ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Haverhill in the County of Grafton, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, March 8, 1960, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following matters.

- Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk.
- Article 2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Commissioners, and any other town officers heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.
- Article 3. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, one Highway Agent, one or more Auditors, one Library trustee for the term of three years, one Cemetery Commissioner for the term of five years, one Trustee of trust funds for the term of three years, and all other necessary Town officers.
- Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to contribute funds for the construction of Class V highways, as provided in Chapter 188, Part 13, Laws of 1945, as amended, and to raise and appropriate the sum required for this purpose.
- Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the Town, as recommended by the Finance Committee in its budget report, to raise and appropriate all sums so determined for the purpose so determined, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.
- Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to issue interest-bearing Notes or Orders to provide for the current year's expense in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks by mail, or at the time they examine the taxable property.

- Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Collector's deeds.
- Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to appoint or elect a budget Committee to supervise the appropriations of the Town, and to recommend to the next Annual Town Meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.
- Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to publish the list of all delinquent taxpayers, and taxes in the next Town Report.
- Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to paint and otherwise repair the Woodsville-Wells River bridge to meet requirements for the State to take over future maintenance of said bridge, and to raise and appropriate the sum necessary for this purpose.
- Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to repair the South Newbury Bridge, and to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 for this purpose.
- Article 13. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

It provides a suitable place where you can dispose of the large amounts of dangerous, inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around your household and local stores, brush, etc., cut on your property. The town dump has become a valuable and indispensable asset in modern community life.

The most successful town dumps are supervised—regular days provided for their use and inflammable material consistently burned. The town dump which receives no attention, where waste material is scattered about without supervision of any description, soon becomes a community

menace and a liability rather than an asset.

Many people still burn debris around their homes. A large number of such fires get out of control causing unnecessary damage and expense to the burner. Why burn at home? Make use of your town dump and eliminate the hazard of burning. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises

- Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden
 —the law requires it. The warden won't refuse you
 if conditions are safe.

Report of the Librarian

To the inhabitants of the Union High School District of Woodsville qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Building in said district on the 11th day of March, 1960, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, Auditors, committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, Auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To choose a Library Trustee for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for the support of the Woodsville Free Public Library.

- 11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
- 12. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Very little change in the membership of the faculties of the Woodsville schools is definitely one of the contributing factors in making both Woodsville Graded School and Woodsville High School the fine schools which they are.

Only one position in the system was vacated in June. That of science instructor and director of girls' athletics. This position, so ably administered for over a decade by Lois Litz, was filled, in the science department, by Albert J. Plante of Orford, N. H. Mr. Plante is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire, holds the degree of Bachelor of Science, with a major in general and applied science. He comes to Woodsville after six years of experience at Orford High School and at Bradford Academy, Bradford, Vermont.

Mr. Bagonzi took over that part of the athletic program previously coached by Miss Litz. This was made possible by the employment of Mrs. Glenda Evans to instruct at the Graded School during the morning session, teaching classes formerly taught by Mr. Evans, and later by Mr. Bagonzi. Mrs. Evans graduated from Plymouth Teachers College in

1957, with a B. of Ed. degree.

Mrs. Marion Mullen, although having taught English during 1959 at Woodsville High School, after Mrs. Pendo and Mrs. Cookson left, is now completing her first full academic year at Woodsville High School. She is also a Plymouth Teachers College graduate, has a B. Ed. degree and has had three years of previous teaching experience.

The philosophy of our schools is trying to keep pace with the changing needs of the individual. We can say that it probably takes less than 20 years for a good educational idea to be accepted by at least half of the public schools of this country. This is an optimistic finding, since Dr. Paul Mort, in studies made in 1935-1940, determined that it took nearly 50 years for an educational invention to develop to meet a specific educational need. With new methods of communications, ideas are quickly available to many people.

There is still a long way to go. A lot of us become aware that alertness to needs, desire to experiment to find new solutions, and conscious effort to promote the use of good educational ideas, are essential in reducing the present time lag in education. Let us familiarize ourselves with the

necessity of replacing old habits for new ideas.

