TOWN MEETING WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, in said State,
qualified to vote in town affairs:—*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 9th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:—

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Road Agents.

Article 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for town officers' salaries, for town officers' expenses, for election and registration expenses, for Municipal Court expenses, for town building maintenance, for the police department, for the health department, for vital statistics, for the Community Center, for miscellaneous expenses, for street lighting, for the Littleton Hospital, for the public library, for town poor, for Memorial Day, for band concerts, for water troughs, for cemeteries, for damages and legal expenses, for payment of the town debt and interest, for the Community Nurse, for the community garden, for the skating rink, and for all other town charges.

Article 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of highways throughout the State in accordance with Chapter 17 of the Laws of New Hampshire for 1935, or any amendments thereto, or an allotment for expenditure of funds upon its town highways.

Article 4. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 5. To see what action the town will take relative to creating and completing public projects, for the purpose of providing employment for its citizens, and paying the cost of the same.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen of the town to apply for, accept and use, monies provided by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, for public works, relief, unemployment, or otherwise, and do all things required by the Federal Government, or State of New Hampshire, to obtain the same.

Article 6 (a) To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed \$500.00, to be paid as its share of the expense of carrying on an advertising and other beneficial program for the section of the State known as the Mountain Region, in co-operation with the State of New Hampshire and other towns in said Region, to be expended under the direction of the Board of Selectmen.

Article 6 (b) To see if the town will vote to complete the re-construction of the public highway, known as the Littleton-Monroe Road, in co-operation with the State of New Hampshire, and to borrow on the credit of the Town sufficient monies to pay its share of the same, and issue its serial notes for such sum or sums, all in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire and the vote of the town.

Article 7. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to discontinue as a public highway, a section of the highway known as South Littleton Crossing, from the southeasterly side of the location of the Boston and Maine Railroad to the southeasterly bank of the Ammonoosuc River in the town of Littleton, and so far as it legally may, do all other things necessary to complete the discontinuance of said section of said way.

Article 9. To take the sense of the qualified voters upon the following question:—"Is it expedient to revise the constitution."

Article 10. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 11. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 12. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

To the Citizens of Littleton:

We herewith submit the annual school report. The report includes treasurer's report for the fiscal year July 1, 1935 to June 30, 1936 with an itemized statement of expenditures for that year; the budget for the present school year and for the next year; statement of estimated receipts for these two years; and written reports by the superintendent of schools and by the headmaster of the high school.

