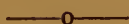

TOWN WARRANT



STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Child's Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustees of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, Community Building, appropriations for street lights and all current expenses of the town and such amounts as may be necessary to apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges culverts and sidewalks.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Memorial Day purposes.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of \$750 to be applied upon the account of the Hillsboro District Nursing Association.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town and in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum equal to not more than one one-hundredth of one per cent (1-100 of 1 per cent) of the assessed valuation based upon assessment of 1945 for the purpose of publicizing the natural advantages of the town in connection with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 for the care and maintenance of the Town Clock, so-called, on Smith Memorial Church.

Article 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to secure the assistance of the State Tax Commission in reappraising the taxable property in the town in order to secure greater equality as between taxpayers, and to insure the assessment of all property in the town on the same standard of value, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and ap-

propriate the sum of \$500 for the support of band concerts for the coming season.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$200.00 to be used for the care and maintenance of Grimes Field.

Article 16. To see if the town will appoint an airport (or Aviation) committee (or Commission) consisting of three members to be appointed by Selectmen and authorized to act for the town in all matters pertaining to the establishment, construction and operation of aircraft landing areas and to confer and consult with State and Federal officers and to execute in the name of the town any and all necessary or desirable instruments and agreements in connection therewith.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$3,000.00 to be expended under the direction of the (Airport Committee) (Aviation Commission) (other Municipal Officials) for the establishment, construction and operation of aircraft landing areas.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 for the salary of an extra police officers for four months in the summer, said officer to be hired by the Chief of Police.

Article 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

General Report

It has been said in a recent bulletin of the U. S. Office of Education that education at the elementary level should be a series of experiences which the school selects for the purpose of guiding the growth and development of children.

Every child needs opportunity to work with his hands, using all kinds of materials and equipment; to develop skills that will make him efficient in earning a living and in getting along with others; to have a hobby or two, to have time to play and to use it wisely; to demonstrate good health in his own habits of living; to appreciate and to enjoy art, music, and literature in an active way; to have some idea of places and people other than his own home and friends, and to know how they influence his own life; and to be challenged to work hard at whatever he undertakes.

Here in the Hillsboro Town schools our teachers have devoted considerable attention to directing their programs towards many of these goals. The school board has liberally provided the latest textbooks and supplies as needed by the scope of the program being offered. A music program is being included under the direction of Mr. Herman Hill. Playground activities at the Upper Village school are quite limited due to the poor terrain. Health facilities at all four schools are in clean condition but of course there is no running water at any of them. The school board has had done, all of the repair work that could be done considering the labor and materials available and all the buildings which are in use, are in safe and useable condition.

Last May, achievement tests were administered to all pupils in the upper grades and the results were quite satisfactory. This test covered the so-called tool subjects such as arithmetic and interpretation of reading.

In November, all the schools took part in a Public Speaking program which was well attended by friends and parents of the pupils. Such programs serve to acquaint teachers and parents with mutual problems.

This year's warrant contains so many controversial subjects that I fear that it may fan political debate to an extent that our primary purpose for existence may be lost sight of. It is imperative that we remember that our basic problem is education for our pupils and that it be of a type and standard presented by our community which is paying for it.

The article pertaining to the sale of three schoolhouses if passed will relieve the District of considerable expense and responsibilities while any buyers would become tax contributors according to the value of the purchase. There are also arguments against passage of this article. The question is dependent on a consideration of just how much such property-holding by a School District contributes to the education of its pupils.

The article pertaining to a study of the building problem has several angles of interpretation which may influence any vote. Sometimes such a study saves a District considerable controversy for several years.

In conclusion I wish to thank voters of the District for electing to their board, such capable and willing persons as Mr. Johnson, Mrs. Powell and Mr. Moulton. They have been fine to work for. The parents of our pupils should also be commended for their grand co-operation, especially in matters of attendance.

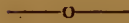

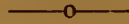

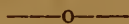
For the Year 1947-1948

This proposed budget allows for our contemplated needs as far as money is concerned, for the ensuing year. The laws now require us to pay a share of the retirement costs of employees who belong to the retirement systems. This explains the large increase in fixed charges. Supplies now cost twice as much as they did a year ago. Our mechanical equipment such as typewriters and machines has not been adequately replaced during the long years of war and must soon be replaced. If any form of state aid becomes available at this session of the legislature, it may be advisable to use some of it for renovation of the Chemistry and Home Economics laboratories and the Primary rooms as recommended in the Superintendent's report. These projects are long overdue and would require considerable new, modern equipment.

On September 4, 1946, Hillsboro High School opened as a six year High School. The enrollment was 203. Included in this were 5 veterans, who are interested in earning

their diplomas, although each of them had passed his G. E. D. tests and was eligible for a certificate of completion.

The School Christmas Party found the entire Student Body together for the first time. The party was a success with tree, gifts, and Santa Claus.

By means of a reorganization of the daily schedule, the Physical Education Program for boys and girls has been greatly improved. Now it is possible for every student in the school to have an opportunity to take part in a Physical Education Program, under the direction of a trained leader.

Medical examinations and hearing tests have been given to all pupils by the school doctor and nurse. The Dental Clinic has been conducted by the school nurse and dentist.

The offerings in the music department have been increased. Chorus and Glee are under the direction of Mr. Kenneth Jewett while the orchestra is under the leadership of Mr. Herman Hill.

The Student Council has continued, and with its sponsors, has taken over the responsibility of the Social and Recreational program for the school year.