Long ago, the U. S. accepted the principle of a high school diploma for all, and is now moving into the era of universal college education. Education for all, more than education for a career, has tremendous potentialities.

The interest of the individual members of the school board, the accomplishments of the teachers, and the support of the community are most gratifying to your superintendent.

Please give attention to the reports of Principal Mullen, Principal McKelvey, and Mrs. LaMott, R.N., which follow.

Curriculum

The Curriculum at Woodsville High School has undergone many varied changes during the past year. During the spring of last year the administration prepared and disbursed a Teachers' Manual and Student Handbook to standardize teacher and student procedures in the school. The staff has attempted to familiarize the student body with national tests such as the National Developmental Test, Merit Scholarship, National Scholarship Qualifying Test, Preliminary Scholarship Aptitude Tests and College Boards.

This fall a Guidance Program under the supervision of Mr. Woodward was inaugurated whereby tests will be administered to all students in the high school and a personal conference arranged with each. It is hoped that the program will grow and mature with time. The national trend seems to be toward more and more guidance and the administration feels that this is a worthwhile addition to our program.

Directed by Mrs. Marion Mullen, the drama students presented *Bull in a China Shop*, which was favorably accepted by the community. Our yearbook, with Mrs. Sherwin Kendall in charge, received national merit from the Medill School of Journalism at Northwestern University. The Science, Department won first prize at the Lancaster Fair last spring under the sponsorship of Mr. John Bagonzi.

The Commercial Department started an on-the-job training program to acquaint the students with actual work in an office and was so favorably accepted by business establishments in the area, that we hope to prevail upon their time and energy to continue the program again this year under the direction of Mrs. Gladys Desrochers.

The Industrial Arts Department, under the auspices of

Mr. John Gordon, displayed various work projects com-

pleted in the shop during the year.

In the field of athletics the Woodsville High School Socoer team competed in the White Mountain League for the first time, Mr. Albert Plante presented a well-drilled and conditioned team which completed a seasonal record of three wins and five losses. Our basketball team completed the best season in years when they posted a record of 19 wins and 5 losses during the long season. The team competed in the Berlin Invitational Tournament where they were well received. Having finished ninth in the state standing, the Engineers, coached by Mr. Donald Evans, competed in the N.H.I.A.A. Basketball Tournament where they won the preliminary game against Penacook but were defeated by Plymouth in the semi-final round. The high note of the athletic year was the winning of the Class "M" Baseball Championship at Tilton School when the Engineers defeated St. Anthony's of Manchester in the final game. The Cohase Lions Club presented Coach John Bagonzi and the baseball squad with a fine banquet tendered at the Community Building.

WOODSVILLE GRADED SCHOOL REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL

January 7, 1960

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herein my annual report of Woodsville Graded

School for the year ending December 31, 1959.

The enrollment for the school year 1959-60 totaled 321 pupils. This is an increase of 14 pupils over last year. The Graded School enrollment has been increasing steadily for the past several years thus increasing the problem of too little room both in the building and on the playground. There are now four grades in the school which have an enrollment of 40 or more pupils.

The Graded School staff had only one change. Mrs. Glenda Evans is teaching junior high school English replacing Mr. John Bagonzi who is teaching full time at the

high school.

An Open House was held in November in observance of American Education Week. Eighty per cent of the children in the school were represented by a visiting parent which shows a great amount of interest in their children by the parents of Woodsville. The teachers were extremely pleased

by this large turnout of parents.

The Graded School testing program includes the administering of achievement, aptitude and intelligence tests. Stanford achievement tests are given in grades 1-8. Intelligence tests are given to grades 3, 6 and 8. Metropolitan achievement tests and Pintner intelligence tests were administered to the eighth grade as well as aptitude and intelligence tests administered by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service. These tests aid in guiding the eighth grade pupils into the proper courses as they enter high school.