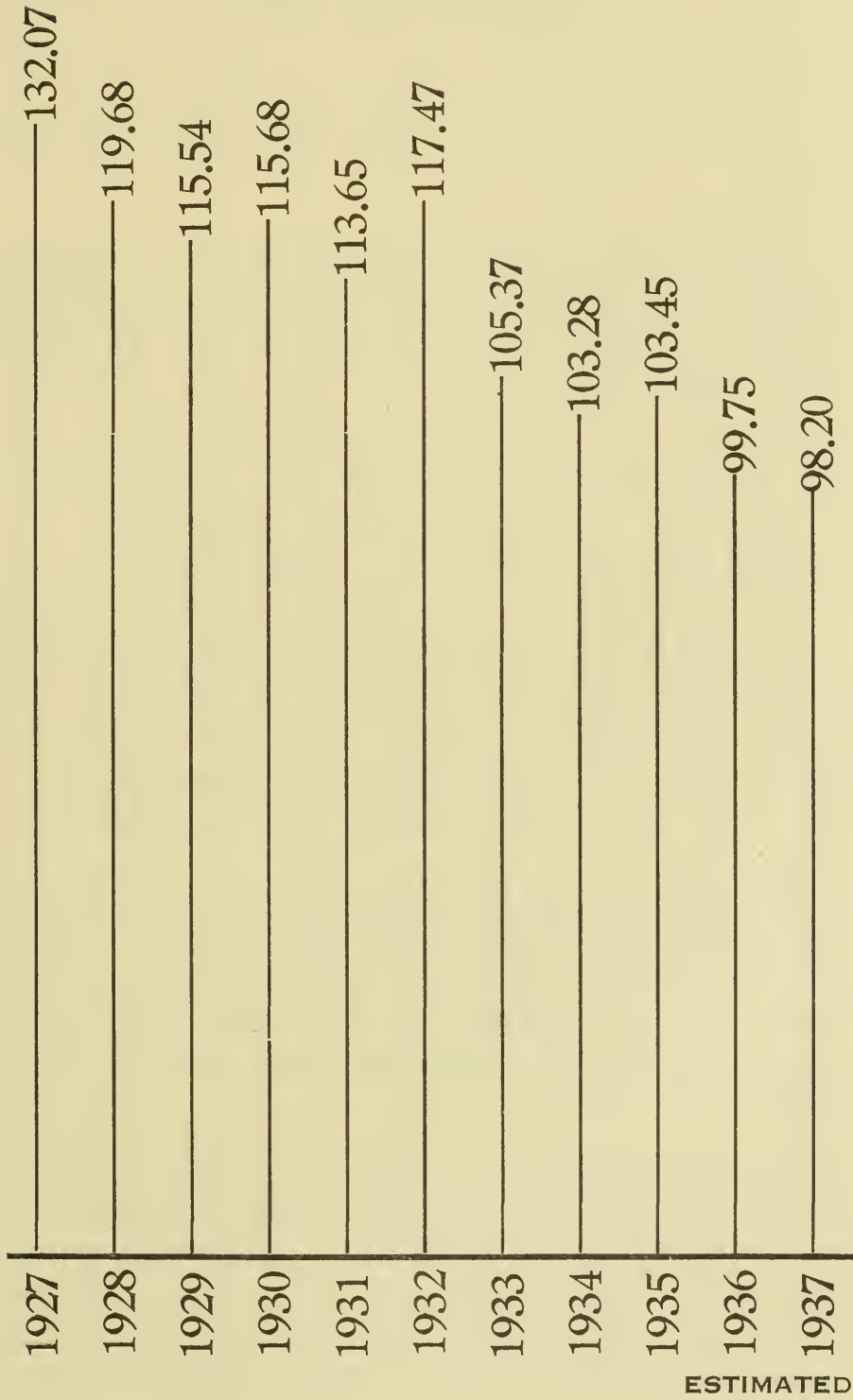
The charts below show that the cost per pupil has decreased materially during the past eleven years. For the school year ending in June 1927 the total payments were \$70,930.00 and the average membership was 537 pupils. The cost per pupil was \$132.08. This year the total expenditures will be approximately \$66,970.00, with an average membership estimated at 685, making a per pupil cost of \$98.20. Deducting fixed charges, including bonds, interest, insurance and per capita tax, the cost per pupil eleven years ago was \$92.83, and this year the cost will be approximately \$78.00. It is true that a comparison of figures eleven years apart for two single years sometimes is misleading. The first six years of the period compared with the last five show the same results, a decided drop in the cost per pupil.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board:

I herewith submit the annual report relative to your schools:

The attendance statistics for this year show the enrollment in the high school building to be 330, in the Kilburn building 219, and in the Apthorp building 185. The enrollment by grades is as follows:

These figures show that the increase in total enrollment during the decade has been nearly 18%, while in the senior high school the increase has been 50%. In addition to the above we provide instruction in woodworking and in home economics for the seventh and eighth grade pupils in the St. Rose of Lima school.

Last year I called your attention to the need of additional room in the high school building. With an enrollment as large this year, and the expectation of a still larger number next year, the need is as great now as a year ago. We have in the high school building two rooms used for seventh and eighth grade pupils—80 desks, 79 pupils enrolled, 75 present

in January. We have six home rooms for senior high pupils (rooms equipped with pupil desks)—245 pupil desks, 265 pupils enrolled—and a January membership of 252. Fortunately we have one large room in which additional chairs can be placed. This room, however, is too crowded most periods of the day for the best study conditions.

