilities in recent years.

3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To choose a Library Trustee for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for the support of the Woodsville Free Public Library.
11. To act upon the following Resolution: Resolved that the Woodsville School District petitioned the State Board of Education to become a member of a cooperative school district which may include, in addition to this district the following School Districts, namely: Bath, Denton and Haverhill.

The re-surfacing of the elementary school play area is a major improvement for this limited space available. Not only is this an improved playing surface, but a lifesaver for the tile floors in the building, eliminating the dirt and salt track-in. Another needed improvement was the dividing of the large eighth grade room into two rooms. This made possible having two divisions of the sixth grade class.

Miss Helen Franklin retired last June after completing many successful years of teaching in the Woodsville system.

To fill the vacated position, Miss Irene MacDonald of Monroe was employed to teach grade six. She also coaches girls' sports. Later, after it became possible to have two divisions of the grade, Mrs. Beverly Gordon of Woodsville was employed as an additional teacher in the system, also in grade six.

Miss MacDonald was granted a B. of Ed. degree from Plymouth Teachers College, Class of 1958. Mrs. Gordon also graduated from Plymouth Teachers College and holds a B. of Ed. degree. She has had nine years teaching experience before joining the Woodsville Graded School staff.

The opportunity for Mr. Pendo to realize both financial and professional advancement by accepting the position of Principal of Spaulding High School at Barre, Vermont, created a vacancy, late in the summer, at Woodsville High School.

After interviewing several candidates for the position, Mr. Norman H. Mullen of Berlin, New Hampshire, was employed to fill the vacancy. Mr. Mullen has a B. Ed. degree from Plymouth Teachers College, as well as having graduate credit in Administration. His previous experience has been at Lisbon High School, and for the past five years, at Berlin High School. Mr. Mullen and his fine family of wife and three children reside at 17 Beech Street in Woodsville.

Other faculty changes at the high school are in the fields of English, Social Studies, and Coaching.

Mrs. Inez Cookson of Groton, Vermont, replaced Mrs. Pendo as English instructor, grades IX, X, and XI, following the resignation of Mrs. Pendo in November. Mrs. Cookson is a graduate of the University of Vermont, Class of '48. Previous experience in this union was at Haverhill Academy in 1953-1954 as Home Economics instructor.

Mr. William G. Bolos, of Woodsville, a 1958 B. Ed. graduate at Plymouth Teachers College, is teaching social subjects and coaching. Mr. Donald Evans is also full-time social studies instructor at the high school. His teaching duties at the graded school have been taken over by Mr. Bagonzi. Mr. Evans is head basketball coach, replacing Mr. Dumais, who is at Spalding High School at Rochester, N. H.

The newly created position of Physical Education Director is being ably filled by Mr. John Bagonzi, of Woodsville. Mr. Bagonzi received the degree of B. S. from the University of New Hampshire in 1953, and was awarded the Master of Science degree from the University of Indiana, majoring in Physical Education, in 1957. He has post-graduate credit toward a doctorate in the latter field. Both Mr. Bolos and Mr. Bagonzi are alumni of Woodsville High School.

The renovation of the assembly room into a three-room science unit, and of the old science laboratory into a school library, is a major improvement to the physical plant. The rather unique arrangement of the science unit and its equipment have received favorable comments, not only from local visitors, but from visiting superintendents, science instructors, and members of the State Department of Education.

Not only has the "action necessary" to meet the Minimum Standards for Secondary Schools as stipulated by the visiting committee from the N. H. Department of Education, in November of 1957, been satisfactorily accomplished, but also those changes noted as "Action Strongly Recommended" have been made.

The sincere interest of the members of the School Board in developing school policy, their interest in the welfare of the teaching staff, and their cooperation in the administration of the schools deserves the gratitude of the citizens.

This fine support of the board members, the industrious attitude of the teachers, the fine cooperation of the teachers and other school personnel, as well as the fine group of boys and girls, all contribute to making the duties of a superintendent's office a very pleasant task.

Please give attention to the reports of Principal Mullen, Principal McKelvey, and Mrs. LaMott, R. N., which follow.

Since September 3, seven students have dropped out, four enrolled, and four entered as post-graduates.

The educational standards at Woodsville High School are excellent and can be compared favorably with any in the state. This attainment is due to the excellent cooperation of our school board, superintendent and the faculty at the school.

