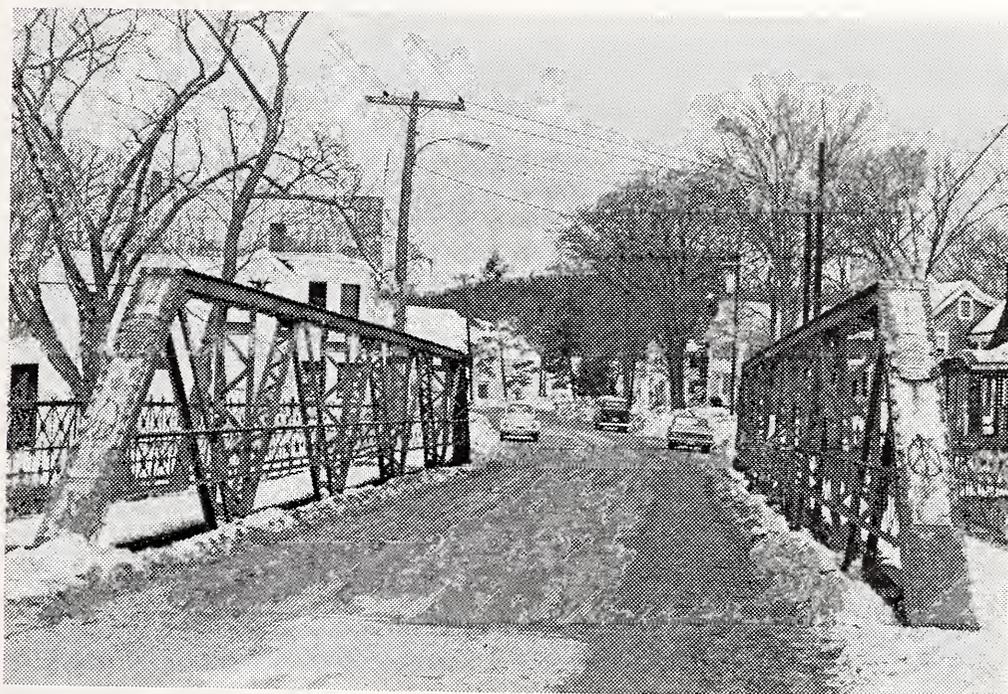


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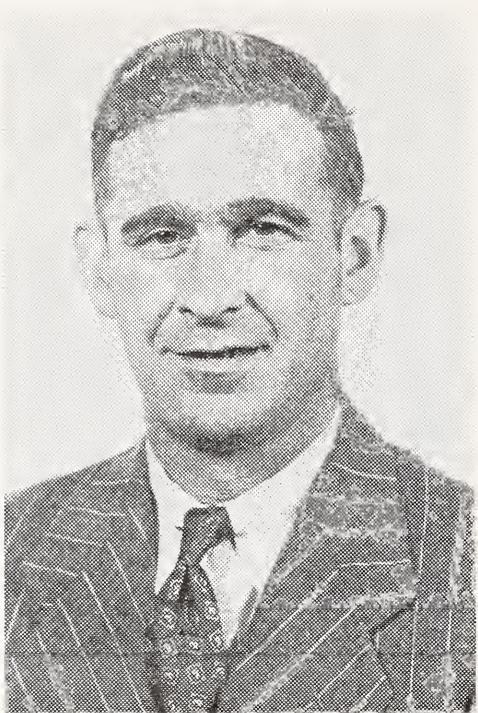

