ARTICLE II. Robert Volk moved that the article be held until the Budget could be discussed. The motion was carried.

ARTICLE III. James Leavitt moved and it was seconded to have the article pass as written. It was a vote.

ARTICLE IV. William Fowler moved and it was so voted to pass the article as written.

Moderator White stated that Article V through Article XIII were on the Official Ballot, therefore we would move to Article XIV.

ARTICLE XIV. Mrs. Luther Amended Article XIV to read, that the Town of North Hampton exclude from the plan for Social Security coverage of its employees submitted in accordance with New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated Chapter 101, Section 5, service in any class or classes of positions of election officials or election workers for a calendar quarter in which the renumeration paid for such service is less than \$50.00. Mrs. Luther moved that the Amended Article be accepted as read. William Fowler seconded the motion. It was a vote.

ARTICLE XV. Robert Volk moved and it was seconded to adopt the Article as written. It was a vote.

ARTICLE XVI. After a discussion Mr. Mulherrin made the motion which was seconded to pass the Article as read. It was a vote.

ARTICLE XVII. After a general discussion Maurice Kierstead made a motion that the Article be accepted as read. It was a vote.

ARTICLE XVIII. Mr. Fowler moved and it was so voted to indefinitely postpone this article in view of the last one.

ARTICLE XIX. Mr. Fowler moved and it was so voted to postpone this article for the same reason.

Mrs. Hobbs moved that the Moderator appoint the following persons to serve with the three library trustees as a building committee: Dorothy Colbeth, Maurice Kierstead, Gordon Dow, Sumner Claverie. It was a vote.

ARTICLE XX. Robert Volk moved and it was so voted to accept Article XX as read. It was a vote.

ARTICLE XXI. Was not a vote.

ARTICLE XXII. Lewis Haven moved and it was seconded to pass Article XXII as read. It was a vote. ARTICLE' XXIII. Lewis Haven moved and it was seconded to accept the article as read. After a general discussion Moderator White brought it to a vote. It was a vote.

ARTICLE II. Moderator White asked that the Budget be read and if there was an item anyone wished to discuss to ask them to "Hold" it.

The only item asked to be held was Town Map and Transfer Work. There was a correction under Interest — New Equipment — Police Cruiser. It should have read Capital Reserve #6.

Robert Volk made a motion and it was so voted to accept the budget as read with the exception of the hold item. It was a vote.

Mrs. Luther stated that the reason she asked for a hold on the Town map was that they are going through a revaluation and were going to have booklets made. It would seem appropriate, she stated, to have a new map and have everything dated as of April 1, 1970. She also asked that the \$800.00 be increased to \$1,050.00.

Mrs. Luther made a motion to increase the amount from \$800.00 to \$1,050. It was seconded and so voted.

Mr. Fowler made the motion which was seconded to accept the budget with the addition of \$1,500.00 for the recreation fund and \$250.00 for the Town map making a total budget of \$215,737.21. It was a vote.

ARTICLE XXIV. Jane Palmer was given a round of applause for her six years service on the School Board.

Mr. Kierstead stated that at the Selectmen's meeting they were presented with a plaque from the American Legion — Hampton Post for its observance of National Holidays. Wayne Elliot stated that many were not aware that the Town Moderator and School Moderator, Mr. White, had stepped down after several years of service, and felt he deserved a hand of applause.

Maurice Kierstead moved that the meeting be dissolved. It was a vote.

Meeting dissolved at 9:20 p.m. Polls closed 9:45 p.m.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1970 was a year of continuous and extensive activity throughout all functions of town government.

Early in the year, the town was faced with the expense of hiring legal counsel to contest the large rate increase requested by the Hampton Water Works Co. The Selectmen and the Water Commission joined in a vigorous opposition to the full increase and, as a result, the percentage of rise allowed by the Public Utilities Commission was kept to a minimum.

The reappraisal of the entire town by the State Tax Commission was completed and was reflected in the new tax rate. A review of all the apparent errors or inequities is now in progress and appropriate adjustments will be made. The revaluation was satisfactorily accepted by a majority of the taxpayers and was completed without overexpending funds appropriated. A new form of tax bill was adopted which, it is hoped, will be more revealing and self-explanatory.

It has been necessary to cope with many pollution problems throughout the year both from health and aesthetic points of view. The Selectmen were successful in persuading the State Highway Department to use Federal Funds at their disposal to erect an expensive and attractive fence to screen a prominently located junk yard. With the cooperation of a resident scrap-metal dealer, a campaign was waged to remove junk cars from private property to a central area for disposal. The Town joined forces with the State to enforce regulations pertaining to local sewerage disposal problems and many improvements have resulted.

