TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the town of Hollis in the county of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in town affairss

You are hereby notified to meet at Lower Town Hall in said Hollis on Tuesday, the fourteenth of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Polls will be open from 9 A. M. to 6 P. M.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To hear the reports of the Selectmen and other Town Officers and Committees.

4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Treasurer under order of the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and appropriate the sum of \$868.77.

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute blank inventories at the time of appraisal.

7. To see if the Town will vote to allow 2% discount on taxes paid before August 1st 1950 and assess fines of twenty cents on all poll taxes not paid by September 1st 1950.

8. To see if the Town will vote to sell the land formerly owned by George Felton and land formerly owned by Phillip LeFavor to Robert O'Donnell.

9. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the road from the west end of the old Runnell's Bridge to the Mass. State line which lies more than fifty feet from the center of the new road.

10. To see if the Town will vote to reopen a portion of the old Pound road from Fred Emery's eastward to the residence of Dana Lund a distance of 550 feet. 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to lease the old Fire House to the Petry Post, American Legion.

12. To see if the Town will vote to enact an ordinance regulating open-air motion picture theaters, or take any other action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town's people will consider holding Town Meeting at night instead of during the day.

14. To see if the Town will vote that the present Zoning laws if still legal and the proposed revised Zoning laws be abolished.

15. To see if the Town will vote that no fund appropriated for a certain category in any Town Department shall be transferred from one category or Town Department to another category or Town Department. Unless voted to do so by the town voters according to law at a special or regular Town Meeting.

16. To see if the Town will vote to turn the new Fire House into two class rooms to ease the present congestion and appropriate and raise the money for same.

17. To see if the Town will vote that the present Planning Board be abolished.

18. To see if the Town will vote that in the event the Planning Board is not abolished then they shall be elected by written vote for a term of three years and not appointed as they are at present.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT FOR TOWN OF HOLLIS

Approximately 25 cases of communicable diseases, such as Mumps, Measles, and Scarlet Fever were reported during 1949. This number is somewhat higher than previous years, so let's all help keep this number at a minimum. Please report all cases immediately.

Many samples of water have been taken and tested from wells throughout the town. Many of these have been found to be very unsatisfactory, due to a high bacteria content as well as very high in calcium chloride, which indicates evidence of drainage from highways and highly fertilized fields and gardens. Let's all help to overcome this situation for the protection of all concerned.

We are still continuing with the garbage collection and urge you all to take advantage of this service where possible.

We urge you NOT to use the side of the highway for the disposal of refuse of any kind. It is against the law and you may be prosecuted.

Let's all join together and help keep our Town clean and healthy.

STATE CHILD HEALTH AND IMMUNIZATION CLINIC

A Child Health and Immunization Clinic was held on the morning of September 1, 1949 at the Hollis School with the cooperation of the local Women's Club and Legion Auxiliary.

Maurice Chagnon, M. D., of Nashua, N. H., assisted by Betsy Muzzey, R. N., and Hector Thibeault, M. D. of Wilton, N. H., assisted by Helen Zalanskas, R. N., were the clinic staff.

There were seven infants and twenty-six pre-school children examined, seventeen of whom received a booster injection to aid in the immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetanus. Four children were vaccinated against smallpox.

Mrs. Mary Smith, Mrs. Elizabeth Parker, Mrs. Norma Morrison and Mrs. Bertha Duncan under the chairmanship of Mrs. Cecile Davis weighed and measured each child and took his history before he was examined. After the clinic each child having a condition needing correction was visited by the State Nurse and the condition explained to the mother, also an interpretation of the doctor's suggestions.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF

The fire record for 1949 shows a total of 21 alarms which is 6 more than for 1948. There were 7 chimney fires, 1 fire at the Town Dump, 3 brush and 2 grass fires, 1 car on fire, 6 building fires and 1 call for aid to Brookline woods fire. These fires required a total of 740 man hours for service, 1/3 of this was spent on the Brookline fire and $\frac{1}{2}$ the service was needed on the three buildings destroyed.

The 5 brush and grass fires were small, covering about 1 acre in total. This shows excellent aid from citizens by giving immediate alarms and full cooperation in outdoor burning, especially during the serious dry spell of the summer. A total of 310 permits were issued for outdoor fires.