At present our school system is operating above the requirements as set down by the State Board of Education, but constant improvement in curriculum is a must. The administration and faculty are in the process of re-evaluating our curriculum and will in the near future propose a change to the school board and superintendent which, we hope, will enhance the educational opportunities of the children in this area.

The usual activity program is being carried on with the majority of our students participation. This fall, through the hard work of Mr. Bagonzi and Mr. Bolos, Soccer was initiated as a fall sport at Woodsville High School. In the past, Woodsville High School has been very successful in the field of competitive athletics and with the fine coaches on our staff the same should prevail in the future.

The national trend toward the ever-increasing overcrowded classroom remains a national problem and as yet is not evident at Woodsville High School. The large enrollment in our elementary schools seems to indicate a need for further study in that area.

It was very gratifying to note the large number of parents who visited Woodsville High School at our Parent's Night in October and also to hear of their comments concerning the changes that have taken place on the second floor in our school building. Our science laboratories are the finest around and our library set-up is comparable to any of our larger high schools. At present the administration is attempting to furnish our library with the latest references available and also provide pleasurable reading for our students.

In ending, I wish to thank Superintendent of Schools, Phil A. Bennett, the School Board, and the staff of Woodsville High School for their wonderful cooperation and help during the past four months.

WOODSVILLE GRADED SCHOOL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

January 15, 1959

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my annual report of Woodsville Graded School for the year ending December 31, 1958.

The enrollment for the school year 1958-59 included 307 pupils. Two grades in the school have an exceptionally large enrollment. Grade 6 started the year with an enrollment of 48 pupils and grade 3 as of the date of this report has 46 pupils. A partition was put up in the eighth grade room so that the sixth grade could be divided into two sections thus eliminating one overcrowded classroom.

A great improvement was made in the playground by the addition of a hardtop surface to the majority of the play area. This new surface has been greatly appreciated by pupils, teachers and parents.

The Graded School lost two teachers in the past year—Miss Helen Franklin who retired and Mr. Donald Evans who is now teaching full time at the high school. Additions to the staff were Mrs. Beverly Gordon and Miss Irene MacDonald, both teaching grade 6, and Mr. John Bagonzi who is teaching English in grades 7 & 8.

The Graded School milk program runs from January through April. In that period 2843 bottles of milk were sold to the children.

Athletic teams at the Graded School include basketball and baseball for the boys, and basketball for the girls. The boys had a good season winning 8 and losing 2, and won the runner-up trophy at the Lion's Club Tournament at Bradford, Vt. The girls had an undefeated season, winning 6 and losing none. In baseball the boys had a record of three wins and one loss.

A music festival in which all grades took part was held before a large audience at the Community Building in May.

I wish to thank Supt. Phil Bennett and the School Board for their constant co-operation in all matters.

Physical examinations were completed in grades 1, 4, and 8. Pupils were examined by their family physician or by Dr. E. C. Campbell, school physician. High school pupils were examined by Drs. E. C. Campbell and Cyrus Eastman for fitness to participate in the physical education program.

Routine vision and hearing tests were done. When defects were found, written notice was sent to the parent. It is important to have the child seen by his doctor, for further examination, when symptoms of defects are found. Failing grades are sometimes the result of vision, hearing, or other physical defects.

There are still some children who have not completed the three Salk polio inoculations. The vaccine has proven its value and now is a good time to complete the series or to get the first two before the polio season begins this summer.

I want to thank the Cohase Lions Club for their contribution to the Sight Conservation Program.

Mr. Bartlett Mann donated large First Aid charts for use in the schools. These charts were most helpful.

I want to express my appreciation to the Graduate Nurses Association for the generous donation of childrens' clothing left from their spring sale. I also want to thank the members of the V.F.W. Auxiliary to Haverhill Memorial Post No. 5245 for washing, mending, and pressing this clothing.

My sincere appreciation to Mr. Bennett, Drs. Campbell and Eastman, the teachers, parents, and pupils for their continued interest and cooperation in the school health program.

REPORT OF WOODSVILLE COOPERATIVE SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE

The committee has been re-activated by the enthusiasm of not only the citizens of the Woodsville School District, but also by the direct action of the neighboring districts of Bath, Benton, and Haverhill.

The development of a 450-500 pupil cooperative school unit for grades 7 through 12, located in Woodsville, seems at last to have definite possibilities.

