

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ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

To the Citizens of Hillsborough County :-

In compliance with the laws of the state of New Hampshire, the commissioners of the county of Hillsborough would submit to you their annual report, with a statement of the condition and expenditures of the different departments over which they have a general supervision, for the year ending April 30, 1884, to which are annexed the reports of the superintendent of the almshouse, treasurer, clerk of the court, sheriff, jailer, and auditors.

COUNTY FARM AND ALMSHOUSE.

The affairs of this institution are under the able and efficient management of Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Stiles, who are ever watchful for the best interests of the county, and for the comfort of those unfortunate ones under their charge. Mr. Stiles has shown good financial ability in purchasing the supplies for so large a family, and is very careful that nothing goes to waste.

The matron, Mrs. Stiles, whose duties are large in an institution like this, has filled them very satisfactorily to the commissioners, and with a fidelity that commands our hearty approval. We are pleased to report to the residents of Hillsborough county that Mr. and Mrs. Stiles are to remain in charge of the county almshouse for another year.

The assistant matrons, who have had charge of the insane wards, Mrs. Nettie M. Webber and Mrs. L. J. Whitehouse, as we have been unfortunate enough to have two in the past year,

have both shown good ability in the management of the insane, by their kind treatment and easy way of satisfying their many wants.

The assistant superintendent, Mr. Dodge, has very acceptably filled his position in supplying the wants of those under his charge and maintaining good discipline.

The school at the farm has been under the charge of Miss Hattie Putnam, who has very acceptably filled the position of teacher. The school has made as good improvement as could be expected, as some of the scholars are here but a short time. They go and come. The weekly average of scholars is thirty-five.

The sanitary condition of the almshouse and insane wards has been good. We think Dr. Hatch has done every thing that he could for the sick. We would refer you to his report elsewhere.

An addition has been built to the female insane ward the past year of 34 x 50 feet, two stories high, with cellar under the whole, at a cost of \$4,496.39. This addition was built at the right time, as it was very much needed the past winter, as the number of inmates of this ward was largely increased.

A new boiler has been put in and the boiler-house enlarged during the past year at a cost of \$2,061.83. This improvement was very much needed. The size of the boiler is 4 1-2 feet in diameter and 11 feet tube. The cost for permanent improvements on the insane ward, and boiler and boiler-house, has been \$6,558.12.

As can be seen elsewhere, the balance against the farm was \$22,412.79, which makes the cost of board per week \$1.62; deducting the cost for permanent improvements from the balance against the farm, leaves the cost of board per week \$1.16, for the year ending April 30, 1884. The crops of the farm have been large the past year, which makes a great difference in the cost of board per week; the larger the number of inmates the cheaper in proportion, per week. The largest number of inmates at any time the past year was 319; the weekly average for the year was 266.

The expense of county paupers not at the county almshouse is a little larger than last year, to the amount of \$1,200. The law

passed by the last legislature making the settlement of paupers commence at the year 1870 made a large number of paupers for the county that had been supported by the towns before the passage of that law. The larger part of them were removed to the county almshouse, which helped to increase the number there; the rest of them are supported in the towns where they lived. The class of paupers that is helped by the commissioners away from the county almshouse is the most difficult problem that we have to contend with, — to know what to do, and how much to help those that ask aid of the county, and whom to help, so that no deserving ones shall be neglected. We are sorry to say that sometimes we find dishonesty practiced among those who ask aid.

The expense at the jail, for board of prisoners, repairs and other incidentals, amounts to \$5,632.31, against \$6,456.87, a reduction of \$824.56 for the year. The prisoners are employed at an income of \$400 to the county; and we are pleased to say that in our visits to the jail we have found every thing satisfactory, and believe that the jailer and matron, Mr. and Mrs. Wadsworth, fill their positions with honor to themselves and satisfaction to those under their charge.

We are putting in at the county farm a windmill for the purpose of pumping water, which we hope will give us a good supply. There are some other improvements that might be made at this institution, which we think can be postponed until another year. In closing our report, we would extend to all citizens of the county an earnest invitation to visit the county farm and see for themselves how things are managed.

The number of weeks' board furnished to inmates for the year ending April 30, 1884, was 13,762; dividing \$22,412.79, the balance against the farm, by that number, it will give \$1.62 and a fraction as the cost of board; and deducting \$6,558.12, the amount paid for new insane and boiler houses, it will give the cost of board a fraction less than \$1.16 per week for each inmate.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Commissioners for Hillsborough County:—

GENTLEMEN, — Notwithstanding an almost entire change in the list of officers and the employment of new and inexperienced men and women in the places of those who left, I think the affairs of the institution and farm have prospered, and we are able to make a creditable showing at the end of the year.