In last year's report I suggested an addition to the Kilburn building. Such an addition would provide room for two classrooms and additional shop room for the mechanic arts department. The seventh grade, and if necessary later, the eighth grade could be moved from the high school building. The mechanic arts course now extends only through the eleventh grade. Boys pursuing that program have to elect some other subject during their senior year. The shop is in use every period of the day. The instructor has to have two classes at work some periods, and the mechanical drawing has to be taught by other instructors in a different room. With the addition of a basement room in the Kilburn building short courses in shop mechanics and auto mechanics could be introduced, and the entire mechanic arts program could be reorganized on a more satisfactory basis. At present 134 boys are enrolled in this department. All of the senior high school courses in this department require 10 forty minute periods. I have discussed this proposed addition to the Kilburn building with you, with other school men, with insurance agents, and with some townspeople. The services of a part time teacher in addition to cost of construction and equipment would be required. A part time teacher will be required in the high school, in any case, if the enrollment continues to grow. The addition can probably be constructed and well equipped at an expense of \$10,000.00 or less. If bonds or serial notes could be issued, the taxation burden would not be great in any one year.

The high school building bonds are now reduced to \$72,000.00. The buildings have been maintained in good condition. The appropriation required for the past three or four years has been less than for the years immediately preceding in spite of the fact that the enrollment and average membership have increased. Consequently, the cost per pupil has decreased as shown by the charts.

During the past year the interior of the Apthorp building has been painted, the desks have been refinished, weather strips have been placed on the windows in four rooms of the high school building and in two rooms of the Kilburn building, shrubbery has been set out on the high school grounds, and many minor repairs have been made at the high school and Kilburn buildings.

The expenditure for new equipment has been larger than usual during the past year. Sound equipment has been installed in the high school auditorium, stage scenery has been purchased, a lathe has been bought for the mechanic arts department and a sewing machine for the home economics department, some physics equipment has been added and more reference books and teaching materials than usual have been purchased. New pupil desks were purchased for one room at the Kilburn building, and some new chairs were purchased for the Apthorp building. Window shades were replaced in one room at Kilburn, and many shades in the high school building were repaired.

The most immediate need in building improvements is the shingling of the Kilburn building. A new fence should be built around part of the grounds at Apthorp, and the tennis court there should be improved and made available for use.

The Apthorp building has two rooms not used at present. These rooms can be made into an auditorium approximately 69 feet by 30 feet, large enough to accommodate 200 persons

or more for school assemblies or community programs. This alteration could be made and the room equipped with stage and furniture at an estimated cost of less than \$2,000.00. The need for this may not be so great as for the extension to the Kilburn building to relieve the crowded condition in the high school, but it is a project worthy of most careful consideration in the near future.

During the past two years the high school auditorium has been painted, the heating has been improved, stage scenery and window curtains have been added, and sound equipment has been installed. Motion picture equipment should be purchased in order to make the most use of this room. Visual instruction is important. Educational films of value in many departments of study can now be secured. With over 300 pupils in the high school grades in this building the need is keenly realized. Many school systems have radio equipment installed in the classrooms of their buildings. In Littleton we have a radio-victrola which is moved about in the high school building at times. The installation of more complete radio equipment for classroom use is important when funds are available.

New pupil desks should be bought for one or two rooms at the Kilburn building. Four of the rooms have been equipped with modern adjustable desks. If the movable type of pupil desk should be purchased the first and second grades could be equipped with it at only a little more cost than that of one of the higher grades with the type previously purchased. Our plan has been to equip one room a year.

You have provided for medical inspection of all pupils once each year and for frequent health inspection by the community nurse. This service costs the district about \$450.00. Miss Bryant and Dr. Page show a keen interest in all health problems. Miss Bryant visits the school often and consults

with Dr. Page relative to clinics and special cases. For several years she has arranged for a tag day to raise money for dentistry, for providing classes for pupils, and for throat operations for the pupils in Littleton and Bethlehem. Interested organizations and persons have made contributions for these purposes. A study of health statistics over a period of years shows that good results have been attained.

About sixty pupils enter our first grade in the Kilburn and Apthorp buildings each year, and some who have moved here from other towns enter other grades. Many of these have had no corrective work. Dentistry is a recurring need. The number of pupils 10% underweight has been especially large for the past four or five years. To apply corrective treatment to all cases has been impossible with the limited funds available. Whether the school district should contribute more money for health work is a topic worthy of your consideration. Federal funds have been available for milk and for noon lunches as part of the New Deal program for two or three years previous to this year. The American Legion and the Association of Business and Professional Women have contributed for these purposes. This year no federal money is available. The noon lunch is being continued but no milk has been provided to date.