Your committee of six, composed of Mrs. Charlene Cosgrove, David Cassedy, Paul Ricker, and the school board members, Mrs. Marion Mann, Harold Taylor, Jr., and Edwin Chamberlin, have given serious thought and study to the problems involved and unanimously recommend approval of the proposed plan.

The present plan calls for an addition to the Woodsville High School building of a two-story wing to house twelve additional classrooms besides special rooms for guidance, health, teachers, and administration.

Some remodeling would also be necessary in the present building. The acquiring of the community building and field would be essential, either by direct purchase or long-term lease.

Any property owned presently by a district, and needed in the new "Co-op," is appraised by the State Tax Commission and purchased for use by the cooperative school district. The district selling the property is given an adjustment for this credit in its school tax assessment during the next ten to twenty years.

Budgets are prepared in the same manner as they are now prepared and presented to the voters at an annual school district meeting.

A few of the many advantages of a cooperative school district include:

1. There would be a broader tax base on which to operate the schools.

2. There is a greater return from the state on construction aid to a cooperative district. Note: At the present time, 30% of the principal payment on the bonds is given by the state to Woodsville School District. If a cooperative school district were established, the cooperative district could receive up to 55% return from the state. This would

only apply if additional construction provided more classroom space.

3. A tendency to unite small neighborhoods with like interests for common purposes.

4. A cooperative school district gives representation to the people of all areas making up the new district.

5. More economic use of specialized equipment for the teaching of science, art, homemaking, shop, dramatics, and business education.

6. Working conditions and salaries which will attract and hold good teachers.

7. Sufficient enrollment to provide good interscholastic and intramural teams in all sports.

The committee unanimously recommends the adoption of Article 11 of the School Warrant pertaining to the establishment of a cooperative school district in our area.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of agents, Auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose agents, Auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of a dental clinic.

10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the support of the Haverhill Academy Activity Program.
11. To act upon the following Resolution: Resolved that the Haverhill School District petitioned the State Board of Education to become a member of a cooperative school district which may include, in addition to this district the following school districts, namely: Bath, Denton and Woodsville.
12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

For some good reason, families are moving into the Haverhill School District. We believe that one of the several reasons is that of excellent elementary school facilities now available to the pupils. The following quote entitled "I am the School" expresses well the philosophy of the teachers and administrators of both your elementary and secondary school staff.

"I am the school.

I am the guardian of the hopes of every generation, and I am true to my trust.

In me all things are equal, in me are no distinctions among those who come to me except the paramount distinctions between those who are proud to serve and those who seek only to be served.

It is my duty not alone to teach, but equally to learn; to keep perpetually a light upon my altars, kindling them forever afresh from the indistinguishable flame that burns in every heart, the sacred fires of love of knowledge, and love of freedom, and love of country, for as I succeed, America succeeds. I am true to democracy.

I am the school."

Few faculty changes since June 1958 helped to maintain the status quo.

Mr. Myron Dodds of Wheaton, Illinois, was employed in March of 1958 to replace Miss Kallum who resigned as social studies instructor. Mr. Dodds returned in September, not only as the teacher of subjects in the social studies field, but as track and basketball coach. He is the proud possessor of a Bachelor of Divinity degree from Gordon Divinity School. Mr. Dodds and family reside at North Haverhill.

Mr. Wayne Evans, of Glencliff, New Hampshire, returned as instructor in the commercial subjects and as baseball coach. Mr. Evans is not new to the academy as he did his cadet teaching there before receiving the degree of Bachelor of Education from Plymouth Teachers College in June 1958. He and his family reside in Glencliff.

The curriculum of the Academy was strengthened in the fine arts by adding music courses for electives. This was made possible by employing an additional teacher. This position is filled by Mr. Barry Hale of Claremont, New Hampshire. Mr. Hale received a B.A. degree from Brandeis

University and has done graduate work at Boston University. Besides giving instruction in music, he teaches science classes and has done much extra curricula work in skiing. Mr. Hale lives on Court Street in Haverhill.

To become an "approved" secondary school by present N. H. Minimum Standards, Haverhill Academy must increase its offerings in the field of practical arts. A committee, appointed at the 1958 annual school district meeting has been studying the problem as to how best this can be done. A report of the committee's findings and its recommendation follows this report. Your serious study of this report is urged.

