SUMMARY OF ACTION TAKEN ON ARTICLES IN

1983 TOWN WARRANTS

March 8, 1983

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Robert A. Johnson at 10:00 a.m. in the Northwood Town Hall. He read the warrant and explained that absentee ballots would be cast at 3:00 p.m. Polls were then opened to voting. Polls closed at 7:00 p.m. Results of the voting are on the following sample ballots.

March 12, 1983
THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING was called to order by Moderator Robert A. Johnson at 9:05 a.m. at Coe-Brown Academy. By unanimous consent he dispensed with the reading of the entire warrant. Frary asked whether the financial reports missing from the town report were yet ready for distribution. The selectmen replied that they were not yet ready.

ARTICLE 1 Robert Bailey moved to table Article 1 and move to Article 2. C. Bailey seconded. Motion passed by unanimous vote.

ARTICLE 2 Theresa Herron moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 1500.00 to engage the services of a firm to conduct a computer survey, and to appoint a citizen committee to work with the professional firm. Charles Johnson seconds. It was explained that many towns have gone computer especially with tax billing. John Lane asked the cost. Reply; 4 to 6000.00. The Budget Committee was asked why they didn't recommend it. Answer: They were trying to cut the budget. Mrs. Herron suggests that we need to recognize that computerization is the coming thing and it needs to be studied. Geo. Stanhope felt that one of our own might be better. Motion was defeated by a show of cards 37 YES 45 NO. Each voter was issued a card with which to vote on a show of hands vote this year, making it easier to tally.

ARTICLE 1 Charles Bailey, (Chr. of Budget Comm. this year) moved to raise the sum of 195,677.00 to defray town charges for the ensuing year. Jean Lane seconds. R. Bailey moved an amendment of an additional sum of 600.00 (for postage 425.00, for Town Reports 175.00). Herbert Sherman seconds. Amendment passed by voice vote. R. Bailey further moved an amendment of 87.00. Jean Lane seconds. This is for Child and Family Services. Alan Thomson wonders why it could not be put under Art. 43. Mr. True Chesley explains that money can't be put in Art. 43. He then expalined that this 87.00 was inadvertently omitted from the budget. Mr. Bailey withdrew his motion and Mr. Chesley moved the amendment of the 87.00 adding it to he welfare item, increasing this item from 30,489.00 to 30,576.00. This would increase the Town Charges to 196,364.00. Amendment passed by unanimous voice vote. R. E. Bailey moved an amendment to increase the insurance the sum of 1729.00, because of additional premiums on 1981 and 1982 Liability insurance. John Lane seconds, making the Town Charges 198,093.00. Amendment adopted by voice vote. Vincent Bane moved an amendment to cut the oil amount from 3600.00 to 2600.00 because the tanks are now full

at the Town Hall and oil prices are coming down. C. Bailey seconds. Amendment passed by voice vote. Charles Frary asks what is the meaning of starred articles in the Town Budget in the Town Report. Answer; These are the amounts in Town Charges. Now the main motion as amended is adopted by overwhelming voice vote. 197,093.00.

ARTICLE 3 Charles Bailey moved that the Town appropriate and authorize the withdrawal of 24,345.86 from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for the following purposes, or take any other action it deems necessary. Richard Corning seconds. Mr. Briggs asks for an explanation of the Police expenditures. Shafer responds that it means expanding their rooms in the lower level of the Town Hall, citing many reasons for their need of more room and more privacy for hearings. Marcia Tasker asks how many policemen we now have. Chief Shafer replies, 8 part time. He explained that 4.30 an hour is not a big incentive to take police jobs that require you to go out a lot at night. Mr. O'Connor asks what the 2500.00 for protective equipment would cover. Reply; Bullet proof vests and new weapons. Barbara Smart asks if they will have to wear the vests. Mr. Shafer hopes that they will on active patrol. Douglas Briggs asks for an explanation of the new cruiser. Ronald Tasker agrees that a new cruiser is needed but feels the equipment for it is not necessary. Marcia Tasker moves that we consider each item separately. Beatrice Tasker seconds. Moderator allows this procedure. Jean Lane moved the sum of 5000.00 for Town Hall: (Smoke detection system 2500.00, Record Room completion and Evidence Room renovations 500.00, Police Department expansion 2000.00). George Stanhope seconds. Passed by voice vote. Phyllis Thomson moved 700.00 for painting at the Bryant Library. Herbert Sherman seconds. Passed by voice vote. Jean Lane moved 8900.00 for the Police Dept. (6400.00 for Cruiser, 2500.00 for protective equipment). N. J. Morse seconds. Douglas Briggs moves to reduce this amount by 2500.00. Doris Bennett seconds. Jean Johnson asks what will happen to this money The answer is that it could be saved until another year. Amendment defeated by voice vote. Main item of 8900.00 passed by voice vote. Charles Bailey moved 547.47 for Cemetery Road construction. R. E. Bailey seconds. Passed by voice vote. Charles Johnson moved 5300.00 for the Fire Department (Equipment 1800.00, Keystone valves 1500.00, Deluge nozzle 1400.00, 2 pagers 600.00). Geo. Stanhope seconds. Passed by voice vote. Charles Bailey moves 2800.00 (Portable radio 1600.00, 4 pagers 1200.00). Jean Lane seconds. Passed by voice vote. Charles Bailey moves 998.39 for General Highway expense, culverts, etc. Mr. Stanhope seconds. Passed by voice vote. Now main motion passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 4 Vincent Bane moved to indefinitely postpone action on this article. Marcia Tasker seconds. Mr. Jacobsmeyer cites the need of housing for the new cruiser, stray animals, culverts, etc. Perry Richardson thinks we may be getting too much at the Dump Area. Several believe we do not need this now. Mr. Jacobsmeyer says the reason for this site was that the Town doesn't own much other land. Robert Bailey says a building of some sort for animal shelter is needed and this would come from Revenue Sharing. Mr.

