TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of New Ipswich in the
County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to
vote in Town Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said New Ipswich on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock, in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget, to raise as estimated therein the necessary funds to transact the Town's business for the ensuing year.
3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1,200. for a resident physician.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$125.00 for Memorial Day.
6. To see if the Town will vote for State Aid for highways, raise and appropriate necessary money for the same, said joint fund to be expended on the Jaffrey Road extending the State Road through Wilder Village to the Sharon line.
7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
8. To choose one member of the Electric Light Committee for three years.
9. To choose one member of the Trust Fund Committee for three years, and this same Committee to serve as the Spaulding School Fund Committee.
10. To choose a committee of three for Memorial Day.

11. To choose a committee of three for the Baseball Field Committee.

12. To vote whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under laws of 1933, chapter 99, section 22.

13. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue the old road near Ilmer E. Aho house, and accept the new road as built, and give and take title of the same.

14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.

15. To see if the Town will vote to extend the street lights from Highbridge to the Greenville line and raise and appropriate a sum of money for the same, or do anything relating thereto.

16. To see if the Town will vote to install the necessary apparatus for the completion of the fire alarm system, so that it can be operated from the house of F. A. Cushing, and to raise and appropriate money for this purpose, also to elect a Committee of three to superintend the installation.

Report of Electric Light Commissioners

The year of 1933 in the Electric Light Department has given your commissioners another chance to find out whether the new schedule of prices, under which we have been operating for the past two years would produce an increase in consumption of current or not. If you will remember the report of last year (1932) showed that the Electric Light Department bought 12,420 kilowatts more in 1932 than in 1931. During the year of 1933 the Department has bought 109,680 kilowatts. This shows an increase over the year of 1932 of 10,020 kilowatts. This would seem to show that the new schedule had produced an increase in consumption. It would look so on the face of these facts, if this Department had not sold to the two stores in the Centre Village this year (1933) 10,653 kilowatts which shows that this apparent increase was all sold to two customers. It was not spread around generally among many customers. Until financial conditions get more normal it does not seem possible to give this schedule a fair trial.

The Federal Tax on current sold to customers has been repealed since the month of Aug. 1933, so this Department no longer has to figure this tax. Unfortunately a few of our customers have not cleaned that matter up and the department must still bother with it.

In regard to the replacement of our pole lines all that can be said is that our lines are one year older, and the new poles from now on will grow more numerous. The Department must replace the poles on the South side of the Turnpike back of the switch house together with the wiring. A thunder storm last summer evidently did the damage and weakened the structure. A temporary hook-up has been put in and the materials bought to replace that work as soon as Spring comes in.

As to the financial condition of the Department it can only be said that customers seem to find it hard to pay bills of all sorts and this Department has found its customers slow to pay their electric light accounts. Last year's report showed a balance of \$788.95

in unpaid bills. This sum included a charge of \$60.00 to the Town of New Ipswich for the electric service furnished to operate the Fire Siren according to the schedule which was adopted by the town for power service. The board of selectmen were unwilling to pay that charge for 1932 service. That charge still stands on the books of the Electric Light Department. No such charge was made on the books for service in 1933. As of February 1st, 1934 there is due on customers accounts \$1,189.16. This is divided up among 110 customers accounts and means that over 40% of our customers have had trouble paying their bills.

During the year of 1933 the U. S. Census asked this Department to furnish it a very elaborate report of the lighting plant and asked to know the miles of pole line, number and size of transformers, number of kilowatts purchased from the Greenville Electric Light Co., the customers had to be classified into farm, power users, commercial users and house lighting, with number of kilowatts used by each class and the revenue from same. This survey showed that there were 33.38 miles of pole line, 1464 poles and 92 transformers in use. In previous years such reports had only to be estimated, so that this year's report was much more of a task.

The number of customers on the books has not changed materially from last year. The active accounts stay around 260. It seems likely that the customer list will remain at about that figure, until more new lines are built.

