# TOWN WARRANT



## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Child's Opera House in said town on Tuesday the ninth day of March next at ten of the clock in the forenoon to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustees of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers herefore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, Community Building, appropriations for street lights and all current expenses of the town and such amounts as may be necessary to apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges culverts and sidewalks.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for Memorial Day purposes.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 to be applied upon the account of the Hillsboro District Nursing Association.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town and in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding one-hundredth of one per cent ( $1/100$  of 1%) of the assessed valuation for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association, the sum of \$272.00.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$60.00 for the care and maintenance of the Town Clock, so-called, on Smith Memorial Church.

Article 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting, and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to appoint a Zoning Commission under the provisions of Section 55, Chapter 51 of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the support of band concerts for the coming season.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$200.00 to be used for the care and maintenance of Grimes Filed.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise the Highway Agent's salary from \$2,200.00 to \$2,800.00 per year.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to raise the salary of the Chief of Police from \$2,200.00 to \$2,500.00 per year.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700 for the salary of an extra police officer for four months in the summer, said officer to be hired by the Chief of Police.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of not less than \$600.00 and not more than \$1,000.00 for the purpose of procuring and establishing a monument or testimonial to the citizens of Hillsborough, N. H., who served in World War II.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the support of the Fuller Public Library.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

It is a pleasure to herewith submit my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Truant Officer: Mr. Andrew Sargent.

School Nurse: Mrs. Anna Bailey.

Teachers: Mrs. Grace Crane, Upper Village School; Miss Gertrude Morrison, Lower Village School; Miss Susan Pierce, Flat School; Mrs. Edna Weiss, Center School.

### General Report

It has been said that the degree to which a person is educated is measured by his ability to think and act wisely. Education for the child should offer him the opportunity to work with his hands, using all kinds of materials and equipment; to develop skills that will make him efficient in earning a living and in getting along with others; to have a hobby and ride it; to have the time to play and to use it wisely; to demonstrate good health in his own habits of living; to appreciate and to enjoy art, music, and literature in an active way rather than as an onlooker; to have some idea of places and peoples other than his own home and friends, and to know how they influence his own life and to be challenged to work hard at whatever he undertakes.

A survey of the local program reveals that we have been making some progress towards many of these goals. The teachers have tried hard to give each boy and girl all the possible educational opportunities available. The School Board has afforded every possible bit of cooperation that could be asked, without any exception.

We have extended somewhat the amount of newer type educational materials available in each school. This is particularly true in the fields of arts and crafts. The schools were well repaired during the summer. Fences were replaced at the Upper Village and Flat Schools which greatly improved the appearance of those school grounds.



Of course, we should be making more rapid and energetic progress towards some kind of new housing for our schools.

A pertinent subject in the warrant calls for a committee to study the purposes and possibilities of a cooperative secondary school somewhere in this area. This opportunity is very important to parents and citizens of this district. It should not be dismissed too lightly because the time is near when districts without High Schools will find their tuition bills increased to include the cost of buildings whether they participate or not.

It has been a pleasure to serve your district during the past year. The splendid cooperation and interest of the School Board in efficient operation of your schools is tribute to the forces of democracy by which you select your members, and to the ideals which we want to instill in our boys and girls.

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## THE GENERAL REPORT

It has been said that there is a purpose, conscious or unconscious, behind every act of the school. In every lesson taught, every new course introduced, every field trip, every basketball practice, every play rehearsal some purpose guides the action and some purpose is served. One of the great difficulties of the school is the fact that its purposes are often not clearly thought through. Only when administrators, teachers, parents, school board members, and even pupils have clear purposes in mind can the school move ahead most effectively and with assurance that it is making

the most of its opportunities. Here in Hillsboro, we have worked to re-examine some of these purposes and establish new ones where needed. However, it is the whole community which builds the purposes of a school. Therefore the more our schools are discussed in the community—the clearer will be established these purposes.

During the last summer it became necessary to appoint a new principal at the Grammar school and Mrs. Louise Murdough was selected. She has served well and with the cooperation of her teachers, has established much better public relations at that school. The building is not adapted to a modern scale of education. The seats and desks are all very old. Most of the teacher's desks are archaic and the needed portable work tables and chairs are non-existent. However, the books are all nearly new and adequate. The teachers are working to overcome all the deficiencies. Many of the teachers are doing considerable group work because in the final analysis, the pupil becomes a citizen to work as part of a group. How well he fits into that group determines whether he becomes a good citizen or a poor one.

At the High School, the most important instructional advantage was gained by the employment of Miss Edna Johnson to work on the English program—trying to unify it into a whole and then to also seriously improve it. Such a program can not be measured immediately. The Guidance program is being quietly but aggressively carried forward by Mr. Bernard. He will report elsewhere on its objectives, but it is the key part in our plan to work on every individual in school to develop his or her talents so that he can make a worthwhile contribution to citizenship. The physical development program has been somewhat expanded to include more pupils in more fields.

At the opening of school the past two years we have administered the Iowa Tests of Educational Development to pupils in the upper grades. The names of the tests and the average points gained in the 1947 testing over the 1946 testing is as follows: Social Studies Background 18, Natural Science Background 16, Correctness in Writing 10, Quantitative Thinking 16, Reading Social Studies 7, Reading Natural Sciences 11, Reading Literature 13, General Vocabulary 19, Average Composite Score on all tests 22, And Uses of Sources of Information 17.

