**1949 TOWN WARRANT**

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Article 1. To choose by ballot and major vote, one Selectman for three years, Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes and two Auditors for ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose all other necessary town officers.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as are necessary for the support of the town poor and other town charges.

Article 4. To see what sums of money the town will raise for Maintenance of Town Roads and Bridges.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise \$862.59 and the State's share to be \$3,450.35 for T. R. A.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise \$75.00 for the Lakes Region.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for the V.F.W. for Memorial Day.

Article 8. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow \$5,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400.00 for pine blister rust.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to close the Poor Farm Road from the five corners to Kenneth Lowry's.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to make some arrangements for a town dump or dumps and to raise money for the same.

Article 12. (a) To see if the Town will vote to authorize the use of the town hall by the clubs and organizations of Barrington.

(b) To see if the town will vote to authorize structural changes and improvements to the Town Hall building, such alterations and improvements to be financed and paid for by the aforesaid clubs and associations and by such other funds as may already be on hand and available for such purpose, and all such structural changes and improvements to be first approved by the selectmen of the Town of Barrington;

(c) To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to enter into and execute, on behalf of the Town of Barrington, such contracts or other legal documents as may be required to guarantee to the said clubs and organizations, in consideration of the improvements to be financed in whole or in part by them, the free use of and access to said Town Hall and all additions thereto at all reasonable and convenient times and for as long a period of time as said organizations or any of them may desire to use said Town Hall, and on such other conditions as the selectmen and said organizations may agree to.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before this town meeting.

## REPORT OF FIRE DEPARTMENT AND FIRE WARDEN

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Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equaling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF BARRINGTON:

This is fewer pupils than last year at this time, by about 6%. However, the general trend of school population is upward, as seen by the school census, which this year for the first time included children from birth to five years of age. High school tuition pupils include 30 in Dover and 19 in Rochester.

The report of the School Nurse, Miss Myrtle Fletcher, shows vision, teeth, and tonsils as the physical conditions most frequently needing correction. Measles was the most frequent communicable disease. Malnutrition was the defect most completely corrected, due doubtless to the splendid lunch program run by the Parent-Teacher Association with the help of federal aid, government surplus commodities, district appropriation, state direction, the faithful service of the regular cook, and the willing help of parents, teachers and pupils. Lunch has been served this year in the auditorium. Barrington joined with other districts in Supervisory Union No. 44 in the purchase of a Pure-Tone Audiometer and Massachusetts Vision Test. A pre-school clinic was held in June, with the services of Dr.

Thompson of Gonic. Six children were taken to doctors out of town by the nurse.

Two "workshops" or in-service training courses have been held at Barrington School for all teachers in the supervisory union, one in fine arts for two days last March under the direction of Dr. Mildred M. Landis and one in health and physical education for five days in September, under the direction of Dr. Lura O. Bruce and Miss Grace L. Felker. These leaders were from the supervisory staff of the state office. The P.T.A. kindly arranged for meals. Barrington School is centrally located in the union, and has ideal facilities for such meetings. One evening of each series was devoted to a public program for the townspeople and visitors. The time of the teachers was well spent, as shown by the stimulation of pupil activities in these directions. Principal McAllister has been conducting organized physical education for the older boys and girls, using the Town Hall, with a limited amount of interscholastic games, as appropriate for this age.

Forward steps contemplated for action in the state legislature this year include:

1. A new and improved teachers' retirement law, to enable teachers to live decently in their later years.
2. State aid continued at the present level, with adjustment for the increased enrollments and cost of living.
3. Special state aid for high school transportation.
4. Providing for a master-plan of larger administrative units or cooperative districts.
5. State aid for new school buildings.

On the national level, it is likely that Congress will pass a bill for federal aid to education, definitely free from federal control, to be administered by the states for their public schools. It is in the national interest that the pres-

ent situation should be relieved, wherein many of the states have so many children and so little wealth per capita that even by taxing themselves to an unusually high degree they can only support schools at an unusually low level. While industrial plants have expanded in the last 10 years by 13 billions of dollars, school building has been practically at a standstill. Federal aid for school buildings is sorely needed.

The supply of elementary teachers in teacher-training schools is very inadequate in the elementary field, and also some secondary fields. Barrington should each year graduate from one to three young people who are strongly inclined to fit themselves for elementary teaching, or teaching in the most needy high school fields. Parents and teachers should encourage in this direction any young people who seem to have the facility for dealing with people rather than things.

Some new furniture for pupils' seating has been purchased this year, of the movable steel and wood type. Centennial Grange gave \$50 toward this project, adding to their list of several such benefactions to the school.