Additional street lights and street signs have been in-

stalled where necessary along with traffic control signs, for the protection of local residents, particularly children.

Many problems developed at the Town Dump as a result of the callous disregard for rules and regulations by a minority of the residents and non-residents necessitating police action, erection of a chain link fence, issuance of identifying auto stickers and the eventual closing of the dump, as an emergency measure, except during specific times when a paid attendant is on duty. The dump hours, for the convenience of all, are as follows:

Monday and Wednesday 4 to 7 p.m. Friday 4 to 8 p.m. Saturday 9 a.m. to 6 p.m.

For many years the position of Tree Warden within the town has not been filled with the function of this department being administered by the Selectmen and the Highway Agent. The Selectmen were pleased to recommend the eminently qualified Mr. Stanley Knowles to the State Forester for appointment to this important office.

Many appointments have been made throughout the year to positions on various boards and commissions. The Selectmen would like to thank all of those who so graciously agreed to give generously of their time and capabilities (many times with personal sacrifice) toward the continuance of the democratic process and a secure, rewarding future for the Town of North Hampton.

An expression of gratitude is due all Department Heads and Office holders for their complete cooperation and devotion to duty accompanied by a sincere sense of economy in wringing full value from every tax dollar.

As Chairman of the Board this year, it has been a distinct pleasure to serve with Mr. Maurice E. Kierstead and Mr. Robert K. Volk. Their wise counsel has been of great value while they have always shown a willingness to serve far beyond the normally scheduled hours whenever necessary. Though heated debate has often erupted over controversial decisions, the democratic procedure has prevailed with resulting benefit for the town as a whole.

Mrs. Barbara Luther, Administrative Assistant to the Board, has faithfully and capably served with an enthusiasm and industriousness worthy of commendation from the entire town.

Thanks are due Mr. James F. Leavitt, Representative, for maintaining an open line of communication with the Board relating to information on legislative matters pertinent to town involvement.

FACTS TO REMEMBER

Property Inventory and Veteran's Exemption blanks will be distributed on or before March 25, 1971. It is of utmost importance that these inventory forms be filed with the town office. By State Statute, a property inventory must be filed if an appeal is to be heard.

Veteran Exemption forms filed this year will be the permanent form and future filing will not be necessary except for new applicants.

Over 70 Exemption forms must continue to be filed each year.

Both exemption forms will be available at the Town Office in March.

Filing dates are between April 1st and 15th. Requirements to be met are listed on each form.

The Town Office is open on Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Saturday mornings 9 a.m. to 12 noon, when Mrs. Barbara Luther will be in attendance to assist with any town business.

The Board of Selectmen regularly meet every Monday night at 7 p.m.



NORTH HAMPTON POLICE DEPARTMENT

Report of 1970

Like most towns in the area, we are experiencing a serious problem with drugs and the aftermath of the use of drugs. Our observation has been that once a drug habit exists, it becomes more expensive to support and, consequently, these people, some juveniles and some adults, turn to crime to satisfy the habit. When stealing and breaking, they do it almost openly and, in some cases, make no attempt to hide their crimes. This accounts for the increase of larceny and other petty crimes as noted in our report.

Drug users operate without conscience, stealing even from their families and other relatives. We are willing to help anyone who feels he has a problem or the narcotic habit. At the moment, drugs are the most serious threat to the community and law enforcement. We are primarily interested in prosecuting drug pushers and sellers.

The New Hampshire Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency is using Law Enforcement Assistance Administration funds to set up a new statewide radio communication system whereby State Police, Sheriff's Department and municipal police cruisers will be in constant contact on a station to station or car to car basis. The North Hampton Police Department has two of these new radios in its cruisers.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE TOWN OF NORTH HAMPTON TOWN WARRANT FOR 1971

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the School Building on Atlantic Avenue in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the ninth of March, 1971, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon; Business meeting to begin at 7:30 P.M.; Polls not to close before 7:30 P.M.; To act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE III. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the aproval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Board of Selectmen, or a majority of them, to sell and convey the real property acquired by the Town by tax sale, to be sold at public auction.

ARTICLE V. To see if the Town will adopt and affirm the action of the Selectmen in adopting the Ordinance relative to regulations governing the operation of the Municipal Dump in North Hampton.

ARTICLE VI. To see if the Town will vote to name as "North Hill Road" the road which is South of Centennial Hall and crosses "the Common", sometimes referred to as "the Green".

ARTICLE VII. To see if the Town will vote, in accordance with the provisions of N.H. RSA Chapter 245, as amended, to change the office of Highway Agent from an elected office to an appointed office and authorize and empower the Selectmen to appoint one or more Highway Agents after the expiration of the term of the Highway Agent elected on March 9, 1971, so that future Highway Agents shall be appointed annually by the Selectmen and shall not be elected.