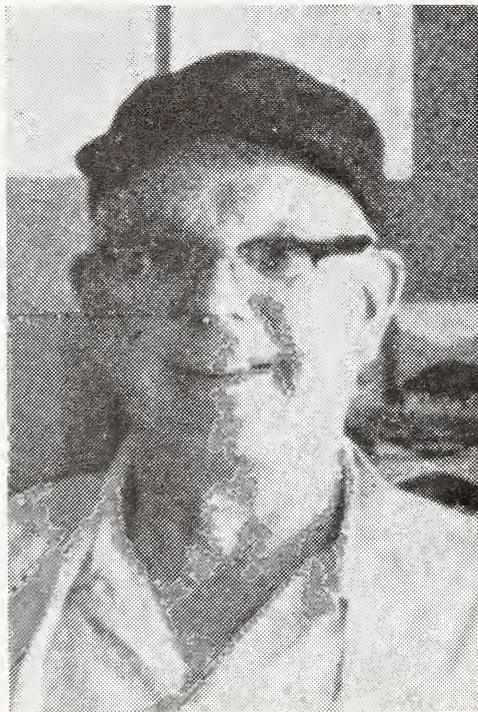

I. In order that the following articles may be legally voted on by Australian ballot, you are hereby notified that the polls will be open for this purpose at ten of the clock on said Tuesday, March 7.

II. The meeting will reconvene at 7 P. M. Wednesday, March 8, 1972 in said school house to see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes and to transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

ARTICLE 32. "To see if the Town will vote to designate all town maintained roads as scenic under the provisions of RSA 253:17 and 18, for the purposes of protecting and enhancing the scenic beauty of Tamworth and further, that the Selectmen of Tamworth shall, regarding such roads designated as scenic, file the appropriate request for suspension of specifications when making application to the Commissioner of Public Works and Highways for Town Road Aid funds under RSA 241:7 (1). Recommended by the Conservation Commission."

ARTICLE 33. To see if the Town will approve the following article: "Beginning with 1972 Town Taxes shall be collected in two installments, the first payable on July 1st annually and the second before December 1st annually."

ARTICLE 34. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue a portion of the Philbrick Neighborhood Road beginning at the southerly boundary of land of Emily

Sedgwick and running northerly for a distance of about five hundred (500) feet, provided that a new right of way is deeded to the Town and a new highway constructed thereon at the expense of Emily Sedgwick to replace the discontinued portion.

ARTICLE 35. To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the amendment of the constitution proposed by the 1971 session of the General Court shall be approved.

ARTICLE 36. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE 37. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax collector's deeds.

ARTICLE 38. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

During the year there was considerable activity by the department.

There was also one house burned for test. Several tests of pumping and nozzles were made.

During the year Tamworth joined the Ossipee Valley Mutual Aid consisting of the Departments of Madison, Freedom, Effingham, Ossipee, Center Ossipee and West Ossipee.

A call center was set up at the Sheriffs Office with a radio network reaching all departments for direct communication. Two radios were placed in Tamworth trucks and Plectrons will be purchased for many firemen, which can alert them at all hours.

We are now able to get help from surrounding towns including Sandwich even though we do not belong to their Mutual Aid set up.

We have already used West Ossipee on an actual house fire with excellent results and we have responded to two of theirs and one in Sandwich.

Several of our men have taken courses in fire fighting and the care of equipment.

Equipment is being updated and we have installed more dry hydrants.

This is a continued buildup of resources toward fighting fire.

The Mutual Aid gives us the benefit of outside equipment and man power which we may be lacking at a given time.

Your continued support of the Department will be appreciated, also your cooperation in preventing fires in your own buildings is necessary.

Please look for defects in chimneys, wiring and especially collection of trash or poor storage of flammable materials such as matches, gasoline and paint.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

LEST WE FORGET — IT CAN HAPPEN HERE

Disastrous forest and brush fires that destroy hundreds of homes are more prevalent on the west coast with their dry seasons and strong dry hot winds but 25 years ago this fall is the anniversary of a disaster that devastated large areas of northern New England leaving villages in ashes with rows of cellarholes and chimneys in a number of summer vacation home locations. Many lives were lost on that destructive day of October 23, 1947, nothing could stop the wind driven flames.

It is true that such conditions are unusual for New Hampshire but they happened once, they can happen again. The fuel for fires is all around us. All it takes is a firebrand. Only by cultivating a habit of carefulness with fire at all times can we meet the challenge of protection when dry conditions prevail. Please let these reminders be your guide:

1. Never, either when walking, riding or driving, discard a firebrand — a lighted match or a glowing cigarette.

2. Always obtain a permit for any outside burning. The burning of household rubbish is not permitted if your town has rubbish collection. Burning of grass or garden litter can be dangerous. See your warden first.