The school system lost five efficient teachers in Headmaster Mattoon, Mr. Palmer, Miss Stapleton, Miss Shea and Miss Stearns. They held key positions in the organization. It was indeed difficult to fill the vacancies. Mr. Whitney F. Parker, for eight years headmaster of Hartford Academy at White River Junction, Vt., was secured for the headmastership. Mr. Parker holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Vermont, and a master's degree from Columbia University. Mr. James E. Stonier was selected to teach science and to coach the boys' athletic teams. He has a bachelor's degree from Bates and has had several summer school courses

in physical education and in science. Miss Alice L. Heald, a graduate of Middlebury College with three years' teaching experience in Vermont, was selected to teach Latin and French. At the Apthorp School Miss Blanche Cree succeeded Miss Shea as principal of the building and as teacher in the junior high room. Miss Dorothy B. O'Neill, a Plymouth graduate with two years of experience in Dalton, was selected to teach in the fifth and sixth grades. Miss Beatrice Nichols, a Plymouth graduate with nine years of experience in Jefferson and Colebrook, was selected to succeed Miss Stearns in the third grade in the Kilburn School. All of these teachers are doing well in their new positions.

The New Hampshire State Teachers' Association held its annual convention in Littleton, October 8 and 9. Littleton is the smallest town in the state to entertain this association within my memory. Other meeting places have been Concord, Manchester, Laconia and Claremont. At least 1,600 teachers were present on Thursday, and probably 2,000 on Friday. That the officers of this association were glad to return to Littleton within a decade of its first meeting here was a real tribute to your hospitality and your ability to care for its needs. Because of my official duties as president in 1929 I knew something of the great effort made by Secretary Richardson of the Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Barrett, Mr. Vaughan and many others in securing the results attained. Improved hotel and restaurant accommodations, improved streets and larger parking places made it possible to care for an even larger convention crowd with no greater effort this year. The installation of sound equipment made the high school auditorium a satisfactory convention hall for the accommodation of over 1,000 people. Mr. J. B. Eames generously gave the use of the theatre for the other large gathering.

The town building, community house, Masonic Temple, and several of the churches were made available for our use.

The officers of the Chamber of Commerce, school board members, town officials and many citizens gave of their time and facilities to make this convention a success. Mr. James Lytle, acting secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, Headmaster Parker, and several of the teachers spent many hours in carrying out the convention plans. The following letter from the executive committee of the association is a pleasing tribute to Littleton's hospitality:

"The executive board wishes to go on record as desirous of expressing its appreciation to the Chamber of Commerce and to the people of Littleton, for the notable community spirit toward the teachers and toward the convention. The remarkable hospitality made possible the efficient handling of all details and the excellent care taken of the guests."

I wish to thank you for your interest and cooperation in all phases of the school work during the past year.

Headmaster's Report

To the Superintendent of Schools:

In response to your request for a report of the high school, I present the following composite.

Attendance has been above 95% with tardiness running very high among a few pupils who live so near the school that there is no excuse for such tardiness.

A fine spirit of cooperation between teachers and parents has been helpful in understanding and assisting many pupils. This is very encouraging for there must be insistence on intensive home study in order that the advantages which the school offers may be most fully realized. Lack of home study makes for a superficial understanding of class room work.

The class schedule has been changed from a seven to an eight period program. This change makes it more completely possible for all pupils to elect the subjects of their choice.

Following your recommendation relative to the arrangement of pupils in study periods, members of the seventh and eighth grades remain in their home rooms for study instead of going to the main study hall. The main study hall group is also divided, where possible, so that pupils study under supervision of a teacher in whose subjects they need help. However, this has been carried out to a limited extent due to lack of rooms and teacher time.

