TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hopkinton in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hopkinton on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
 - (1) Town Officers Salaries
 - (2) Town Officers Expenses
 - (3) Election and Registration
 - (4) Expense and Care of Town Hall
 - (5) Police Department
 - (6) Vital Statistics
 - (7) Fire Department
 - (8) Cemeteries
 - (9) Town Poor
 - (10) Old Age Assistance
 - (11) Interest on Notes
- 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges in addition to the one quarter of one per cent of the Town's valuation, which is required by law, estimated \$5,500.00.

- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for general expense of the highway department and street lighting.
- 5. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the employment of a District Nurse and the support of the Concord Hospital and other health expenses.
- 6. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Hopkinton Free Public Libraries.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Old Home Day.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for Town Construction and permanent improvement of roads.
- 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Town Road Aid.
- 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Legal Expenses.
- 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Merrimack Valley Region Association.
- 14. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Town Dumps.

- 15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a tank truck for the Fire Department. (No amount recommended by the Budget Committee.)
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to gravel and oil the Cut-off road between Route 103 and the Penacook Road in Contoocook.
- 17. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to gravel and oil the road leading from Tyler's Bridge to the Webster Town Line.
- 18. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for improvements to the Stumpfield Road leading from Route 9 to the so-called Dr. Dodge Corner.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to close the following roads subject to gates and bars:

The road leading from the top of Sand Hill beyond Tyler's Bridge and connecting with the Main Road near the Blackwater Bridge.

The road leading from the Junction of Routes 9 and 202 to the Atherton Corner.

The road leading from Douglas Mann's place to the Henniker Line.

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the practice of electing Highway Agents and instead instruct the Selectmen to appoint such agent or agents as they deem necessary.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Municipal Court as provided in Section 28, Chapter 377, Revised Laws.
 - 22. To see if the Town will vote to set the salary

of the Municipal Judge at an amount greater than the legal Minimum of one hundred dollars per year.

- 23. To see if the Town will vote to increase the price of Cemetery lots.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the following Cemetery Trust Funds, the income to be used as directed, subject to provisions adopted at the Town Meeting of March 10th, 1935.

The sum of \$200.00 from the Estate of Willis C. Rand for the care of the Warren S. Rand and the John G. Colby lots in the Contoocook Cemetery.

- 25. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of the 1949 tax levy.
- 26. To act on reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees and Committees for 1948.
- 27. To hear and transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE TOWN OF HOPKINTON PLANNING BOARD

To the inhabitants of the town of Hopkinton:

In compliance with the request of the people of Hopkinton, the Planning Board has, during the past year, extended its study of the school system in the Hopkinton district. The board submits herewith a report of its findings.

Object:

- 1. To present a factual study of the present school system.
- 2. To assemble information concerning improvement or expansion of the school system.

Summary of Results:

- 1. The present facilities in all grades have practically reached their capacity.
- 2. Facilities now handling the first six grades will be wholly inadequate within five years.
- 3. Facilities now handling grades VII to XII are crowded, and will become more so in the near future.
- 4. Major repairs and alterations to all school buildings will be necessary within a short time.
- 5. Expansion of the existing limited curriculum in the high school grades is desirable.
- 6. The current facilities for cultural and sports programs are inadequate.

Recommendations:

In view of the foregoing, the board recommends that a committee, composed of two members from each neighboring town willing to enter into a discussion of the problem, be set up to study the possibility of establishing a cooperative school which would serve all communities. It is further recommended that this board work in close cooperation with local and state educational authorities and that emphasis be placed on accommodating grades VII to XII in the cooperative system. Grades I to VI to be handled on a local basis.

Outline of Methods:


- 1. Taking of pupil census.
- 2. Survey of present facilities.
- 3. Assembly of other vital statistics.
- 4. Correlation of items 1-3 incl.

