

#### TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 10th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Road Agents.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town officers' salaries, for town officers' expenses, for election and registration expenses, for Municipal Court expenses, for town building maintenance, for the police department, for the health department, for vital statistics, for the Community Center, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for the Littleton Hospital, for the public library, for town poor, for Memorial Day, for band concerts, for water troughs, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the community garden, for the skating rink, and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the

construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 84 of the Laws of New Hampshire, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its town highways, in accordance with pending legislation, or such as may be enacted by the Legislature of 1935.

- Article 4. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and abandon that portion of the public highway leading from the Littleton-Monroe Road, so-called, across the bridge known as the Waterford Bridge, to the line of the Town of Waterford, in the State of Vermont, including the said bridge.
- Article 6. To see what action the town will take relative to creating and completing public projects, for the purpose of providing employment for its citizens, and paying the cost of the same.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to borrow on the credit of the town sufficient monies to pay a current indebtedness of the town, estimated at \$40,000.00, and issue its serial notes or bonds for this purpose, and doing all things necessary therefor, under the laws of the State of New Hampshire and the vote of the town.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to complete the re-construction of the public highways in said town, known as the Manns Hill Road from Littleton to Dalton, and the Littleton-Monroe Road from Littleton to Monroe, and to borrow on the credit of the town sufficient monies to pay for the same, issuing its serial notes or bonds for such sum or sums, all in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire and the vote of the town.

- Article 9. To see if the town will authorize its Board of Selectmen to make application to the Federal Government under the rules and regulations of the Works Progress Administration, and do all things necessary therefor, including the making of contracts, the purchasing or leasing of land, the raising and appropriation of monies, or borrowing the same on the credit of the town to pay for the same, and every other thing necessary, for the following projects:
- 1. An Airport or Landing Field in the town of Lisbon, near Franconia, in Grafton County; or elsewhere.
  - 2. Paint Town Hall of Littleton, inside and outside.
- 3. Improvement to Market Roads, in said town, consisting of clearing sides of roads of brush, trees, rock, etc., widening roads, and digging side drains.
- Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and how much, for construction and repairs upon the Manns Hill Road, and roads intersecting therewith, in said town.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen of the town, to apply for, accept and use, monies provided by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, for public works, relief, unemployment, or otherwise, and do all things required by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, to obtain the same.
- Article 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 13. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give any druggist doing business in this town, a prescription permit

to sell pure spirituous and malt liquor for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chapter 147 of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 14. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 15. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## Report of Board of Education

To the Citizens of Littleton:

We herewith submit the annual school report. The report includes treasurer's report for the fiscal year July 1, 1934 to June 30, 1935 with an itemized statement of expenditures for that year; the budget for the present school year and for next year; statement of estimated receipts for these two years; and written reports by the superintendent of schools and by the headmaster of the high school.

We have studied the items of the budget for the next school year carefully. The charts prepared by the superintendent show that the appropriations for the last three years have been several thousand dollars less than for the years immediately preceding. During these years the total school membership has increased. To operate the schools at their present level of efficiency and to maintain the school property in good condition, further reductions cannot wisely be made. We recommend an appropriation of \$65,000.00. That is the same amount that was raised last year.

## Superintendent's Report

To the School Board:

I am pleased to submit my fifth annual report relative to your schools.

For the sake of comparison I am listing the present enrollment by grades and the total enrollment and the high school enrollment for a period of years, as in last year's report.

These figures show a total enrollment of 736, seventeen more than last year. The number of pupils in the elementary grades in slightly less than last year but the high school enrollment is larger. The present membership is 690, 32 more than a year ago in January. The number of pupils in the primary grades in the Kilburn building is large, the first three grades having 129. The increased enrollment in the high school building, 263 in the senior high school and 67 in the seventh and eighth grades, presents a real problem. Five years ago we had 295 pupil desks in this building, 80 of which

were in two rooms assigned to grades seven and eight. We have now added 30 desks in the senior high school rooms and have a total of 245. We have 263 pupils registered this year, with a membership of 249 at date of this writing. This enrollment is 50% more than ten years ago. The high school building, supposedly built to provide for future needs is full. Yet, the enrollment will probably be larger next year. The present senior class has a membership of 43, and the eighth grade in this building, the Apthorp building and the St. Rose of Lima school numbers at present 68. The most of these pupils, with the probable addition of 7-10 from outside the Littleton district, will enter next year's ninth grade.

