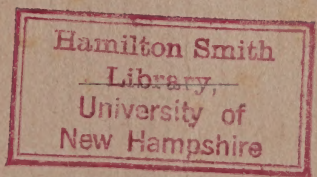

## School Report.

It gives me great pleasure to be able to report this as a more profitable year than last for the schools in a majority of cases. For this improvement I have to thank the teachers for their untiring efforts to improve and elevate the same. I am satisfied that the first and most essential thing for a successful school is a good teacher, one well qualified and adapted to the work, then if the parents do their duty, causing regular and prompt attendance, assisting and supporting the teacher in maintaining good order, there can be no such thing as failure. It is not every good girl or boy, however well qualified they may be, that can keep a good school, and my advice to those who are not reasonably well satisfied with their success, as a teacher, is to try some other occupation. I do not consider it anything against a person because they cannot make a success of teaching, but it is against the interests of the schools if such teachers are employed. There is a scarcity of the best of teachers.

### SALMON HOLE.

There have been three terms of school here the past year, taught by Miss Bertha Hildreth. This has been a very profitable year for this school; it has been a model in every respect. The class in primary arithmetic is entitled to special notice—don't think they can be beat in the State.

### NORTH LISBON.

Spring term, taught by Mrs. H. F. Howe with good improvement and general satisfaction. Fall term, by Miss Edna L. Little. Miss Little is a teacher of much energy and perseverance and the school made excellent improvement under her care. Winter term, by Sadie J. Cobleigh. Miss Cobleigh is an earnest, faithful teacher, and notwithstanding there was an element of discord, on account of prejudice, as I understand, the school made an excellent showing at the closing examination.

## WALKER HILL.

Taught the entire year by Nellie Lehane. This has been a very profitable year for this school. Miss Lehane has fully sustained her former reputation as one of the best of teachers. The primary class in arithmetic here deserve special notice, many of them being able to repeat the multiplication table nearly to the twenties.

## MINK POND.

Spring and fall term taught by Miss Hattie C. Poor. Miss Poor is a fine disciplinarian and teacher. The school made excellent progress and could well be termed a model. Winter term, by Mary A. Whitcher. The good work so well begun by Miss Poor was successfully carried out by Miss Whitcher.

## GOODNOW.

Miss Ida Gordon had charge of the spring term, giving good satisfaction and making much progress. Fall and winter terms by Hattie E. Dow. Miss Dow seems to have an excellent faculty for governing and instructing children and the school made extra progress under her direction. She has attended the Normal School.

## STREETER.

Three terms, taught by Mrs. Jennie W. Kendell, a teacher of much experience. This has been a very profitable year for this school. Good order and good lessons make a good school every time.



## CENTRE.

Spring term, taught by Miss Maud C. Blake. Miss Blake seems to be well adapted to teaching and I am glad to learn that she is attending the Normal School, and wish others who intend to teach would go and do likewise. I predict a success for her as a teacher. The school though small was highly satisfactory. Fall term, by Hattie C. Vance, did good work and was creditable to school and teacher. Winter term, by Miss Gertie I. Beane. This term, at its commencement, gave promise of success, and I think it was. Miss Beane was taken sick and the last two weeks were taught by Miss Florence Hildreth, a pupil of the school. The school made a good showing at its close under the direction of Miss Hildreth, and I have no doubt good progress was made the entire term.

## COLE.

Two terms, taught by Miss Minnie M. Bowles. This school made good progress and was highly satisfactory to the parents.

## GEORGEVILLE.

Spring term, taught by Miss Lavira M. Noyes. The school made good progress and was quite orderly. I think Miss Noyes would make an excellent teacher if it was not for the fact that she labors under a natural disadvantage. Fall term by Miss Marion A. Stevens, with a good degree of improvement.
