THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Stewartstown, in the County of Coos, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Town of Stewartstown on Tuesday the tenth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid.
2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget, and raise money for the same. If not to see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year, as follows:
 - (a) Town Officers' Salaries.
 - (b) Town Officers, Expenses.
 - (c) Election and Registration.
 - (d) Town Hall Expenses.
 - (e) Damage and Legal Expense.
 - (f) Health Department.
 - (g) Vital Statistics.
 - (h) Interest on Temporary Loans.
 - (i) Interest on Bond.
 - (j) County Tax.
 - (k) Payment on Bonds.
3. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for Support of the Poor.
4. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for the Support of Libraries.

5. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for the care of Cemeteries.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise seven hundred thirty-five (\$735.00) dollars, for street lighting.
7. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise for the following departments:
 - (a) Police Department, including care of tramps.
 - (b) Fire Department.
 - (c) Sewer Department.
8. To see what sum of money, if any, the Town will vote to raise in addition to that required by law for Town Road Maintenance.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Winter Road.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for the purpose of widening Town Roads where necessary.
11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to incur debts for temporary loans in anticipation of Taxes of the Municipal Year and to pay out of the Tax money when it is received.
12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct and authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of at public auction any and all real estate now owned and acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deed.
13. To see if the Town will vote to buy any new equipment and make appropriation for the same.

14. To see if the the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$68.00 to the White Mountains Region Association, being one 1-100th of one per cent of the Town valuation, for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspapers, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.
15. To choose by Australian ballot the following Town Officers:
 - (a) Town Clerk.
 - (b) Selectman for the three years ensuing.
 - (c) Town Treasurer.
 - (d) Five Road Agents.
 - (e) One or more Constables.
 - (f) One or more Sextons.
 - (g) Collector of Diamond Pond Rent.
 - (h) Overseer of Poor.
 - (i) Trustee of Trust Fund.
 - (j) One Library Trustee for three years ensuing.
16. To see if the Town will instruct its Selectmen to appoint all other Town Officers as required by law.
17. To transact any other business that may be legally brought before this meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Stewartstown School District:

FOREWARD

This report is being made at a time when the world is engaged in a great struggle between the democracies and the totalitarian states in which the avowed purpose of the totalitarian governments is the complete annihilation of democracy and the democratic way of life.

We need not review the international situation leading to the bold attack upon the United States. Our nation is arming to defend itself.

America must be strong—strong to meet the thrust against her way of life from armed aggressors; strong to solve her own domestic problems by peaceful democratic means. To the building of a stronger America the schools of the Nation are dedicated. By patient processes of instruction and training they seek to develop in the youth of the land those essential knowledges and skills and that devotion to our democratic way of life which make for national strength and unity.

In this time of crisis the North Country stands ready—ready to give of its youth and resources and ready to do its part in training boys and girls to preserve for the world at least one nation where freedom and liberty for mankind survive.

Tuition

There are at this time, 27 tuition pupils at Canaan, 11 at Colebrook and 1 at Pittsburg. An increase in the number is expected this fall.

Enrollment and Attendance

There are 92 enrolled at West Stewartstown, 55 in the four rural schools and 39 tuition pupils for a total of 186. This is 10 less than at this time a year ago. There are fewer tuition pupils while the number at West Stewartstown and in the rural schools remains about the same.

The percentages of attendance, on the whole, are lower due to the series of epidemics. The best records were made by South Hill and West Stewartstown Grammar with 96.52 and 95.19 respectively. The Hollow School had the best (4) and Cedar Brook the poorest (98) tardiness record.

Buildings and Equipment

The buildings are for the most part in quite good condition. The Hollow School was painted outside. One side of the roof was shingled and the chimney top relaid both at Cedar Brook and Bear Rock. New seats and slate blackboards were installed at Cedar Brook. New white porcelain urinals replace the old slate ones in the boys' basement at West Stewartstown. Numerous other minor repairs and improvements were made.

The stoker on the West side is being operated for much less than the old oil burner. The electric lights in the rural schools are valued improvements. No way as yet has been found to get electric lights in the Bear Rock school.

It is hoped that the old double seats at the Hollow and South Hill can soon be replaced with more modern equipment.

School Debt

The school board found it possible to add \$800. out of surplus to the \$800. special appropriation and thereby decrease the debt from \$3400. to \$1800. The debt is now quite small and with small appropriations can soon be completely wiped out.

Teachers

There were several changes in the teaching personnel of the district. Mildred Loubier, Gorham, was selected for grades 5 and 6. Ruth Stoughton, Keene, filled the position in grades 3 and 4. Gertrude Hanscom, Gorham, with considerable previous teaching experience, was elected to fill the vacancy in grades 1 and 2.

Hallie Weir substituted for the first month at Bear Rock. Since then Mildred Corbett has filled the position. Nellie Stone assumed the duties of the school nurse.

Notes on the Budget

The school board's budget for 1942-43 totals \$18,559.00 as compared with \$17,383.00 for last year. The budget is reduced by an estimated income of \$5,950.50 so that the requested appropriation is \$12,608.50. The appropriation in March 1941 was \$11,609.60 plus \$800. on school debt for a total of \$12,409.60.

Conclusion

It is always gratifying to note the regard that individual citizens and local organizations have for their schools. Your interest in the well being of the entire school system, your support and your cooperation are most cheering.

I take this opportunity to again express my appreciation to the members of the school board, parents, teachers and friends for the interest and support they have given to the schools during the past year.