Shortage of work is still with us and will continue to be for those under 18. The National Youth Administration is continuing to help high school boys and girls over 16 years

of age. Ten pupils are now receiving this aid. Parents are urged to keep their children in school and thus remove them from competition for every available job. Therefore the school is continuing to provide a refuge from the world for every pupil for whom such refuge is desirable irrespective of the educational outcome of his continued schooling.

The school offering has been further enriched to meet the varied needs by adding general mathematics as a fourth year subject in the Mechanic Arts curriculum. Pupils have been placed in classes according to ability wherever divisions in classes could be made and teachers have modified their procedure to care for individual differences and work out suitable adjustments where classes could not be so divided. Today neither the school nor the home expects all pupils to do work equal in amount and quality. Some learn easily, rapidly; others learn at a slow rate and with difficulty. Who can say which is the greater learning? The school aims to offer in so far as possible the best educational opportunity in accordance with aptitude, capacity and interest. Curriculum selection is directed on this basis.

Visual education is one of the most effective methods of instruction. Maps and field trips represent one phase while films and slides such as are available to-day in nearly every school subject can no longer be considered in the class of luxuries. They are a necessity in the learning process for many pupils who are not able to acquire knowledge by the printed page alone. They are valuable for pupils of all levels of ability. A room was built in connection with the auditorium for the purpose of showing just such pictures. A machine should be purchased for this purpose.

There is great demand for the addition of vocational subjects in the high school. In fulfilling this demand there is danger that we overlook the value of the so-called cultural

subjects. It is through these subjects that knowledge and tastes are acquired which enable one to enjoy good music, to learn about the authors who have written the best books and by sampling their writings acquire enjoyment in the best literature.

Music is an essential part of education. Littleton is fortunate in having a well organized program faithfully carried out by competent supervisors in both instrumental and vocal music. The school orchestra participated in the North Country Concert given at the State Teachers' Convention. Mr. Gardner Wentworth received much deserved praise for the excellent program rendered. This reflects honor on the communities represented.

One of the prime objectives of education is to teach people to live with others harmoniously, to make contacts easily and wisely. Every person must learn by doing. He must learn to solve problems by solving his own each day. The school does not assume responsibility which belongs to the church and the home but the school provides supervision for interesting extra-class activities—clubs, teams, class organizations, dramatics—where pupils learn to get along with others in group projects and develop skills and increase their variety of interests. It is through these activities that young people change so that they are identified as educated individuals. Their appearance, speech, and behavior tell of the gradual change which has taken place.

In addition to the present athletic program, physical exercises and games for all would not only contribute to the physical well being of the student body but would offer additional opportunity for citizenship and character training. At present no member of the faculty is free to carry on this work. However, on Saturday mornings a group of pupils from the Apthorp, St. Rose of Lima, and Junior High Schools have

games under Mr. Stonier's supervision. Miss Heald and Mr. Welch have charge of the girls and boys respectively who are interested in outdoor winter sports. The free skating rink so generously provided by the community is a real help in meeting the recreational needs.

The school health officer has given special physical examinations to all participants in the major sports in addition to general examination for all pupils. The follow up work has been effective in correcting defects.

Professional improvement in service of teachers is carried on by teachers' meetings where curriculum problems and methods are reviewed and discussed. Teachers subscribe to one or more professional magazines and are conversant with recent professional books.

In closing I wish to thank the teachers for their loyal support, parents and pupils for their friendly and helpful assistance, and others who have aided the school in its work.

Librarian's Report

To the Board of Trustees of the Littleton Public Library, the annual report of the Librarian is herewith submitted:

In the year 1936 there were published in the United States alone, 10,436 books. How much of this wealth of information, pleasure and enlightenment is available to citizens of a small town many miles from the book centers of the country? With a possible clientel of 4,000, what can a library provide, new and old, on a book budget of \$657.02 or a little less than \$.14 a piece?

If it were necessary to rely entirely on our own resources the result would not be a cause for pride. Busy people coming to this part of the country for recreation and pleasure would rightly consider that they had thereby cut themselves off from the sources of information that they have always taken as a matter of course. What four million taxpayers in New York City can accumulate for the use of all its citizens could not be expected to be provided in a town of two thousand taxpayers.

