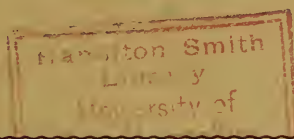

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Chesterfield in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To vote by Australian ballot for all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To see what action the town wishes to take in regard to assessors.

Article 3. To determine the method of collecting taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

Article 5. To hear the report of the budget committee and act thereon.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,605.00 for town officers' salaries, or act thereon.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$930.00 for town officers' expenses, or act thereon.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$600.00 for election and registration expenses, or act thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for Town Hall expenses, or act thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for forest fire expenses, or act thereon.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the police department, or act thereon.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to insure its firemen under the Firemen's Retirement Act, the cost to be paid out of the general expenses of the Fire Department.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$720.00 for the support of the fire departments, or act thereon.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the support of the board of health, or act thereon.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,200.00 for the repair and upkeep of highway equipment, to be spent under the supervision of the selectmen.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$6,000.00 for town road maintenance, reserving \$1,000.00 of the same for calcium treatment, or act thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for street lighting and authorize the selectmen to contract for the extension of lines and change of street lights in place of the expiring contract, affecting the lights from West Chesterfield to the new bridge.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for snow removal, or act thereon.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for timber salvage, or act thereon.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 to be used in cooperation with the state forestry department for the control of white pine blister rust.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to be used with an equal sum from T. R. A. for relocating and constructing the lower end of the Winslow-Welcome road.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the town library system, or act thereon.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the town poor, or act thereon.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for old age assistance, or act thereon.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1.00 or more for aid to dependent soldiers and their families, or act thereon.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$10.00 for Memorial Day exercises, or act thereon.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to hold Old Home Day and raise the sum of \$125.00 for the same, or act thereon.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds, or act thereon.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the cemeteries, or act thereon.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to elect one sexton to care for all town owned cemeteries to take effect March meeting 1942.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to accept the gift of the land surrounding the Joab Wetherbee burial lot and described in the deed from Morris Friedsam to the town of Chesterfield.



Article 32. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the town beach, or act thereon.

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for interest of temporary loans, or act thereon.

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$400.00 for the purchase of new fire hose, or act thereon.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 for legal expenses, or act thereon.

Article 36. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the towns share in participating in the Monadnock Region, or act thereon.

Article 37. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid or Town Road Aid (T. R. A.) for the ensuing year and raise the sum of \$2,098.00 for State Aid or \$751.95 for T. R. A., or act thereon.

Article 38. To see if the town will vote to petition the state tax commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 39. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell property acquired by tax collectors' deeds.

Article 40. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 under the will of Frances L. Goreham, the income only to be used for the care and upkeep of the Alamsom Norcross burial lot in Chesterfield cemetery.

Article 41. To see if the town will vote to accept the will of Frank C. Hamilton and to be known as the Frank C. Hamilton Trust Fund—

A. The sum of \$500.00 the income only to be used for the care and upkeep of and the purchase of flowers on each Memorial Day for the Frank C. Hamilton burial lot in Spofford cemetery.

B. The sum of \$500.00 the income only to be used by the library trustees for the purchase of new books.

C. The sum of \$1,000.00 the income only to be distributed annually by the selectmen to the poor and worthy children in said Chesterfield and at the discretion of said selectmen.

D. The residue of the estate amounting to \$4,234.75 the income only to be used by the selectmen each year at Christmas time for old and indigent persons of Chesterfield, each to receive from said income the sum of \$10.00.

Article 42. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## TOWN MEETING, MARCH, 1940

---

Proceedings of the annual meeting of the voters of the town of Chesterfield called at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, March 12, 1940.

The meeting was called to order at 9.25 a. m., by the Moderator Arthur H. Post and the Warrant through Article 1 read by the Clerk. The Moderator then declared that balloting was in order for all town officers by Australian Ballot and also for

Delegates to the Republican and Democrat National Conventions.

At 10.10 o'clock a. m. the Moderator called the meeting to order for business and the remainder of the Warrant was read by the Clerk.

The Articles of the Warrant were then disposed of as follows:

Article 2. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Moses H. Chickering that the Selectmen act as Assessors as in past years. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 3. Voted by voice vote on motion made by John Mansley that for the ensuing year the same method of collecting taxes be used and the same discounts allowed as in 1939. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 4. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Daniel Schlichting that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 5. The Moderator called for the Clerk of the Budget Committee, Clifford W. Tuttle, to read its report. Clifford W. Tuttle not appearing the Moderator announced that the Budget was posted on the Bulletin Board if anyone wished to read it.