ARTICLE VIII. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500.00 for the purpose of remodeling the town garage.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE IX. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$163,500.00, said amount to be raised by the issuance of bonds or notes of the Town, the discretion of fixing the date, maturities, denominations, interest rate or discount rate, place of payment, form and other details of said notes or bonds and for providing for the sale thereof to be delegated to the Board of Selectmen; to authorize the expenditure of \$15,000.00 from Capital Reserve Fund Number 8; to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to accept any grants or gifts, and to enter into and execute such agreements and other documents as are necessary to obtain the same, for the purpose of constructing a new Town Library; and to vote to construct said Library and to authorize and empower the Selectmen to enter into such contractual relationships as may be necessary for the construction of said Library and to execute such contracts and other documents as are necessary to accomplish the same in such form and on such terms and conditions as they deem to be in the best interest of the Town.

(Submitted without the recommendation of the Budget Committee).

ARTICLE X. To see if the Town will vote to accept a lot of land just West of the present Library lot, so-called, which lot is bounded and described as follows:

On the South, 40 feet on Atlantic Avenue; on the West, 225 feet, more or less, by land now or formerly of Edward Kaplan; on the North, 40 feet by land now or formerly of Paul W. Hobbs, and on the East, 225 feet, more or less, by the so-called Library Lot.

ARTICLE XI. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the Library Capital Reserve Fund Number 8.

(Approved by the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XII. To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Southeastern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. This Commission will have membership of at least two of the municipalities in the area. The objective of this Commission is to plan for and encourage regional planning analysis, provide consenus on major problems of regional concern and to assist in the effectuation of projects which extend beyond the boundaries of a particular town. The Commission will have no jurisdiction over any matter of local affairs. It will be primarily advisory. Two members of the Regional Planning Commission shall be from the Town to be appointed by the Selectmen.

(Not approved by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE XIII. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$1,980.00 to finance studies to be conducted by the Regional Planning Commission. These monies will be used for financing planning studies which must be approved by the Regional Planning Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other state and federal funds available for planning purposes.

> (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XIV. Upon the petition of Dorothy L. Hogan and fourteen other voters of the Town, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the purpose of alleviating the dangerous curve condition on Woodland Road (so-called) adjacent to residence of Paul J. Hogan and Edmund J. Waters.

> (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XV. Upon the petition of David W. Peters and twenty other voters of the Town, to see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 for the construction of a sidewalk in Atlantic Avenue from Route 1, Lafayette Road, East to the North Hampton Elementary School.

> (Submitted without recommendation of the Budget Committee)

ARTICLE XVI. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the Selectmen to enter into an agreement with other municipalities which establishes a Municipal Dump to be used by all parties to said agreement.

ARTICLE XVII. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows? To amend the Zoning Ordinance and Zoning Map by removing the following property from the R-1 District and include said property in the I-B 1 District:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side of Lafayette Road at the southeasterly corner of said property at the northerly corner of the intersection of South Road and Lafayette Road; thence northerly along Lafayette Road to the existing boundary of the I-B 1 District; thence in a westerly direction along said boundary of the I-B 1 District, five hundred (500) feet; thence in a southerly direction in a line which is parallel to and five hundred (500) feet distant from said Lafayette Road to a point on the northerly side of South Road which is five hundred (500) feet westerly of the northerly corner of the intersection of said Lafayette Road and South Road; thence in an easterly direction, five hundred (500) feet, to the point of beginning.

(On the Official Ballot)

ARTICLE XVIII. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

To amend Section 601 of the Ordinance by substituting a comma for the period at the end of said Section and adding thereto the following words:

"And if the exception is approved by the Planning Board."

So that Section 601 reads as follows:

Exception: An exception is a use that would not be appropriate generally or without restriction throughout a particplar zone but which, if controlled as to number, area, location or relation to the neighborhood, would promote the public health, safety, welfare, morals, order, comfort, convenience, appearance, prosperity, or general welfare. Such uses may be permitted in a particular zone as exception, only if specific provision for such exception is made in this Zoning Ordinance, and if the exception is approved by the Planning Board.

ARTICLE XIX. Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment number 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows?

To amend Section 901 of the Ordinance by striking out in its entirety Section 901 of Article IX and substituting therefor the following:

NORTH HAMPTON FIRE DEPARTMENT Report of 1970

The Fire Department responded to 79 calls for the year of various causes, 18 calls over 1969. The calls consisted of 6 Mutual Aid to surrounding towns, 1 resusitator, 9 automobile accidents, 14 grass and brush fires, 5 building fires, 1 of major loss and 50 for other causes. The fire loss for the year was \$28,403.60.

