Number of Ballots cast 469

The Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, William H. Doonan, and Polls were opened at 10 o'clock A. M.

Acting under Article 1 of the Town Warrant the following officers were elected: Town Clerk, Henry P. Gainey; Town Treasurer, Albina Cournoyer; Selectman for three years, Joseph C. Caouette; Tax Collector, William H. Doonan; Highway Agent, Robert G. Lafleur; Water Commissioner for three years, Wilfred J. Caouette, Sr.; Library Trustee for three years, Eugene H. Coffin; Auditors, T. Archibald Eaton, Harlan E. Karr; Trustee of Trust Funds, for one year, Linus E. Nutting; Trustee of Trust Funds for two years, William H. Doonan; Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, Amedee Ouellette. For First Fireward, William H. Doonan, for Second Fireward, Lazare J. Rodier, for Third Fireward, A. Alphonse Bergeron; Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, William H. Doonan, Camille J. Vaillancourt, and Clyde S. Eaton; for Public Weighers, Joseph Bernier, William H. Doonan, Camille J. Vaillancourt, Helen Pelletier, A. E. Rouse, Jr., Honore Rousseau, and Arthur Bernier.

Art. 2. See Selectmen's report for Appropriations.

Art. 3. Voted to accept reports, of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and officers as printed.

Art. 4. Voted to authorize the Town Treasurer and Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 5. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$171.92, to be used jointly for State Road Aid.

Art. 6. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$119.00 to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire.

Art. 7. Voted to take no action on this article.

Art. 8. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to surface and tar Baker Avenue.

Art. 9 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 to rebuild and tar the road from Mill Street to residence of Honore Rousseau.

Art. 10. Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 to build a sidewalk on River street.

Art. 11 Voted to take no action on this article.

Art. 12 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 for suitable strong guard rails or abutments on No. 6 Bridge, said amount of Three Thousand Dollars to be paid off annually in payments of Five Hundred Dollars each, payments to begin in 1951. Art. 13. Voted to take no action on this article.

Art. 14 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty Dollars for the purpose of disposing of the temporary World War II Honor Roll, after a permanent record of the names now appearing on said Honor Roll has been made in the form of a photograph and that said photograph placed with the Town Records.

Art. 15 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$580.00 to install 6 new street lights on Main St.

Art. 16 Voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to build a new road from the Temple Road westerly and northerly through the Greenville Mills property.

Art. 17 Voted to repair or to replace the present Town Clock, the cost of same to be taken out of Town Hall appropriation.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Greenville in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Greenville on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects: bring in your ballots for the following town officers:

Town Clerk for one year; one selectman for three years; town treasurer for one year; tax collector for one year; highway agent for one year; one water commissioner for one year; one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years; Library Trustee for three years; two auditors for one year; three fire wards for one year;

And at eight o'clock in the afternoon of the same day the same place to act upon the following subjects;

Art. 1. To choose all necessary officers not chosen by Australian ballot.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Art. 3. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Art. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen and town treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, or take any action thereon.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to install a street light on a pole on the road leading from lower Mill Street to the residence of Honore Rousseau, said pole being at the corner of the road leading to the residences of Theodore Bedard and Harold Martin, or take any action thereon.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and raise and appropriate a sum of money to cover the expenses of such an audit. Art. 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to install two toilets at the playground or take any action thereon.

Art. 8. To see if the Town will vote to build a new road from the Temple Road, westerly and northerly through the Greenville Mills property, surface and tar the same and raise and appropriate a sum of money for said road, or take any action thereon.

REPORT OF FIREWARDS:

The most serious fire of the year occurred in April on the Dustin property on Merriam Hill. It apparently started by the highway and the high wind carried it down the fields to the Dustin buildings. The house was saved with slight damage but the garage was destroyed. There were a number of other alarms but none caused much damage. The exceedingly dry weather of the last three summers has made an acute fire hazard and all persons should be on the alert to report fires. I hereby submit the Annual Report of the Library for the year ending December 31, 1950.

The library has been opened each Monday and Wednesday evening and Friday afternoon, except when a legal holiday came on a regular library night.

A table given by Mr. and Mrs. Ralph LaPierre, and the loan of four small chairs, proved most useful for the little children. An old-fashioned stereoscope complete with pictures has added to their enjoyment.

Two large book-cases and several hundred books, predominately mystery and detective stories, were given by Mr. Edwin Rogers, and Mrs. Josephine Gale presented the library with a set of Stoddard's lectures.

An electric pencil has been purchased as permanent equipment and aids in marking the non-fiction books in a much clearer and quicker manner.

The State Library continues to send the Bookmobile once in three months with children's books and a few non-fiction for adults. They have been most co-operative in the matter of supplementary reading material for the schools and individuals.

The reading table has been placed in the back room where it is quieter and more convenient for anyone to read.