The high school this year has 21 pupils from Gilman. These pupils are an asset to our school in every sense. They have proved themselves good students and have made a valuable contribution to our extra-curricular activities. Their presence has doubtless brought the business life of Gilman and of Littleton closer together. For the benefit of both communities our school should be made to prove attractive to them.

Throughout the nation the number of pupils in public elementary schools seems to be on the decline. Up to the present high school enrollment has increased. Some writers believe that in a very few years the peak in high school enrollment will have been reached and then will gradually decline, in spite of the fact that a larger percentage of pupils are attending high school than formerly and that the age limit for compulsory attendance has been extended in some states and is likely to be in others. In New Hampshire that age limit has been for some years higher than in many states and the New Hampshire school population has been more stable than in some states. In Littleton the enrollment in the lower grades indicates no reduction in high school attendance in the immediate future. The best analysis I can make indicates a slightly larger high school membership dur-

ing the next five years than during the past five, provided the town's population remains stable.

An addition to the high school building would be expensive and unwise with the present economic outlook. An extension to the Kilburn building towards the high school building, similar to the one towards Oak Hill Avenue, would provide ample room to relieve the crowded condition in the high school building. It would provide the possible need of an additional classroom for Kilburn pupils. It could also provide a basement room for the use of the mechanic arts department. This room would make possible the offering of a course in shop mechanics or in auto mechanics. In the present accommodations we are able to offer only courses in woodworking. Such an addition could probably be constructed and equipped for \$10,000 to \$12,000. While I do not consider this addition absolutely necessary during the next year, I think it is a probable need of the near future.

The school pupils of Littleton have the advantage of medical inspection by a competent physician and of frequent inspection by the district nurse. Both the school physician and the district nurse keep close watch of our pupils and visit the schools almost daily in time of any epidemic.

Last year milk was furnished to undernourished pupils at the expense of the Federal government. This year Federal assistance has been withdrawn. The Association of Business and Professional Women has been effective in arousing the interest of other organizations in town to provide a large fund for milk and for dental and eye clinics. Mr. J. B. Eames generously contributed the total receipts of one full day at his theatre for this purpose. Much credit is due Miss Bryant for her efforts in securing the cooperation of many persons for this worthy cause. Much credit is also due the local physicians for their treatment of many school children at the throat clinics of last summer and of many previous summers.

The course of study recommended by the State Board of Education is in use in the elementary grades. The courses recommended by the state board are quite closely followed in the high school departments. The state board has recently published new programs for the following subjects—one on Guidance, one on Alcohol, Tobacco and Narcotic Drugs, and one on High School Administration. The one on Alcohol, Tobacco and Narcotic Drugs is for use in all grades and is very helpful in offering instruction relative to this important subject. It has received much commendation from other states. The state board has also outlined a short non-unit course for instruction in automobile driving. Headmaster Mattoon is to give the instruction to those pupils of proper age who wish it during the latter part of the year.

To our unit courses previously offered in the high school we have added one year of mathematics. A pupil can take high school mathematics for college preparation now during each of his four years.

The classes in Adult Education conducted last year and financed by the Federal government and by the school district were not reorganized this year. The school district did not appropriate the money to make this offering possible. Classes in Home Economics are being offered at the Community House under the direction of Mrs. Jencks and have a good attendance. Classes in Adult Education and some advanced courses for high school graduates are bound to receive more attention in the near future than in the past. Cities and large communities which can afford them will probably soon recognize their importance as part of their educational program. While I do not urge their introduction immediately in Littleton, I think that our school buildings should be more largely available for the use of the citizens for educational programs than they are at present.

Through your cooperation and the cooperation of Mr. Albert J. Richardson, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce,

Headmaster Mattoon and I have secured the vote of the Executive Committee of the New Hampshire State Teachers' Association to hold its annual convention in Littleton next October. This association has a membership of over 3,000 persons engaged in educational work in the state. The last convention had an attendance estimated at 2,500. While the attendance here will not be as large, it is safe to predict that 2,000 or more persons will seek our hospitality. To provide meeting places for its general and departmental sessions, and to provide for the personal comfort of its members, we shall need the active support of all organizations and citizens.

