TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hooksett in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L.S.]

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hooksett on Tuesday, the tenth (10th) day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon; action upon the following subjects will be at eleven of the clock in the forenoon; polls will close at 6:30 P. M.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
- 3. To hear and act upon the report of the Town Budget Committee.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget in whole or in part.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to give a discount of two per cent (2%) on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before the fifteenth (15th) day of July.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to accept all Trust Funds not before accepted.
- 7. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of the 1942 taxes, to be repaid therefrom.
- 8. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Agents, Auditors and Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise one hundred dollars (\$100.00) to be used by the George E. Merrill Post

No. 37, of Hooksett, for Memorial and Armistice Day ceremonies, as petitioned for by George A. Cook and ten (10) others.

10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) to be at the disposal of the Defense Chairman for defense purposes only. This amount can be applied to the appropriation of the Town's Board of Health amount, made annually, as petitioned for by John L. H. Prince, the Public Safety Chairman, and twenty-one (21) others.

Instructions by State Board of Assessors, now in the hands of the Board of Selectmen, describes how this money

can be raised.

- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand six hundred dollars (\$1,600.00) to replace all stone culverts with concrete pipe, shape up with gravel, and surface treat with tar, a distance of two thousand nine hundred (2,900) feet on the Hackett Hill Bow road, starting at present tar road and go towards the Bow Town Line, or take any action relative thereto, as petitioned for by George H. Elliott, and twenty-five (25) others.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred sixty dollars (\$560.00) to shape up and surface treat with tar, Jacob Avenue, as petitioned for by Honore Dubuc and twenty-eight (28) others.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, not to exceed two thousand one hundred thirty-seven dollars (\$2,137.00) for the purpose of purchasing fire fighting equipment for South Hooksett Fire Department No. 2. The equipment to consist of one 1½ ton truck, one two hundred (200) gallon portable fire pump, one eight hundred (800) gallon water tank and other necessary material and labor for equipping same, as petitioned for by William S. Smith and sixteen (16) others.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred fifty dollars (\$350.00) to purchase a Booster Pump to be placed on the Dodge Truck at No. 1 Fire Station, as petitioned for by Ovila Chevrette and twenty-one (21) others.

15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the rate of pay of the New Hampshire Highway Department for

2 cu. vd. Dump Trucks, \$1.70 per hour, hand loaded 3 2.30 " 66 66 " 66 " 66 66 4 2.90 66 66 3.50

If loaded by power equipment, an increase of ten cents (10c) per hour to above rates. For plowing snow

2 Ton Truck, with front plow only, \$2.75 per hour.

- 4 Ton Truck, with front and wing plows, \$4.00 per hour. For Road Agent, sixty cents (60c) per hour, laborers, fifty cents (50c) per hour. This will increase the Highway Maintenance; for winter maintenance four hundred dollars (\$400.00); summer maintenance, one thousand sixty-two dollars, (\$1,062.00), as printed in the budget. This is to become effective upon its adoption.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the installation of a street light on pole No. 8, situated on Lamphier Street, as petitioned for by Catherine Neville and eighteen (18) others.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) to be used to repaint the inside of the Town Hall, or take any action relative thereto.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the vote of the Town which created a salary of three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for the Road Agent and in its place have the Road Agent paid on an hourly basis throughout the year, or take any action relative thereto.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-six hundred and seventy dollars (\$2,670.00) as its proportionate share of State Aid Construction, to be expended on the Bow Bog road; or four hundred seventy-six dollars and seventy-one cents (\$476.71) the State to furnish nineteen hundred six dollars and eighty-four cents (\$1,906.84), making a total of twenty-three hundred eighty-three dollars and fifty-five cents (\$2,383.55), the same to be expended under the State Highway Department for Class V Town Road Assistance, or take any action relative thereto.

(No Town may receive both Class V and Class II aid in the same year.)

20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Hooksett:

My eighth annual report includes enrollment and organization, emergency protection of school children, advancement in health projects and other activities.

The report of your enumeration officer for September, 1941 shows that Hooksett had enrolled in school 386 children under sixteen years of age. Three hundred and twenty of these were in local public schools, twenty-two were enrolled in elementary schools outside of Hooksett, and forty-four were registered in high schools and academy. If the forty-one high school pupils over sixteen years of age are included, the total high school attendance becomes eighty-five.

Recent industrial changes have contributed and will increasingly contribute to a reduction in high school attendance. This is reflected in the proposed budget by an estimated reduction of \$1000 for high school

tuition.

During the last two years the cost per pupil in the elementary schools has decreased from \$58.56 to \$56.83. In the same period the median cost per elementary school pupil in the state increased from \$81.85 to \$84.61.

The year has been characterized by an unusual number of changes in teachers throughout the state. Hooksett has had four changes including one addition

to its regular staff of teachers.

Mr. Clarence P. Amadon of Lancaster, New Hampshire, was chosen from several candidates to succeed Mr. Henry W. Thorne as teacher of the Village grades VII and VIII. Mr. Amadon was also elected principal of the school to fill the vacancy caused by the transfer of Mrs. Gertrude Washburn who has organized and conducted the newly established activity school at Martin's. Mr. Amadon was graduated in 1941 from the four-year course at Plymouth Teachers College. Previous to receiving his degree he had taught for six years in the Orford Grammar School.