During the year one of the poles near the Town Hall had to be replaced on the original installation at the end of the Telephone Co. cable. In making the change caused by the C. W. A. project near the Gibson Four Corners the old poles were in poor shape and the Telephone Co. advised putting in three new treated poles there. This makes an installation of four new poles this year.

In looking over the income from our invested funds it will be noticed that the income has been reduced this year. The Department was notified in June that all interest on checking accounts had been abolished by the order of the U. S. Government. The Savings Department of the Townsend National Bank also reduced its October dividend on the Department account to 3%. The Town of New Ipswich paid up \$1,000.00 on its note, thus leaving the note held by the Department \$2,000.00. Your Commissioners have opened an account for \$2,000.00 with the Mason Village Savings Bank at Greenville, N. H.

The Town of New Ipswich paid up \$1,000.00 on its note as will be seen in the schedule of assets on January 1st, 1934. Your Commissioners have opened an account in the Mason Village Savings Bank, which also appears in the same schedule.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF NEW IPSWICH:

I respectfully submit herewith my eleventh annual report.

SCHOOL ORGANIZATION

Again New Ipswich is fortunate in retaining the same corps of teachers for another year of service. In accordance with the wishes of the district there has been no music supervisor during the past year or this year.

The statistical tables at the end of this report are for the complete school year 1932-1933 and for the Fall Term 1933. As compared with previous years the enrollment shows a small decrease. The attendance has remained approximately at the state average. Tardiness has been much lower than the state average except in the Junior High School where last year the amount of tardiness was nearly three times as great as the state average. A part of this was due to the difficulties of transportation. During the Fall Term of this year the Junior High School again shows an excessive amount of tardiness, none of which has so far been caused by transportation difficulties. An attempt is being made to prevent further tardiness by penalties upon tardy pupils and by calling attention of the parents through action of the truant officer.

SUPERVISION

In several of my earlier reports I have given in some detail statements of certain phases of my supervisory activities and I have spoken particularly of the use of standardized tests to measure the progress of the children in various subjects. The reading tests described in last year's report have been continued and the children have shown even better results than were reported at that time.

The Stanford Achievement Tests have been used for a period of five years, every child in grades three to eight taking this battery of tests at least once each year, generally in October, and those children who do not appear to have made satisfactory progress in the Spring have been examined a second time.

The scores of these tests are stated in terms of letters A, B, C, D, and E and we expect in the long run to find approximately 7% of the children getting A; 24% B; 38% C; 24% D; and 7% E. Last October the scores of the 104 children taking the test in New Ipswich showed 5% getting A; 24% B; 41% C; 25% D; and 5% E. This indicates that the advancement of the New Ipswich children, so far as it is measured by these tests, is almost exactly average. Taking the individual schools, the Junior High had more than the average number of Ds and Es, Number One school had more than the average number of Cs but no Es, Number Four had a larger number of As and Bs with no Es, Number Six had approximately equal numbers of Bs and Cs with no other scores, and Number Twelve had no As and a proportion of Ds much above the average.

MEDICAL INSPECTION

The medical inspection last Fall was conducted by Dr. Cayward with the assistance of the nurse, Mrs. Gilbert. The nurse has completed the examination by weighing and measuring and testing the eyesight of each child. Her illness at the present time makes it impossible to give a more detailed report of the examination and her follow-up plans.

HIGH SCHOOL TUITION

Perhaps a statement regarding the legal provisions for high school tuition will be of interest. The state law, as amended from time to time by the legislature up to and including the session of 1933, provides that a school district having no high school of its own shall pay the tuition of any child who resides in the district with parents or guardian (or has resided in the district without parent or guardian and attended the district schools for two years or more) at any New Hampshire approved High School or Academy. The District is not liable, however, except under contract, for a rate of tuition higher than the average cost of high school instruction in the state the preceding year. A school district may authorize its School Board, with the approval of the State Board of Education, to make a contract for a higher rate of tuition with any high school or academy in New Hampshire.

