TOWN WARRANT THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L.S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sandown in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Sandown on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, said loan to run from Town Meeting to Town Meeting.

4. To see if the Town will appropriate \$50.00 to repair road to Butman cemetery, the same amount to be raised by the Town of Hampstead.

5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$1,300.00 on long term notes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to purchase road grader and appropriate money for the purpose.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$25.00 to purchase forest fire equipment, the State contributing the same amount.

8. To see if the Town will vote to eliminate all offices on Town ballot except the following: Selectman,. Road Agent, Clerk, Treasurer and Tax Collector. 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept \$50.00 Trust Fund to care for cemetery lot of Moses Sanborn and William Tilton.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for construction of either of the following: Class 2 roads; the Fremont road and appropriate the sum of \$382.50 or appropriate the sum of \$314.70 to receive State aid for Class 5 roads.

11. To act on any other Town business that may legally come before said meeting.

To the School Board and Citizens of Sandown:

I herewith present my twelfth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Supervision

My primary duty should concern the welfare of the children in your schools. My philosophy is dependent upon that function. The supervision and improvement of instruction naturally come to mind as the first essentials whether they come from the introduction of a new textbook, advice to the teachers on school problems or absolute direction to perform certain tasks. You will admit that interruption of service makes this ideal more difficult to perform. That has been our problem this year. Miss Cheney transferred her activities from Pine Grove School to another district as did Miss Gustafson of the Clark School. In their places came Miss Marjorie Andrews from Keene Normal School and Miss Alice Davis, an experienced teacher of some years. We had fond hopes for another successful year but must just now undergo further interruption due to the resignation of Miss Davis. We regret that Miss Davis, a hard and conscientious worker, does not have the strength equal to carrying on the task. Up to the present, your teachers were asking for whatever help I am able to render. I have no reason to believe this demand will expire after the present emergency is over. I trust that this aid and support is indirectly helpful to the pupils.

We must look to the results to determine the value of instruction. Among the forty-four pupils in your schools at the close in June 1938, forty were promoted or 91%. In other words, it was found that only 9% were in need of or could profit by remaining in the same grade for another year. I believe this is a worthy record. Last year's graduation class of five pupils will serve as another example of accomplishment. Along with the other S1 graduates of the eighth grade in this Union, these five took the Metropolitan Achievement Tests, Advanced Form. Three exceeded and two fell slightly below their grade standards. It is highly significant that the highest score in the whole Union was obtained from one of your pupils, namely Dean Hathaway. As a further example of parental cooperation and pupil interest, I am pleased to list the following pupil who was perfect in attendance during 1937-38:

Finance

My secondard duty has to do with finance and the general operation of the physical plant. In a large Union such as this, too often this function comes ahead of the first ideal, supervision. Yet, certain situations must be faced and problems solved. Required reports must be finished on time, meetings held to review needs, plans made to meet conditions. Much time must be spent either by night or by day to determine the means of satisfying these needs by long-time planning. That is one of the School Board's duties, and mine, just now and a difficult one it is due to the length of time in advance before the spending occurs as well as the uncertainties of high school tuition, caused by frequent shifts in family residence. Every budget presented to you must foresee the demands of a year or more in the future. This year's budget is no exception to this formula.

To show certain facts concerning the financial management of your schools I list the following information taken from recent releases of the State Board of Education. These indicate the financial burden and how well it is being done in comparison with other towns in this union.


