

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pembroke in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in the Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Grammar School Auditorium in said Pembroke, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the town will vote to charge twenty (.20) cents on and after September 1, 1953, on all unpaid 1953 Poll Taxes.

5. To see if the town will vote to authorize its Selectmen to sell any real estate which the town may have acquired by deed as a result of non-payment of Taxes; and to authorize the Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the town to the purchaser of such land.

6. To see if the town will vote to accept the following named funds, in trust, the income to be used for the perpetual care of the cemetery lots indicated:

(a) Charles H. Ruggles Fund of One Hundred Fifty (\$150.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Ruggles Lot.

(b) Herbert W. Glidden Sr. Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Smith Glidden Lot and the Frank Glidden Lot in Pembroke Hill Cemetery.

(c) Charles E. Cushing Fund of Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars, the income therefrom to be used for the care of the Cushing lot in the Evergreen Cemetery.

7. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 171-A of the Revised Laws relative to playing games of beano in this town.

8. To see if the town will vote to allow the collector of taxes additional compensation for his services in collecting the state head tax and to fix the amount thereof.

9. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the following roads as open highways and make said roads subject to gates and bars, as provided in Part 9, Chapter 188 of the Laws of 1945.

(a) Third Range Road - (1) from Dearborn Road to Academy Road, (2) from Church Road to Pembroke Hill Road and (3) from a point 100 feet northerly of the residence of Joseph Rush to Brickett Hill Road.

(b) Fifth Range Road - from the residence of Richard Diehl to the Cross Country Road, so called, running from the Fourth Range Road to the Sixth Range Road.

(c) Sixth Range Road - (1) from Buck Street to the residence of Andrew Lennartson and (2) from the Cross Country Road to Burrough Road.

(d) Seventh Range Road from Buck Street to to the end of the road.

(e) Church Road from the Fourth Range Road to the Seventh Range Road.

(f) Road from Howard Robinson's residence to the Fifth Range Road. (g) The roads beginning at the Fifth Range Road and running to the Eight Range Road.

(h) Road running from the Eight Range Road near the residence of Mrs. Ernest Hartford to the Burrough Road near the residence of Ida Robinson.

(i) Road leading westerly from the Second Range Road (Route U. S. 3) at Hobbs Corner, so called, from the Public Service Company of New Hampshire sub-station to the end of said Road.

10. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the town road leading from Buck Street, near the residence of Webster Bryant, to the Eighth Range Road, as provided by Part 9, Chapter 188 of the Laws of 1945 as amended.

11. To see if the town will vote to rescind Article 14 in the 1952 warrant which was accepted at the Annual Town Meeting, March 11, 1952. Said article being as follows: "14. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to elect the Road Agent by popular vote in the same manner as other elected officials of the town."

12. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to remove the present iron bridge across the Soucook River, owned jointly by the Town of Pembroke and the City of Concord, and to construct a town road on the Pembroke side of the Soucook River, from the intersection of the Horse Corner Road, so called, and the Burrough Road, so called, to the New Hampshire State Highway near the residence of Lawrence Brown, and to acquire such land and to make such contracts as shall be necessary for that purpose; and to see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sum of money, not exceeding Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars by the issuance of serial notes of the Town, as shall be neces-

sary for that purpose, and to fix the time and place of payment of said notes and the rate of interest thereon.

13. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to repair the sidewalk and railings on the Main Street Bridge, so called, crossing the Suncook River in Suncook Village; and to see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to borrow such sum of money, not exceeding Twenty-five Hundred (\$2,500.00) Dollars, by the issuance of serial notes of the Town as shall be necessary for this purpose, and to determine the time and place of payment of said notes and the rate of interest thereon.

14. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to construct a sidewalk on Pembroke Street from the estate of Anthony Garand and extending northerly to Robinwood Farm, a distance of approximately Four Hundred (400) feet, and raise and appropriate sufficient funds for that purpose.

15. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to construct a hot top sidewalk from the top of Broadway hill (on west-side) where sidewalk now ends, to Fairview Avenue, a distance of approximately three Hundred (300) feet, and to raise and appropriate sufficient funds for that purpose.

16. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, for the construction and maintenance of a sidewalk on Buck Street extending from the corner of Turnpike Street to Evergreen Cemetery.

17. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to give the Pembroke Congregational Church a Quitclaim Deed to a strip of land 26 feet wide and approximately 200 feet in length bounding on the southerly line of the Church property, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to give a deed in the name of the Town to such land. 18. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) to be set aside and added to the accumulative Library Fund for building purposes.