Your interest in your child helps make his school life happy and successful. Make certain that your child recognizes and understands your support of his full-time job of going to school. A tangible way of showing interest in your child is by visiting school.

1. Encourage your child to do his best without "pushing" him into tasks beyond his energy and interest.
2. Remember that all children are different in abilities and personalities.
3. Guide your child to do his work with diligence, imagination, and excellence.
4. Confer with teachers about your child to discuss the difficulties and misunderstandings ever present in the complex growing up of children.
5. Provide home experiences that may be closely related to school work such as individual projects and reports.
6. Schedule and attend parent-teacher conferences.

The continued support of the school board members, of the teaching and administrative personnel, as well as of the parents and citizens of the community make the success of your school possible.

Such support is herein recognized and appreciated.

The reports of Principal Jenkins, of Mrs. LaMott, R.N., and of the Haverhill Academy Study Committee follow and merit your attention.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herewith my thirty-fifth annual report of Haverhill Academy and High School.

The total enrollment to date distributed by classes is as follows:

There have been thirteen tuition pupils enrolled. One has left school. Of the remaining twelve, six are from Piermont; three from Warren; one from Benton; and two are State Wards. Five of the twelve are in the senior class.

Four pupils have left school to date leaving the present enrollment at one hundred-one. The decrease of eight in this year's enrollment as compared with last year's is due to the unusually large number who left school during the year last year and not to a decrease in the entering class this September. There were seventeen who left school during the year and six who were in school at the close in June did not return in September. Seven of the twenty-three drop-outs transferred to other schools due to change in residence. The remaining fourteen or approximately 13 percent will presumably not return to graduate. This is a significantly large number in view of the importance attached to a high school diploma by prospective employers, colleges, training schools, and the Armed Forces. The Federal Employment Bureau estimates that ninety percent of help-wanted-ads state . . . "only high school graduates need up-ply."

The athletic teams enjoyed an unusually successful season. Both the boys' and girls' basketball teams won the league championship. The boys' baseball team won the league championship and the State championship in their class. The Cheerleading team won first place in the North Country Contest. The X-Country team won the State Championship this fall in its division.

Some progress has been made toward meeting our deficiencies in the State Department of Education Minimum Standards. Length of class periods has been adjusted to meet time requirements; one more year of typing is being offered; two additional years of math. have been added; some additional equipment for the laboratory classes has been purchased; and the requirements in the field of Fine Arts have been substantially met by offering unit courses in Music under the direction of a certified music teacher. The extent to which these changes and additions will justify their existence will have to wait on the passage of a little more time. The immediate problem, as far as meeting the Minimum Requirements, is in the field of Industrial Arts. For progress in that direction, I refer you to the reports of the Superintendent, Mr. Bennett, and the Study Committee.

REPORT OF THE HAVERHILL SECONDARY SCHOOL STUDY COMMITTEE

The committee, composed of Mrs. Velma Tyler, Herbert Bearse, Linwood Hammond, and the three school board members, Mrs. William Eichhorn, Francis Patridge, and Roe McDanolds, held a series of discussion meetings starting in November and continuing through February, 1959.

The purpose of this committee was to recommend to the voters, at the annual district meeting in March 1959, the most practical method of improving the status of Haverhill Academy in terms of meeting the "N. H. Minimum Standards for Secondary Schools," at the same time considering what would be best for the students' welfare in academic and practical course offerings in the years ahead.

The immediate problem was the expanding of the Academy's course offerings to include three more units in the field of practical arts.

This could only be done by the construction of an industrial arts shop building at an estimated cost of \$65,000.00. The other alternatives were to send all pupils to an approved school, of their choice, on a tuition basis, or to continue the Academy with its present courses and lose its status as an approved secondary school.

The committee then called a public meeting that the citizens might discuss these three possibilities, after which the board would prepare an article for the warrant to be considered on March 17, 1959.

As this well-attended meeting, held on January 22, 1959, with more than 115 interested citizens present, practically no interest was expressed in approving any of the three plans presented. However, overwhelming interest was expressed to consider a cooperative secondary school plan with Bath, Benton, and Woodsville. The committee was instructed to develop facts and figures on two such plans: first, to consider the Woodsville site, including an addition to the Woodsville High School plant to accommodate 450-500 pupils. The second, that of an entirely new plant on a new site.

The committee presented figures on each project at another public meeting held on Monday, February 9, 1959.

