NH RSA -188H Implementation Committee Co-Chairs

For the past three years, Jane and Sharyn have had the honor of co-chairing the Sexual Misconduct at Higher Education Institutions (NH RSA-188H) Task Force. NH is the first state to pass and implement the student-designed and lead Every Voice Legislation. The committee has benefited from the insights, wisdom and knowledge of NH practitioners and researchers with expertise in campus climate, advocacy, law enforcement and prevention strategies. This month, the Task Force will launch the second campus climate survey at all NH Institutions of Higher Education.



Exciting uSafeUS Updates

As some of you know, uSafeUS® is your ultimate ally in campus safety, providing survivors, friends, family, faculty, and staff at US colleges with instant access to crucial local information and tools for the prevention of and response to sexual assault, sexual harassment, stalking and relationship violence. Our interactive features empower students to navigate potential dangers with confidence and connect students to resources the moment they are needed.

We recently released <u>uSafeUS Version 6</u> and are excited about the updated look and ease of use. Also, we have cool collateral and swag to engage communities that use uSafeUS. Please reach out to <u>Sharyn</u> if we can jumpstart your prevention efforts this semester.

Additionally, in an effort to address the intersection between campus sexual assault and alcohol misuse, we are thrilled to share that the National Institute of Health has awarded the University of Florida (<u>Professor Nichole Scaglione</u>) and PIRC an R34 to add an alcohol tracking feature with real-time messaging to uSafeUS. Interviews and focus groups are


underway to design these new features, and we look forward to providing updates over the next year.


