**WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
MARCH 13 AT 9 A. M.**

Article 1. To hear the reports of the various town officials and take action on the same.

Article 2. To choose a Town Clerk, Selectmen and Town Treasurer.

Article 3. To choose all other necessary town officers, agents and committees.

Article 4. To raise money for town charges.

Article 5. To raise money for highways and bridges.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount necessary for the maintenance of state highways.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the amount necessary to secure state aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

Article 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the free public library.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.) in anticipation of the collection of taxes.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.) for repairs on Chase road.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to bond the Town Treasurer and Tax Collector.

Article 12. To see what action the town will take in relation to the legacies of the late Mary J. Currier for the benefit of the Public Library and the care of lot in Currier cemetery.

Article 13. To see what action the town will vote to take in regard to "Old Home Day" and raise money for same.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to purchase a new road machine and raise money for same.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to purchase a portable stone crusher and raise money for same.

SCHOOL REPORT.

South Hampton, N. H., February 15, 1917.

To the School District:—

The following report for the year ending February 15, 1917, is respectfully submitted by the School Board:

At the Peak school Miss Miriam O. Morrill completed two years of successful service in June. In September she entered the Keene Normal School, where she is at the present time earnestly at work perfecting herself in the profession of teaching. Her successor is Miss Alice M. Robinson, a graduate of Robinson Seminary. Miss Robinson is doing well with her small number of pupils.

Miss Eva M. Lawrence is in her second year of good service as teacher of the Upper Village school. Last March Miss Lawrence was given a teacher's certificate by the State Superintendent of Instruction. These certificates are given for successful service and yield the recipients two dollars weekly from the state. Following the practice in many towns, the "certificate money" has been paid Miss Lawrence with her regular salary and of the district school money, the latter waiting to be reimbursed by the state.

The Centre school still remains closed on account of the small number of pupils within its limits. In the spring and fall these "centre" pupils were transported to and from the Upper Village school. During the present winter the Barnard school is in session and the Upper Village school is closed.

If our young people are to receive the greatest good from the educational advantages we offer them, they should be regular in their school attendance. It is best

for pupils not to miss a single recitation. The daily attention to school work is of excellent educational value, aside from the knowledge that may be obtained. Parents are, therefore, earnestly requested to have their children attend each session of the school if possible.

The amount of knowledge taught in the elementary schools is limited. For a boy or girl to enter upon life's work, with less education than the eight grades represent, is to begin the labor of years at a disadvantage; and there does not seem to be any good reason for permitting children to be satisfied with less schooling than the complete elementary requirements. It is well at home to arouse in a child an ambition to continue in school,—and to studious endeavor while there. The state requires all children in good health to attend school until they complete the prescribed work of the elementary grades, or, failing in proficiency, until they are sixteen years of age. Any person having the custody and control of a child and violating the law is liable to a fine. Our common school is a priceless inheritance, and its course of study is not beyond the understanding of any boy or girl fourteen years of age. We should not be satisfied with less attainment for any child.

Schoolhouses form no part of a rifle or shot gun range. Whoever treats them as such shows a deep need of that mental development of which the schoolhouse is a factor. Youth should reverence and not abuse its temples of learning.