The Dodge truck was equipped with a new 500 gallon per ininute pump and a tank holding 675 gallons of water. With other small extinguishers and foam-making nozzles we have an excellent all-purpose fire fighting unit.

The new fire station is nearly finished and will cost less than the appropriation voted.

Most fires are preventable, so may 1 again urge everyone to continue their caution against fire and continue the good fire record for another year.

REPORT OF HOLLIS PLANNING BOARD 1949

Although the thoughts and activities of your planning board have been on a general long range program, we have spent most of our time on the first steps of preparing a tax map for the town, as well as practical working maps for each of the departments in town. Much of our time has also been given to the revising of our present zoning laws, bringing them up to date with the many changes in our town.

At present our recommendations are under the advisement of cur legal adviser. From this advice we will not have the necessary recommendations ready for a public hearing, in time to present them at this year's Town Meeting. We do, however, wish to continue our work, and have the necessary recommendations ready for a hearing shortly after Town Meeting, followed by a special Town Meeting at which everyone may have an opportunity to vote on them.

Studies have also been made in regards to supplies for our Town Hall banquet hall and kitchen, but since there are so many other large and important expenditures we felt that this particular program could be held in the minority at present.

We wish to call your attention to the good work of the new Tree committee, and hope it may proceed with its good work this year and the years to come.

Constructive criticism, and practical suggestion, are, and will always be welcome to your planning board.

SCHOOL WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Hollis, New Hampshire, qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Lower Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March 1950, at 8 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the district will vote to form a cooperative secondary school district for grades 7-12 with the school district of Amherst, effective July 1, 1950, in accordance with Chapter 199, Laws of 1947 and take any other action relating thereto.

9. If the preceding article is not adopted by both Hollis and Amherst districts, to see if the district will vote to build and equip a new elementary school consisting of not less than six regular classrooms with sanitary and administrative facilities, provide the necessary equipment and furnishings, and to acquire any real property that may be necessary for the proper location of such a school and take any other action relating thereto.

10. If the preceding article is adopted, to see what sum the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the construction, equipment and furnishings for such new elementary school and the acquisition of any real property that may be necessary for its location; and whether the district will vote to authorize the issue of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale, the time and place of payment of principal in accordance with the municipal bond statute, N. H. Revised Laws Chapter 72 as amended by Chapter 55 Laws of 1949. 11. If the district has adopted the article for a new elementary school, to see if the district will vote to appoint a building committee to consist of the school board and two persons to be appointed by the moderator to select the location of the school and to supervise the construction of said building, provided that the plans, specifications and selection of the site for the new school shall be approved by the school board acting alone as required by law and the school board be further authorized to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary in connection with the construction of said school

12. If Article 8 is not adopted by both Hollis and Amherst districts and if Articles 9, 10 and 11 are not adopted, to see what action the district will take in providing six additional regular and special classrooms with adequate sanitary and administrative facilities, make the necessary alterations to the existing village school building, provide the equipment and furnishings for the same and take any other action pertinent thereto.

13. If the preceding article is adopted to see what sum the district will raise and appropriate for the enlargement and renovation of the present village school building; and whether the district will vote to authorize the issue of serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the district for all or any portion of the sum so raised and appropriated; and to authorize the school board to determine the terms and conditions upon which the notes or bonds shall be issued including their sale, the time and place of payment of principal, in accordance with the municipal bond statute, N. H. Revised Laws Chapter 72 as amended by Chapter 55 Laws of 1949.

14. If the district has adopted the article to remodel the present village school, to see if the district will vote to appoint a building committee to consist of the school board and two persons to be appointed by the moderator to supervise the construction of six additional regular and special classrooms with adequate sanitary and administrative facilities and make the necessary alterations to the existing village school building, provide the equipment and furnishings and the school board be further authorized to execute any and all contracts or agreements necessary in connection with construction, remodeling and renovation of said school. 15. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive, in the name of the district, such advances, grants in aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States government or any state or private agency.

16. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00, to be paid into the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of new school building or the remodeling of the present building.

17. If either article 11 or 14 is adopted, to see if the district will vote to use the capital reserve funds as previously voted and to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to pay over these accumulated funds to the school board as agents of the school district to be used in the construction of a new school building or the remodeling of the present building.