The Graded School milk program runs from January through April. In that period 2,525 bottles of milk were

sold to the children.

The annual music festival for all grades was held at the

Community Building in May before a large crowd.

Athletic teams at the Graded School include basketball and baseball for the boys and basketball for the girls. The

girls had their second undefeated season in a row, winning 6 and losing none. The boys won 9 and lost 3 and won the second place trophy at the Junior High School Tournament in Bradford, Vt.

I wish to thank Supt. of Schools Phil Bennett and the School Board for their constant co-operation in all matters.

boots and overshoes.

REPORT OF THE RECREATION COMMITTEE

The Woodsville Community Recreation Program of 1959 commenced on July 10, as the Summer Youth Recreation Program was initiated under a new organizational plan. fostered by the Woodsville Recreation Committee. The program continued for six weeks. There was a total of 205 students enrolled. Of this group 34 were from Wells River. Average daily attendance was 175. Students were divided into six groups: Beginners—Boys and Girls—Intermediate Boys and Girls—Senior Boys and Girls. Games consisting of softball, baseball, volleyball, kick-ball, soccer, football, broad jump, high jump, relays, track and field events, archery and tennis were played. Calisthenics, marching and a story hour were also incorporated into the morning program. Swimming was held at Hall's Pond in the afternoon and students were placed in various phases of instruction according to ability. Two hikes were conducted during the program and activities culminated in a water meet at Hall's Lake and Little Olympics day at the Community Field. Awards for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place were given in all events. Transportation for swimming was furnished by George White. A mid-morning break was also held in which students could buy chocolate milk and ice cream.

Concomitant to the summer program was a little league baseball program for boys between the ages of 8-12. A new feature to this program was the inclusion of a little league farm system which enabled those not making the parent teams to participate with boys of their own ability and age. There were 81 boys enrolled in this baseball

program.

A junior baseball team which played an independent schedule also comprised a part of the summer program. Boys in the 13-16 age group participated here and enjoyed

an undefcated season.

A town baseball team to help satisfy the desires of some of the adult baseball players was initiated. Though a limited schedule was played, this team is expected to participate in the Central New Hampshire Baseball League for 1960.

The 1959 Youth Center began on October 21. Activities in the afternoon included basketball, volleyball, tumbling, fencing, and table tennis. The evening record hop has been well attended and total enrollment at 223 has been the highest since the program's inception. Highlights of the

season have been a Halloween Costume Ball and a Christmas Semi-Formal Ball. A talent contest for members was also conducted.

A Little League basketball program for students in the 10-13 year age group was started. Five teams comprised the league which played their games on Sunday afternoon. Sponsors for these teams included: W. J. Larty Gulf Company, American Legion, Lions Club, Rotary, and Youth Center. Uniforms were purchased for each team.

A rifle team composed of boys belonging to Youth Center has been organized and will receive instruction at the National Guard Armory on Wednesday afternoons under

the direction of Captain Bart Mann.

A Sunday afternoon bowling league for recreation members has been formulated and is currently underway.

Adult recreation is centered mainly around a Wednesday

evening open house featured by a volleyball league.

A town basketball team sponsored by Grafton Motor Sales Company was organized and formed as a part of the

Adult Recreation Program.

A ski program initiated by the Woodsville Lioness' Club is in full swing and participants are transported to Mittersill ski slope on Sunday afternoon and receive instruction in various phases of skiing. Arrangements have been initiated for instructors from the Franconia Ski School to assist in instructing ski students at the Woodsville Ski Tow for next year.

SCHOOL WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of Haverhill qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the North Haverhill School Auditorium in said district on the 15th day of March, 1960, at 8 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
- 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- 3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
- 4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- 5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
- 6. To hear the reports of agents, Auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To choose agents, Auditors, and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
- 8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
- 9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of a dental clinic.