19. (By Petition) To see if the town will vote to install three street lights on Brickett Hill in the town of Pembroke for the convenience of the residents and as a security measure for the Storage Tank of the Fembroke Water Department and appropriate the necessary funds for said project. These lights to be 2500 lumen lights and should be located (1) near Walter Beaumont residence (2) near C. P. Warners residence (3) near Oliver Sherburne residence.

20. To hear the reports of auditors, agents and committees or officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The polls will be open until six o'clock in the afternoon.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

February 1, 1953

To the School Board of Pembroke:

It is a privilege and a pleasure to present my sixth annual report of the schools of Pembroke. May I take the opportunity to thank you for your understanding and honesty in conducting the affairs and problems of the district.

As is true in every town of the size of Pembroke, personnel changes will occur every year. Among these changes include the hoped-for teaching improvements, insufficient salaries, pupil load in classroom, retirement, a desire on the part of the teacher to get into a larger system, and many others. The teachers in Pembroke are no different than in any other town and therefore there were a number of changes in the teaching staff.

You already know that Mr. Donald L. Chase accepted a position in Connecticut and was replaced by Mr. Manson A. Donaghev of Concord. Mrs. Muriel A. Sargent left the teaching profession and her position was taken by Mr. Norman R. Morin of Manchester. When Mr. Robert P. Weber and family returned to Ohio, Mrs. Louise D. Carey was elected to take his place. Mrs. Florence W. Stone was added to the staff in Grade 5. Mrs. Helen Trask replaced Mrs. Gertrude L. Washburn when Mrs. Washburn beceme too ill to continue her work as the remedial teacher and Mrs. Trask in turn was replaced by Mrs. Bertha M. Hickey at the opening of school in September. Mr. Robert M. Pasqualetti accepted a principal's position in Deerfield and Mrs. Elizabeth Thompson from East Andover took his grade. When Miss Dorothea Carr moved out of the State, Miss Catherine Noonan was elected to take her place. This completed the changes made in the staff, seven out of ten. May I state here and now that the present teaching staff as a whole has proved equal to the tasks it had to face when the school year began.

With the changing of the personnel of the teaching staff, we also had a change in the number of children in the school. Education is not static and this is no exception in the matter of children. When school opened in September it was necessary to divide Grade 7 because of the large number of children in that grade. Another teacher had to be elected to meet this change. Grade 5 was withdrawn from the departmentalized section of the school and placed under a permanent teacher. Grades 6, 7, and 8, however, were continued as before. Now it may be necessary to make a similar change in September 1953 since conditions may warrant the need of a permanent teacher in each of the eight grades.

However, there is a greater problem to be solved which may require the addition of another teacher or the elimination of the remedial teacher. This problem begins in Grade One. We now have nearly forty pupils in this first grade with varying abilities and growth For this grade, 25 pupils are more than sufficient. But with nearly 40 children only a small amount of time may be given by the teacher to each child. We have tried to solve the problem this year by releasing the remedial teacher on a part time basis, but when this happens the children who have been improving under the remedial system will again be deprived of this regular instruction. If and when another teacher is elected, the present lunch room will have to be equipped for the second group of beginners and the boys and girls of the entire school will then have to either take their lunches back to their rooms or we must set up the lunch tables in the auditorium or on the stage where the girls in Grades 7 and 8 are now having Home-making. If you go a step further and visualize two teachers in each grade, you can surely realize that in the very near future your school will have two teachers for each grade—sixteen in all—and a supervising principal. At the present time the present building can utilize not more than 12 or 13 rooms including the stage, which might be made into two rooms, the lunch room, the remedial room, the nurse-teacher room, and perhaps parts of the auditorium. And to add to this problem, is the problem of playground space which, in a very few years will be asking for a solution.

For another year and for many years to come, we have and shall come face to face with an increased budget; and probably the greatest increase in every budget will be found in teachers' salaries and tuition. It might be helpful for the citizens of the town to get a direct explanation concerning the trend in teachers' salaries for next year as well as the increased costs in tuition.