18. To see if district will vote to send the High School students to Nashua schools, and raise and appropriate money to accomplish same.

19. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

20. To see how much money the district will raise and appropriate for special repairs, alterations, insurance and new equipment.

21. To see if the district will approve the transfer by the school board of the financial books and records to the office of the Superintendent.

22. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hollis:

I herewith present my eleventh report, the thirty-first in the series. I commend to your attention the various reports of my colleagues, statistical and financial, which appear in these pages.

1. TEACHERS

A. Printed elsewhere in this report, you will find a list of teachers for 1948-49. To bring the record up to date, there have been two changes:

B. If any who read these pages are considering occupations for their young people, might I suggest the field of teaching? It is now much better paid than formerly. The prospects for security, improved working conditions and continued employment are indeed good. For the next few years, the need for teachers in the elementary schools will be very great. Kindly remember that the number of candidates in training should be three in elementary to every one in secondary and that Hollis, to replace its staff, ought to send two candidates to training school every year.

2. SCHOOL PHILOSOPHY

Change is inevitable. Schools, like life, cannot remain static. They change because people change. They try to meet the needs of the children for the present and for the life they will lead in the future. Some of the following may point to the way it is being done in a few subject fields. They are not confined to any one grade level, but extend throughout the system.

A. Three R's

A nationwide survey among adults shows that six out of ten adults believe children are better taught in reading than they were. America bought over 50 million newspapers every day last year, and think of the weekly papers and magazines that circulate to the millions. The modern reading program has been developed so that children read more books than ever, read faster and with greater understanding. Writing is stressed in the early years of school. It is one of the essential skills which every person should possess. The big goals are legibility and speed.

Modern instruction in arithmetic conforms to the basic needs and use of this tool. Problem-solving occupies an important place. Faults are corrected by remedial exercises. A teacher can, by tests, determine how well her pupils rate with each other and with similar grades in other schools.

The amount of time spent on these three R's is much greater than it was a hundred years ago. The techniques have improved, and the schools teach them better than ever before.

B. Health

There are many ways in which the schools contribute to the health of the child. The School Board mentions one, and I would emphasize that — physical education. We are very proud of that program. This most important field and its close ally, recreation, are contributions of the modern school to the development of the whole child.

C. Music

This is the one subject for everyone. All manners and kinds of people meet on common ground in music. There is perhaps no other experience of the school program that is carried over more completely into adult life than music appreciation and performance. To be sure, there are unmet needs in this field, but generally greater enjoyment, opportunity for display of special talents, appreciation are end results.

D. Social subjects.

These include history, geography, economics, civics, sociology. Their purpose is to create a more effective citizenship. History, we must have to understand the backgrounds. We study the past to learn about the present, the present to predict the future. Geography of towns, states, nations leads to understanding of the relations of people with each other. Economics covers problems of capital and labor, tariff, exchange, banking, price, rent and hundreds of others closely associated with daily living. Sociology deals with the family, stability of home, population growth, crime, education, sanitation and many other subjects close to human relationships. Civics is the study of the principles of our government, including federal, state and local.

3. "STORK AND SCHOOL BOARD"

This is a quotation from a recent article, but it leads to the next problem of needs. I am sure I cannot fully solve it. Perhaps I shouldn't try. I will, however, give you some help in arriving at your solution. The following table illustrates the present enrollment projected into the next five years, with the help of census and predicted entering classes. I do not guarantee the numbers, since people move away and come to town too often to allow exactness.

B. Authorities point out that the teacher load should be 20 to 25 pupils in Grades 1 through 3, and 25 to 30 in Grades 4 through 6. These are the limits for effective teaching. I think you can see what effect each added pupil would have upon the total teaching output.

Therefore there ought to be four teachers next year for Grades 1 through 3, and two for grades 4 through 6, which would make six teachers. You now have four rooms and four teachers for these grades. In a few years, the increase will be felt in the high school C. Plans have been discussed to alleviate the room shortage. I assume plans will be presented by committees already established, either cooperatively or locally.

4. UNMET NEEDS

A. Art — as means of expression, for fun, for imagination, to coordinate manual capacities, to help in clear thinking — and extra teaching to lighten the load in English and other combined classes are first in mind.