A table in the main room has been appropriately decorated for the prevailing holiday each month. It has attracted much attention and is eagerly anticipated by the children.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 13th day of March 1951, at 9:00 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see if the school district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for the purpose of converting the present heating system to oil and authorize the school board to use any additional sum necessary to complete the project. This sum to be taken from any balance that may exist at the end of the 1950-51 school year, or take any action relating thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF GREENVILLE:

I respectfully submit my fourth annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

INSTRUCTION

The Greenville Public School, under the able instruction of Mrs. Helene Greene, Mrs. Edna LaPierre, Mrs. Mary Pelletier, and Miss Elsie Wheeler is continuing to show excellent progress. Definite emphasis is being placed on the fundamental tools of learning, namely Reading, Writing, Arithmetic and Language These areas of learning are being supplemented by a Arts. knowledge of the essentials to successful living as health, science, social understandings, and appreciation of the part that music and art plays in one's life and an ability to competently live in a democratic society. Your teachers are conscious of contemporary methods of teaching and have availed themselves of every opportunity to improve themselves professionally. Mrs. Greene and Mrs. LaPierre are presently enrolled in a course in Elementary Guidance given at Wilton through the cooperation of Keene Teachers College. A more thorough guidance program is in the process of being developed so that the teachers may have a better understanding of their pupils.

HEALTH SUPERVISION

The health program is under the supervision of Miss Sybil Beatham and Dr. Harlan Karr. Each year all pupils of school age in both the public and parochial schools are thoroughly examined, and results reported to the parents. An attempt is made to keep all parents informed of the health condition of their children. For further details on the services rendered by the School Nurse and Doctor, I refer you to the School Nurse's Report.

"No School" Policy

The Greenville School Board has established the following policy relative to keeping school on stormy days. Our school will be open every day regardless of the weather unless it should be so extreme that the school bus cannot operate. Thus parents will be assured that when they send their children to school there will always be somebody there to receive them. On extremely stormy days, parents are encouraged to use their own judgment and keep their children home if they feel that it is in the best interests of health and safety to do so.

PLAYGROUND FACILITIES

Equipment on our playground is comparatively limited. We have one set of swings and one set of see-saws. This comprises

the equipment available to the very young people. If and when it is deemed desirable, it would be well to procure a wave slide and another set of swings. Another improvement that might be considered is the leveling off of the play area immediately in the rear of the building. This could easily be done by adding fill and grading. Since the town playground area has been developed, our older people have used it for baseball. This use has largely taken place after school hours. Its distance from the school, makes it impractical to utilize this area during recess periods. Thus it is necessary at these times to conduct numerous activities in a small unlevel area.

IMPROVEMENTS

In the past three years a definite program of building improvements was inaugurated and is well on its way toward completion. The interior of the building has been completely redecorated with the exception of the room that is now used as an "activity room." This will undoubtedly need attention in the near future. The hallways, and stairwells, and teachers' room were re-decorated this past year. For several years your School Board has wanted to replace the broken down, unattractive wooden fence that encloses the school property, with a permanent chain link fence. Several estimates at different times have been given. The cost would be approximately \$1160. Each year a section of the present fence has to be removed since it presents a definite hazard to the young people's safety while they are playing. The fence is in such poor condition that it would not be economical to attempt to repair it. The district may wish to take this project into consideration at some future date.

FINANCE

All concerned with operating and administering your school are making every effort to do this as efficiently and economically as possible. A careful perusal of the School Board's Budget will show that the large areas of increase are primarily tuitions and teachers' salaries. The first is determined by the schools receiving your high school pupils, the last reflects the increased cost of living. It will also be noted that while the amount required to operate your school for 1951-52, will increase \$1,494.19 the assessment has been reduced \$1,200.51. This is due to the School Board estimating a balance of \$2,304.70 for June 1951.

STATE AID

Legislation for State Aid now pending in the New Hampshire Legislature provides no state aid for Greenville. This is due to the large equalized valuation in back of each pupil who is attending the public school. The formula reads that "any district paying less than 14 mills per \$1000 of equalized valuation for school purposes is ineligible to receive state aid." Greenville's school tax rate per \$1000 of equalized valuation in 1949-50 was \$10.80.

CONCLUSION

I wish to thank the Greenville School Board and the citizens of Greenville for the excellent cooperation they have rendered to the teachers and me during this past year. It is only as we all work together that we can achieve the type of education we all desire for our children.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

As School Nurse for the Town of Greenville I made visits both to the Sacred Heart School and the Greenville Public School. The total pupil load is 188.

The pupils were weighed and measured in May and October 1950 and most showed a satisfactory weight gain.

By means of the Snellon Eye Chart I tested the pupils' eyes and sent notes to the children's parents who showed a deficiency in vision. I hope to do an audiometer examination of the hearing this spring as the equipment was not available during the fall.

With the aid of the teachers and the Sisters of the Assumption I have tried to impress upon the children the necessity of personal cleanliness and good health habits in the prevention and control of disease. Informal talks and monthly inspections have been part of the program.

The pupils attended the Federal Public Health Clinic in Milford for the Fluorine treatment in the winter of 1950. This has stimulated interest in care of the teeth and the improvement is marked.

I assisted Dr. Harlan Karr in examining the children during the fall.

I made five home visits during the year.