3. If you camp or picnic, be sure open fires are allowed and if they are, put them dead out when leaving.

4. **Most Important** — instruct your children in the danger of the lighted match. A lighted match and dry grass or forest litter is a dangerous combination which leads to destructive loss and can lead to tragedy.

The past year - 1971 was a favorable year for the control of fires. There were too many fire starts in some

towns. We thank those who remembered and ask others to heed Smokey's message.

REPORT OF THE TAMWORTH PLANNING BOARD 1971

The Planning Board met thirteen times during 1971 and approved several subdivisions. At two meetings members of the State Planning Board were present to discuss legislation and other matters. At one meeting about thirty residents from Ski and Beach Development were present to give their views on a proposed Non-Resident Mobile Home Park at the entrance to the club. It was a lively meeting and opinions were freely expressed. It should be pointed out that all unsold plots in Ski and Beach have been grouped to conform to sub-division regulations. The Planning Board would again like to stress the fact that all meetings are open to anyone who cares to come. Regular meetings are held on the fourth Wednesday of every month except July and August.

The most pressing matter that faces the Board is that of trailer parks and camping areas. It is the opinion of the Town legal counsel that both of these are to be classified as subdivisions and hence administered under the Town Subdivision Regulations. This would give the Town some control over their location and size. The Board is acutely aware, however, of the crying need for a mobile home park in Tamworth for the use of local young people who are finding it increasingly difficult to acquire land at a reasonable price. The result is that quite a few trailers have been located on family land and some are in violation of health as well as subdivision regulations. The Planning Board has discussed the possibility of finding a tract of land which might be set aside for such young residents for either permanent or mobile buildings. Such land should be located on a convenient road and attractively situated. It should, of course, met all the Sanitation and Health regulations. The problem is to find the land. The Board will welcome suggestions from interested parties. The current prejudice against trailers is unrealistic, and although in large numbers they can become a financial burden to the

Town, properly dispersed and to a certain extent regulated, they fill a very urgent need.

The Initial Housing Study under the 701 Plan is now available and copies can be obtained at the Selectmen's Office. Town maps have also been received. The 701 Plan to aid Towns to make Comprehensive Plans has been discontinued from Washington, hence what future planning is done will probably have to be done locally. The town of Canterbury, for instance, has created its own Comprehensive Plan at a cost of some \$400.00. This was done over a period of three years by volunteers with the help of the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. Tamworth, a town of much the same size, might well benefit from its example recognizing the need to preserve its unique qualities and charm.

TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

The seven members of The Commission begin this report with an expression of appreciation to the residents of Tamworth for their appropriation of \$500 at Town Meeting, March 9, 1971, for The Commission's use. This was the first time The Commission had asked for money from The Town. A financial statement of The Commission follows this report.

The Tamworth Conservation Commission has been in existence almost five years. Ten regular meetings were held in 1971 and in addition there were two special meetings in connection with drawing up The Conservation Plan for The Town.

In August of 1971 it was officially recorded in Carroll County Courthouse that Mrs. Theodore Johnson and Lois Bernice Johnson had given to The Town two tracts of land which include a swamp and twenty-two acres of woods and fields, with the understanding that these properties remain undisturbed and in a natural state. Mrs. Johnson has named this area "Waterfowl Haven." It is dedicated to the memory of the late Theodore Johnson. "Waterfowl Haven" can roughly be described as lying between the Johnson property on Route 113 and the Chocorua fire station on Route 16, and The Commission members gratefully acknowledge the Johnson's gift unique in that it is a sanctuary literally right beside hustling, bustling Route 16.

Fifty small evergreens were purchased from a nursery by The Commission and on September 18th temporarily transplanted by several Commission members in a plowed field owned by John Hidden. These trees will be used for planting throughout The Town when they attain a sturdy size.

