## TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Temple in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Temple, on Tuesday, the 13th day of March next, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$397.05 to cover the deficit for the past year.
- 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for same.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for maintenance of highways and bridges.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for snow removal.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of town poor.
- 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for support of Library.
- 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 9. To see what action the town will take regarding the purchase of additional snow fence.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to accept one \$50.00 Government Bond for the perpetual care of the Lizzie Wheeler cemetery lot.

- 11. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 to be held in trust for the perpetual care of the Emily Holt cemetery lot.
- 12. To see what action the town will take regarding the purchase of a new tractor.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the portion of Old Brown road (so-called) leading from camp of Temple Mountain Club over Kidder Mountain to old Todd Road (so-called).
- 14. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the old road leading from a point north of the home of John Edwards by George Stone's and S. H. Taintor's to bridge at foot of Blood's hill and make provision for repair of lanes leading to homes of S. H. Taintor and George Stone.
- 15. To see what action the town will take in regard to the construction of a dining hall and kitchen in the town hall.
- 16. To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under this act. (Laws 1933, Chap. 99.)
- 17. To see if the town will vote to put entrance signs at Peterborough, Wilton and New Ipswich town lines and appropriate money for same.
- 18. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes not to exceed the sum of \$10,000.00.
- 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

# Report of Superintendent

For the School Board and Citizens of Temple:

I respectfully submit herewith my eleventh annual report.

#### SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

Fortunately we have been able to retain our two teachers, Mrs. Tuttle and Miss Rideout, to continue their very satisfactory service this year.

The statistical tables at the end of this report are for the comlete school year 1932-1933 and for the Fall Term 1933. As compared with previous years the enrollment is somewhat larger, especially in the grammar room where the desks had to be rearranged and several new ones added to make all comfortable. The attendance last year was higher than the previous year but still a bit below the state average. Tardiness last year was exceptionally high, being approximately three times as great as the state average. This was due in part to the difficulties of transportation. Up to the Christmas vacation this year the tardiness was not excessive.

#### Supervision

In several of my earlier reports I have given in some detail statements of certain phases of my supervisory activities and I have spoken particularly of the use of standardized tests to measure the progress of the children in various subjects. The reading tests described in last year's report have been continued and the children have shown even better results than were reported at that time.

The Stanford Achievement Tests have been used for a period of five years, every child in grades three to eight taking this battery of tests at least once each year, generally in October, and those children who do not appear to have made satisfactory progress in the Spring have been examined a second time.

The scores of these tests are stated in terms of letters A, B, C, D, and E and we expect in the long run to find approximately seven per cent of the children getting A; 24 per cent B; 38 per cent C; 24 per cent D; and seven per cent E. Last October the scores of the forty-three children taking the test in Temple showed four per cent getting A; 33 per cent B; 33 per cent C; 23 per cent D; and seven per cent E. This indicates that the advancement of the Temple children, so far as is measured by these tests, is slightly

better than average but it should be noted that this marks a considerable advance over the condition prevailing at the beginning of the previous year.

#### MEDICAL INSPECTION

The medical inspection was carried out last September by the school nurse, Mrs. Cutter, and school physician, Dr. Pease. They have reported as follows:

#### HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

Perhaps a statement regarding the legal provisions for high school tuition will be of interest. The state law, as amended from time to time by the legislature up to and including the session of 1933, provides that a school district having no high school of its own shall pay the tuition of any child who resides in the district with parents or guardian (or has resided in the district without parent or guardian and attended the district schools for two years or more) at any New Hampshire approved High School or Academy. The District is not liable, however, except under contract, for a rate of tuition higher than the average cost of high school instruction in the state the preceding year. A school district may authorize its School Board, with the approval of the State Board of Education, to make a contract for a higher rate of tuition with any high school or academy in New Hampshire.

No contract is necessary with Appleton Academy since their tuition rate is now determined by the state average cost of instruction. No contract has hitherto been necessary with Wilton or Peterborough because the state average cost did not drop below the Peterborough tuition rate until last year and did not drop be-

low the Wilton tuition rate until this year. There was one Temple pupil attending Peterborough High School last year and a small balance is due Peterborough for her tuition. The payment of this may be authorized by action of the district under a special article in the School Warrant. The state average cost of instruction last year was \$78.26 but the rate of tuition charged at Wilton is \$80. This may be taken care of by a contract which the district is asked to authorize also under a special article.

#### TRENDS IN EDUCATION

The effect of the depression upon the schools has been less severe in New England than in any other part of the country. The primary reason for this is doubtless the fact that the depression itself has been less severe here. However, it may be that New England people are more determined to provide adequate education, whatever the cost may be, within reason.

General education of all the people is intimately related to their individual success and happiness and to the prosperity and security of the country. We can accumulate wealth and pass it on from one generation to the next, and to some extent this is true of physical health and mental ability, but we can not bequeath an education to our children. The most we can do is to provide them with the means for an education. Of necessity some economies must be made, but the schools ought to be the last to feel the real pinch of economy and the first to benefit by a returning wave of prosperity.

There is a deeper significance in the present situation than the mere reduction of costs, essential as that may seem to us now. Society is undergoing some fundamental changes and these must be reflected in education if the coming generations are to receive the proper training for future social conditions. The happiness and prosperity of our successors in their time will depend upon their education and training, not only for their personal living and occupational pursuits, but in their choice of leadership and their cooperation with others in sustaining intelligent and beneficent government.

Amongst all the facts and knowledge that we must pass on to our successors none is more important than the fact of change. In the field of human affairs, as distinguishing from fixed physical facts, nothing is changeless and the speed with which changes take place is ever increasing.

Only a few generations back our forefathers could pass on to their successors great bodies of knowledge with the assurance that most of it would remain as solid fact, but today we are confronted with the certainty that much of what we teach our children will be changed when they have grown to maturity. Our successors must not only know this fact, but they need to be so trained in habits of thought as to be able to adapt themselves to change and to do their part in cooperation with others in the control of the effects of change.

Necessarily this argument applies more to the field of what we call secondary education than it does to elementary education, for it is at the high school age that youth becomes susceptible to training in methods of thought and study, and it is at this time rather than later in life that habits of reasoning can best be developed in place of prejudice. From this point of view many are now saying that our high school programs of study are ill adapted to the needs of our young people. Much study is being given to this by leading educators and laymen, and it appears that we shall shortly be making changes in the direction of substitution of more material in the social science fields for some of the subjects now given greater emphasis.

In closing, I am again happy to express appreciation for the support and interest in all of my endeavors to be of service in my capacity as Superintendent of Schools.
