THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Town meeting will be recessed for School meeting.

The articles in the warrant will be taken up at 10:00 o'clock a. m., and the polls will be closed at 5:00 p. m.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

- 3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other committees.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings and town trucks.

- 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.
- 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward paying its indebtedness or take any action relative thereto.
- 13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 14. To see what action the town will vote to take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for the same or take any action relative thereto.
- 15. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction of the Class II Road known as Warner Road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$2,022.00; or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V Roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$921.66.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to provide for additional fire protection, watchmen, additional police protection and additional health protection, which may be needed for the benefit of the citizens of the town, due to the war emergency; or take any action relative thereto.
- 17. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

The total number of pupils registered was 278 of whom four were high school tuition pupils.

From the foregoing tabulation, it will be noted that no school except Quaker Street had the required 360 half-sessions. The percent of attendance is lower. Other items are about the same as for the previous year. Parents of pupils in school might greatly increase our percent of attendance by seeing that their children are regularly in school. The only legal excuse for absence from school is the illness of a pupil, yet many other excuses are presented in notes sent by parents. There is rarely any real need for a pupil to remain out of school for work outside the family, or to go shopping with parents. In many cases, we suspect that the real reason for a pupil's absence is the lack of interest of his parents in his progress. They do not realize, or it is a matter of little moment to them, that every day lost by the pupil means a loss of instruction for that day. Lessons are lost which cannot be adequately made up. As a consequence the pupil gets behind and loses interest. He wishes to stay out oftener. School becomes a matter of little importance to him.

During the winter months, a ten-week course in Automobile and Tractor Repairing sponsored by the Federal Government for out-of-school youth, 17 through 24 years of age was given at the high school. About twelve young men completed the course. Necessary tools were furnished by the Federal Government through the State Board of Education. The cost of heat, light, power, janitor service and teacher's salary were paid by the same agency. Mr. Ray E. Bowden was the instructor.

The first prize for work of students in Mechanic

Arts Senior High Schools, also the Sweepstake award were won by Henniker High School this year at Hopkinton Fair.

The equipment of the high school was improved by the purchase of a typewriter and mimeograph machine. This permits the publication of a mimeographed school paper. It also facilitates the preparation of units of work and various tests given by the teachers.

At the Central School, there is still need of a better stove for the preparation of school lunches. The oil stove now in use is dangerous and unsatisfactory. More dishes and spoons are needed for serving lunches in this school. There is also need of more electric lights for use of the pupils in the Central building. In each of the school rooms there is only one electric light and this is in the front of the room over the teacher's desk. All the school rooms have windows on three sides so that there is extensive cross lighting. These conditions no doubt account for some of the difficulty which some pupils have with their eyes.

SHORTAGE OF TEACHERS

We wish to direct the attention of the board and the parents of pupils in the district to the serious shortage of teachers. During the past two years, this has been becoming more acute particularly among elementary teachers. Now, it is greatly accentuated and is extended to high school teachers. The reasons for this are: (a) Large numbers of young men have enlisted in the army or navy. (b) Others, both men and women have gone and will go to work in essential industries where they receive much higher wages or salaries than they would in teaching. The latter will be followed by others, who

are now teaching, unless higher salaries are paid. Prices are going up, and the value of the dollar is coming down. The cost of living has increased eleven percent since August 1939. Food prices are up nineteen percent. A dollar at the grocers is worth only about eighty cents.

Twelve million factory workers have already received an increase of 30% in average weekly earnings. Farm products have gone up 45%. Teacher's salaries, however, remain the same. Prices by the end of the year, 1942, will in all probability be 25% higher than in August, 1939. Thus the teachers salary of \$1,000.00 will be cut to \$750.00. To have purchasing value equal to that of 1939, it should be advanced to \$1,250.00. This will of course mean an increased budget and higher taxation, but to meet this, incomes of the people in general are rising faster than the cost of living. Property is worth more.

At the coming district meeting, it will be necessary for the people of the community to choose whether they will jeopardize the welfare of their children through the loss of their best teachers, or whether they will increase the salaries of these teachers enough to hold them in the district. Already, several of the teachers in Supervisory Union No. 26 have received very attractive offers to teach in neighboring states or in the larger towns and cities of New Hampshire.

The schools are our long-time line of defense. It is the responsibility of the people to strengthen rather than weaken this line.