5. APPRECIATIONS

My appreciation for all the worthwhile activities of a busy school year go to the School Board, teachers, pupils and citizens. In this connection, I am awaiting anxiously the success of the "window" study which started so auspiciously in the recent workshop.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

I herewith submit my third annual report as Headmaster of Hollis High School.

The 1949-50 school year began September 7, 1949, with an enrollment of 51 students in the High School. At present there are 10 Seniors, 17 Juniors, 12 Sophomores and 10 Freshmen for a total of 48. In the Junior High there are 19 in the 8th and 17 in the 7th grade.

Time allotted to high school subjects is four 50-minute periods a week for all except the following: Physics, five 60-minute periods a week; Biology, five 60-minute periods; Home, seven 50-minute periods; Foods, seven 50 minute periods; Home Economics, 7th and 8th grades, three 50-minute periods.

The above subjects may be supplemented by correspondence courses from the University of Nebraska.

The School Lunch Program began October 1st. Approximately 150-160 children are provided with hot meals each noon. Mrs Coleman is the treasurer and is in charge of making up the menus and the buying. Mrs Parkhurst is in charge of the kitchen with Mrs Hills her assistant. During the Summer months a ceiling was placed over the beams in the lunch room to eliminate dust and dirt that was being jarred loose. Since school started the students have painted the walls of the lunch room and replaced the oilcloth in the high school room, under the guidance of Mrs Coleman. Other improvements were made by the school board. The tubes in the steam boiler were replaced and leaking washtubs were changed.

The total income from the Noon Lunch Program was \$5096.73, of which \$1,547.63 was Federal Aid. Total expenses, including improvements to the Lunch Room, were \$5,190.12.

Activities for the last half of the school year 1948-49 were as follows. Athletic activities included basketball and baseball. The State Music Festival was attended by Annette Colborn and Juanita Nartoff. The operatta "Stephen Foster" was presented by Hollis Center School under the direction of our music teacher, Miss Ethelyn Edwards. Roger Saunders and Norma Jambard were elected to attend Boys and Girls State at the University of New Hampshire. Alan Orde and Roger Saunders attended the Youths Government Conference at Dartmouth College, and Concord, N. H. In May, the Juniors had their Junior Prom, and in June came the Senior Ball and Graduation.

The Seniors who graduated in June were: Martha Bell, Juanita Nartoff, Shirley Smith, Jane Wilkins and Charles Woods Jr. Of the six Graduates, four are taking further education. One entering the University of New Hampshire, one entering Jackson College, one the Nashua Business College, and one in training for the nursing profession. Our school activities this year again began with the Senior Play, "Spring Fever", under the direction of Miss Rideout. The play was its usual success playing before a capacity crowd. The Sophomores had their annual Freshman Initiation and roller skating party.

With the repair of the motion picture projector, more educational films are being shown to supplement classroom instruction. In June, the Class of 1949 gave five dollars toward the purchase of a film strip projector which now enables the school to show film strips and slides which are becoming an increasing aid in the furthurance of education. Activities for the remainder of the school year 1949-50 will include baseball and softball in the Spring, a musical program by Miss Edwards, Junior Prom in May and the Senior Ball and Graduation in June.

On January 4, 5 and 6, a workshop on "The Evaluation of Our Schools" was held at Milford. High School Seniors, Parents, Teachers, and Townspeople of Hollis, Amherst and Milford were participants in the Workshop. Hollis was well represented at the Workshop with over 34 Students and Parents present. At the end of the Workshop the Hollis group decided to continue the "Evaluation", with the emphasis placed on the Hollis School. On January 12, 1950, at the Parent-Teachers meeting a program of study was set up under the guidance of Mr. Arthur Shedd, Director of Secondary School Practices, from the State Board of Education. Four study groups were set up with a chairman and secretary being elected for each group. These four groups were each given four problems or questions pertinent to the functioning of the Hollis Center School for study and evaluation. A second meeting was held January 27, and a third planned for the 15th of February. All residents of Hollis are invited and urged to attend these meetings.

In closing my report, I again wish to thank the school faculty for their cooperation, and the community for the fine support given to school functions.