The schools lost more teachers than usual at the close of the last school year. Four teachers resigned from the high school staff and three from the elementary grades. two of the new teachers have had successful experience in public schools elsewhere. One teacher has been added to the high school staff—necessitated by the largest enrollment in the history of the high school. Miss Evelyn R. Stapleton, a graduate of Colby College with a year's study in the Ecole Normale Superieure de Sevres, France, and a year's experience as an instructor in the Ecole Normale de Bourg, France, was secured to teach French and Latin. Miss Doris U. Cate, a graduate of the commercial course at Plymouth Normal School, with six years of experience at Newmarket High School was selected for the commercial department. Miss Ellen Corey, a graduate of the junior high training course at Plymouth, with five years of experience at Groveton High School, was selected for the English department. Miss Corey studied during the past summer at Boston University, and Miss Cate at the University of Vermont. Miss Blanche Henry, a graduate of the University of Maine, with a year's experience in the Machias, Maine, High School was secured to teach History and Mathematics classes and coach the girls' athletic teams. Florence Langley, a Simmons College graduate, with seven years of experience in Laconia, Lyndon Institute, and Pinkerton Academy, was selected to teach Home Economics and History classes.

In the elementary grades Miss Pennock was transferred from the Apthorp building to the Kilburn building. Miss Edith Woolson was selected for the other position in the Kilburn school. Miss Woolson is a graduate of the elementary training course at Plymouth and has studied four summers at the state normal schools. She has had five years of experience in Stewartstown, Brookline and Colebrook. Miss Blanche Cree, with the same training as Miss Woolson, was chosen for one of the positions at Apthorp. Miss Cree has had six years of experience in North Stratford, Lincoln and Pittsfield. Miss Phyllis Ashford, a graduate of the three year elementary training course at Plymouth in last year's class, was elected to the other position at Apthorp.

Four years ago the school board adopted on my recommendation a teachers' salary schedule for women teachers. The principal features of this schedule are a minimum beginner's salary, a fixed increase each year for successful experience for a term of five years, a fixed maximum salary for all women teachers, and a demand for summer school attendance at least once in three years and for a total of three summers. The purpose of this plan was to improve the efficiency of instruction. The plan makes possible the securing of well trained, efficient teachers, and requires from them continued professional study. To secure teachers who have served with marked success elsewhere for the many vacancies of this year would have been difficult if the school system had not offered the attractions of reward for success and for professional study. Good teachers are necessary for good schools.

During the past summer the auditorium and gymnasium in the high school building were painted. Unit heaters were installed in the front of the stage to provide additional heat in the auditorium. Curtains to match the stage curtain were purchased for the windows and doors in the auditorium. The boiler in the high school building had to be re-lined. New desks were placed in one room in the Kilburn building. Other minor improvements were made. The insurance on the Kilburn building has been increased by six thousand dollars and on the Apthorp building by five thousand.

Your program of spreading the costs for building repairs and improvements, equipment, and insurance equally over the years is a wise one. The appropriation made a year ago for the present school year was \$65,000.00. The Treasurer's books at the close of the school year last June showed a deficit of nearly \$1,000.00. At the close of the present vear the deficit will be less, probably about \$500.00. the school district approves an appropriation for the next year of \$65,000.00 the books should be made to balance in June 1937. The financial statements published by the State Board of Education show that the expenditure per thousand dollars of equalized valuation for current expenses, not including debt and interest, in Littleton last year was \$9.04. The median expenditure of all the school districts in the state was 11.06. Seventy-nine school districts in the state spent less and one hundred fifty-eight spent more. In the table showing per pupil costs of public elementary schools, Littleton was slightly below the median, and in the table for public high schools slightly above the median. In consideration of Littleton's ability to pay in comparison with other school districts the costs must be considered low.

The charts below show that the cost per pupil has decreased materially during the past ten years. Ten years ago the total payments were \$70,930.00 and the average membership during that year was 537 pupils. The cost per pupil was \$132.03. This year the total expenditure will be approximately \$67,500.00, and the average membership at least 685 (690 on February 1, with an enrollment of 736), making a

per pupil cost of \$98.54. Deducting fixed charges, including bonds, interest, insurance and per capita tax, the cost per pupil ten years ago was \$92.83, and this year the cost will be approximately \$78.60. It is true that a comparison of figures ten years apart for two single years sometimes is misleading. The first three years of the last decade compared with the last three show the same results, a decided drop in the cost per pupil.