The Tamworth Conservation Commission voted to join The Association of New Hampshire Conservation Commissions in January of 1971. Through joining this Associa-

tion Ford Foundation Funds are available to commissions under certain restrictions. Four members of The Tamworth Conservation Commission attended the first annual meeting of The Association in Lee in November and learned a great deal, from a field trip and accompanying lectures, on the value of marshlands.

Mrs. Harry Damon gave us a handsome sign for "The Black Spruce Ponds Reserve" (former Damon property previously donated to The Town) near White Lake which is managed by The Commission.

There were slides and a modest exhibit of Conservation Commission projects at The Arts Festival last summer and the slides were shown at The Wonalancet Outdoor Club Annual Meeting as well as at Summer Town Meeting. Peg King spoke at both these gatherings.

Due to The Chocorua Lake Association Foundation extending an invitation to The Chairman of The Tamworth Conservation Commission to become an "ex officio" Trustee of The Association, each chairman of The Commission will from now on automatically serve in this designated capacity on The Foundation with which we are closely affiliated.

The Commission applied in November for a \$250 gift available to any commissions in New Hampshire from The Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trust administered through The Association of New Hampshire Conservation Commissions. This money was granted us on condition that it be used specifically towards the cost of printing The Tamworth Conservation Plan.

Two Commission members continued to lead the weekly nature walks for the children in The Summer Enrichment Program.

Last but not least, many, many hours have been spent by Commission members — both in their own homes and at most of the monthly meetings — writing and re-

writing The Conservation Plan for Tamworth. This Plan contains The Commission's recommendations to The Town for the use of its natural resources. It has gone through four drafts as this report is being written. Hopefully it will be printed, by the printer who gave us the lowest estimate, by late summer of 1972.

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

During 1971 your library has shown an increase in use with 3899 books borrowed by 2652 adults and children. THE TAMWORTH FOUNDATION

July 1971

To the Tamworth Public:

It would have been preferable that this thirty-fourth annual report and appeal had come later or that work on the new Selectmen's Office had started sooner. Timing in life can be inconvenient. Yet in the long history of Tamworth a few months one way or the other may be secondary. The important thing is that any large change be widely discussed and approved, as to our best knowledge will be the case with this change. As was said here a year ago and as has been discussed at two Town Meetings, the plan is to move the Selectmen's Office from the present small room in the Town House to the so-called Willow Inn, the building opposite Remicks' Store, which Mrs. Harry F. Damon generously gave the Town for the purpose. Though repair and changes will be expensive, a new building of like cost would certainly be smaller and probably less attractive; location, size, and historicity speak for the present building. In the long run size could prove the main advantage; there will be space not only for people to do business with Town officers in reasonable privacy and for the officers to do their own work but space also for small meetings and - considering the fact that such a now essential effort as public nursing is, historically speaking, quite recent - space for the growth of that and similar work. A dry and adequate vault for our unbroken series of Town documents (back, among others, to Col. David Gilman to whom on parting Washington gave one of his own swords in token of regard - History of Carroll County p. 765) will be the only exterior addition; roof, underpinning, and main interior changes will be a start, with later changes to come as they are needed. Specifications are now being drawn as basis for contracts, and by a year hence the move should have been made. We have saved

for this effort and, as with the Wilson wing at the school, shall expect to make up in following years the excess of cost over yearly income. The prospect extends into the farther future because, once the Selectmen's Office leaves the Town House, it may be thought desirable to move that ancient building - historically the chief building in town, built in 1793 (M. G. Harkness, *The Tamworth Narrative* pp. 87-91) south of the road beyond Ordination Rock and the graveyard and moved to the village in 1852 - to some opener site. The beautiful town that we have been lucky enough to know may seem even more extraordinary in the era ahead, and it behooves us to keep thought of the future.