In May of 1970 twelve men took a basic pump course run by Instructors from the New Hampshire Fire Service Training. It is planned for the coming year that all members of the Fire Department will attend a basic firefighting course and that some will attend courses at the Massachusetts Civil Defense Training Academy in Topsfield, Mass.

In October during Fire Prevention Week, with the cooperation of the principal and teachers, a demonstration and talk was put on at the school for the children.

Through the efforts of the Firemen's Association and Ladies Auxiliary 10 more Plectron Monitors were purchased making a total of 27 units now in service.

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REPORT OF THE LIBRARY TRUSTEES

The trustees and librarian appreciate the fine books given to the library. The Woman's Club and interested friends give Memorial Gifts annually. The Garden Club is building a fine collection of garden and nature books.

The Friends continued their monthly workshops. Their National Library Week programs included the tenth annual Book Reviews by Marion Rudkin, an illustrated lecture on old trains by Richard Sanborn and a story-hour for kindergarten children by Charlotte Hutton of the Hampton Library.

The Friends celebrated their Tenth Anniversary with a well-attended dinner. Rachel Sanborn, Public Library Consultant, who encouraged the organization of the group, was the guest of honor. Richard Sanborn gave a travelogue on the Canadian Rockies.

In June, the fourth annual Strawberry Festival and Country Auction netted \$867.05 for the Library Building Fund. Russell Raymond and Charles Peck volunteered as auctioneers.

The Friends' third annual membership drive was their most successful, \$647.00 having been contributed.

The North Hampton Historical Society was organized by the Librarian, Trustees and Friends of the Library under the leadership of Paul Kelleher. A pamphlet of pictures of Old North Hampton was printed as well as a map of North Hampton as it was in 1857, designed by Benjamin C. Newell of Derry. The proceeds from the sales will be donated to the Library Building Fund to help furnish the room where ''special collections'' will be kept. The Library Building Committee chose Edward Benton Miles A. I. A., of Exeter to prepare preliminary plans for a new building. Application was duly made for a Federal Grant for Building Construction. North Hampton is very fortunate in that, although New Hampshire is receiving just half what the State has ordinarily received, a tentative grant of \$84,425.00 has been made to us.

It is important that the voters realize that there is no way of knowing when Federal funds might be available to us again if the voters do not approve the matching funds of \$163,430.00 at Town Meeting. The larger Service Center Libraries have prior claim to the Federal Building Funds.

The Building Committee is making an effort to secure gifts from groups and individuals and thus far are happy to announce a pledge of \$4,325.00 from the Friends of the Library. We wish there were space to name all of those who have contributed their efforts to raising this fund and those who have made donations.

1970 ANNUAL REPORT OF THE NORTH HAMPTON CONSERVATION COMMISSION

In compliance with R.S.A. 36A-2 the Conservation Commission submits the following report to the voters of North Hampton.

The Commission conducted its fourth annual clean up day on April 18th with full cooperation from all sources. More than 150 young people turned out to help those who loaned trucks or station wagons with drivers. The Commission wishes to thank all who helped in making it a success.

The Selectmen requested us to aid them in finding a location suitable for Sanitary Land Fill as soon our present dump will not be suitable in compliance with State Laws. A great deal of time has been devoted by the Commission in finding out about equipment and cost pertaining to such, viewing films and touring areas in our town which might be available for Sanitary Land Fill. We also looked to other towns as to how they were solving their problems. We have held joint meetings with the Selectmen informing them of our progress and advising them of our recommendations.

We again showed films at The Farragut Playhouse, inviting the public to view subjects on nature and preservation, along with our local film which shows the good and not so good spots around our town. We have acted as 'watchdogs' on the unlawful filling or pollution of our marshes, reporting violations to the proper authorities.

A member of our Commission has spoken at a number of nearby schools who are interested in sending their sixth grade children to Otter Lake for conservation study. For the past two years the sixth grade of the North Hampton Elementary School has attended this conservation camp. We have had representatives at most all hearings and meetings held in the Seacoast area as well as State meetings held in Concord and Bedford. Whenever needed, letters voicing our support of conservation measures have been sent to proper authorities.

The Commission has encouraged those who own marshland, to either give or bequeath their holdings for preservation, and at the present time it is estimated that 40 odd acres have been given or designated for such. The Commission is responsible for a parcel of land which is rich in wildlife and wild flowers being set aside as a Conservation Area. This is being done by easement and of no cost to the taxpayer.

