Board of Selectmen

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Warner in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Warner on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow money in the anticipation of taxes on the note, or notes of the Town, payable on or before December 31, 1965.

4. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property taken for taxes.

5. To hear reports of the Officers of the Town heretofore chosen and Committees appointed and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to accept from L. Earl Nichols the gift of a fifteen (15) acre (more or less) tract of land for the establishment of a cemetery and raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.) towards the initial improvement of said tract of land as a cemetery in accordance with the terms of the gift.

7. To see if the Town will vote to change the purpose of the capital reserve fund known as the Mill Street Culvert capital reserve fund from construction of such culvert to improvement of the cemetery identified in item six (6) of this warrant and to authorize the Board of Selectmen and Town Treasurer to expend all moneys accumulated in said capital reserve fund for such purpose.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000.) in addition to

the regular appropriation for the Pillsbury Free Library to make possible needed repairs.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Chandler Reservation Committee to grant permission for the use of a portion of the town owned land known as the Chandler Reservation for the relocation of the ski slope necessitated by the construction of Interstate Route 89 and to grant permission for the operation of said ski slope.

10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to dispose of the Bagley bridge as they see fit.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.) for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association for the purpose of promoting and publicizing the natural advantages of the Town together with other towns of the region.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Twenty Dollars (\$320.) towards payment of the Concord Hospital deficit.

13. To see if the Town will vote to change the hour at which the business portion of the annual Town Meeting is commenced from the presently appointed hour of two of the clock in the afternoon to the hour of eight of the clock in the afternoon commencing at the 1966 annual Town Meeting and in all ensuing years except as the Town may subsequently vote otherwise.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

At meetings and drills, Instructions and practice was given in use of suppression of fire and rescue work.

Several firemen spent about 50 hours in purchase and preparation and testing new fire truck.

About 1,000 man hours, without pay, was given by the Firemen for their interest and protection of the Town of Warner.

In September, the Department took delivery of a new 750 G.P.M. pumper, equipped with a 700 gal. booster tank, auxiliary lighting plant and the usual Fire Dept. equipment. This new piece of equipment was thoroughly tested and approved by the N. H. Board of Fire Underwriters before being accepted by the Dept.

The Fire Dept. spent about \$1,200. of their own finances to purchase new equipment for the new fire truck. Every fireman is now equipped with a coat, helmet and boots.

The cooperation, both working with and for the Police Dept. is excellent.

Mutual aid with the towns of Webster, Hopkinton, Bradford, Sutton and Henniker is friendly and cooperation is excellent.

I would like to say that the morale in the Fire Dept. is very high.

The Fire Dept. is very grateful of the assistance given by the Fire Commissioners, Town Selectmen and the people of Warner.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND YOUR DISTRICT CHIEF

The 1964 forest fire season surpassed the record year of 1963 in both length and severity. For the second successive year, we experienced a rainfall deficiency of more than ten inches and the compounding of such drought conditions, together with the many days of strong, dry winds, characterized 1964 as one of the most hazardous years in the past half century. Although our fire season was three weeks longer than that of 1963, the number of fires showed only a slight increase and more remarkable was the fact that the area burned dropped from 2280 acres in 1963 to 900 acres in 1964. Early detection and rapid response kept many potential fire disasters from becoming reality. We all owe a debt of gratitude to the men in this community who responded and fought our fires so efficiently. Our state is now 86% wooded and its economy — both industrial and recreational — is greatly dependent on this forest resource. The responsibility for adequate fire protection of this great area — 4,350,000 acres — is everyone's responsibility and prevention is one of our most effective tools.

Prevention is good common sense.

1. Take your rubbish to the town dump. If you must burn, obtain a permit and watch your fire until it is dead out.
2. Instruct your children in fire safety. Keep matches from young children. Explain to them the dangers of lighting matches and making outdoor fires.
3. Be sure discarded smoking material and matches are out.

A major portion of our preventable fires this year are chargeable to three causes: (1) permit fires allowed to escape; (2) children playing with matches; and (3) smokers. Let's be mindful of the fact that all such fires endanger property and lives.

We wish to thank you for your fine cooperation during the past fire season and with your continued cooperation we are confident that we can improve our fire record in 1965.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

In view of the events of the past few months, your Police Department feels it advisable to give a report to the residents of Warner, informing them of the activities of their town police force.

During 1964 nearly 300 telephone calls were received by the department, for such cases as follows: lights on in buildings, owners absent; petty larceny; grand larceny; assault; vandalism; prowlers; domestic disturbances; missing or lost persons; livestock on highways; suspicious cars or persons; automobile accidents; fires; requests for emergency assistance; security checks; transportation of valuables; calls regarding dog cases; death or other emergency messages delivered; and other emergency runs. 181 inspection slips were issued with many more inspections made of vacant buildings, no slip issued.