Data sent out by the State Department of Education, the New Hampshire State Teachers' Association, and the National Education Association show that the State average for all teachers for the 1952-53 school year was just over \$3000 per teacher and the national average slightly higher-about \$3300. The average salary for Pembroke teachers for the same period — 1952-53 — is an even \$2600, just \$400 off the State average and \$700 off the National average. And to go a little further, the National Education Association Board of Directors propose salary goals of \$3200 to \$8000 for qualified teachers who dedicate their services to their communities through a teaching career. If this is not carried out we shall continue to lose good teachers in New Hampshire to neighboring states or young men and women will refuse to enter the profession as is drastically proved this year from the data from New Hampshire colleges which show that there are far less teachers graduating in June 1953 than graduated in June 1952. This is not only the problem of the educator, but the problem also of every citizen of every town in New Hampshire. Your children, New Hampshire children, must be educated because it is their right under our constitution.

For the next school year in nearly every district in this Union as well as those near by, the minimum salary will not be less than \$2600 and in all probability will be nearly \$2700. A number of districts in the State have set up and are working on regular salary schedules where the teacher will start at a certain salary — \$2700 — and receive regular increases — \$200 to \$300 — each year until a maximum of from \$3400 to \$3800 has been reached with extra increments for extra activities.

The second important problem for the School Board and the taxpayer to solve is the tuition problem. The budget this year calls for \$23,500. The budget for 1953-54 proposes \$24,000 if the per pupil increase is not too great. Suppose that the town of Pembroke sends 110 pupils to the Academy next year at \$250 per pupil. The amount will figure \$27,000. This may or may not be the case, but circumstances point in that direction. And there will be no relief in any other section of the State. We have been informed by the Concord Union District that the high school tuition in Concord next year will be \$325 and the elementary school tuition will be \$260 per pupil. Raymond has just announced that the tuition to the Raymond High School will be \$300, \$25 above last year. This will be true everywhere because school costs are increasing. American education has reached a point where tuition rates are equal to and even greater to the increase in children going to high and elementary school.

Many suggestions have been made for a solution. The most pertinent is the matter of State Aid. Maine sets aside \$6,000,000 for its schools; Vermont has voted \$2,500,000; West Virginia \$39,000,000; Washington State \$150,000,000; but New Hampshire, 47th on the list of state aid for its schools, sets aside \$400,-000. This is a job for the General Court. It would seem that the time has come to forget political parties and political lines and think in terms of our boys and girls and the future of our state and nation and in terms of more and better education, the foundation of the democratic way of life for a free people. 1 would like to express my further appreciation to the members of the present School Board, the teaching staff, and every single person who believes in our school system and the effort being made to make it better. Only through this combined effort will your children benefit and become the enlightened men and women of tomorrow.

This is my fifteenth annual report as Principal of Pembroke Academy. It includes the school's organization and educational activities for the year 1952.

Teaching Staff and Enrollment

School opened Wednesday, September 3, 1952 with an enrollment of 178 students, 80 boys and 98 girls. The teaching staff of eight regular and two part-time teachers included three teachers new to Pembroke Academy. Nichols K. Gardner replaced Miss Mabel E. Hayes, who is teaching in Somersworth, N. H. Mr. Gardner has taught for the past six years at Bishop Bradley High School in Manchester, N. H. Chester J. Steckevicz has succeeded Mr. Gerald A. Crotty, who has been continuing his studies in residence at Springfield College. Mr. Steckevicz is a recent graduate of St. Anselm College. Mr. Thomas N. McKnight took over the Shop work when Mr. John J. Burkhardt left to teach in Stamford, Conn. in the high school. Mr. Mc-Knight is a graduate of Keene Teachers College. Music

Mrs. Mabel Reed is Music Supervisor again this year. Her work is with a General Chorus, a Freshman Chorus and both boys' and girls' smaller groups. These latter have made several public appearances on different occasions. This year Pembroke Academy is well represented at the State Music Festival to be held in Nashua, N. H. on March 19 and 20. David Child has been selected to play in the all-state orchestra, and the following have been chosen to sing in the chorus: Joanne Culberson, Lois Stevens, Donald Hamlin, David Yeaton, Allan Cole, and Judith Farnum.

Dramatics

Under the supervision of Mrs. Elizabeth Morrill the Senior Play "Tons of Fun" was presented two days, Nov. 6 and 7, to appreciative audiences. Miss Patricia Gorman coached the Christmas Play, and Mrs. Morrill will coach the School Play to be staged in May.

Cadet Teachers

We have been able to work out a mutually beneficial program again this year with Mount Saint Mary College. Miss Maureen Habe, a senior at the college, was with us for the first semester and taught classes in Economics and in U. S. History and took charge of some of your principal's study rooms. The following is an extract from a letter from Sister Magdelene, Dean of the College:

"We, all of us, realize fully, Mr. Beal, how great a service you do us when you accept one of our inexperienced girls . . . and we are most grateful." On the other hand, in this time of teacher shortages, it has been of great help to the Academy to be able to secure Mount Saint Mary students as substitute teachers, on short notice and whenever needed.