Meanwhile the present presses, and much of the Foundation's support was for current needs. A main contribution of \$3,000 went to the admirable work of the pre-school under Mrs. Stanley Coville and Mrs. Parker Whipple. It is a paradox of this age of communication that children no longer tend to begin life in the kind of big and busy households that existed in the age of farming but in relative isolation; little in their experience prepares some, perhaps most, for the society of school. The pre-school was extended last year for some children to a second year; in a few cases what could have caused later trouble was found early; all or nearly all first-graders now emerge from the pre-school to a happier and more effective start. \$100 each went to the school library and for baseball equipment, and \$400 toward renovation of the ballfield worn with use by both the ordinary league and the little league, which use different sized diamonds. \$200 went to the Tamworth Library; for reasons that are expected not to recur, unusually large contributions of \$450 and \$350 were needed for the skiing and swimming programs. A greatly appreciated anonymous gift of \$1000 (not the first act of generosity from this source) equipped the local police with a second two-way radio, an important addition. By its own gift of \$600 the Foundation provided a new moving-picture projector for use in the school and

for films brought by the Arts Council (a new screen and curtains to darken the school auditorium were given a year ago). \$650 went to the Chocorua Lake Association for surveying newly given land at the inlet which will help comprise the Frank Bolles Nature Conservancy, part of the Association's strenuous effort to protect the lake. \$250 helped two Tamworth young people attend the touchingly humanitarian camp for retarded children in North Conway.

Such current needs show no sign of diminishing - they will more likely increase - and considering the limited means of the Foundation, conflict arises between the present as represented by these needs and the future as represented by plans for the new Selectman's Office and perhaps later for moving the Town House. How simultaneously heed both present and future? The question at least helps define the Foundation's unique function in Tamworth. Other organizations look to specific causes; through the beneficence of Miss Wilson's and Mrs. Whittemore's large bequests (for the latter of which the Foundation is trustee on behalf of the Chocorua Library and the Community Nurse Association) and through smaller, though important, gifts over the years, the Foundation can now do what would have been unthinkable thirty-four years ago. The township is big; needs are many; tax-revenue is heavily committed; in a changing age the Foundation must somehow serve as best it can both current needs and the longer good of this exceptional place. The foresight of the founders helps assure continuity. Had the Foundation not existed, how would Miss Wilson, Mrs. Whittemore, and others have conceived their acts of continuing benefit? Please be faithful to it; yearly contributions make up about a fifth of its means; they are at the heart of continuity. Please also attend the Annual Meeting, which is open to all and of which further notice will appear in local papers, at Runnells Hall on Friday, August 27th., at 4 P. M. Gifts large and small, which are deductible on Federal Income

Tax returns, will be gratefully received by Charles T. Gallagher, Treasurer, in Tamworth, (03886).

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL HEALTH OFFICER

During the 1971 season, 47 septic sewage disposal systems were installed in the Town of Tamworth. Ten of these systems involved repair to existing systems, and the other 37 were new. Of these new systems, 14 (or 38%) required State Permits since they were located within 1000 feet of state waters. The remaining 23 systems were designed by the writer using State and Federal design criteria, and were granted town permits under the ordinance of 1964.

Toward the end of the 1971 field season, State Law RSA 149E was revised by the Legislature, and the use of the 1000 foot distance from state waters as a boundary outside of which state septic permits were not required, was eliminated. The effect of this change is that in the future all new septic systems will require States Permits regardless of location vis-a-vis state waters.

This change will increase the work load of your Special Health Officer far beyond the limits of experience in previous years. The work involved is of a highly specialized nature and (by mutual arrangement) is reimbursed by the Town on the basis of a token annual fee which covers little more than the travelling expenses involved.

To cope with the expanded requirements of the State Water Supply and Pollution Control Commission, and at the same time to continue serving the sewage disposal requirements of the town, commences to pose serious practical and financial problems. It is therefore hoped that the time required by the Special Health officer for preparing permit applications can be reduced by asking applicants to prepare a part of the basic supporting data themselves. This, hopefully, would have the effect of balancing the Special Health Officer's time input with the previously accepted annual fee.

