### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Langdon, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall, in said Langdon, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repair of Highway and Bridges, and make appropriation of the same.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will raise for State Aid Highway Construction, and make appropriation of the same.

Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise for State Aid Maintenance, and make appropriation of the same.

Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will raise for Trunk Line Maintenance, and make appropriation of the same.

Art. 7. To see what action the town will take toward improving the appearance of the Cemeteries, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Art. 8. To elect a Trustee of the Trust Funds for the term of three years.

Art. 9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To elect a delegate to attend the Constitutional Convention to be holden in Concord, in June next.

Art. 11. To allow accounts.

Art. 12. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

### Report of Superintendent of Schools

We respectfully submit this our fourth annual report, being the sixteenth in the series, to the school board and the citizens of the town of Langdon.

We have given below the statistical table usually given which covers the school work to the beginning of this school year. You will notice that we have disregarded

the term as a unit and that the following includes the three terms in the year unit. The new teachers are inserted in connection with their respective position.

The teachers are all new this year. They are graduates of the Keene Normal School, and we are fortunate in securing teachers who take up the work so well and fit into the community activities. You will notice the low average attendance due to the scarlet fever epidemic. In the village about five weeks was lost in the best part of the year. The number of weeks includes these and the same is not considered in the percent of attendance.

The broken condition of the school last year weakened the grades somewhat. The work of the last part of the year and that of this year has redeemed much of the lost work and we have organized the school in the first six grades to conform rather closely to the new state program. More has been done than in the other years we have served you in developing the text books to meet the requirements and, in general, to modernize the schools. The fundamental work seems to be well done and the outlook for the future seems bright.

We hear much of taking out some of the work of the schools to meet the emergencies of the times. The mistake has been made in the countries of our allies in Europe of taking away from the coming generations the legacies of the ages and breaking down those institutions upon which the coming generation must depend when the war is over. Officials who have charge of educational matters in this country warn us of the danger and urge us, in spite of the burdens we have to bear, to do what we can to hold what we have. We must secure good teachers, if we can. The call to other occupations is loud and the remuneration larger for the present than in their present profession. The running expenses of the schools must be larger, if we maintain the schools as they are. With all the dreary prospects before us we must at least continue the legitimate work of the schools in the present crisis.

We expect to use the schools as a means to reach the homes and bring to these homes the calls of the nation and the state for aid, if it is needed, and to spread the information which the departments of the government which have charge of the conservation of our supplies and the production during the coming summer entrust to us. As this information and the calls for aid may we have the co-operation of the citizens of Langdon in making the work a success. Each pupil should have a garden this year. It should have in it something which has food value and as far as possible, the crops which can be used in the coming winter. If the work is with the county club workers it will be as well, but we expect to have the teachers take a large share of the work in the spring in stimulating the children to greater activity in the work of production and in the actual supervision of their work. We hope this is no fad

but a sincere desire to do more to make the schools do something to meet the needs of the times and to have the children feel that they have a work to do at this time. We shall bring to the teachers the materials and try to instruct them in the movements as they come from time to time. We hope to maintain as high a standard as possible in the essentials and to look out for the educational welfare of the children under our supervision.

Another problem we have to face is the change of the school year. The money raised at the next school meeting is to be used for the schools of the town for the school year beginning Sept. 1st. 1918 and ending Aug. 31st. 1919. If the balance is not large enough to finish the present school year there should be, according to the new law, an appropriation to cover that time. It looks as though the funds could be raised on the notes of the town and thus not make the whole burden of taxes come at one time. The report of the finances of the school district here given by your board is to show the financial condition of the district that you may provide for the future intelligently. The books must be kept open until Sept. 1st. 1918 and the report then made to the state will be that printed in the report next year. This report will contain two appropriations and the expenditures from Feb. 15th. 1917 to Sept. 1st. 1918. There will be another school meeting in the spring of 1919, when another appropriation can be made but it will still continue a deficiency unless some way is provided for funds to cover the period from the first of February until the last of August, providing there is not a balance sufficient for this need.

We wish to thank the people of Langdon for their

cooperation in the work of the year. The teachers have done much to make the schools what they are and deserve your support. The teachers and the school board have given me loyal support. We hope that we have been able to aid them and that the schools of Langdon may meet the needs of the times and develop each year as we meet new problems and new conditions.
