THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County to Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Town meeting will be recessed for School meeting.

The articles in the warrant will be taken up at 10:00 o'clock a. m., and the polls will be closed at 5:00 p. m.

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other committees.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.

5. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings and town trucks.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward paying its indebtedness or take any action relative thereto.

13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

14. To see what action the town will vote to take to prevent the spread of White Pine Blister Rust, raise money for the same or take any action relative thereto.

15. To see if the town will accept State Aid for construction of Class V Roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$922.70.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to provide for additional fire protection, watchmen, additional police protection and additional health protection, which may be needed for the benefit of the citizens of the town, due to the war emergency; or take any action relative thereto.

17. To see what action the town will take toward renewing its contract with the Public Service Co. of New Hampshire for street lighting, or take any action relative thereto.

18. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT

The epidemic of Scarlet Fever that started late last year continued through the winter months. In February there was an increase in the number of new cases. After consulting with the School authorities we deemed it advisable to close the Schools for two weeks.

During this time the School buildings were fumigated with a powerful disinfectant.

It was April 1 before the last case was released.

No further cases appeared until November 15. Then there were four cases in one family. Fortunately no other case developed.

Whooping cough and grippe have been very prevalent.

I have sent twelve samples of milk and cream also four samples of water from the Town supply to the State Laboratory for analysis. Reports satisfactory.

I have investigated all complaints and for the most part have remedied same.

Report of Tucker Free Library for year ending Jan. 31, 1943.

At that time there were four trustees, Henry A. Emerson, L. W. Cogswell, Walter A. Connor, Mrs. Jennie N. Dodge. The next year, I think, Rev. T. C. H. Bouton was added to the number; then later, Mrs. M. Marion Cole. From then to the present time there have been six on the board.

Mr. Walter A. Connor, who passed on last month was the last one of the original board. He served as secretary for most of this time, and may be all of the time; as caretaker of the building for several years, until failing health compelled him to give up the work.

We feel that the Library as well as the community has sustained a very real loss in the passing of Mr. Connor. His conscientious interest and unflinching care in and for the library never flagged in the forty years he served on the board of Trustees. We mourn his passing and shall miss his kindly presence, and we extend our heartfelt sympathy to his family.

Mr. E. M. Cogswell left a pleasing memorial in the beautiful evergreen trees and shrubs he had placed on the grounds around the library. We shall re-

member him as one interested in the good of and attractiveness of the Library.

Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Kelly gave us ten books besides a set of twelve of Stoddard's illustrated lectures, which the recent changes caused by the war has made more valuable than ever. Also Mrs. Kelly's sister, Miss Florence Bissell of Middletown, R. I., sent us several books of very high character. Two of these are for young people and are especially fine.

Mr. Harry B. Preston has sent us many fine books to add to the supply.

Miss Helen Connelly gave us twelve books and Miss Mandell four, Mrs. Pickering one, John L. Coombs three books, W. C. Goss two very old books, one dated 1822, another "The School of Good Manners" 1802. Miss Jennie Hussey sent us a volume of poetry etc., in which there are two of Miss Hussey's own compositions. We have been fortunate in having so many donations of fine books, for due to the smaller income from the Library endowment and a large expense for repairs to the roof of the building, there has been less money available for the purchase of new books, and this may continue for the next year, so it has been suggested by the trustees that citizens donate any readable books from their personal collections which they would like to give to the Library. I might say we have the promise of six already on this suggestion. If the voters should be disposed to raise even one hundred dollars towards new books, we feel sure it would be money well invested.

However we thank sincerely every one who has already helped out in this way. Mr. Henry Cogswell and several others have contributed magazines for the reading room table, and someone has given us a

six months' subscription to the Christian Science Monitor. Mrs. George H. Fitts of Framingham, Mass., sent a year's subscription to "The National Humane Review" in memory of her aunt the late Edna Dean Proctor. We are all interested to make the best use of the Library and make it useful to every one in town.

The above table shows that the schools of the village lost 5 half-days which were not made up. The reason for this was the closing of school on account of scarlet fever. Quaker Street school lost only 2 half-days. The total number of half days lost in all the schools was considerably increased over last year.

The total number of pupils registered was 267 of whom four were tuition pupils from Bradford. This shows that the number of pupils residing in the district and attending public school was 263.

There was a decrease in the percent of attendance and an increase in the amount of tardiness. We hope for a better record next year. The decrease in the average membership of the schools will probably be greater in 1942-43, as many people have left the district to engage in defense industries. On account of the smaller number of pupils the number of teachers at the Central School was reduced to four for 1942-43. In the high school, the position left vacant by resignation of Mr. Smith at the end of the school year, was not filled. The number of teachers in this building was reduced to six for 1942-43. The manual training work formerly taught by Mr. Smith has been taken over by Mr. Boutelle. Half of the federal-aid course formerly taught by Mr. Boutelle was dropped. This of course results in the loss of several hundred dollars of federal aid.

Since May our teachers have assisted in the O.P.A. rationing of sugar, gasoline and fuel oil by registering consumers in this district. School as usual is as impossible as business or farming as usual. Changes also have to be made in our curriculum not only to permit pupils to go out for farm work during regular school hours, but subjects have to be changed

to meet the specific need of young men and women for aeronautics, mathematics and other practical training. Many of these changes will doubtless be in force for some time to come, or as long as there are labor shortages in industry and agriculture, and high school boys are destined for immediate service in the armed forces.

TEACHERS' SALARIES

For the school year 1943-44, for which appropriations will be made at the 1943 March meeting, it will be necessary to provide substantial amounts for increasing teachers' salaries. Otherwise our teachers, particularly our best teachers, will seek better paid positions. There will be fewer and poorer teachers to take their places. The district was particularly fortunate last summer in losing only two teachers whose positions had to be filled. Other schools in the supervisory union lost a high percentage. School boards will be wise to contract early with their teachers at a substantial increase in salaries. Under present conditions a \$50 raise does not greatly attract teachers whose salaries are low. Salaries of beginning women elementary teachers will probably be at least \$1,000. Very few will be available at the Teachers' Colleges even at that. Some of the cities and larger towns have already made general increases in the salaries of their regular teachers. Practically all our teachers who left last year went to better paid teaching positions in this state. None to our knowledge left to go into war defense work.

The most important factor in the education of our pupils is the teacher. Though we may feel that we

must cut expenses on account of rising taxes, the salary of the teacher is not the item to be reduced this year. Every effort should be made to retain our best teachers.