TAMWORTH SUMMER ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

The Tamworth Summer Enrichment Program completed a fourth and very successful summer in 1971.

The program's main objective is to provide supervised interesting and enriching activities for children between the ages of 6-15 years on a three-day-a-week, seven week basis during the summer months of July and August.

The program is not set up to take the place of a home or school oriented environment or to provide baby-sitting service.

Thru the choice of a wide range of activities, the TAMWORTH SUMMER ENRICHMENT PROGRAM offers "something for everyone."

For the sports enthusiast there is baseball, basketball, football (several varieties), tetherball, bicycling, croquet, ping pong, tennis, mountain climbing, as well as track and field days. The TSEP is also co-ordinated with the Tamworth Red Cross Water Safety program at White Lake.

For the creative child there is drama, art (formal and informal), crafts, puppetry, music, and designing and building (everything from stage sets to whacky models).

For those that are of a more scientific nature, an environmental nature walk is scheduled weekly as well as a week's attendance at a lecture series given by the Squam Lakes Science Center in Holderness, (the attendance at these lectures has tripled since it was first offered in 1970. The average daily attendance this past summer was 15-20 children going to Holderness each day.)

For the musers and thinkers a chess tournament was set up. Chess sets sprung up like mushrooms and were to be found everywhere-between innings at baseball games, under almost every pine tree during lunchtime, and they even went along on our swimming party and picnic at Lower Falls on the Kancamagus.

There were many field trips in addition to our regular days of Monday, Wednesday, and Friday at the school grounds.

All these “great” things didn’t just happen. They were made possible by an energetic, creative, and competent group consisting of staff, volunteers, and private financial contributors who saw value in the program and worked for it.

As always, we are indebted and grateful to the school for the use of a portion of the building and the grounds, and especially to the Town for its financial assistance — for without it the caliber of our program would suffer immeasurably. But in order to maintain the quality of our program, it is necessary this year to ask more financial support of the town. For in spite of increased private donations, we have for the past two years been running in a deficit trying to keep pace with rising costs and more state and federal regulations; i. e. state unemployment tax, insurance, etc.

We hope the town will agree with the committee and continue this worthwhile program.

For the past two years the teens of this town have been working in an attempt to achieve their goal. This goal being the acquisition of land or building or both, to be used for a meeting house and an all around building for them. This past year has been a special one though, as our dream has finally become a reality.

With the generous loan of a parcel of land at the foot of Page Hill by Mr. Lincoln Robinson of Kansas and Tamworth, and also a building donated to us by Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Hoch of Chocorua, we got off to a great start.

Contributions have come in in many ways, shapes, and sizes. Mr. Richard Alt of Tamworth has donated a heating system which will be installed when the foundation is set and the building has been moved, but we will need men and equipment to move the building from its present site to the Page Hill location. The Summer Enrichment Advisory Committee has aided us also with advice and house/land hunting.

We would like to give special thanks to Mr. Percy Olton for all his time and effort in recruiting funds, taking care of our finances, and helping us in his many ways.

A private grant, The Spaulding-Potter Charitable Trusts, had agreed to match us \$1.00 for every \$2.00 raised or promised, with a deadline of December 31, 1971; their maximum contribution being \$1500.00. Thanks to private donations, the Tamworth Foundation, and our own efforts, we will be able to receive that maximum amount from the Spaulding Charitable Trusts.

Some of the work done by the teens during the past two years is listed below.

(1) During the summer of 1970 we had two car washes in Mr. Robert Olkkola's driveway. We had the use of a tanker loaned to us by the town fire station.

(2) Things got rolling this past summer thanks to Wayne Mock and many others who set us on our way. We scheduled meetings and decided to have a door-to-door collection. As a result we received \$96.65.

(3) Another project was the cleaning up of the village and areas outside of the village such as Ordination Rock and Tamworth School. Both as a community project as well as advertising. We set up trash barrels at either end of the bridge to help keep our town clean.

In the spring we will be planning to set the foundation and move the building. We thought the townspeople would be interested in our progress.