1970 Report of the

North Hampton Recreation Commission

During the year 1970 your commission met regularly to accomplish the following:

- 1. Initiated a six-week summer program of recreation at the school playground for all children grades 1-8. There were 168 registrants for the program which included sports, active games, table games, badminton, croquet kick-ball, nature activities, arts & crafts, junior olympics, pet show, trip to Pawtuckaway State Park and presentation of a play to conclude the season. The program was directed by Eileen Sharp, a Physical Education major at U.N.H., assisted by Karen White and Frank Bosch. Six volunteers from the 8th grade assisted regularly.
- 2. Initiated a program of Girls' Basketball for students, grades 5-8 on Saturday afternoon also directed by Eileen Sharp.
- 3. Elected a Youth Advisory Council of students from Winnacunnett and St. Thomas high schools, who then met regularly with the commission to formulate a program for Tuesday afternoon and Saturday evening. The use of the basement of the United Church of Christ was requested and granted. Mr. Jim Clifford, 6th grade Science teacher at the Elementary school was hired to assist the students in carrying out this program, which is this town's attempt to meet the social and recreational needs of its young people.

Future planning will consist of studying town development with possible steps being recommended for acquisition of land to be set aside for recreational use in various areas of the town. Study will also continue in areas of swimming facilities, skating, tennis, etc.

We wish to express our gratitude to the School Board for the use of the school and playground, to the Board of Policy and Planning for the use of the church basement; without the use of these facilities we could not have had these programs. We also thank the Bush and Bud Club for the nature program they conducted and the P.T.A. for its contribution. We especially thank the citizens of this town for its support of money and interest.

North Hampton Ambulance Corps North Hampton, N.H.

The North Hampton Ambulance Corps respectfully submits the following report to the inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton:

During the year 1970, 90 calls for assistance were received and responded to covering a total of 1080 miles, including several trips to Massachusetts, Northern, N.H. and Maine.

In the fall, we sold our first and original ambulance which was a 1960 Pontiac model. The newer ambulance, which was purchased in 1969, is an excellent vehicle and we have it completely equipped with all modern first aid equipment.

We would like to remind the Townspeople that we have contracts available consisting of ambulance coverage for the entire family in residence for one year that includes service within a fifty mile radius, at a cost of \$5.00 a contract.

Our sincere appreciation is extended to both the Fire and Police Departments for their kind assistance on many occasions.

We would also like to thank the Townspeople and summer residents who have generously donated money to the corps.

Our ambulance crews are completely trained to give immediate and professional first aid assistance twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, to assure the Town of the best possible service throughout the coming year and many years to come.

SEACOAST HOME HEALTH ASSOCIATION

The Seacoast Home Health Association is in its second year and our volume of patients has increased to the point when in June 1970 another nurse joined our staff on a part time basis; so we now have one full time nurse and two part time nurses.

In November we had a Rubella Clinic at which time we vaccinated 550 children. Because of the availability of the vaccine we were able to do ages 1 through 12. Most of the children done at this clinic were pre-schoolers as the older children had been done at our previous clinics.

Since July 1970 our organization has seen great changes in Medicare benefits being paid. This is not due to any change of law but rather a more strict enforcement of the law. This has limited our Medicare patients as most of them are no longer covered for our services and we are providing them at no charge in many instances. Our income from Medicare has been cut from approximately 80% coverage to less than 20%. As you can see this made for a bad financial situation, especially when about 70% of our patients are of Medicare age. A person can only be covered by Medicare now when he is acutely ill, and then only for a short period of time. This does not mean that we do not make the calls it merely means we make the calls free unless the patient can pay in full or part of our charge. We continue to make our calls until the Doctors or nurses feel the patient is able to take care of himself satisfactorly. No one is ever refused our service. This applies to all age groups not just the over 65 group.

Our nurses check up on the progress of all children from our area attending the Crippled Children Clinics to make sure they are progressing, as well as to answer any questions and reassure the parents. We have about 30 children in our area who receive assisstance through this clinic.

Since the start of the organization we have made a total of 3,225 calls, 375 being to new mothers and babies. Our nurses find these very rewarding visits and the new mothers appreciate our concern.

We sincerely hope that anyone in the areas of Hampton, Hampton Falls, North Hampton and Seabrook who feel we could be of help to them will give us a call at 926-2066. We are here to be of service to the community.

YOU ARE HEREBY NOTIFIED TO MEET AT THE NORTH HAMPTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AUDI-TORIUM ON ATLANTIC AVENUE, IN SAID NORTH HAMPTON ON FRIDAY, THE SIXTH OF MARCH 1970, AT FOUR O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING OF SAID DAY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE FOLLOWING DISTRICT OFFICES:

- Moderator for the ensuing year Joseph P. Mulherrin
 91 votes: John T. White 3 votes.
- 2. Clerk for the ensuing year Judith H. Batchelder 92 votes: Mary Hale 1 vote: Fred Scheyer 2 votes.
- A member of the School Board for the ensuing three years — Joseph B. Turner - 93 votes: Harold Eames - 3 votes: Page Case - 2 votes: David Case, James F. Leavitt, Christine Chevalier and Percy Rogers - 1 vote each.
- 4. A Treasurer for the ensuing year Judith H. Batchelder - 90 votes: Mary Hale - 1 vote.