The testing program has been continued and strengthened. All 4 classes were given the Iowa Tests for Development by Grades. The results are on file and have been of much assistance in guidance.

A definite guidance program has been set up this year with Mr. Serguis J. Bernard as director. This department working with the Headmaster and the teachers, hopes to be of much service to the students.

The school wishes to acknowledge with thanks, the gift of \$15 from the class of 1946, to be used for an outdoor flag for the school.

The program for Visual Education is being carried on and many worth while educational films are on the list.

May I express my sincere thanks to the faculty and pupils who, by their willing co-operation, have helped so much in whatever progress has been made.

THE GENERAL REPORT

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Continuously through the years as our towns, states and America have developed, the schools have attempted to meet the needs of the times. Like our nation, the educational system here in Hillsboro has perhaps grown so rapidly that we have not always had time to study just what our needs were and to plan education that would meet them. We have, instead, perhaps invariably met demands by makeshift measures designed to take us through another school year each time. Many of these makeshift practices introduced in this way have now become so traditional with us that it is difficult to modify them to meet modern needs. It is only by realistic evaluation of Hillsboro's educational needs, and of the processes by which she may reach these goals, that our schools can hope to be effective. Education is now trying, by meeting the present and increasing needs of each child for a full, complete life, to meet the demands of our society. Each child needs abundant, continuing physical health; fundamental, continuing mental health; increasing social understanding and adaptability; increasing competence in those abilities which make him able to function in the modern world. To catch up with these goals, Hillsboro has a long road to travel and in as short time as possible.

Generally, Hillsboro schools are making some conversion progress in all departments. Especially gratifying was the response of parents and citizens to our plea for salary money last March. Fortunately our pleas were granted, for we were forced to employ many new teachers and in a market which was so short, that we sorely needed the money. We anticipate no break in salaries this year and will have to make very substantial increases to retain most of our present staff. The budget takes care of our anticipated needs, as presented. In November, our teachers were caught in the widespread high cost of living squeeze and made a request for a salary adjustment. Being more fair minded than many other faculties, they agreed to have the money requested at our annual meeting in March. The matter needs careful consideration by the voters, in the same fair attitude taken by our teachers.

Another important item in the budget, calls for a slight increase in the salaries of your district officers. It is doubtful if the present salaries of your school board members even pay their actual expenses incurred in carrying out their constantly multiplying duties and responsibilities in behalf of the District. If the Hillsboro Special District wants to continue to have the services of well qualified and vitally interested citizens for its School Board, it seems as though this increase might well be approved.

One of the most substantial program changes has been in the High School shop where we are inaugurating a complete program of arts and crafts, which are not in the Home Economics courses. Eventually, this should provide material and instruction in trades and hobbies, available to all pupils in the school. The conversion task is tremendous and we are indeed grateful to Mr. Bartlett Lund for his talent and interest.

The noon-lunch program must be common knowledge to the parents of over two-hundred children who are served daily, a completely balanced hot lunch. Here again is an example of the very close cooperation of your school board with modern trends in education.

Last fall, at the High School, we were obliged to make certain fundamental changes in the basic schedule. This brings us about half way to a good schedule which can be brought about more readily when we get at least one more teacher as requested in our budget. Schools like, Peterboro, carry at least eleven teachers for our number of pupils. We have requested ten for next year in the six year High School program. It might be said here that the Junior Highs generally are being absorbed into High School programs. Here again is an example of a need for rapid catching-up because of previous delay in changing fundamental organization.

It seems advisable to maintain the Grammar school building about in its present state. The building is nearly obsolete, but usable. Certain desirable changes should be made at the High School now. These are not too extensive but should be done. The present so-called science laboratory and also the Home Economics laboratory are totally inadequate. If state aid ever becomes available, we should use some of it to re-equip these two basic laboratories. One other need, of imminence, is the gymnasium problem.

This might entail probable extension of the back wall so that the gym would be twice as large as it is now, and the playing court turned around. This might leave room for bleachers, take care of the stage problem and permit closing off the corridors with glass brick. This might provide us with much needed physical facilities. Perhaps a committee could be provided to make a study of these problems and to make recommendations at the next meeting.

I have inserted several tables at the beginning of this report in case you are interested in comparing our schools with others. It was necessary to use different town groupings because some do not have high schools, which are nearest to us in population.

In conclusion, I wish to thank Chairman Ellsworth, Mrs. Tasker, and Mr. Mason for their extremely helpful co-operation in promoting the welfare of our pupils which is the purpose for which we are organized. Thanks also go to the parents, teachers and pupils for their insistence on better things in education, and for their loyal co-operation in our undertakings.

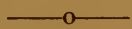

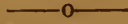

REPORT OF ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

Dear Mr. McCormack:

The spirit and temper of a nation is expressed in the physical action of its youth.

For the past 150 years, European physical education has been based upon the creation of strong bodies to be of military service to the state. Thus, European systems of physical education provide for rugged and exacting programs of mass body drills. The individual is taught to follow the leader without question, in the service of the state.

The highly competitive spirit of the American way of life is reflected in the physical education of American youth. The physical educator has an outstanding opportunity to offer a program of competitive team games and to teach democracy in terms of competition, sportsmanship and adaptability to situations in learning to live with the other fellow. The physical educator must include a small element of daring in his activities; the American boy soon loses interest in a challengeless program.

At Hillsboro High School we are attempting to follow these ideals in our Saturday morning classes for the fifth and sixth grade boys, in our Junior High School intramural and interschool activities and in our Senior High School interclass and interschool activities.
