



To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hebron in County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs;

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hebron on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article I. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same.

Article III. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the maintenance of Town Highway and Bridges and make appropriation for same.

Article IV. To see if the Town will raise \$50 for Old Home Day.

Article V. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for State Aid maintenance, Trunk Line maintenance, make appropriation for the same.

Article VI. To see what action the Town will take in regard to painting Town Hall and Church Building, Tractor House and Chapel and make appropriation for the same.

Article VII. To see if the Town will vote to put water in at Chapel or Grange Hall, for use of Townspeople. Article VIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$100 to be used for drawing of river gravel to be used when needed on roads.

Article IX. To see what action the Town will take in regard to fixing the road across the common and make appropriations for the same.

Article X. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting and make necessary appropriation for the same.

REPORT OF THE HEBRON LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The past year has been one of continued progress and prosperity for the Hebron Public Library.

The Library was open fifty-one Saturdays, distributing 2,502 magazines and books. We have purchased sixty-five new books and received fifty-seven as gifts.

Twenty-five dollars was given us by the State for the purchase of new books. Books are kept at the East Hebron Post Office for the use of the people in that part of the town.

Sixteen dollars and ten cents have been spent for periodicals this year.

The Librarians of Hebron, Groton, and Bristol with one of your Trustees spent a most enjoyable day at the meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association in Hanover getting many suggestions to help us in our work.

October twentieth, we entertained the District Librarians for an all day meeting. More than fifty were present, coming from New Hampton, Hill, Franklin, Bristol, Plymouth, Holderness, and Rumney. A splendid program was carried out, giving us all new vision and purpose for our work.

Under the direction of the Librarian, Mrs. Blodgett, Book Week was observed in November. The children gave a short program and Mrs. Sheldon Bissell of Franklin gave a talk on the importance of story telling in connection with Library work, and then told a very interesting story to the children.

Our needs are legion, but that most important and nearest at hand is more money for the best periodicals to add to our already splendid list. Our children's list is steadily increasing and we hope to supply them with better books next year.

In closing may we urge parents to use, and to have the children use, the books of reference, and all read the really fine books provided for you in "OUR" Library.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board:

I have the honor to present my third annual report. I shall discuss briefly a few items in the hope that they will stimulate interest and discussion at the next meeting of the school district in March.

The school district and the town in general are to be congratulated on the fine painting job done on the schoolhouses.

The small appropriation made last year to purchase adjustable desks and seats was only enough for eight new desks and seats in each school. It would be desirable to have the school district vote an additional sum this year in order to replace all of the old type furniture left, and thus complete the job. I make the same suggestions which I made in last year's report concerning chemical toilets, and electric lights. Our schoolhouses should keep up in modern improvements with the best homes in a community.

It is gratifying that last June graduation exercises were held in town, perhaps for the first time. Four boys and girls were awarded diplomas from the Hebron Elementary Schools. I am sorry that not all of them went on to high school. No community which has the best interests of its children at heart can afford to allow its children to remain a generation of eighth graders in the present social system. Let the teachers, parents, and the community in general stimulate our boys and girls with a desire for a higher educational goal. We look forward to graduation next June as the greatest event of our schools.

Considering that the roads are being improved every year, and that snow plows keep them clear of snow during the winter months, travelling conditions are much better today than the most optimistic hoped ten years ago. Distance is no longer a drawback. It is only a question of time when it will be in order to plan for some form of consolidation. People no longer fear this word. Good roads and motor vehicles at the present time enable village and country to exchange advantages with no detriment to either. The best educational opportunities are not to be secured in one room schools. A one room school capable of giving as good advantages as a consolidated school, would make the unit cost of education too high. Besides a one room school lacks the inspiration found in numbers.

Considering the social, religious, and economic resources of Hebron, it is reasonable to advocate the adoption of a progressive educational policy capable of educating boys and girls for present day living.