The expansion of the Woodsville site was favored by a large majority of those present. It was then moved and so

voted to instruct the school board to insert in the annual school district warrant of 1959 the following resolution: "Resolved that the Haverhill School District petition the state board of education to become a member of a cooperative school district which may include, in addition to this district the following school districts, namely Bath, Benton, and Woodsville."

This action was unanimously approved by the six members of the committee and the board has included such an article in the warrant, and unanimously recommends its passage.

All routine vision and hearing tests were completed. When defects were found, written notices were sent to the parents. It is important that the child is seen by his doctor, for further examination, when symptoms of defects are found. Failing grades are sometimes the results of vision, hearing, or other defects.

Forty-five pupils were immunized at the Well-Child conferences. I want to thank the Lend-A-Hand Club and the North Haverhill Girls Club for their cooperation and assistance in planning and working at this clinic. There are still some children who have not had the three Salk polio inoculations. The vaccine has proven its value and now is a good time to complete the series or to get the first two before the polio season begins this summer.

Another successful Dental Clinic was held. The Lend-A-Hand and the North Haverhill Girls Club sponsored transportation. The following people donated their cars and time

to take children to the clinics: Mrs. Russell Hatch, Mrs. Robert Morris, Mrs. Phyllis Cleveland, Mrs. Mineva Wheeler, Mrs. Priscilla Stoddard, Mrs. Orman Thayer, and Mrs. Betty Boudreault. I also want to thank the V.F.W. Haverhill Memorial Post #5245 for their donation of money for the clinic.

Three pupils attended the Orthopedic Clinic and Treatment Center at Littleton.

I want to thank Mr. Bennett, the teachers, parents, and pupils for their continued interest and cooperation in the school health program.

**REPORT TO HEALTH OFFICER
TOWNSHIP OF HAVERHILL, N. H.**

FOR YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31st, 1958

The state public health nurse made home visits to babies, preschools and adults. These calls were made for the promotion of good mental and physical health, correction of defects and prevention and control of communicable diseases.

Three Well-Child Conferences were held at No. Haverhill V.F.W. hall where—

- 45 children received a physical examination by a physician
- 10 children received the 3 triple shots of diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough vaccine
- 35 received the triple booster shots of diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough vaccine
- 26 received 2 polio. vaccine shots
- 29 were given the booster shots of polio. vaccine
- 39 were vaccinated for smallpox

A dental clinic was also conducted in Woodsville. This clinic was organized by the state public health nurse and sponsored by the Women's Club. The dental hygienist from the Bureau of Dental Public Health of the N. H. State Department of Health conducted these clinics and also gave demonstration for proper brushing of teeth and instructed the parents on proper foods for good teeth.

The large area and populations of the township of Haverhill certainly shows the need for a local district nurse to provide adequate health services to the citizens of these towns. The salary of a local district nurse should be brought to the attention of the budget committee. It is impossible for a state nurse who covers all the northern section of Grafton county to provide all the services needed.

My sincere thanks to the doctors, health officer, nurses, town officials, school nurse, Lend-A-Hand Club, Girl's Club and The Women's Club for their assistance and cooperation.

REPORT FROM THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

Nineteen Hundred Fifty-eight was a busy year for the White Mountains Region office, particularly in the information and transportation fields.

In view of foreseen drastic consequences, the Region took a very active part in representing our towns in fighting transport curtailment, particularly with regard to the railroads. We appeared at hearings in Concord, North Conway, and Littleton, and engaged in a considerable amount of travel and correspondence in the effort to prevent the Boston and Maine and the Maine Central railroads from cutting out their passenger service. While only limited success resulted, it should be pointed out that such curtailments will go through without even a delay if they are not strongly contested. We have also taken an active part in proceedings before the Civil Aeronautics Board in attempting to secure better air service for northern New Hampshire; the final decision on this is not yet in. In the meantime, we have worked with bus companies to publicize their service in the hope that bus travel may take up some of the slack.

Demands for White Mountains literature of all types continue to increase, and we have been considerably crowded to satisfy them. The new N. H. Montreal office, turnpike information booths, and new sources contacted while out of state have all upped the quantity of literature we need to distribute. As satisfying the requests for folders about our region means dollars to our towns, it is extremely important that we receive enough funds to supply the need.

