Whole number of children not less than five years of age who have attended school not less than two weeks, including non residents, 138

Whole number between five and fifteen years reported by selectmen, boys, 35; girls, 35; total, 70.

Number of terms of school the past year, 17

Number of weeks of school the past year, 160

Two terms of school have been maintained in every district the past year, besides a winter term of 10 weeks in the primary and intermediate in No. 4, and a winter term of 10 weeks in No. 7, which all scholars in town have had the privilege of attending. We have perhaps paid better wages the past year than heretofore, but we feel justified in so doing. Without specifying any particular school, we would say that all have been fairly successful, some notably so. Good schools are the foundation of good government, and we must have good teachers to accomplish that result.

In regard to repairs, the primary department in No. 4 has been put in good condition. In No. 6 the seats from No. 4 have been put in; it has also been papered, painted and shingled. Nos. 1 and 5 are in a bad condition inside. We think an expenditure of fifteen or twenty dollars on each of these would be a good investment. In No. 7, which is getting to be the largest school in town, the seats are very uncomfortable. We would suggest an appropriation of fifty dollars for purchasing modern seats for the same.

Two terms of school have been maintained in every district the past year, besides a winter term of 10 weeks in the primary and intermediate in No. 4, and a winter term of 10 weeks in No. 7, which all scholars in town have had the privilege of attending. We have perhaps paid better wages the past year than heretofore, but we feel justified in so doing. Without specifying any particular school, we would say that all have been fairly successful, some notably so. Good schools are the foundation of good government, and we must have good teachers to accomplish that result.

In regard to repairs, the primary department in No. 4 has been put in good condition. In No. 6 the seats from No. 4 have been put in; it has also been papered, painted and shingled. Nos. 1 and 5 are in a bad condition inside. We think an expenditure of fifteen or twenty dollars on each of these would be a good investment. REPORT OF Trustees of Town Library.

During the year there have been added to the library by purchase, 56 volumes, making the total number now, 814. This does not include many publications received from the State, which owing to limited room have never been shelved nor catalogued. All the books have been accounted for. It is, perhaps, a remarkable fact that since the starting of the library but one has been lost. To replace worn out books, 10 new ones must be purchased this spring; 13 volumes need re-binding. The appropriation of last spring is sufficient to meet the expense.

The whole number of books taken has been 2,792; number of patrons, 160. Largest number of books taken by one person, 64. Largest number by one family, 128. Average charges per day, 26.