In addition to these usual complaints — we were faced with a very serious problem of breaking and entering cases. For several months reports had been turned in, mostly by our summer residents, that their property had been entered and valuables stolen. Together with the State Police, about two hundred hours of patrols were run (mostly at no cost to the town.) On December 24th, an alert resident phoned advising me that a suspicious car was seen leaving an area where several breaks had occurred. This prompt report enabled us to immediately put out an alarm and the car was apprehended. On being questioned, the occupants admitted the breaks. This cleared from the records in all 38 breaks (18 in Warner) with 44 entries. Working as a team, Detective Sgt. Smith, Trooper Stover and your Chief of Police spent from 14 to 16 hours a day for eight days, recovering several loads of stolen property. More might have been recovered if the reports turned in had been complete in describing the stolen property, giving serial numbers, etc. for each item listed. The first seven days a total of

1,184 miles were covered in this one investigation, locating and picking up the stolen property.

During the year two two-way radios were purchased with funds from the Fall Foliage Festival and these have given us invaluable means of communication with the State Police and other departments in cases of emergency. We wish to extend our thanks to the Fall Foliage Festival for these funds.

Your police officers attended a series of training classes held during the year in order to give you a better trained Police Department. Other classes are planned for 1965.

We appreciate the cooperation of the Board of Selectmen, the Fire Department, and all of the citizens in reporting any unusual circumstances that might need investigation. To all, my personal thanks.

Then ensued a tremendous snarl of red tape, in which the State of New Hampshire was denied Federal aid pending the hiring of what was deemed the proper supervisory personnel. The contract was rejected in August and again in late November.

Only after the Warner Board appealed to Governor King did the Council take the necessary steps, and on February 9, 1965 we were informed that the contract had been approved and that progress would be made in the near future.

Thank you for your patience. We hope that it will be rewarded by a sound set of zoning and building ordinances that will insure the progress and continued beauty of Warner.

The big topic of discussion in Warner will be "Should or shouldn't we join the Cooperative?" The results will probably be known before the town report is in your hands, so it will do no good for me to discuss the problem in any detail. I will say that if it is voted it will mean a considerable improvement in the education offered the young people of Warner.

Too much credit cannot be given the whole Cooperative Planning Committee. The Warner members: Miss Mary Martin, Emil Allen Jr. and Donald Pierce have spent hours and hours of their time in conscientious research and meetings. Let us hope that this work does not go unrewarded. They have been excellent representatives of Warner School District and The Kearsarge Cooperative School Planning Board.

Warner's elementary school population continues to grow while the high school enrollment remains about the same. The critical change which we face in the high school is the fact that our number of tuition pupils shows a decrease. We used to have about sixty percent tuition pupils and now our resident pupils number over sixty percent. This trend is reflected in the amount of tuition receipts for this coming year.

Warner has made great effort to run a good school program, but with increasing costs, it becomes increasingly difficult to operate small high schools. All over the state communities have been forced to close their small schools and either send their children to another school district for their high school and junior high education or to join with other towns in a Cooperative school effort.

We have had only two changes in our teaching staff this year. Mrs. Elaine Southard is the new first grade teacher and Mrs. Judith Wachsmuth is the new Home-Making teacher at the high school. The school board has made plans in their budget to add a second grade teacher to the elementary school. Our big problem at the moment is where to put the new second grade class.

Perhaps some of you know that there is great pressure on the Legislature to pass a teachers Salary Schedule with a minimum salary of \$5000; Massachusetts already has such a law. This bill may or may not pass this session of the Legislature, but I feel it is only a matter of time. In the meantime some school districts are using \$5000 as a minimum figure; some are planning to reach it in one or two years. Unless conditions change radically this figure will not be uncommon in New Hampshire. This puts the squeeze on the real estate owner. You will note that the Sweepstakes money has given us some relief, but much more is needed.

These are changing times in Education and we must be ready to accept those changes for the best interests of our children.

9. To see if the district will authorize the school board to make application for and to receive in the name of the district such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the U.S. Government and/or State Agencies.
10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to negotiate with the State Highway Department on the

relocation of the Ski Tow, Building, and Lighting facilities to a new site in Warner; the Highway Department to move the above equipment, and make the new site suitable for a ski area; the work to be done in lieu of cash payment for that portion of land given the district by John P. H. Chandler which is to be taken by the State for Highway 89 extension.

11. To see if the district will vote to use the excess Sweepstakes money to help pay for the deficit in the 1964-1965 budget.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