The tuition rate of Appleton Academy has always been lower than the state average cost of instruction. This year, however, the state average cost fell to \$78.26 and in anticipation of this fact the trustees voted last summer to fix the tuition rate for this year at the state average.

BUDGET FOR 1934-1935

Only minor changes can be made in the items of the budget, some costs showing a tendency upward at the present time. The total amount of the budget shows a reduction of \$863 from the budget presented last year. This reduction, however, is partly offset by a reduction in state aid, and probably also in the income from trust funds.

TRENDS IN EDUCATION

The effect of the depression upon the schools has been less severe in New England than in any other part of the country. The primary reason for this is doubtless the fact that the depression itself has been less severe here. However, it may be that New England people are more determined to provide adequate education whatever the cost may be, within reason.

General education of all the people is intimately related to their individual success and happiness and to the prosperity and security of the country. We can accumulate wealth and pass it on from one generation to the next, and to some extent this is true of physical health and mental ability, but we can not bequeath an education to our children. The most we can do is to provide them with the means for an education. Of necessity some economies must be made, but the schools ought to be the last to feel the real pinch of economy and the first to benefit by a returning wave of prosperity.

There is a deeper significance in the present situation than the mere reduction of costs, essential as that may seem to us now. Society is undergoing some fundamental changes and these must be reflected in education if the coming generations are to receive the proper training for future social conditions. The happiness and prosperity of our successors in their time will depend upon their education and training, not only for their personal living and occupational pursuits, but in their choice of leadership and their cooperation with others in sustaining intelligent and beneficent government.

Amongst all the facts and knowledge that we must pass on to our successors none is more important than the fact of change. In the field of human affairs, as distinguishing from fixed physical facts, nothing is changeless and the speed with which changes take place is ever increasing. Only a few generations back our forefathers could pass on to their successors great bodies of knowledge with the assurance that most of it would remain as solid fact, but today we are confronted with the certainty that much of what we teach our children will be changed when they have grown to maturity. Our successors must not only know this fact, but they need to be so trained in habits of thought as to be able to adapt themselves to change and to do their part in cooperation with others in the control of the effects of change.

Necessarily this argument applies more to the field of what we call secondary education than it does to elementary education, for it is at the high school age that youth becomes susceptible to training in methods of thought and study, and it is at this time rather than later in life that habits of reasoning can best be developed in place of prejudice. From this point of view many are now saying that our high school programs of study are ill adapted to the needs of our young people. Much study is being given to this by leading educators and laymen, and it appears that we shall shortly be making changes in the direction of substitution of more material in the social science fields for some of the subjects now given greater emphasis.

In closing, I am again happy to express appreciation for the support and interest in all of my endeavors to be of service in my capacity as Superintendent of Schools.

REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

TO THE CITIZENS OF NEW IPSWICH:

The most hopeful sign of educational progress during the past few years has been the ever increasing number of our boys and girls seeking admittance to the Academy.

No change has been made in the personnel of the teaching force, which has been a big factor in the successful conduct of our schools. Unfortunately, an epidemic of measles and whooping cough was so severe that the Junior High, Number Four, and Number Six were ordered closed. This closing will necessitate keeping those schools in session until the latter part of June and omitting at least one of regular vacation weeks in order to comply with the state ruling that all public schools must be in session thirty-six weeks at least.

In making out the budget for the coming year every item has received the most careful consideration in order that the lowest possible figure may be given for each. But the amount of our Estimated Revenue has been so greatly reduced that the School Board finds it necessary to increase the sum to be raised by taxation.

To the Parent-Teacher Association, the Red Cross, and the librarian, Mrs. Frances Nash, the Board again offers its thanks for the help they have given the children in our public schools.

We hereby acknowledge our indebtedness also to Dr. Cayward for the generous offer of his services as examining physician without any expense to the Board.