The total points on each scale above is 100, therefore it is significant that there was an average gain on every test

after one year and it is important to note that many of the gains were large, especially the average composite score which showed us a gain, up nearly one fourth of the whole scale. We would be more proud of the results if we hadn't had such a low score in each case, back in 1946. With these individualized scores on each pupil, the guidance director can positively help each pupil to overcome his weaknesses and improve his strong points. Likewise it points out avenues of teaching which need strengthening.

This past year we have been forced to raise salaries somewhat in relation to other schools. Excerpts from a recent State Salary Survey for the current year, done by the State Board of Education, follows:

The above tables merely illustrate that our salaries are generally very conservative. I have tried to select towns with conditions of population most nearly like ours.

Another item which often arouses great interest is that of the cost of High School Instruction. Using the same High Schools as in the above table, we offer the following figures compiled by the State Board of Education for 1946—

The above chart merely points out that our costs were conservative and not far out of line with those of similar schools.

In our new budget we have made no allowances for Capital improvements. The stage in the auditorium at the High School is very poor. The seating capacity is poor for athletic contests. The enclosures are too open and meet few standards of a physical education classroom. The science laboratory is in bad need of being equipped with suitable benches. Half the seats and desks should be replaced with larger ones at an early date. These are all needs which we honestly feel should not be attempted this year. But they are real needs which must be met soon if Hillsboro wants to maintain suitable standards of school housing. Since such necessary improvements might easily cost well over twenty-five thousand dollars, it may pay to give careful consideration to the study of the currently discussed Cooperative School District.

The School Board has carefully studied the matter of fire insurance on the two schools. At the present time we have two buildings each insured for half their value. It seems important to correct this coverage at the annual meeting.

The proposed budget reflects some economies over last year's tax request due to larger anticipated income from tuitions. Without these tuitions our school would be small and our offerings fewer. We feel however that the other Districts are willing to pay a fair share of the costs. We have no reason to believe that school costs will drop any

faster than any others and the budget generally is meant to hold the present line although salary increasements, will have to be made in order to hold teachers.

In conclusion, I extend thanks to the School Board, Teachers, and Parents for their interested cooperation in promoting a program designed for educational growth.

## HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To the Superintendent of Schools:

On September 8, 1947 Hillsboro High School opened its second year as a fully approved six year High School. The enrollment was 200.

The walls had been redecorated, new shades in many of the rooms. A new oil burner was put in in place of coal. These improvements were followed shortly by new typewriters, new fluorescent lights for the commercial rooms, and sewing machines for the Home Economic department. These improvements are welcomed and are evidence of the effort to make Hillsboro High School as efficient as possible.

The school day has been divided into two sessions with three one hour periods in the morning preceding lunch and one forty and one hour period after lunch. Five periods in place of six as before.

These lengthened periods make possible a better distribution of time and an opportunity for supervised study.

The hot lunches are being continued this year and are patronized very well.

The usual medical examination and tests have been given to all pupils by the school doctors and nurse. The dental clinic has been started and is conducted by the school nurse and dentist.

The Glee Club is again under the direction of Mr. Kenneth Jewett; while the Chorus and Orchestra are under the leadership of Mr. Herman Hill.

The Student Council is functioning and with the faculty committee have taken over the social and recreation programs for the school year.

Under the direction of the newspaper staff with Miss Edna Johnson as advisor, the newspaper is being published at regular intervals.

This year the Iowa Test for Educational Development were given to the three upper classes. This is the second year the tests have been given and the marked improvement in the results tend to show that such a system of testing followed by remedial work is sure to show improvement.

The guidance program has been continued with Mr. Sergius Bernard as director. Through the cooperation of the faculty the individual record of each student has been filed

which gives a rather complete picture of the individual for guidance purposes.

The 16 mm movie projector, the S.V.E. projector and the recently acquired Reflectoscope furnish ample opportunity for all forms of visual education.

The traditional school functions are being held; to date the Freshman reception, the Halloween Sophomore party directed by the sophomores; sponsored through the kindness of William Dumais, chairman of the Legion reception committee. The annual Junior Prom sponsored by the Junior class and the Senior Musical sponsored by the Senior class. Latest the Christmas Party with the entire school in attendance. Santa Claus was present and there was a gift for each individual. Through the courtesy of the Loyal Order of Moose extra presents were given to the seventh and eighth grades, as a part of their program for Christmas celebration. The gifts were greatly appreciated.

An attempt is being made to have the fundamentals in English, Mathematics and Science given consideration in every class.

May I express my sincere thanks to the faculty and pupils who, by their willing cooperation have helped so much in what ever progress has been made.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

The schools of Hillsboro Special School District opened September 8, 1947 with an enrollment of 364 pupils and a full faculty of teachers.

In the High School we have made some much needed alterations and repairs. During the summer vacation the building was thoroughly cleaned and most of the walls and ceilings painted. The oil burning heater was installed, new lights put in the Commercial and Typing rooms, several new typewriters were bought to replace old, wornout machines; three new sewing machines for the Home Economics Room; old alcohol lamps in Chemical Laboratory are being replaced with gas burners; new ventilators put in windows in all the classrooms; electric exit signs at all exits as required by law for safety.

The Elementary School was thoroughly cleaned, all necessary painting done and new roof put on building.

Before making up the budget for the year beginning July 1, 1948, ending June 30, 1949, the Board went through both School Buildings, taking a complete inventory of stock on hand, such as school supplies, textbooks and supplies for janitors. We then made a reasonable estimate of what would be needed for the year 1948—49. We also made an estimate of all repairs and equipment needed.

Robert Matthews and Frank Mosley, custodians, did most of the work inside of buildings during summer vacation.

The Board of Education wishes to extend thanks to Supt. McCormack, Principals and Teachers for the co-operation in trying to give Hillsboro better schools.
