To the Inhabitants of the Town of East Kingston in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said East Kingston on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Old Age Assistance.

5 To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the Public Library.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to install an Oil Burner in the Town Hall Furnace.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$169.90 against the State Appropriation of \$679.61 for Class V Road Assistance.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 annually for the Gale Cemetery.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for maintenance of the new Fire Truck.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Forest Fire Equipment.

11. To see if the Town will vote to observe, during the month of August, 1949, the 50th Anniversary of Old Home Week, and raise and appropriate a sum of money therefor.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to tar Class V Roads.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to establish a shelf list in the Public Library.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of East Kingston, N. H.

I take pleasure in submitting my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

In the long run a community provides the kind of education for its children and youth that the whole community wants. The school does not belong to the superintendent, the principal, or the teachers. It belongs to all the people. All American youth need formal education at least until they reach the age of eighteen. For such education to be meaningful to them, modifications must be made in many current school programs which were originally designed primarily for pupils seeking entrance to college.

Some objectives generally accepted by good modern schools are listed.

The school should:

1. develop self-disciplined and responsible citizens who will live harmoniously with other members of the community.
2. develop and promote good physical and mental health.
3. develop in the youth the ability to use the tools of learning effectively.
4. develop in each youth employable skills for securing a respectable place in society.
5. teach youth to use leisure time wisely.
6. provide experiences to develop worthy home membership.

7. give knowledge of how to purchase and use goods and services intelligently.
8. develop an interest in and appreciation of art, music, radio, screen and stage.
9. stimulate interest in and an understanding of the **part that science plays in modern living.**

For education to attain these objectives, the first requirement is full cooperation of citizens and parents, teachers and students. A second requirement is to have competent teachers in charge of our young people, for a school can be no stronger than the teachers who are employed there.

A third requirement is to have adequate physical facilities such as school buildings and playgrounds which will assist rather than hinder the attainment of the objectives of modern education. Some yardsticks which can be used to help us to determine how adequate our present facilities are, follow:

1. HOUSING FACILITIES—Does the building provide accommodations to meet increasing enrollments so that no room needs to house more than twenty-five students?

2. AGE OF BUILDING — Is the building modern enough to meet the requirements of present day education?

3. SIZE OF PLAYGROUND—Does the playground meet the national standard of five acres for the site and an additional acre for each one hundred students?

4. PROVISION FOR CAFETERIA & AUDITORIUM —Does the building have a cafeteria and a combination auditorium and gymnasium?

If some of the above requirements are not being met to the degree which you feel they should be, may I encourage you to give serious consideration regarding what

can be done to fulfill these needs, for I am sure that you as an active and interested citizen are eager to have your community provide the best possible training which it can afford for its young people. There is no better investment in this troubled world than investment in youth.

East Kingston has two teachers who have a wealth of experience and training to offer. Mrs. Eva Philbrick continues her invaluable service to the boys and girls and to the community as teacher of grades 1-4. Mr. Frank Robinson has an unusual background in the fields of education and business and is in a position to use this information as teacher of grades 5 - 8 at Brown's Academy. To supplement the work of these two teachers, Mrs. Regene Matthews is supervisor of art instruction and Mrs. Doris Bridges is teaching sewing at Brown's Academy. Miss Prudence Hayes has returned as music supervisor and Mrs. Constance Cooper as school nurse is in charge of the health program. All of this instruction gives the boys and girls of East Kingston a well-rounded program of education.

I call to your attention the reports and tables which follow. I trust these will be of interest to you.

I wish to thank the citizens, the members of the School Board, and the teachers for their fine cooperation and support.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The sewing class at Brown's Academy started in October and due to holidays and vacations it was impossible some weeks to hold our class. Sewing class is held Thursday afternoon from two thirty to three-thirty.

The class consists of fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade girls, eleven in number. Due to the difference in age and sewing ability, we have followed a varied program.

The first two classes were devoted entirely to sewing fundamentals. The girls have completed a felt needlebook, a boudoir pillow, the filling for which they gathered and dried milkweed making the cover of dotted dimity appliqued, fringed a dish towel, cut and fitted a felt novelty belt, sachet bags, and an apron.

Since variety is the keynote of interest building, many projects however small will present themselves in the weeks to come.

The cooperation of the girls has been most gratifying.

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Health of the school children during 1947 and 1948 was unusually good. We had no serious epidemics.

The annual health examination of eyes, ears, teeth, throats and skin was made in the early part of the school year. This examination was followed up with home calls for the correction of physical defects, and any other conditions which would result in having healthier and happier children.

The usual health program is being carried on with frequent visits to the school, close contact with each pupil, teacher and parent.

Our greatest need is dental work. It is impossible to secure the services of a dentist for clinical work. This condition exists in all parts of the state. Therefore, I ask the parents to assume the responsibility of getting their children to their own dentist at least once a year.

I sincerely thank the School Board, teachers, parents and many others for their continued fine cooperation.