You are also notified to meet at the same place at 7:30 o'clock in the evening to act on the following subjects:

5. Auditors — James F. Leavitt - 90 votes and Philip T.

Boothby - 89 votes. No reports from agents of committees were made.

- Mr. Joseph LeBlanc moved that the District vote to elect its school district officers at the annual town meeting in accordance with the provisions of the Revised Statutes Annotated, Chapter 197, such action to take effect the next calendar year. Seconded by Robert Volk - hand vote - passed.
- 7. Mrs. Diane Jones made the motion that the District vote to establish a contingency fund to meet the cost of unanticipated expenses during the year in accordance with the revised statutes annotated 198:4-6, and further to see if the District will appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for this purpose - motion seconded - hand vote - passed.
- 8. Mr. Joseph LeBlanc moved that the District vote to establish a Capital Reserve fund in accordance with the Revised Statutes Annotated 35:1 to 35:18 as amended for the purpose of major expenditures for the repair and renovation of the school building and facilities, and further move that the District raise and appropriate \$1,000 to be placed in this capital reserve fund - motion seconded - hand vote - passed.
- 9. Mrs. Jane Palmer read the budget item by item requesting that all items to be questioned be held. Mrs. Diane Jones moved that the town of North Hampton appropriate the amounts recommended by the School Board for all items not laid aside motion seconded hand vote passed. The discussion then went to the four items which were requested to be held #110, 210, 400 and 1265.
 - Considerable discussion was held regarding line item

#210 - salaries. The big difference between the School Board's Budget and the Budget Committee's budget was explained as a guidance person. It was moved by William Fowler to vote on the Budget Committee's budget of \$279,970.00 - seconded. An amendment was made to the original motion to consider the School Board Budget - hand vote for a yes/no ballot regarding the amendment - no vote. After considerable discussion on the merits of a Guidance Program and a checklist vote on the amendment of 43 yes and 48 no, the District returned to the main motion to vote on the Budget Committee's figure of \$279,970.00. Mr. Fred Schever made the motion that a vote on the above item be made by checklist - hand vote - yes - checklist used for the Budget Committee's Budget - yes 55 - no 36 passed as per Budget Committee's recommendation. Return to and passed item #110 as per School Board's Budget.

#400 - Health Services - After considerable discussion regarding the nurse's salary, motion was made to accept the Budget Committee's figure of \$7,076.00 - seconded. Miss Leota Whitcomb amended the figure to read \$8,566.00 - seconded. A standing vote was taken on the amendment - yes 40 - no 40. A second vote was taken to break the tie - yes 44 - no 39. The main motion reads that \$8,566 be raised - the vote on this question was a standing vote - yes 44 - no 35; it is a vote in the amount of \$8,566.00

#1265 - Sites - move to adopt the Budget Committee's figure of \$45.00 to be appropriated - seconded - hand vote - passed.

10. Mr. Percy Rogers read the following resolution requesting that the Clerk of the District forward a copy of same to Concord and other appropriate offices. Seconded - hand vote - passed.

WHEREAS, New Hampshire ranks last in the nation in state aid to local schools; and

WHEREAS, the number of school children and the cost of education continues to increase each year; and

WHEREAS, the increasing cost of education is borne almost entirely by local property taxes which are fast becoming confiscatory.

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved that the voters of North Hampton call upon the Governor and the Legislature to substantially increase state aid to local school districts; and that the Clerk is hereby instructed to forward copies of the resolution to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and the local Legislative delegation.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To School Board Members:

The following is presented to you in the form of my fifth annual report:

All of us have used the term "generation gap" in our discussions related to the problems of society today. Another term not frequently heard is the "information gap" which is prevalent in our nation and its network of smaller communities. What we, as educators, think our schools should be doing and what the general public thinks about the schools' role represents a wide educational informational gap. What you think about today's education — its many faceted problems, objectives and outcomes is important. We should be concerned, those of us in education, that we hear your voices, your opinions, indeed your thoughts aimed at solutions to the very complex problems we all face in educational circles.

The truth of the matter is that we haven't been communicating very well — either of us — the educators nor the general public. We do hear the voices of the few who tell us annually that we are the ''big spenders'' and that we are careless administrators. Some people forget that we too are taxpayers. We get concerned about the high cost of living just as you do. However we do have to present the bill to the taxpayer in anticipation of keeping the schools open year after year. We are experiencing slow but steady growth in our enrollment which is difficult for some to believe. As enrollment increases there is a rippling effect upon staff needs, student and teacher supplies, textbooks, etc., etc.