Discussion:

A complete census of Hopkinton youth was completed by three teams of enumerators who gave their time and energy to this phase of the work. In taking the census the enumerators listed all children by name, sex, age and if in school the grade attended. The location of each child in the town was established and plotted on a map. Chart No. 1., compiled from the results of the survey, indicates the number of children in the town listed according to their ages. Chart No. 2., compiled from the results of the survey and checked with the school authorities, indicates the distribution of the children of school age in the various grades. These two charts when considered together bear out the fact that there are more children coming up to school age in the near future than our present facilities can accommodate. This conclusion is also borne

CHART NO. 1


CENSUS OF HOPKINTON YOUTH AGES 1 TO 16

out when one looks at chart No. 4. which was compiled to show pre-war, war-time and the post-war effects on the town birth rate.

An anticipated enrolment in the first grade may be estimated from chart No. 1., for each of the next five years as follows:

The highest number to enter the first grade in any previous year since 1931 was 38 in 1937 which is 79% of the number indicated for entry in 1953. The average number to enter the first grade over the last fifteen years is 29 which is 60% of the number indicated for entry in 1953.

Existing accommodations for the first grades consist of 65 seats in Hopkinton's two room school and 123 seats in Contoocook's four room school or a total of 185 seats. Estimated seating requirements for these grades are as follows:


From the foregoing and a study of the trends in the charts it would appear that in 1953 we will have passed from a crowded condition into one where the demand for seats exceeds the supply. CHART NO. 3

It is possible and quite probable that the number of births in the next few years will not exceed that of 1948. Chart No. 4 which shows the birth-rate from 1937 to 1948 seems to indicate that a repetition of the 1938-1942 cycle is to be expected if the *average* birth rate over the 11 year period can be used as a guide. This should not be misconstrued as an indication that the situation will be materially better after 1953, the general trend of the birth rate is upward.

Finally in planning or estimating enrolment in the upper grades Chart No. 3 can be used to determine the probable number of students that will reach and continue through the high school grades. The percentage drop in the curve for Hopkinton Schools was computed from enrolment data compiled for a fifteen year period. Though this curve indicates a larger number of first graders fail to go on through the rest of the grades than is true for the state as a whole, it is felt that this is partly due to students leaving to attend other high schools. A better curriculum would have a tendency to lift this curve making it compare more favorably with the state survey.

All material gathered to form the basis of this report is available to the committee proposed under the Board's recommendation.

I am under some pressure in writing the report for Hopkinton because somewhere in the report I am expected to insert some little original tidbit. This in spite of the fact that the educational situation is becoming more serious with each passing year. Increased enrollment, need of a construction program, increased budget, and shortage of teachers make a serious problem which the people of Hopkinton are going to have to face realistically.

The Statistical chart shows the grade placement of the various youngsters in the school system. At the present time, there are thirty-eight children in the first grade in town; twenty-six of them in the Contoocook grade school. The Association of Childhood Education give the following figures as a desirable teacher load: Children 6-8 20-25 per teacher Children 9-12 25-30 per teacher

From the above figures, the first grade at Contoo-cook is above the maximum load as is the third-fourth and fifth-sixth grade rooms. Moreover, as this group of twenty-five first graders get up into the two upper rooms, it will make the teacher load considerably beyond the desirable load, assuming that we can crowd them all in one room which I doubt can be done without arranging them in tiers. The primary room in Hopkinton Village is also over crowded. Thirty-two children in the first three grades is too much to expect one teacher to handle.

The school district lost only two teachers last year and was able to replace them with two excellent teachers, Mrs. Andrews and Miss Harris. In this Hopkinton was more fortunate than most towns. The teacher shortage this year is fully as acute as last year. Only a handful of prospective teachers is graduating and a large number of positions will have to be filled.

The grey hairs that make me look older than I Really Am are caused by worry of wondering where I will find new teachers. Every effort should be made so that we will not lose the good teachers we have.

Two very positive steps have been taken during the past year. They are: "The survey of the school problem by the planning board," and the formation of a Parent-Teacher Association. The planning board has done a lot of work and I know that there is more to do. I would suggest that the planning board work in conjunction with the school board on this particular survey.