Miss Yvonne E. Laflamme of Littleton, New Hampshire, and also a graduate of Plymouth, was selected to fill the teaching vacancy in Grades I and II of the Village School. Following her graduation from the three-year elementary course Miss Laflamme taught for five years the Hill School in Pembroke. In addition to her primary work, Miss Laflamme directs the girls' sewing classes in the seventh and eighth grades.

Miss Teresa F. McLay of North Andover, Massachusetts, a 1941 graduate of Lowell State Teachers College, succeeded in September Miss Mary D. Monahan in the Hackett Hill School. In January of this year Miss McLay was released to accept a graded

school position in Massachusetts.

Mrs. Lois Cate Merrill, a former teacher in Hooksett and Pembroke, is substituting for the remainder of the year at Hackett Hill.

Mrs. Taschia P. Dunlap, who conducted your music instruction last year, withdrew in June to join her

husband in Camp Blanding, Florida.

The position of Music Supervisor was filled by the election of Mrs. Doris S. Buswell of Andover, New Hampshire. Mrs. Buswell is a graduate of the Lowell State Teachers College and of the Conservatory of Music Supervisors' Course. She also supervises the music instruction in four neighboring school systems and is a director of the State Music Festival.

Complying with recent legislation for special instruction of physically handicapped children, Mrs. Madge V. Bergsman of Hooksett was employed from January, 1941 to June, 1941 to instruct at home a crippled girl. Mrs. Catherine E. Hammond of Manchester was recently engaged to give instruction in lip-reading to a boy serously handicapped by loss of

hearing.

An enrollment of nearly sixty children in the fifth and sixth grades of the Village School necessitated the opening in September of a third room at Martin's and the extension of transportation for more than twenty pupils from the Village. The educational results of the activity program, conducted by Mrs. Washburn at Martin's School, are proving the value of such organization. A visitor is soon impressed by an atmosphere of alert and purposeful activity of mind and hand in worthwhile achievement.

The recent emergency protection of school children does not anticipate an air attack directed against your schools. On the other hand it does anticipate that the defense of nearby military objectives may at anytime subject neighboring areas to damage from our own as well as from enemy planes. For this reason the least exposed shelter has been chosen in each school building. By the use of steel screens and black-out panels of veneer wood, these shelters afford reasonable protection except from direct hits by explosive bombs. The chance of a school building being hit by such explosives is considered extremely slight.

By well organized drills the children are now able to procure overshoes and outside wraps and to assemble in their shelters within five minutes after an alarm is sounded. Groups of older children are being trained to check and remove incendiary bombs, insert blackout panels in windows and doors, render first aid, and

serve as emergency messengers.

Health projects have been continued and permanent

services advanced.

Through the services of your school nurse, Miss Douillette, eleven cases of defective vision and thirteen cases of diseased tonsils and adenoids were corrected.

At the dental clinic, conducted in April by Dr. Mayo, 91 children were treated. Eighty-one of these received complete care and dental certificates. While there were 119 fillings, it is worthy of note that only 14 extractions of permanent teeth were necessary. Fifty-three paid the full cost of treatment, nine paid part cost, and 29 were given free care.

Through the loan of audiometer equipment, granted by the State Board of Education in April, your nurse was able to conduct thorough and scientific tests of hearing among 245 of the older children in the five schools. The results show a surprisingly small number

of hearing defects.

Through the generous cooperation of the Surplus Marketing Association and the Federal Community Service program, hot lunches were continued at the Village School until June, 1941 and were resumed this year in December. The menu for a typical day includes:

You are fortunate to retain through the Federal Community Service program the services of Mrs. La-Valley in the preparation of nutritious and appetizing lunches.

Through the assistance of Mrs. Maude Langford, who was recently selected by the same federal service, approximately 100 hot lunches are prepared daily in the Village School kitchen. With the generous assistance of interested parents 25 or more of these hot lunches are being delivered at noon to the pupils of the Martin's School.

Fruit and some canned foods are being used in the

three remaining schools.

In recognition of the united efforts of your teachers and pupils it is worthy of mention that in the standard battery of achievement tests, given annually to all pupils of certain grades in this Supervisory Union and covering thoroughly the skill and content subjects, Hooksett schools produced the highest record with a total average meeting the approved standard.

In the Union Spelling Contest of last May, your team of three members—Doris Smith, James Gray, and John Jacoby—returned the trophy cup to Hooksett by a winning score of 296 out of a possible 300 points. Two of the pupils from Hooksett attained perfect scores. This is the second year that Hooksett has held

the spelling cup.

At the present hour the schools are more than ever concerned with the physical and mental fitness of our youth. Sound minds in sound bodies are demanded.

A public service is being rendered by everyone who in cooperation with the school nurse and teachers is seeking to make adequate diet, physical well-being, and health education available to every child in your community. For not only is health the basis of the individual's well-being, but, as Disraeli remarked, it is the foundation of the people's powers as a nation.


