

SCHOOL REPORT.

In closing my work as member of the School Board, I would express my appreciation of the kind and courteous treatment which I have received from parents, teachers and pupils; the teachers especially deserve a word of commendation for the heartiness with which they have taken up whatever has been suggested for the benefit of the schools.

During the past three years we have had written examinations in all schools with uniform rules for the same. These have proved of great value but have made extra work for pupils, teachers and members of the School Board, but this has been cheerfully done. This work should be continued, not only for the present benefit derived, but as a preparation for what pupils meet every few weeks in the higher schools.

By careful management and the aid of the state fund we have been able to have twenty-seven weeks of school, an unprecedented number we believe. In several districts schools have been discontinued and pupils conveyed to others. School work will be resumed in these districts whenever it seems best. It is a mistaken idea with some, that a small school where each pupil can receive a large share of the teacher's time is best. It is not special attention that the average pupil needs so much as something to stimulate to work themselves, and this stimulus is found in the large school rather than in the small, where there is and can be but little competition, therefore it has been our policy to unite wherever practicable.

State aid has been or will be received to the amount of \$185.43, which will materially lengthen the schools of another year. Teachers in surrounding towns are receiving

higher wages than heretofore. We shall have to come into line or put up with inferior teachers, which will be a serious mistake.

Owing to the new law, whereby the tuition of pupils in High schools or academies corresponding, must be paid by the town, aided by the state in proportion to the tax rate, the amount of money paid by Campton for education will be considerably more than usual, but we earnestly hope this will not lead to cutting down the amount usually raised, but rather let us work to have the defects in the law remedied, as we believe they will be at the next session of the legislature. Pupils going from our schools in the past have done credit to our town; let us endeavor to keep up and raise the standard higher in the years to come, taking this for our motto, "Knowledge is power."