Noon Lunch Program

Under the direction of Mrs. Alice W. Bean, Home Economics teacher, and with the help of Mrs. John Farnum and Mrs. Erwin Chase, our Noon Lunch program is being continued and a well-balanced meal is being served daily to 60 - 80 students. With financial help and surplus commodities from the Government and with some financial help from the Trustees this program manages to break about even. Its size can be realized better when I say that in January expenses for food and help were about \$500.00 and that we used over 1,600 bottles of milk.

Trade and Industries

Our Shop program as well as that in Home Economics is Federally aided, and must meet certain standards and requirements. Mr. Thomas N. McKnight, a graduate of Keene Teachers College, is the new Shop Instructor. He has the boys interested in woodworking, metal working, and shop electricity. Many practical jobs about school are done by the boys, who gain by these experiences. Recently the Trustees purchased a "Shop Smith" and this machine has proved a valuable piece of equipment. The "Shop Smith" is a combination of five basic power tools in one.

Sports

Pembroke Academy has a reputation of always doing well in sports. The Cross-Country team did well during the regular schedule and took part in the State Meet at the University of New Hampshire. They were coached by Mr. Chester Steckevicz, a graduate of St. Anselm College. Mr. Steckevicz has charge of boys' gym classes and is coaching the JV basketball team. The Varsity basketball team is coached by Mr. Nicholas K. Gardner, a newcomer to Pembroke this year, whose team has made an enviable record to date. After losing the first three games, the boys have won fourteen straight games! With three more games to play they stand 4th in the Class B standing in the State.

Mr. Edward Currier is the baseball coach. His boys won the Central New Hampshire Interscholastic League title last spring.

The Girls' basketball team is coached by Miss Frances Nourse again this year. To date they have won 5 and lost 7, but the games have been close and the competition keen.

I want to recommend that parents encourage their children to take out insurance against accidents occuring in sports and physical education activities. For as low a charge as \$1.00 benefits can be obtained in all sports except football and hockey and skiing. Many parents and friends have aided in transporting our players to out-of-town games, and I want to take this opportunity to thank one and all for your interest and cooperation.

Conclusion

It has been a good year. Attendance has been good, 95.14%. Tardiness and absences low! Interest has been good; promotions nearly 100%. Honor students, who have parts in the 1953 Graduation are: Janet Murphy, Valedictorian; Harold Loso, Salutatorian; Lila Pennock, Class History; Lucy Yeaton, Class Will; Pauline Townsend, Class Prophecy and David Otterson, Class Oration.

The school is experiencing growing pains. Shop space is crowded; kitchen space is crowded; classroom space is crowded, and numbers are increasing! In June there will be about thirty graduates; next June over fifty! For the past five years the average number of pupils each year has been 180. And we have only 160 desks! I am glad to be able to report that Alumni interest is on the increase. This fall alumni officers and members of their Executive Committee have met and organized, drawn up a Constitution, and are planning ahead. These officers are: Hermas Daviault, President; Read Parmenter, Vice-President; Paul Ordway, Vice-President; Esther Holt, Secretary; and Burt Robinson, Treasurer.

In conclusion I want to thank Supt. Watson, the Trustees, and my teachers for their sympathetic interest and cooperation in our mutual problems.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

TEAM WORK WILL DO THE JOB

Team work has won victories from time immemorial — for families, towns, cities, states and nations. Team work is the highest form and most democratic example of cooperation. Without team work, America and Americans would never have achieved the greatness that is theirs. We are all aware of its power and appeal. It is no less needed now than in the past.

Team work among those who live, work and recreate in and near the woodlands, is vital. There never was a time when our woodlands as a whole were in such precarious condition as they are now.

Since the hurricane, nearly 900,000 acres of slash have been added to our already sizeable slash problem. If we are to avoid unnecessary trouble with fire in our woodland areas everyone must cooperate — we must have team work. The remedy is simple —

YOU and YOU and You and You

MUST secure the required permit from your local forest fire warden before burning.

MUST use necessary precautions while burning or smoking in or near woodlands.

MUST not throw lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from vehicles moving along highways. Otherwise YOU might well contribute to a costly

and damaging fire. And don't forget that fire might destroy your own property.

REMEMBER — Only YOU and YOU and YOU can prevent fire!