Predicting pupil enrollment is most difficult when one considers the particular part of the state and country in which we live. Surely we experience certain peaks and leveling off periods during a given year but we do have to assure each pupil a desk, chair and textbook, etc., so we must anticipate the peak period or else be justly accused of improper planning.

It is important to ask yourself what has happened to

educational costs since 1963, coupled with the sharp advance made in salaries during this period. To cite an example, the minimum teachers salary in 1963-64 approximated \$4200 per year with a maximum of about \$6500. Currently (1970-71) the Supervisory Union-wide teachers minimum is \$6300, maximum \$10,250!

When the school board presents its annual operating budget proposal to citizens, rest assured they have come to grips with spiralling costs and increased tax rates. These budgets have been essentially of the "bare bone" variety to keep the roof overhead so to speak. The board members would be the first to admit that many well-intentioned items were cut by board members themselves to keep the budget within reach.

I feel it important to report to you at this time some highlights of the excellent programs currently in effect in this union. The quality of our educational offering is something that you should be proud of indeed.

Title I continues to be one of the few federal programs which has full funding.

This year (1970-71) in Supervisory Union No. 21, the total budget is \$37,055.00. This is broken down into the following allocations:

The staff consists of the following personnel: One director who also functions as an educational adjustment counselor, one full-time counselor, one part-time educational analyst, one full-time secretary, and six part-time teacher aids.

The staff will expand after January 1, 1970 to include one more part-time counselor and six more teacher aides. Many of the teacher aides are volunteers from the University of New Hampshire who are experiencing field training in the field of counseling, social service, or special education.

The Title I program includes all grade levels within the Supervisory Union (kindergarten through grade 12). The Title I personnel are working with students who are potential non-learners due to one or a combination of the following reasons:

- 1. learning disability
- 2. social adjustment
- 3. emotional adjustment

The individual group of students are evaluated by a qualified examiner using standardized tests and testing procedures. If the child in question needs help in the visualmotor area, this can be accomplished by either a part-time aide or by a counselor working with the classroom teacher. The child's parents also become involved through conferences with the teacher, counselor, or aide.

A counselor will, at the time, try and relieve any social or emotional problem the pupil may have which is causing school failure. This is done primarily through counseling and conferences with parents and/or school personnel. If considered severe enough, the problems will be referred to an outside agency. Problems which can be relieved through counseling will be taken care of by a staff counselor. There is one counselor working as a liaison person between school, parent, and outside agencies. The Instructional Materials Center began its fifth year of service to teachers within Union 21 schools this summer. The new custom-designed quarters on the lower level of the Administration Building have provided very practical facilities for handling of materials, media production, and in-service training activities. More orders are beng handled each year, more teachers dropping in to preview and select their needs, and more original local products and duplications are being carried out here.

Two special awards were provided through the State Department of Education this year. A Title II grant for Exemplary Library Materials Centers was utilized to expand the loan collection in media for individualized instruction; these materials included over 300 lessons on the modern tape cassette format. Other items added to the library through continued federal funding include many books, films, transparencies, models, and media kits. This regular Title II allocation has been doubled for the coming year.

A second special award was granted from a proposal submitted under the Title V program. This provided for inservice training of teachers in local production of audiovisual materials. Twelve Building Coordinators participated in a one-week workshop held in late June; these trained teachers are forming a valuable network to assist administrators and faculties in each building during the school year. An evening course, accredited by the N.H. State Department of Education, was offered by the IMC during the fall semester. Twenty teachers were enrolled in the twelveweek program which saw them working on films, slides, tapes and evaluating other programs already available through the loan collection.

This year the Center became a duplication facility for videotaped training programs from the NHN Educational TV network. Other services which are being continued included AV workshops within the schools and professional visitations for individual teachers on scheduled days. Deliveries to all Union 21 schools are made three times per week and the teachers are kept informed about what's new via a quick reference catalogue — now some 135 pages and a monthly newsletter. In keeping with the original IMC policy for working with other educational and cultural organizations, the Center has been assisting such groups as town libraries, historical societies, conservation commissions, and civic departments. Visitors are always welcome at the IMC.

Supervisory Union #21 is the only Union in the State of New Hampshire who has voted to have all Title II money under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965, which covers library services, spent at a central location and thus made available to all students and teachers through the I.M.C. We have just received our sixth grant through the State Department in the amount of \$5,139. The previous five grants have amounted to \$25,250.45. This money is spent by a Title II Advisory Committee made up of one person from each of the twelve schools who present recommendations from teachers and administrators. These are reviewed by the staff at the I.M.C. and purchases are made from the list throughout the year. We now have over 10,000 books and audio-visual materials (filmstrips, tapes, slides, study prints, 8mm films and models) available for all to use on a loan basis K-12.