We have continued our customary and tested programs of 4-H awards, Youth Awards in science, and of liaison with all types of organizations and departments who in one way or another are working for the benefit of our area and our state. We have confidence that 21 years has proved them worthwhile. We have continued to travel to areas outside our state to carry the White Mountains message, and have co-operated with attractions operators and others who are doing the same job in different ways.

We'd like to remind every town again in this legislative year that holding the line in taxes in New Hampshire will be possible to a large extent only as much as we continue to bring in out-of-state visitors to help finance our main sources of revenue (Ex: they pay over 40% of the gas tax

and others). To do this, we have to continue to reach out and bring them in, and put up the small sums (which return many times over) that publicity costs. It's for our own benefit, and it *does* pay off. At a small outlay to any one town, an area publicity program operates that benefits *all* our towns. Our surveys in four consecutive years have shown consistently $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 times the town monies coming back to the area out of just a few inquirers surveyed.

Your town's part in this work is important, and is appreciated. This is one way where we in New Hampshire can still do things for ourselves.

WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION

Woodsville, New Hampshire

Recent White Mountains Region Association activities have dealt with a variety of fields, including transportation, 4-H, promotion plans, industrial development, and factors involving major region tourist attractions.

At present, Executive Secy. David S. Cassedy, Woodsville, is representing this area in helping staff the state's new exhibit at the Hartford, Conn., Travel Show sponsored by the Hartford 'Times.' Investigation is also under way to try and work out joint sponsorship for a Region booth at the Montreal Sportsman's Show in March. In the meantime, the annually-issued winter folder covering all area winter facilities has been distributed in bulk to newspapers, travel bureaus, ski clubs, and the like, and newspaper advertising placed to call public attention to it.

Orders have been placed for the annual 4-H awards to top clubs, and this last year's silver bowl winner is expected to be announced shortly.

Using its privilege as an intervenor before the Civil Aeronautics Board, the W. M. R. A. has filed exceptions to the C. A. B. examiner's decision and forwarded supporting statements to bolster the state's case for better air service. Pointed out by the Region were: deterioration of other public transport, notably railroad; poor scheduling and unreliability of seating via Northeast Airlines out of Berlin; and improvements to the Whitefield facilities, where Northeast's certificate to serve has never been activated.

In their last meeting, W. M. R. A.'s Board of Directors reviewed the need for a fresh approach to the problem of industrial development, and this will be a major topic in the January meeting, with State Industrial Director Winfred Foss present to offer suggestions and comments.

Also under study is the recently-released report of the Mt. Washington Study Committee, since the directors are keenly aware of the vital effect that wrong handling could have on the operation of one of the region's most prominent and valuable recreational assets.

Last March, at its annual meeting, your town appropriated funds for continuing control of the White Pine Blister Rust in cooperation with the Forestry and Recreation Commission. Final returns to the Forestry Division indicated that 86 towns and cities did likewise.

Conforming to our yearly custom there has been prepared, and is attached herewith, a statement briefly summarizing expenditures of town, state and federal funds. The town contribution is used to employ labor, whose duties are the destruction of wild Ribes—(Currant and gooseberry bushes)—whether by hand-pulling or with the aid of chemicals. State and federal monies are spent in mapping pine areas prior to control measures; in scouting to determine the location of Ribes; purchase of chemicals and spraying equipment and transportation. These expenditures appear under the heading of "Cooperative Aid." In view of the fact that details of control work vary from town to town, it is not possible to report all in a brief statement. However, the District Leader in charge of the project in your town will be pleased to supply these details upon request, as well as to submit a map indicating those sections where this work was performed. His name and address appear below.

Success in state-wide control of the Rust is evident today. Travel along highways or through woodlands do not dis-

close the large and frequent areas of infected pines as was the situation in the early days of this project. The destruction of millions of wild Ribes is definitely reducing, very materially, the spread of this disease.

Since soil disturbances brought about by logging, fire or blow-downs may result in a regrowth of Ribes within or adjacent to the younger stands of pine, periodic examinations of these disturbed areas is necessary to maintain the control already established. The fact that in such inspections, over large acreages, but few Ribes are found, is a most encouraging condition from two angles. *First*, that protection to growing crops of white pine is assured, and *secondly*, that the cost of control is becoming less to towns as well as other cooperating agencies.

Our goal, toward which we are working, is that time when the entire state control area will be on a maintenance basis requiring only minimum funds to sustain this condition.