- 10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.
- 11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.
- 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The total enrollment of the pupils in the elementary school apparently reached its peak during 1958-1959. There were 21 less pupils registered in September 1959, than were enrolled last June. The Academy is beginning to feel the impact of an increased enrollment, there being 413 regis-

tered as compared with 101 in September 1958.

Only one faculty member changed employment in the entire system of seventeen teachers. Mr. Kramm resigned to accept a position at Orford. The district is fortunate in finding a most capable person to fill this vacancy in science and advanced math. Mrs. Rhoda Ansley accepted this position and began work at the Academy in September. Mrs. Ansley holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Brown University and comes to us with seven years of previous

experience in education.

The passage of House Bill #77 by the 1959 session of the General Court of New Hampshire established such requirements for the approval of a High School that Haverhill Academy could be approved as such by the State Department of Education. To be approved as a COMPREHENSIVE HIGH SCHOOL a school must meet all requirements set forth in the publication "Minimum Standards and Recommended Practices for New Hampshire Secondary Schools, Grades 9-12." The standards were originally adopted by the State Board on March 25, 1957 and re-adopted on September 21, 1959.

To be approved as a HIGH SCHOOL, a school must meet all requirements set forth in said publication except those relating to curriculum. The curriculum of an approved high school must provide at least 20 units of

academic offerings.

Haverhill Academy meets the latter requirements and is one of twelve so Approved Public Secondary Schools in

New Hampshire as of September 1959.

The philosophy of our schools is trying to keep pace with the changing needs of the individual. We can say that it probably takes less than 20 years for a good educational idea to—be accepted by at least half of the public schools of this country. This is an optimistic finding, since Dr. Paul Mort, in studies made in 1935-1940, determined that it took nearly 50 years for an educational invention to develop to meet a specific educational need. With new methods of communications, ideas are quickly available to many people.

There is still a long way to go. A lot of us become aware that alertness to needs, desire to experiment to find new solutions, and conscious effort to promote the use of good educational ideas, are essential in reducing the present time lag in education. Let us familiarize ourselves with the necessity of replacing old habits for new ideas.

Long ago, the U. S. accepted the principle of a high school diploma for all, and is now moving into the era of universal college education. Education for all, more than education for a career, has tremendous potentialities.

The interest of the individual members of the school board, the accomplishments of the teachers, and the support of the community are most gratifying to your superintendent.

The reports of Principal Jenkins and Mrs. LaMott, School Nurse, follow to which I wish to direct your attention.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit herewith my thirty-sixth annual report of Haverhill Academy and High School.

The total enrollment to date distributed by classes is as

Five have left school leaving the present enrollment at one hundred eleven. Of the five who have left four have transferred to other schools due to a change in residence.

Nine pupils left school during the school year 1958-59 and four who were in school in June at the close did not return this September. Of the four who did not return in September three transferred to other schools. Of the nine who left during the year none transferred but one of the nine returned in September. The eight who left and whose formal school training is presumably ended represents approximately 7½% of the total enrollment. This is a relatively low rate of drop-out.

The thirty-seven enrolled in the straight college preparatory courses represent a decided increase over recent years and is in keeping with general trend of the past three or four years through out the country as a whole.

The X-Country team won the State Class S championship for the second consecutive year and the baseball team won the runner-up spot in the State championship along

with the League Trophy.

The generous appropriation by the School District for support of the activity program has made it unnecessary to levy a tax, as in the past, to carry on the program. Money now raised by the several classes is deposited to their accounts and used to help defray the expenses of their class trips. The senior class account has a present balance of \$406.34.

A new piano has been purchased for the music department and a new automatic duplicating machine from income

from the trust funds.

The school has been approved by the State Department of Education as an "Approved High School" as opposed to an "Approved Comprehensive High School." To meet the requirements of the latter type of approval, we shall have to offer at least three more units in the practical arts area. In order to do this the school plant will have to be enlarged. And even if no further consideration is to be given to meeting the requirements for an "Approved Comprehensive High School," the problem of too little space for our present enrollment still exists. There is little or no indication that the current enrollment will decrease and very substantial evidence that it will increase. Something has to be done. What?