The Parent-Teacher Association was set up this past fall with the active and sincere cooperation of the

teachers and people interested in the schools. I might add that the only qualification for membership is a sincere interest in securing better schools for the town of Hopkinton. The bylaws read: To bring into clear relation the home and the school, that parents and teachers may cooperate intelligently in the training of the child; to develop between educators and the general public such united efforts as will secure for every child the highest advantage in physical, mental, social, and spiritual education.

From my own personal viewpoint I should like to get all the information possible to the public. I should like to have the people know what we are doing and why we are doing it; to know what we would like to do. I like Dr. Edgar Fuller's quotation; "Given full opportunity to consider the facts about public education, the people of New Hampshire will make the right decisions about it."

I am very grateful for the fine cooperation of the School Board, teachers and the people of Hopkinton. It has been an enjoyable year.

The enrollment as of September 1948 is an increase of eleven over the previous year. It will be interesting to note that the major increase is in the seventh grade. The trends seem to indicate that the incoming classes within the next few years will be comparatively as large. If so, an additional teacher would be of great value, in that the teaching assignments of our present teachers limit the time for remedial and individual work.

The teacher personnel at Hopkinton High School remains the same as the previous year. Several teachers attended school during the summer of 1948 and others of the faculty were in attendance at various inservice extension courses conducted in nearby communities.

Figures in parentheses denote number of times classes meet per week. (Four years of English and United States History are required of all.) This flexible program is being used to meet the needs and requirements of the students.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Extra-curricular activities include boys' and girls' athletics, glee club, dramatics, music, school paper, Future Farmers and Future Home Makers Clubs. This year the students are participating in a radio program known as "Do you know." This program has offered radio experiences and opportunities to students from grades seven through twelve.

SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM

Our school lunch program is in operation from November 15, through April 22, under the direction of Mrs. Evelyn Rice, Home Economics teacher. An average of 185 meals is served at the High School (which includes the Contoocook Graded School) while an average of 55 children are served at the Hopkinton Village School, making a total average of 240 meals served per day. We are extremely fortunate to have the services of Mrs. Elsie Straw, Mrs. Mary Shurtleff, and Mrs. Clara Ward, to assist in the preparation of these meals. It would be impossible to leave the sub-

ject of Hot Lunch without paying due respect to Mrs. Clara George who so kindly donates her services four days per week during the maintenance of this program. From my observation the children of Hopkinton and vicinity are extremely fortunate in having such a fine program, which is being carried on in a school plant which was never intended for such purposes and which over taxes the physical possibilities of the building. The Hot Lunch program is entirely maintained by the personnel of the schools. Parents are urged and cordially invited to come and observe your children or friends at any lunch period.

During the spring of 1948 a battery of Aptitude tests was given classes nine through twelve. These tests have proven valuable in the guidance program, and are used in aiding the pupils as accurately as possible in their probabilities of success in the various courses, curricula, or jobs that they may be considering. This program was continued this past fall wherein classes nine and eleven were given tests.

In an effort to meet the needs of the students a half year course in Driver Education was included in the Program of Studies for the year 1948-49. This course is being offered to Juniors and Seniors and those students who will have reached their sixteenth birthday by the end of the school year. Through the cooperation of the AAA and a local garage a Dual Control car has been made available to the students.

A class, one period per week, in Music Appreciation is being offered by the Music Supervisor to those students interested.

Audio-Visual Aids (Film strips and films) to increase the effectiveness of instruction have been used in many of our classes. This program is further aided by having student operators of the projector.

It is the desire of our school to build character, to help our youth to be honest, sincere, cooperative, and responsible, so as to play their part in democracy, as well as to believe in it, in order to contribute to the enrichment of society. The only possible manner in which these goals may be attained to the highest degree is through the sincere cooperation of the home with the school.

In closing, I wish to take this opportunity to thank the School Board, Superintendent, faculty, parents, students and interested citizens for the cooperation received during the past year.
