## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

---

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg, in the County of Coos, in the said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pittsburg, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at ten of the clock on the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
2. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
3. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to distribute blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
4. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for same.
5. To see if the town will vote to elect a committee or instruct the moderator to appoint a committee, to set the date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise the rate of pay for laborers to \$1.00 per hour, and to raise the rate of pay of Town Officers to \$1.10 per hour.

7. To see if the town will vote to pay truck and driver \$2.25 per hour on town roads, when used under shovel be paid State rates.
8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to pay necessary rates to provide for suitable trucks for snow removal on Town highways.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of eight hundred dollars (\$800.00) to lay out a road three rods in width and gravel a road twelve feet wide to Warren Haynes Lot, as proposed in petition for the laying out of road.
10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for construction and maintenance of a town skating rink, and same to be under the direction of the Principal of the School.
11. To see if the towns people will vote to sell Town Lots on Back Lake Numbers 43, 45, 47 and 49 back to A. M. Bean so they may become taxable property.
12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old right of way lying on the East side of Camp Otter Road near Ball field.
13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) to improve the addition of the Hollow Cemetery, same to be under the direction of the Selectmen.
14. To see if the town will vote to instruct the moderator to appoint any vacancies in the committee of the Soldier's Memorial and Old Home Day committee.
15. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary Town Officers not listed under Article 16.

16. To bring in your ballots for the election of delegates at large, alternate delegates at large, district delegates, alternate district delegates, to the National Convention to be held to nominate candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States, also for one Selectman for three years, one Road Agent for the Lake District, one Road Agent for the Middle District, one Road Agent for the Lower District, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Three Auditors, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Library Trustee for two years, and one Overseer of the Poor.

Polls shall be opened at 10 A. M. and not closed before 6 P. M.

**WARRANT**

**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

---

To the inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Pittsburg qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 15th day of March, 1952, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To chose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the

application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to sell the school woodshed.
10. If the preceding article is adopted, to see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to use the proceeds realized from the sale to construct a storage shed, approximately 16 feet by 20 feet, and to use any remaining balance to improve the school grounds.
11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to exchange a portion of the land deeded to the district by the John H. Brackett Estate for an equal amount to be added to the parcel of land deeded to the district by George W. Hawes. The purpose of said exchange is to establish a straight easterly boundary on the upper section of the district's property.
12. To see if the school district will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the school district the benefits of title II of the Federal Social Security Act (Old-Age and Survivor's Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$45 to defray the school district's share of the cost thereof.
13. If the foregoing article is adopted to see if the school district will authorize the School Board to execute on behalf of the school district the necessary agreement with the State of New Hampshire to carry into effect the plan and to see if the school district will designate the School District Treasurer as the officer to be responsible for the administration of the plan.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

---

To the School Board and the Citizens of the Pittsburg School District:

### Foreword

During this period of extreme uncertainty and concern for the future, a period of continually rising educational costs, it would seem that it might be well for us to consider briefly the over-all responsibility of our schools. It has been long recognized that one very important job is to provide the pupil with those tools of learning which will enable him or her to obtain and comprehend information to the extent that it may be used in subsequent steps in the learning process. For example, the child is taught how to read, write and to work with numbers in the early grades in order that he or she may become proficient in the use of these very necessary tools of learning during the following years. At any one of the sequential steps up the educational ladder, it is possible to determine more or less accurately the degree of understanding and retention of the concepts assimilated. Generally speaking, we are fairly sure of what has been learned academically, as the results can be seen, and of how it was learned insofar as observed activities are concerned, for we set them up.

As important as is the function of the school to help pupils to acquire the above mentioned factual information, however, of vastly greater importance is any assistance that may be given in the development of the attitudes, sound judgment and emotional stability which, in turn, will result in a type of conduct that tends to produce wholesome, happy and well adjusted individuals in society. To say it another way, possibly there is as much evidence about us which seems to indicate that there is perhaps as much likelihood of constructive application being used in a given situation, as a result of learning how to do a certain kind of work well, as there is from the impressions gained by studying and discussing a particular concept at length. In other words, the chances of inculcating principles of good citizenship to the extent that they will be exemplified in action sometimes seem to be even more apt to stem from the proficiency developed in preparing for a chosen occupation or profession than from an exhaustive study of the value of these principles. If this is true, it would seem that there is need for additional emphasis upon supplementing the portrayal of our educational concepts by setting in motion, insofar as is possible, practical procedures to accomplish the desired objectives. In the final analysis then, our primary concern is to bridge the gap, if there be one, between the theoretical acceptance of our educational ideals and their actual accomplishment by doing all that we can to provide the required training techniques.

