TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket in the (L.S.) county of Rockingham in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, that is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration and town hall; for the Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, moth extermination and extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, and sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the departments; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including the decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments to other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes, and pay all other necessary charges arising within said town.

4. To see if the town will vote to authorize and empower the selectmen to borrow money for necessary expenditures in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount of 3% on all taxes, except poll taxes, paid on or before August first, 1940.

6. To see if the town will vote to pay members of the fire department \$22.00 in addition to that required by law.

7. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class II road known as _____ and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$ _____; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$ _____.

8. To raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter and otherwise publicizing the resources and natural advantages of the town in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$130.00.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust, to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry and Recreation Department.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purpose of continuing construction of the Epping road that is completed as far as the residence of Richard Hilton. (Petition)

11. To see if the town will vote to accept the following streets: Washington Street and Lincoln Street. (Petition)

12. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new tractor costing \$5,500.00. \$2,000.00 of which to be raised and paid this year and the balance in three yearly payments of \$1,000.00 each and one of \$500.00.

13. To see if the town of Newmarket will vote to raise the sum of \$3,772.97, the balance due to the School District on former appropriations, and pay the same to the School District, with the understanding that the School District shall deduct the same amount from their budget.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,486.47 as a deficiency appropriation, to cover assessment by County Commissioners for the past Old Age Assistance.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the additional sum of \$1,300.00 (\$500.00 raised last year) to repair retaining wall at Eagles Hall.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the services of a supervisor, tools, and materials for local N.Y.A. projects. All labor costs to be paid by Federal Government with the exception of a supervisor.

REPORT OF SUPT. OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Newmarket:

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The membership of the high school teaching staff, with the exception of one, has completely changed in the last two years. Mr. Austin J. McCaffrey, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, came from Lincoln High School to become Headmaster, replacing Mr. James A. Boyd, who became State Educational Consultant for the National Youth Administration. Mr. Ramsden went to Antrim as Headmaster, and Mr. Eames to Connecticut. In their places, the School Board engaged Mr. Stewart V. McCormack and Mr. Arthur J. Kenney. The former is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire with experience in Epping High School, while the latter is a graduate of Holy Cross College. In order to secure and retain the type of teachers desired in Newmarket, the salary schedule formerly in force should be restored and extended.

It is remarkable that the spirit and efficiency of the High School have been preserved notwithstanding such drastic changes in staff personnel. All teachers have responsibili-

ties for guiding school activities as well as classroom instruction. The Headmaster, assisted by Mr. McCormack, has further organized pupil guidance, including pupil records and remedial work. In vocational guidance, the Headmaster will be assisted by the Committee to Cooperate with the High School in the Placement of High School Graduates in Local Business and Industrial Positions, created by the Newmarket Chamber of Commerce last September and consisting of Mr. William Grant, Dr. John D. Butler, Mr. William Barrett, and the Chairman of the School Board *ex officio*.

The School Board has constituted an Athletic Council as recommended by the State Program of Health and Physical Education, consisting at present of the Headmaster, Coach, and Mr. John L. Jordan representing the Board. This Council is to approve athletic budgets and schedules and determine programs and policies, subject to review by the Board. Mr. Chester F. Kingsman has been appointed by the School Board as coach of boys' athletics. Miss Florence M. Giddings continues as girls' coach.

The pupils themselves have an active share in the management of their school. The Student Council has purchased a radio victrola, which is used for social occasions and also cooperated in the regulation of pedestrian traffic on the streets and in maintaining "honor study halls" under pupil supervision.

An interest in the best popular music has been guided by the regular musical instructor, Miss Martha Walker, while classical records from the collection at the State Library have been arranged in programs under the direction of Mr. Kenney. Dancing and Social Etiquette have been made subjects of instruction under the direction of Mr. Kingsman and Headmaster McCaffrey. These subjects and activities are not merely for the sake of a superficial polish, since the poise and confidence which they give relieve the growing youth of that natural awkwardness and occasional

feeling of inferiority that hinder social development and not infrequently are the real cause for untoward conduct.

Other features of High School development reported by the Headmaster include revision of the school activities bookkeeping system, with the assistance of the commercial teacher, Miss Giddings. Miss Giddings is also assisting with the first Senior Class Year Book, to be issued this year. The manual training class, under the direction of Mr. McCormack, has fitted the auditorium for group basketball, in which a large number participate. This class also fitted a small room for a library, where reference books are collected and issued. The School Board has purchased a set of first-class encyclopedias and other much needed reference material, which will be cared for in this library. Miss Esther Norris, head of the English department, has been coaching dramatics and giving remedial instruction in reading, since with the phenomenal increase in high school enrollment throughout the country, many pupils are included who have never quite overcome all their reading difficulties. Miss Elsie McConnell has organized noon lunches correctly planned from a dietetic standpoint and much appreciated by the pupils remaining at noontime, besides giving valuable training in home economics. Miss McConnell has also had charge of utilizing Federal Surplus Products, such as fruits and fruit juices, purchased by the government from farmers to prevent waste and furnished free to all school pupils as well as elsewhere. Teachers at the Primary and Stone Schools have also cooperated (with limited facilities) in dispensing these products. Miss Elizabeth Saunders has charge of Current Events and other work appropriate to the junior high age. Much other regular and special work of all the school grades could be set forth is space permitted.

The interest of the community in school activities is shown in the support of the games and by the increased appropriation for athletics on the initiative of the district itself in the meeting. The public's support of the Primary operetta

resulted in the purchase of many supplementary reading books by the primary teachers, as well as providing for a silent 16-mm moving picture projector and screen, which have been used several times to the great interest of the lower grades. For the high school, a larger projector having sound features is very much needed, to replace the old wide-film machine which is worn out. While student organizations can help some, it will doubtless be necessary to have a district appropriation to meet the full cost.

It is noteworthy that graduates of Newmarket High School in 1937-38 performed above the average of New Hampshire graduates of all schools with reference to their college grades compared with their high school marks, indicating that the standards here have been kept high.

The Report of the School Nurse, Miss Margaret MacDonald, R.N., for last year showed 598 pupils examined in all Newmarket schools, with unfavorable conditions reported to the homes. Many home visits followed, to discuss remedial measures or to investigate school absences. Children were accompanied out of town for special treatment on several occasions. The dental clinic held in Newmarket last winter was sponsored by the Eagles, Relief Corps, Woman's Club, Red Cross, Parent-Teacher Association, and American Legion. Eighty-nine pupils were treated, with 185 operations.

The cooperation of all citizens in the regular work of the schools as well as special enterprises and the adjustments that have taken place has been marked and has been appreciated by the school authorities.