The financial condition of the school district is good. The high school building has been kept in excellent repair and is one half paid for. The condition of the Kilburn and Apthorp buildings is as good as at any time in recent years. Your expenditure at present is slightly less than the average for the past ten years and on that expenditure you are educating at least 11% more pupils than the average. Your teachers are well trained, efficient, and professionally progressive.

An appropriation of \$65,000.00 for the next school year is necessary in order to continue your program of building maintenance and equipment and maintain your schools at their present level of efficiency.

## The Headmaster's Report

#### Dear Superintendent Jordan:

It is a pleasure to submit my fifth annual report. Four school years have elapsed since the school board sought and secured your services as superintendent. In that period you have endeavored to give wise counsel, careful direction, adequate supervision, and general professional information to members of the high school staff. Whenever changes in personnel have occurred, you have nominated teachers who have attained high scholarship in teacher-training institutions, who possessed good personalities, who gave promise of reaching marked efficiency in instruction and who indicated a sympathetic and friendly interest in pupils' personal and educational problems.

Within the last school year you have secured the services of five teachers in the high school—nearly half of the staff is new. With this large turnover, all have had to make many adjustments to produce a smoothly functioning school organization. Our class work has received primary consideration, delaying our extra-curricular program when necessary.

You will care to learn what attention has been given to scholarship during the last four years. One measure is the success of graduates. There have been 170 graduates since 1931.

1 in 5 graduates has accepted post-secondary training, either in hospitals, normal schools, colleges, or universities.

1 in 10 has gone to college on the individual's high school record and the headmaster's statement. Littleton High School graduates are enrolled at Bates, Boston University, Dartmouth, Harvard, Northeastern University, Simmons, University of New Hampshire, and University of Vermont. Not one of these has been dismissed by college authorities for unsatisfactory scholarship.

1 in 14 has been recommended to and been accepted by the normal schools at Keene and Plymouth. Not one of the graduates enrolling from Littleton has been dismissed for low scholarship.

1 in 24 has entered hospital-training schools in Massachusetts and New Hampshire. All are succeeding.

35 of the 170 graduates in four years have maintained a satisfactory scholastic record in the hospitals, normal schools, colleges, and universities in which they matriculated.

In addition to the 35 graduates, several have taken courses as post-graduates at the high school, with profit to themselves in accumulated knowledge, maturing experiences, and heightened morale. There must be many graduates from the high schools of northern New Hampshire who are financially unable to pay for a college or university training at city prices, who would welcome advanced study at limited expense. Littleton might have junior college courses to enroll these students, to bring them into town to live during the school year, and thereby save parents much of one or two years' expense incident to education in cities. The State Board of Education grants approval for junior college courses, and Littleton might serve the North Country well in this advanced program.

Standard intelligence and achievement tests have been used as scientific measures of ability and performance.

The North Country Headmasters' group has made and administered tests in current events and reading. This makes possible a comparison of Seniors in 14 schools.

Pupils tire of continuous book-study. There must be some attention given to their interests aside from reading the written page, that, in the end, they may have a liking for all phases of school life. Pupils in the junior high school discuss careers in which they think they would like to earn a living. Many pupils develop their skills in football, basketball, winter sports, and baseball.

The North Country Headmasters' group has organized an eleven-team basketball conference with your headmaster as secretary. This conference has produced harmonious relations during the basketball season and has paved the way for the formation of a baseball conference for the spring.

In winter sports, the North Country headmasters guide the various outing clubs in the interscholastic winter sports events by advocating a program of fourteen features in skiing, snowshoeing, and skating, with the addition of ski jumping in a few towns where jumps are maintained. This has been a real aid in promoting sportsmanlike relations between schools. There are annual interscholastic winter sports contests now supported by the Headmasters' group in Lancaster, Lisbon, Littleton, Bath, and Whitefield. Some schools participate at Woodsville, and Woodstock. A winter sports field day has been held at Bethlehem. The headmasters are exerting considerable influence in the development of this region as a winter playground and are, thereby, bringing a financial return to the several communities.

The National Youth Administration was organized to assist young people to continue their education by giving funds in return for work. The high school has pupils assisting in cataloguing books, and performing necessary duties about the Kilburn building and the high school.

The enrollment has been increased by the registration of fine young people from Gilman, Vermont. These pupils have acclimated themselves to our regular school life and are very cooperative. They seem to be happy in the educational environment surrounding Littleton pupils, and give our school life added strength by their abilities.