For Year Ending December 31, 1959

The State Public Health Nurse made home visits to babies, preschools and adults upon request. This type of service could be much improved and provide more health instructions and services to your people if a *local* Public Health Nurse was employed. Investment in Public Health pays the highest dividends for healthy, active and happy citizens.

A Well-Child Conference was held at the V.F.W. Hall in No. Haverhill March 26th, April 14th and May 14th.

19 physical examinations were given by the physician 153 immunizations for polio, whooping cough, diphtheria, tetanus and smallpox were given. These also included the booster shots.

Two adult polio, vaccine clinics were held. One June 9th and July 7th.

305 people received 1st, 2nd and 3rd polio vaccine shots. A third clinic will be held in February 1960. At that time those who have received their 3rd shot over a year ago will be able to receive the 4th booster shot.

The State X-ray Mobile also took chest X-rays in Woodsville and in No. Haverhill for adults over 30 years of age.

These clinics were conducted by the State Health Dept., sponsored and assisted by the Woodsville V.F.W. Aux., Girl's Club in No. Haverhill, Lend-A-Hand Club, Haverhill, Grange in Pike and the Graduate Nurses Club.

My sincere thanks to all for the cooperation and as-

sistance received.

Gentlemen:

Presently your Board and the local Budget Committee will be engaged in the preparation of the 1960 Town Warrant and Budget. Therefore, I wish to recommend that the sum of \$200.00 be included in both documents for continuing White Pine Blister Rust Control in cooperation with the Forestry and Recreation Commission.

The means by which the need of control measures are determined in any town, for any season, are as follows:

Following the working of pine areas, their location is plotted upon town maps, and the acreage and number of currant or gooseberry bushes—(known as Ribes)—destroyed are recorded on permanent forms. From such basic data, supplemented by field examinations, a decision can be arrived at as to when future work is required. Special attention is given lands cut over five or more years previously since logging operations or blowdown cause soil disturbances which often result in the re-growth of Ribes.

Owing to white pine being such a prolific seeder, and since it thrives so readily upon a variety of soils, excellent reproduction of this species very generally takes place following logging or other disturbances. Thus, if both Hosts—(pine and Ribes)—develop together, new areas of infection are bound to occur. With the continued high production demand for white pine lumber, cooperage and many other forest products, the need for establishing, developing and protecting these younger stands should be evident to all far-sighted citizens.

Control of the rust is moving forward at an encouraging rate. We are pleased to report that 163 towns and cities participating in this project now have this serious disease well under control. We are looking forward to the time when this status will be enjoyed by all towns, and to the end that we may replace yearly appropriation recommendations with a minimum amount, and at infrequent intervals.

REPORT OF CIVIL DEFENSE DIRECTOR

As this is my first Civil Defense Report, I shall try to

make it as brief as possible.

This is a very important part of today's living which is overlooked by a great many people in our town and nation today. Mainly because they do not realize the need and full scope of the program and how it might be called upon to look after the welfare of our community and state.

Many believe that we must have a "Shooting War" before Civil Defense goes to work. This is not so, this is only one facet of the Civil Defense set up. The Civil Defense Authority can be invoked in case of natural disaster, such as floods, hurricanes, explosions, train wrecks, and aircraft accidents, especially bombers such as pass over

our town daily.

At the present time we have a Police Team trained by the State Police and Court Personnel, members of which work with the local Department for further experience one night each week without cost to the town. We also have a Radiological Team trained by the state and equipped with the latest devices for measuring fallout.

We have been able to secure some equipment through Surplus at a fraction of its original cost so that it might be available in case of emergency. The 2 way radio in the Police Cruiser was secured with C.D. matching funds which

saved the town a substantial sum.

A few of the projects to be developed are, Rescue Squads, Welfare and Housing Committee and Communications.