### Teachers

Two new teachers have joined the faculty this year. In the high school Leo T. Rvan, Jr., who received his bachelor's degree at the University of New Hampshire and his master's degree from the University of Arizona, has been employed to teach Mathematics, Biology and Social Science. Mrs. Mae F. Thibeault, a graduate of Plymouth Teachers' College and a teacher with extensive experience both inside and outside the state, teaches Social Science and Mathematics in the junior high school and Typewriting in the high school.

It means much, during this period of acute teacher shortage, to have six of our veteran teachers continue working with us. The high school teachers and the respective subjects taught are Francis C. Wilson, Principal, Shop, General Science and Physics; Helen Barclay, English and French; and Vera F. Gilpatrick, Home Economics. Doris E. Fissette, Esther H. Bean and Eva S. Scott teach Grades 5-6, 3-4, and 1-2 respectively in the elementary school.

### School Nurse

Mrs. Ethel S. Sturgis, R. N., employed to fill the vacancy in the school nurse's position in this supervisory union created by the resignation of Phoebe H. Stevens, is well known in this area for the stellar work she has done during the past several years. A graduate of the Massachusetts General Hospital School of Nursing, Mrs. Sturgis is a veteran nurse with extensive experience in private, community and institutional work in Washington, D. C., as well as in this and other states.

### Enrollment and Attendance

The enrollment is somewhat smaller this year than it was last year, as there are 122 enrolled at the present time as compared to 133 a year ago. A breakdown of this number shows that there are 34 in the high school and 88 in Grades 1-8. Four tuition pupils are attending the high school from Clarksville. Again, as last year, 8 Pittsburg pupils from the Hall Stream Section are enrolled in the West Stewartstown School. In addition, there is one pupil in attendance at the Canaan High School from this same area. The average percentage of attendance for the past year was: Grades 1-6, 93.92; Grades 7-8, 91.01; and Grades 9-12, 95.35. The average number of tardinesses per pupil for the same groups was .19, .50 and 1.08 respectively.

## Notes on the Budget

The Budget of the School Board of 1952-53 is \$59,504 of which \$43,974 is for operational expenses and \$15,530 for principal and interest payments on bond and serial note issues to finance the construction and equipment of the new school building. The current year's budget is \$55,806 of which \$42,186 and \$13,620 are for operating cost and bond issue obligations respectively. As no state aid is anticipated, the estimated income is confined to a possible \$600 for tuition which makes the amount \$58,90 to be raised by taxes by the town.

## New School Building

Pittsburg has every reason to be very proud of its new school building. Dedicated on the beautiful spring day of May 20, 1951, it stands as concrete evidence of the determination of the community to provide the best possible facilities conducive to the education of its boys and girls. The attractive physical features found in the beautifully decorated, profusely lighted, and newly equipped classrooms, should tend to have a beneficial and lasting effect upon the impressions received and attitudes developed by the pupils while studying and working together within its walls. The provision, also, of the new up-to-date equipment that is supplied in the Shop, Home Economics, Cafeteria, Commercial, Laboratory and Regular Classrooms greatly enhances furnishing an inclusive, adaptable and flexible educational program to more adequately meet the ever increasing, present-day responsibilities of our schools.

In order that a knowledge of the cost of constructing and equipping this sturdy functional unit may be had, a breakdown of the various expenses in a financial report of the building fund is printed on subsequent pages in this report.

### Miscellaneous

With the number of pupils taking advantage of the dental clinic service continuing to increase, and with the periodic examinations and check-ups that are made with special attention being given to follow-up work in some cases in the regular health supervision, particular attention is given to the physical well-being of the pupils.

The school lunch program, operated for the first time this year, has proved to be very popular. Nearly 100 pupils and most of the teachers are taking advantage of this morale-building and health-giving service.

As is pretty generally known, little change has occurred in the state aid picture as a result of any action taken by the State Legislature at the last session. Again, as has been the case during the past two years, the district received no financial assistance.

### Conclusion

May I again express my sincere appreciation to the members of the School Board, parents, teachers and citizens for all the help and co-operation received in our work together to maintain high standards in our schools.