The number of inmates cared for has been larger than in any previous year in the history of the institution, still all have been comfortably provided for, and the capacity of the institution not overtaxed.

It will be noticed that the price per week for board of inmates is lower than for several years previous. It is accounted for from the fact that a large per cent of our inmates were young children, and also that the produce from the farm went a long way in supporting our large family. We had an abundance of cabbage, parsnips, apples, and other vegetables, of which all seemed to be very fond. Our apple crop was bountiful. We sold twelve hundred dollars' worth, besides giving out to animals about 325 barrels.

The greatly increased comfort and cleanliness enjoyed by the female insane, as a result of the additional room furnished by the extension and enlargement of the female insane wards, are sufficient argument to convince any one that an addition of the same dimensions or greater to the house occupied by the insane males would result equally as well, and is called for upon the grounds of health, comfort, and cleanliness.

We have suffered much inconvenience from the short supply of water, the rams not being sufficiently powerful to force to the reservoir water enough to furnish all that is required for the boiler, laundry, and cooking purposes, but as soon as the windmill contracted for is in place and working successfully, we hope for no further trouble from that source.

A large saving of fuel has resulted from the use of the new boiler, and we have had no trouble in heating all the premises.

The school has had a larger number of scholars than ever before, and many of them have made fine improvement in their studies.

The hollow at the foot of the hill as you approach the institution has been filled in about twelve feet, and it is contemplated to still further reduce the steep ascent.

I repeat what I said last year in favor of ensilage. I regard it as a useful and economical article of food for stock.

In closing, I desire to express my appreciation of the courtesy and kindness that have attended all my intercourse with the commissioners, and to such of the officers as have performed their duties faithfully and promptly I return my thanks.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Commissioners of Hillsborough County: -

GENTLEMEN, — Allow me to make my third annual report of the sanitary condition of the Hillsborough County almshouse during the past year.

On account of a change in the state law, the number of inmates has increased greatly during the past year, and of course with an increase in number there has been a corresponding increase in the amount of sickness, but we have terminated the year without increasing the death rate from last year.

The low death rate at this institution is due in part to better facilities that we now have to take care of the sick ones, also in part to the matron, who makes it her practice to personally attend to the sick.

The increase in the size of the female insane ward was a great improvement, and now the inmates there are sick less often than before, although there are more of them.

I think that there should be an alteration in the size of the nursery. It is not of sufficient size for the number children who occupy. They cannot get a sufficient quantity of good air in that small room. It is impossible to ventilate it as it is now without exposing them to cold. I think a change there is needed very much indeed.

I wish to thank the commissioners, Mr. and Mrs. Stiles, and all officers, for the courtesy at all times shown me.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Commissioners of Hillsborough County: —

GENTLEMEN, — Since last September I have performed the duties of the chaplaincy at the Hillsborough County farm at Wilton.

During this time a preaching service has been held once a month. These services have been well attended; nearly all the inmates of the institution who are able to attend seem to appreciate these religious privileges, and all, from the children to the aged, apparently give close attention to the preaching of the Word.

Funerals have been attended as they have occurred. The sick have been visited and others have been conversed with. It has been with a considerable degree of satisfaction that I have attended to these duties. It has seemed to be service for the Lord. "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these, my brethren, ye have done it unto me." With the Lord's gracious help I have tried to be faithful to the trust. It has been my aim to preach the truth and claims of the gospel in those aspects which seemed most in keeping with the time and place, as clearly and forcibly as I was able.

If there is one class of people more than another who need the comforting, guiding and restraining influence of the gospel, it is those who are usually brought together in institutions like this. Many who find a home here have not, nor can ever expect to have, any bright earthly prospect before them. The earthly portion of many is only disease and suffering; but the grace of God, through faith in Jesus Christ, is able to save the soul and insure the blessings of heaven. Jesus ministered to the poor and suffering, and gave as one of the proofs that the Messiah had come that the poor have the gospel preached to them.

I desire to express my conviction that the superintendent and matron are devoted to the general comfort and well-being of those under their care; but of that which it is most fitting for me to speak is the interest they feel in the moral welfare of these people. Mrs. Stiles is especially devoted to the welfare of the children, — the most interesting department in the institution; and eternity only will fully reveal the results of the good impressions made on their young minds and hearts. A Sunday-school is sustained, mainly for the children, which they much enjoy.

Through the effort of Mrs. Stiles quite a library of good books has been collected for the use of the inmates, and considerable religious, instructive, and otherwise interesting reading is also furnished them through magazines. papers, etc., collected from various sources. Lectures and talks on temperance have been given at various times during the year.

I feel that no pains should be spared to make the moral and religious atmosphere of institutions like this as pure and elevating as possible.