Lidback says a building could not be built much cheaper than this. Motion carried 78 YES 47 NO. Article indefinitely postponed.

ARTICLE 5 Charles Johnson moved that the Town remove from the Highway Safety Equipment Capital Reserve Fund up to 5600.00 to be used in conjunction with the 6400.00 of Rev. Sharing Funds for the purpose of purchasing a completely equipped police cruiser. Helen Fogg seconds. J. R. Tasker moved to delete from this the amount needed to cover the cost of the lights, siren and radio. Marcia Tasker seconds. Chief Shafer explains that the old equipment is either now defective, outdated or being used in the other cruiser. Amendment defeated by voice vote. Main motion passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 6 Charles Johnson moved to raise and appropriate the sum of 20,446.00 as its share of the capital cost, with interest, for the incinerator and energy recovery facility as set forth under the Agreement for Formation of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative and to allow the Selectmen to accept Federal or State, and other grants that may be available to the Town in providing its share in the project. C. Bailey seconds. Motion passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 7 Charles Bailey moved to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and raise and appropriate the sum of 10,000.00 for interest on same. Helen Johnson seconds. Motion passed by voice vote.

ARTICLE 8 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 10,360.00 for the Northwood Public Libraries. Theresa Herron seconds. David Foster asked for an explanation and Mrs. Herron replies that the Town Report shows how this is spent. Motion adopted by Unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 9 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 11,775.00 for Parks and Playgrounds. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 10 Charles Bailey moved the sum of 650.00 for the care of cemeteries. Robert Bailey moved to increase this by 3,352.53. This being the sum of money that came from sale of lots in Pine Grove Cemetery held in a trust fund, said fund now being declared illegal by the State. Amendment seconded by Mr. Chesley and passed by voice vote. Before the main motion was voted upon, there was some question about the legal way to phrase it so lunch recess was declared at 12:15 giving the selectmen time to properly phrase the motion. Reconvened at 1:00 P.M.

Charles and Robert Bailey agreed to withdraw their original motions and now present this motion: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate by taxation the sum of 650.00 for the care of cemeteries and further resolve to raise and appropriate by removal from surplus funds the sum of 3,353.53, which had been transferred to surplus from the Pine Grove Cemetery Trust Fund by order of the State of N. H., this amount to be allocated for the care and construction purposes at Pine Grove Cemetery. Motion adopted by

unanimous vote.