Article 6. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Daniel Schlichting to raise the sum of \$1,605.11 for town officers' salaries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 7. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert Berry to raise the sum of \$800.00 for town officers' expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 8. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert Berry to raise the sum of \$700.00 for election and registration expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 9. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter J. Post to raise the sum of \$200.00 for Town Hall expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 10. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$500.00 for forest fire expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 11. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the police department. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 12. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to raise the sum of \$600.00 for the support of the fire departments. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 13. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to raise the sum of \$350.00 for the support of the board of health. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 14. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Susie Morris to raise the sum of \$25.00 for general highway expense. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 15. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter J. Post to raise the sum of \$6,000.00 for town road maintenance but that we do not reserve \$1,000.00 for calcium treatment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and to be lost.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter J. Post to raise the sum of \$6,000.00 for town road maintenance, reserving \$1,000.00 of the same for calcium treatment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 16. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd M. Fuller to raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for street lighting. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 17. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter J. Post to raise the sum of \$2,200.00 for snow removal. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 18. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul M. Penning to raise the sum of \$100.00 for timber salvage. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 19. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul M. Penning to raise the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the town library system. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 20. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter J. Post to raise the sum of \$1,500.00 for the support of the town poor. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 21. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul M. Penning to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 for old age assistance. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 22. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter J. Post to raise the sum of \$10.00 for Memorial Day exercises. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 23. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Daniel Schlichting to hold Old Home Day and raise the sum of \$125.00 for the same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried by the affirmative.

Article 24. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Susie Morris to raise the sum of \$50.00 for parks and playgrounds. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 25. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester Burnham to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the cemeteries. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 26. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul M. Penning to raise the sum of \$150.00 for the support of the town beach. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 27. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Daniel Schlichting to raise the sum of \$100.00 for interest of temporary loans. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 28. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Paul M. Penning to raise the sum of \$200.00 for legal expenses. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 29. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Moses H. Chickering to accept Town Road Aid (T. R. A.) for the ensuing year and raise the sum of \$745.91 for same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 30. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Charles Furlone to pass over article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and to be lost.

Voted to ballot on the article, the Moderator declaring that to vote "yes" would mean to raise the sum of \$800.00 for the support of a District Nurse Association for the ensuing year, and to authorize the establishment of a District Nurse Association; to vote "no" would mean that we do not raise said sum or form said association. A count of ballots cast resulted as follows:

Yes had,	66
No had,	74

The Moderator declared that "no" had it and that we would not raise the sum of \$800.00 for the support of a District Nurse Association.

Article 31. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Henry C. Chickering to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 32. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Daniel Schlichting to accept the deed to the Atherton property, bordering on the Spofford school property, and turn the same over to the School District. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 33. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Albert D. Berry to raise the sum of \$500.00 for a town office. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 34. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to raise the sum of \$200.00 for town business equipment. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 35. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd M. Fuller to raise the sum of \$200.00 for chairs for the town hall. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 36. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham that the disposal of this article be left in the hands of the highway department and that the money if in their opinion any is needed be taken from the Highway Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.



Article 37. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Daniel Schlichting to raise the sum of \$140.00 as the town's share in participating in the Monadnock Region. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 38. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Moses H. Chickering to pass over article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 39. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Chester M. Burnham to insure the Firemen under the (Firemen's Retirement Act) and raise the sum of \$120.00 for the same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 40. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Clarence K. Lewis to pass over the article. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the negative and to be lost.

Voted by voice vote on motion made by Walter J. Post to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 for the purpose of straightening and widening the road leading from John Bellevue's to Fritz Richter's and authorize the Selectmen to lay out the same. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 41. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Floyd M. Fuller to accept the sum of \$200.00 from Annie M. Brown, the income from the same to be paid to the C. W. C. A. for the perpetual care and maintenance of the Calvin P. Gilson lot in said cemetery and to be known as the Calvin P. Gilson Trust Fund. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.

Article 42. Voted by voice vote on motion made by Ada W. Allen to accept the sum of \$100.00 under the will of Emma P. Farwell, the income thereof to be expended as needed in the perpetual care and maintenance of the Farwell burial lot in Spofford Cemetery. Vote declared by the Moderator to be carried in the affirmative.



Article 43. Not other business appearing the Moderator declared the balloting would continue until four o'clock p. m.

At four o'clock p. m. the Moderator declared the ballot box closed and a count of ballots cast resulted as follows:

For Trustee of Trust Funds. Chester M. Burnham had 248 votes and was declared elected.

For Sexton Spofford Village Cemetery. Byron A. Davis had 80 votes, Walter L. Deselle had 134 votes, George W. Goodridge had 62 votes. Walter L. Deselle was declared elected.

For Sexton Center Cemeteries. Lawrence G. Crowell had 227 votes, William Nurse had 1 vote. Lawrence G. Crowell was declared elected.

For Sexton New Boston Cemetery. Lawrence G. Crowell had 228 votes and was declared elected.

For Sexton Pattridge & Atherton Hill Cemetery. Frank Whorfe had 235 votes, Jessie B. Joslin had 1 vote. Frank Whorfe was declared elected.

