

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Hebron on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will raise for maintenance of town highways and bridges and make appropriations for same.

4. To see if the town will raise \$50 for Old Home Day and make appropriations for same.

5. To see what sum of money the town will raise for State Aid Maintenance, Trunk Line Maintenance, and make appropriations for same.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100 to be used for drawing out river gravel to be used when needed on roads and make appropriations for same.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise \$250 annually for preaching in Union Congregational Church and make appropriations for same.

8. To see if the town will vote to pay \$2.50 for man, \$5.50 for team and man, \$8 for truck.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and the Citizens of Hebron:

I have the honor to present my fourth annual school report. As your school executive I share with the school board a certain amount of responsibility and authority in directing your schools.

Last fall our two schools opened with a membership of thirty-four pupils. Miss Nickles returned to the school at East Hebron. Miss Madeleine Creamer, a teacher with a number of years of successful experience was engaged for the village school. It goes without saving that the success of any school is to a greater extent than anything else due to the type of teachers who teach our schools. A teacher's success is also dependent upon the community. It is not for the best interests of your school system to have a complete turnover of teachers every year. For the good of their children the parents should so cooperate with the schools as to help the teachers make good. A sympathetic and intelligent attitude on the part of the parents toward school problems is a great asset. First hand knowledge concerning the schools is superior to hearsay, and to the reports of immature children.

The interest which has been taken in the improvement of the schoolhouses is commendable. We have electric lights in the two schools. Interior and exterior improvements have been made. The fence at East Hebron is a great protection to the children playing so near the state road. It is well to still keep in mind the need of adjustable desks and seats, hardwood floors, more blackboards, and sanitary toilets. The school rooms are the workshops of our children. There ambition is stirred, ideals are stimulated, and the keys which open the door to opportunity are forged. With this in mind let us not hesitate to improve our children's opportunities so as to get them ready for present day complex living.

I regret to report that three out of the five pupils who entered high school last fall have dropped out. A high school enducation at the present time is a minimum requirement for intelligent citizenship. The graduates of our elementary schools should be so encouraged and inspired as to make them desirous of attending high school to the point of graduation. It is my opinion that if free transportation to high school could be made possible more of the young people of Hebron would avail themselves of secondary education. This is an instance where public spirited citizens of means could help materially. Hebron needs educated men and women. We have intelligent citizens in Hebron with whose interest this problem can be solved. Here is the challenge.

The greatest events of the year in our schools are the annual prize-speaking contest, and graduation. The interest which has been shown during the past two years leads us to believe that the two customs have now become permanent institutions. Such exercises cannot help giving our young people the feeling of worthy accomplishment, and perhaps a determination to further achievement. Let us look forward to next June with pleasant expectation.