As we study the financial structure of our schools it seems appropriate to share some statistics with you. The *local effort* in the support of schools will not surprise you but when you consider the state support provided local communities in comparison to our sister states in New England you may be a bit surprised.

I have a deep sense of personal pride in the accomplishments of your schools over the past five years. No one can honestly say that we have discouraged teachers and students from trying out newer techniques. For one to say that we believe in the "status quo" would be a misstatement indeed. We have maintained an open door policy regarding problems of all types. There have been some mistakes perhaps but these were not repeated and we do profit by occasional failures. I have a high regard for the professional abilities of my colleagues and can truthfully say that teacher morale in Union 21 is of the highest order. Early and sparse results of recent achievement tests indicate to me that our students are performing with distinction as we study the national scores. The increased number of staff who have earned credits beyond their present degree must be considered exemplary. Such self-improvement can only mean improved instruction to students. Nothing is perfect, and we do need to consider some improvements. My report to you should not be misconstrued so as to indicate that all is "rosy." I personally feel that those districts not offering public kindergarten need to gear themselves for this in the next couple of years. Research proves that a child's age of inquiry and curiosity reaches its peak between three and seven years.

Counseling services at the local elementary level must come to Union 21 soon.

Building programs need voter endorsement in several of the districts without delay.

We must get behind a well-planned concerted effort to provide (from the State level) for the emotionally disturbed children whose number increases each year. Other state supported assistance programs need full implementation to help relieve the burden of the local taxpayer.

Public elementary and secondary education in New

Hampshire needs to be placed on a high priority list by those who allocate funds from the state level. We should not be satisfied with anything less.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools and the

School Board of North Hampton:

I respectfully submit the following report of the School Health Program in North Hampton for the school year 1969-70.

Professional nursing service in the school setting is provided to strengthen the educational process of students. The quality and quantity of learning of each student is in direct proportion to the physical, mental, emotional and social levels of health. The school nurse, in collaboration with other educators, utilizes the school health program to contribute significantly to the attainment of the full health and educational potential of each individual student.

Routine procedures carried out throughout the school year include the following:

Tuberculin tests were administered to all school personel and to students in grades one and seven. There were 181 Heaf tests administered. Arrangements were made for staff members with positive reactions to receive chest-X-rays. All students were negative reactors. Flu vaccine was administered to staff members who wished to receive it. There were 22 injections given.

Dr. Sidney Baker and Dr. Hugo Hochschild gave routine physical examinations to students in grades one, four, and seven. All boys participating in extra-curricula sports also received physical examinations. A total of 236 students were examined. There were 40 defects found and of these 22 were able to be corrected. Urinalysis for pupils in grades one, four, and seven were done as part of the physical examination. I also checked the blood pressures of students participating in sports.

All pupils in all grades received a routine check by the nurse. This includes height, weight, vision and hearing tests. Inspections of teeth, hair, posture, and general cleanliness was also done at that time. There were 17 visual defects found and 14 were corrected at the close of the school year. Three hearing defects were found and corrected.

The Speech Clinic under the direction of a Therapist from from the Portsmouth Rehabilitation Center was held onehalf day weekly at the school. Forty-four pupils were evaluated and of these 25 pupils received therapy.

Several Clinics were held during the year. Some of these were under the direction of the Seacoast Home-Health Association and assisted by the school nurse. On October 21, 1969 a Measles Clinic was held — 19 students were immunized. On December 2, 1969 a Rubella (German Measles) Clinic was held and forty-five students immunized. Another Rubella Clinic was held on March 31, 1970 and at that time 230 students received immunizations. The regular Pre-School Clinic was held on May 14, 1970 and 55 children registered for the incoming first level. On that day all the children were weighted, measured, and had their vision and hearing checked. Dental inspections and speech evaluations were also performed.

Health education is one aspect of the total school health program. The school nurse is available to assist the teachers in planning and organization of health units. I am also available to act as a consultant in the use of materials and to assist in curriculum development in areas pertaining to health. Routine health units taught by me include Medical Self-Help in Grade 8 and First Aid in Grade 6. Other classes were held at various grade levels and covered areas of safety, dental health, family living, drug education, personal hygiene, good grooming, nutrition, and human growth. Emergency care of the ill and the injured involves a part of every day. The notification of parents when students are ill or injured requires time. The total number of first aid procedures during the year was 2,513. The number of home contacts and home visits made was 571.

I also find that more time is spent in conferences with teachers and parents regarding students who may have a learning disability, or a physical, emotional or social problem. This also involves arranging for proper referral of the student and if necessary a change in the educational program so that every student will be able to reach his or her own educational potential.