Parents, Rotarians, and other citizens of the town have transported athletes to neighboring towns for sports. Prizes have been given by local organizations at graduation. Advertising space has been purchased by merchants, manufacturers, and professional people in our school publications. We are very grateful for this support. Without it, some of our activities would not survive the financial demands in maintenance.

#### I summarize this report by saying—

- 1. You, the superintendent, have interviewed and nominated efficient teachers.
- 2. Nearly one-half of the high school staff is new to the system within the last school year.
- 3. 35 of the 170 graduates in the last four years have maintained a satisfactory scholastic record in post-secondary institutions.
- 4. Littleton High School graduates may enroll in practically any college or university in the country, without examination, upon the high school record and with the headmaster's statement showing the graduate has acceptable achievement, character, industry, and leadership.
- 5. Littleton High School might have junior college courses for North Country graduates unable to finance advanced training in the city.
- 6 Standard tests form one of the scientific measures in this school.

- 7. The North Country Headmasters' group has developed tests in current events and reading.
- 8. An eleven-team basketball conference has functioned during the winter.
- 9. Winter sports interscholastic events are advocated in a fourteen feature program of skiing, snowshoeing, and skating by the North Country Headmasters' group. This has commercial value to the community.
- 10. The National Youth Administration assists pupils in this high school.
- 11. The pupils from Gilman, Vermont are a happy, studious, cooperative group.

Our appreciation is expressed for the service many members and organizations in town have given the school.

The Headmaster is personally grateful for the fine support of school board, superintendent, townspeople, teachers, and pupils in the fulfillment of the program of the high school, advanced for the development of the young people of Littleton.

### Librarian's Report

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library the annual report of the Librarian is herewith submitted:

Comparison of its statistics with those established by authorities in the library world puts Littleton Public Library on not very spectacular middle ground. With \$1.00 as a minimum per capita appropriation for maintaining standard (not superior) library service, our \$.65 per capita seems neither very shocking nor very gratifying. The same might be said of many other features. Our building is adequate for the book supply and for reading facilities; too large for comfortable maintenance on our present income, if the auditorium and meeting rooms are to be used without prohibitive charges to would-be users, and if it is to be kept in repair. Our staff is adequate for necessary service; insufficient for providing more convenient library hours, doing recataloging and other technical processes greatly needed, or for any very useful extension work. In other words, we are moving along without too great discomfort, but making no aggressive contribution to new economic and cultural conditions. This has been necessary in every publicly financed institution in recent years. Littleton has now to decide whether to remain on this middle ground, or to put more energy and resources into one of its educational and recreational centers.

Sport enthusiasts consider \$2.50 membership in the Outing Club, covering ski lessons, a modest outlay for physical welfare and enjoyment, as indeed it is. This however is in addition to the equipment required for the pursuit of almost any outdoor sport. For our mental health and equipment, how does \$.65 a person compare? In last year's Town report, the estimated cost of relief for the coming year was \$20,000. No one would pretend to believe that a larger library appropriation would lower relief costs, but it is well to consider the

relative merits of building up constructive elements in our environment, and of patching up conditions that are indicative of poor social equipment. No one would consider attendance at two moving pictures a year a frivolous expenditure, yet for less than the amount required for that diversion, each person in town may have what he demands in the way of reading. For it is largely in answer to demand that the book collection is built up. No library can ever supply the demand for light fiction, but it can divide its funds to meet each type of need in fair proportion.

The annual report is not an occasion for a plea for funds. Nor is this meant as such. It is simply an effort to explain to the owners of the public library, just where we stand at the end of the fiscal year, and why. Each year a brief summary of the work accomplished has been given in the librarian's report. This year facts and statistics are added in tabular form. No discussion of such features as the ever increasing use of inter-library-loan privileges, improvement of technical processes within the library, cooperation with the schools, can be made with profit, since no further expansion has been possible.

We are faced now with the need of expensive building repairs. Examination of the budget will reveal no fund to draw upon for this expense. The only two flexible items in the library budget are salaries and the book fund. We cannot do without heat and light, and the other building expenses, already reduced to a minimum. The most rigid economy in the use and purchase of library supplies makes but slight impression on the budget, so small is the whole amount spent in comparison with other items. In the past it has usually been the book fund which has suffered. Another recourse would be to return to the days of untrained caretakers for the books. Or we can maintain the status quo (juggling books and repairs). Still another possibility is to decide to have a Class A library.
