FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurrence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops, lowered water levels and dried up brook's everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagrations we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient properly to equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Deerfield:

In accordance with the rules of the School Board and the laws of the State of New Hampshire, I am pleased to submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools for the Town of Deerfield.

Since my election, my time has been spent chiefly in studying the problems of the entire Union, watching the schools in action in each district, becoming acquainted with the teachers, children, and citizens, attending meetings of the school board both regular and special, checking equipment, books, and supplies, trying to discover the strong and weak points of each system so that a thorough understanding of the needs of your boys and girls may be emphasized, and gathering data which will be necessary for future reference.

It is, then, fairly apparent that any recommendations made at this time would be somewhat superficial and would not present a clear picture of what would be the best procedure to follow. Therefore, during the coming year advice will be suggested only after careful consideration and study of the available material and the educational welfare of the children of the town.

APPRECIATION

I wish to express my appreciation to the School Board for the confidence it has shown toward me since July 1947. The patience and courteous consideration expressed in my behalf and for the children of the town is humbly received and I shall try to merit your continued confidence in my efforts as your educational advisor and executive officer. I wish also to express my appreciation to the pupils, teachers, and citizens of the town who have so generously helped to make the schools what we all hope they should become and to express the pride with which every conscientious person has taken in time and energy to aid in the growth of the youth of the town.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Since taking office as head of the Deerfield Schools, I have been impressed by the seriousness and desirability of the School Board to develop and complete the projects necessary to insure good schools. The cooperation of its members in all emergencies as well as regular routine matters has been frank, earnest, and constructive.

I am thoroughly convinced that the board as well as the public wants the best schools possible. In keeping with this desire, I am bringing to your attention the following items as commendable accomplishments:

Tests and Testing

Testing is important in the development of modern youth in his educational growth. Although much time must be spent to administer such a program, the results have proved very desirable. It has been the custom in the past to test the boys and girls at the close of the school year to determine in part whether or not a youngster should be promoted to the next grade or graduated. After discussing the matter to considerable length, these tests were administered in the fall. After correcting and tabulating, teachers were able to concentrate upon the weaknesses of their pupils with the entire year to work out individual problems. This innovation in the schools of the town has been a challenge to every teacher and a decided aid to the educational growth of the pupil. The cooperation of the teachers was excellent even though it meant extra work in the correction, tabulation, and study of the tests.

Marking System and Report Cards

Probably one of the most important changes made since September was the simplification of the report card and the introduction of a new marking system.

Evaluation of the work of the boys and girls in the school is a subjective matter at best and considerable time is spent every six weeks in order that a fair and accurate report may be made to the parent of the classroom activities of the child. Many prominent educators have opposed this type of report where a subjective statement is made that does not tell the whole story. However, as long as the colleges and the State Department require some form of measuring pupil progress, New Hampshire schools must continue to keep such records. It has always been the intention of the administration, however, to make such a report as brief as possible yet to advise the parent of the child's progress in its simplest form. It is my opinion that the new system has met widespread approval in the community.

Standardization of Permanent Records

The permanent records of the pupils and the schools have been standardized. This method of permanent record-keeping in the schools is in use all over the country and should prove an asset to pupils, teachers, parents, and future administrators.

Teachers

It is my opinion that your teachers are doing a very satisfactory job in the teaching of your children. Since the appointment of Mr. Amadon as a principal of the three schools, close association with the work in each school has been improved and the problems of all have been merged to make the teaching stem from the human angle. I believe that this single change alone has done much to improve and develop a better understanding between teachers and pupils. You are to be congratulated in having such cooperative spirit for the interests of the children.

South Road School

It was necessary to open the South Road School this year. The Town of Deerfield is outgrowing its buildings for educational purposes and in order to meet the situation in September another building had to be opened. This has been an expensive necessity and will continue to require thought and study in the housing problem or until the town is ready to accept the responsibilities of a modern school house. Mrs. Ethel M. Barney was engaged as the teacher in Grades one and two at the South Road School where twenty-five youngsters meet every day. Mrs. Barney has had considerable experience in the schools of the state and comes to Deerfield well recommended. In the other schools of the district the increase in the number of pupils will, in the near future, require more space.

Repairs

Certain repairs which are necessary every summer were carried out by the members of the Board with dispatch and economical acumen and too much cannot be said in favor of a board which takes its duties in this manner. They are to be commended for their actions.

Textbooks, Supplies, & Equipment

Many textbooks, supplies, and equipment have been brought up to date. Readers, both basic and supplementary, geographies, science books, arithmetics, and many items of equipment and supplies have been purchased including chairs, maps, and magazines. This has put considerable strain on the budget, but the results, in my opinion and where the boys and girls of the town are concerned, has justified the means.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The foregoing achievements or accomplishments have been the highlights of your schools since September and as the year progresses there will, undoubtedly, be other matters which will have the attention of the Board as well as the teachers and pupils.

Since it is very necessary to look into the future and try to determine what is best for education in Deerfield, I should like to make a few recommendations that, to my mind, must have your attention, if not immediately, at least in the very near future especially those items pertaining to the budget for 1948-49.

Tuitions

This item in the 1947-48 budget claimed 35 percent of the entire amount raised and appropriated. The 1948-49 budget calls for an even greater amount. This item is set by the laws of the state which require every school district to pay the tuition of any boy or girl who wishes to attend a high school or academy. The tuition rate was increased by the State Department from \$123.79 in 1946-47 to \$138.89 in 1947-48 and without doubt will be in the neighborhood of \$150 for 1948-49. It is, therefore, very important that provision be made for the next school year for this item.

Teachers

In view of the fact that your teachers have proved very satisfactory during the past year, and in view of the fact that the cost of living has not been reduced during the past year, I recommend that your teachers be given an adequate increase in their salaries for the year 1948-49.

Health Supervision

Your nurse, Miss Margaret E. Cronin, receives \$2400 from six districts distributed as follows: Raymond \$715.05; Candia \$316.02; Deerfield \$223.60; Auburn \$377.45; Merrimack \$640.47; Litchfield \$127.41. Her salary is based upon the number of pupils in each district for the previous year. This means that her salary includes her traveling ex-

penses from her home in Manchester to the various schools in the above districts. It also includes her trips to Concord, Manchester, Boston, Hanover, Laconia and wherever it is necessary to transport a child or a group of children. She is on call at all times and through her generosity makes many special trips in connection with her work.

The time has come to realize the great part the school nurse plays in the school system and the personal interest she takes in each and every child regardless of expense. Therefore, I recommend that an adequate amount be set aside in the budget for reasonable expenses of traveling for the district.

New Equipment

Since all indications point to the increase of pupils in the schools of Deerfield, some provision must be made for new equipment for the South Road playground and the general routine equipment which needs replacing. It is my opinion that the physical education of the youngster on the playground is a very important phase in his education and in visiting the schools it seems that at least at the South Road School, equipment is sadly lacking. Therefore, it is my recommendation that one or two articles of playground equipment be purchased and that provision be made for it in the budget.

Building Construction

I should like to emphasize the fact that very serious thought must be given to the construction of a modern centralized school. Too much cannot be said for those citizens who are looking to the future when a central building will improve and bring up to date the educational facilities of the town. There is just as much pride and interest in the town of Deerfield as in similar towns in this section of New Hampshire and New England. It would seem that the economic situation alone would present serious thought and study of

the project. I would be failing as an executive officer of the School Board if I did not call this matter to the attention of the citizens of the town. Please take a little time to think about it and discuss it.

May I again thank the individual members of the School Board for the assistance and advice so generously given in my behalf and in the interests of the citizens, teachers, and pupils of the Deerfield Schools.