For Spofford Constable. Lyle P. Blake had 76 votes, George W. Goodridge had 71 votes, Arvid W. Pearson had 133 votes. Arvid W. Pearson was declared elected.

For Center Constable. Henry C. Chickering had 244 votes, Winston H. Cray had 10 votes, Charles Furlone had 1 vote, George White had 1 vote. Henry C. Chickering was declared elected.

For West Chesterfield Constable. Harold E. Randall had 265 votes, Shirley G. Bevis had 2 votes, Ora Underwood had 1 vote. Harold E. Randall was declared elected.

For Surveyors of Wood and Lumber. Chester M. Burnham had 252 votes, Louis W. Chickering had 226 votes, George W. Goodridge had 232 votes, Harold E. Randall had 1 vote, Newton E. Darling had 1 vote, Carl Castle had 1 vote, Clarence

Shippee had 1 vote, Jessie M. B. Joslyn had 1 vote. Chester M. Burnham, Louis W. Chickering and George W. Goodridge were declared elected.

For Fence Viewers. John L. Castle had 236 votes, Richard G. Chickering had 219 votes, Floyd M. Fuller had 226 votes, Jessie M. B. Joslyn had 1 vote, Kenneth Fales had 1 vote, Carl Castle had 1 vote. John L. Castle, Richard G. Chickering, and Floyd M. Fuller were declared elected.

## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF TOWN LIBRARIES LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

---

Total circulation for the year was 3,699 volumes loaned; of these 3,109 were fiction and 295 non-fiction. The average weekly circulation was 75 books.

There are 145 names in the borrower's register, 39 are summer residents, 24 have moved, leaving 82 active borrowers. There are 48 adults and 34 juvenile borrowers.

The book collection has been increased and improved with 132 new books, 73 of these are juveniles.

Our collection of reference material is very inadequate but has been improved and we hope to gradually improve it to meet the increasing demand. By vote of the trustees the interest from the library trust funds may be used in this department.

During the year there were several gifts of books to the library. Among the larger gifts were nearly 200 volumes given by Mr. Morris Friedsam, none of these have recent imprints. About 100 volumes were given by Dr. Everett Estler and around 25 volumes were given by Mrs. A. W. Spaulding and son Richard, for the juvenile department.

Almost a complete set of 50 years of town reports were given by Mr. Arthur H. Post and a few old town reports were added by Mr. Roger Spaulding. Mr. E. James Winslow has given several very useful volumes to the non-fiction collection.

Rev. N. J. Langmaid gave several books to the same collection. There were several gifts of single volumes.

A new book plate has been designed of which we are proud.

We notice a gradual increase in the use of the reading room and the new addition used for the juvenile room is a wonderful improvement.

Books were exchanged 7 times in West Chesterfield, and 10 times in Spofford during the year.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH

---

Four cases of scarlet fever developed in town and were under quarantine for several weeks, also a few cases of impetigo, several people were taken to hospitals, several camps were inspected and one was posted as unfit for use, some complaints were received in regard to dead animals not being properly buried.

Parts of the shore around Spofford Lake had to have special care in order to keep the same safe for swimming and other recreation, rubbish barrels were placed there for the accommodation of the public.

The outlet of Spofford Lake became so filled with sand that very little water could enter the channel causing a fire hazard to the surrounding property, this was remedied. Some water holes could be constructed in the channel leading from the lake for a small sum of money so that in a dry time the water could be held up to a higher level in the lake.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

To the School Board and Citizens of Chesterfield:

I herein submit my eighth annual report as superintendent of schools.

Education today faces a crisis in history and civilization. If we are to maintain the ideals of democracy, we must not forget the boys and girls in our public schools who are soon to be the men and women that have to carry on in a changed world. They will have to cope against far reaching questions and pay enormous debts.

Therefore, it is fitting that we scrutinize carefully our objectives and clarify our methods of procedure. Indeed, in our final analysis we must regard our boys and girls in the public schools as our first and last line of defense. All isms and philosophies that are poisonous to democracy and the American Way of life must be banished from our public schools and colleges. We believe our methods of procedure must follow three lines of thought, viz. (1) an invigorated drill and practice in fundamentals, the efficiency of the "Three R's" cannot be overlooked, the purity of the English language must be maintained, the intellectual activity and vision of life ex-

tended. (2) The pupils must be imbued with a deeper feeling for, sense of appreciation of and a higher respect for the home, the school and the community. (3) Every child must be brought into contact with some situation of life that may give him control of himself, give him the power of decision between right and wrong.

The boys and girls of today are looking not only onward but also upward. Let our training be such that they will see more above them than airplanes but will grasp the fundamental ideas of a Divinity that rules the Universe.

With the coordination and correlation of the above mentioned lines of thought, we may be able to reach our objective, viz. the true Christian American citizen, to whom we may delegate with safety the welfare of the American Way of life, the Constitution and the highest ideals of democracy.