In the past library year, Littleton citizens and their visitors have had at their disposal 348 new books for recreational reading, supplementary reading in connection with school work, and for reference use. With these books and the resources of five other libraries in the state from which we borrow, and with the permanent collection of some 17,000 books now owned, borrowers have had 15 books a piece; 40,030 books and magazines were lent to 2,637 registered borrowers. Had not the rigors of last winter completely emptied the coal bins, the rate of interest on endowment funds gone down, and the cost of lighting the library increased nearly 30%, the record might have been brighter.

That it is as bright as it is, is due in large measure to the 157 books borrowed from the State Library, Public Library Commission, and other libraries in the state. This number of books added for one month at a time might not mean much in the long run (about one day's circulation) if they were books of average demand. The book fund is used for books of average demand; the 157 books, 5 magazines, 9 pictures borrowed from other libraries represent specific expensive demands that no small library could meet. An electrical engineer requires a book on his subject. Handbooks in these special fields are expensive, \$5.00 or more. To be useful to the expert, they must be up to date, so that this would mean a perennial \$5.00. There is possibly only one person in 4,000 with this interest, but he needs the book just as much as a person of similar interest does who has the resources of a large city library at his disposal. For three or four cents (return postage only) and a one cent post card for the request, the library meets this demand. Miss B is interested in pastel painting. Perhaps this is something that many would like to know about; perhaps it is only a passing whim of Miss B's. Let us borrow the book, and display it when Miss B has finished. If it is of general interest, when we buy the book we shall have spent 5 or 6 cents more than is necessary, but we shall have satisfied Miss B immediately (we cannot buy books one at a time as we borrow them) and we now know definitely that the purchase is justified. Mr. X wants to tinker with a telescope. Are there many amateur telescope makers or tinkerers in Littleton? Probably not, so we borrow and this time do not buy. To run through the inter-library-loan records is a fascinating occupation to anyone interested in a cross section of the interests of a community. The trend toward state and federal subsidizing of local libraries may horrify those who fear encroachment of a central government upon local rights and responsibilities. But it is questionable whether proud independence is a virtue when it means depriving those who happen to live in small communities of

their share in the contributions of their fellow countrymen to civilization. These contributions can only be distributed as books, and not without cost to someone.

The Public Library, unfortunately, in addition to housing the books and satisfying our varied interests, is a Public Building and must not disgrace us in its physical appearance. This means building expenses. The books, unfortunately, will not select, catalog, and keep themselves in order, nor get themselves back and forth to the sources from which we borrow. This means salaries.

Although we take advantage of every method of enlarging the scope of our modest book fund, conditions are not ideal. Even with 28% of the fund spent on the Children's Room collection this year, that collection still leaves much to be desired. An enterprising teacher borrows five books of supplementary material for her class work on prehistoric man. Three months later she is reluctant to part with them, for, being general history, they are still invaluable to her in her work on Greek civilization. We could use ten times the equipment in that class alone, since there are far more than ten teachers having access to the library, not to mention the children, who are expected to get additional material on any subject they are studying. We could expand the whole collection in the Children's Room in the same proportion with profit, and who will not agree that the New Book shelf for adult readers is always practically empty? We could use a good picture, map, and clipping file vigorously. Ours is still in its rather frail infancy. We could draw many more borrowers to our doors if we were open from 9 A. M. to 9 P. M. with no break for lunch and supper hours. We could give more efficient service if we had a telephone, but should need an extra person to attend it. We ought to give mailing service to our rural borrowers. R. F. D. was once considered the rank extravagance that Rural Book Service may now seem

to town dwellers. We could use our second floor more generously for meetings and lectures. We have space, and probably sufficient local interest to house a small museum in one of the upper rooms, had we the funds to provide a person in charge of it.

These are some of our needs and goals. The Library belongs to the town. It is an object of local support, not charity, but it should welcome the interest and support of lay members who see in it a "people's university" whose range and influence extend years beyond those of the public schools. There is a growing interest in "Friends of the Library" groups. In many parts of the country they have played an important part in putting through much needed legislation and in raising library standards. Perhaps the time is ripe for such an organization in Littleton.