- ARTICLE 11 Charles Bailey moved that the Town accept and expend monies received from the Motor Vehicle Transfer Fees-Highway Fund. George Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.
- ARTICLE 12 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 86,751.61 for Town highways. (Summer 46,000.00, Winter 34,500.00, Motor Vehicle Transfer Fees-Highway Fund 4,000.00, General Expenses of the Highway Dept. 2,251.61). Jean Lane seconds. Mr. Bane reminds us that we really spend 123,000.00 on highways. Mrs. Herron asks how many miles of roads we have. Perry Richardson says 29 miles. Charles Frary asks why the Budget Committee deleted 18,000.00 from their recommendation. Mrs. Herron says she believes it was because they hoped State money coming in might be used for some of these projects. Motion adopted by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 13 Charles Bailey moves that the Town accept the recommendation of the Street Lighting Committee, established by the vote of the 1982 Town Meeting. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Walter Fiander moves to amend by deleting from the removal list pole #8/153 at the Ridge. Barbara Smart seconds. He cites safety of children as a reason. Amendment passed 65 YES 22 NO. Main motion passed by unanimous voice vote.
- ARTICLE 14 Charles Bailey moves to raise and appropriate the sum of 3600.00 for street lighting. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Mr. Lidback asks if this additional light needs more money. The selectmen reword the motion to read 3700.00 agreed to by Charles Bailey. Motion adopted by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 15 Charles Bailey moves to raise and appropriate the sum of 6.150.00 for the Northwood Rescue Squad and Ambulance. Janet Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 16 Charles Bailey moves that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 5,085.42 for the purpose of Town Road Aid, the State's share to be 4,422.10 and the Town's share to be 663.32. Robert Bailey seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.
- ARTICLE 17 Charles Bailey moves that the Town raise and appropriate the <u>sum of 6,829.00</u> for the Town's per capita share of the Rural District Health Council, Inc. Verne Anderson seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.
- ARTICLE 18 Charles Bailey moved that the Town transfer 3,000.00 from the revenue of the Municipal court to the Highway Safety Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. R. E. Bailey seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.
- ARTICLE 19 Charles Bailey moves that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 26,300.00 for new construction. This is comprised of 7,381.50 of Town Money, 11,502.31 Highway Subsidy money and 7,416.19 Special Highway Subsidy Funds. New Construction breakdown: Harvey Lake Road 12,000.00, Priest Road 4,000.00, Tasker Hill Road 2,500.00,

Canterbury Road 4,000.00, High Street 2,000.00, Bridges (2) 1,800.00. Jean Lane seconds. Gordon Smart questions why Tasker Hill Road needs paving and amends the article to delete the 2,500.00 for Tasker Hill construction. Robert Herron seconds, Perry Richardson says to resurface it would save money in the end in plowing, graveling and grading each year. Questions were asked about construction on Canterbury Road and Harvey Lake. Motion defeated 35 YES 50 NO on amendment. Main motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 20 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 8,891.00 for the operation and maintenance of the Northwood Recycling and Reclamation Area. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 21 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 3,225.00 for the Planning Board expenses. George Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 22 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 250.00 for the Board of Adjustment expenses. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 23 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 980.00 for the Conservation Commission expenses. Geo. Stanhope seconds. David Behm moved to amend the article to read 855.00. Gordon Smart seconds. Explanation: Camp scholarships can't be raised by the Town legally. Mr. Behm hopes townspeople will donate to a camp scholarship fund. Amendment passed by unanimous voice vote. Then True Chesley suggested a short break so the Cons. Comm. could pass the "hat" around the audience to collect for this fund. This was done and later in the meeting Mr. Behm announced that the sum of 155.30 had been collected, assuring a conservation camp scholarship this year, and expressing the gratitude of the Commission to the townspeople.

ARTICLE 24 Theresa Herron moved that the Town raise and appropriate the <u>sum of 800.00</u> for the Newmarket REgional Health Center. Robert Herron seconds. Motion adopted by unanaimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 25 Helen Fogg moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 4,497.00 to be placed in the Town Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund. Theresa Herron seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 26 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of 1,500.00 for the fee compensation and expenses of the Building Inspector. George Stanhope seconds. Mr. Grano thought the building permits paid for the Inspector. Charles Bailey explained that they do and this is an in and out item. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 27 Theresa Herron moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Vincent Bane seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.

- ARTICLE 28 Charles Bailey moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 29 Charles Bailey moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Helen Johnson suggests that in the future all articles concerning roads be placed in the warrant in consecutive order. R. E. Bailey explains that there is over 8,000.00 in this fund now and that in two years the Town would need to replace a truck so they had asked for the 2,000.00 this year. Motion to indefinitely postpone prevailed by show of hands vote 56 YES 40 NO.
- ARTICLE 30 Robert Herron moved to authorize the Selectmen to hire a C.P.A. for the purpose of auditing Town accounts for the year 1983 as required by the U. S. Treasury Dept. Revenue Sharing. Charles Bailey seconds. There is money in the budget for this for the start of the audit. Motion adopted by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 31 Charles Bailey moved that the Town raise and appropriate the <u>sum of 3,622.00</u> to be used to finance the Town's share in the <u>purchase of a spare rubbish hauling container</u>. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Mr. Herron suggests that all articles concerning the "dump" be put together in the warrant. R. E. Bailey explains that an extra container saves an extra trip for the trucks hauling away. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.
- ARTICLE 32 Charles Bailey moved to indefinitely postpone this article. Vincent Bane seconds. Motion adopted by voice vote.
- ARTICLE 33 Charles Bailey moved that the Town require the Town accounts be audited by a C.P.A. beginning in 1984.* Geo. Stanhope seconds. Helen Fogg asks if this will cost more. Answer is yes, but the Revenue Sharing requires it at least every three years. Mr. Chesley estimates the cost to be between 2 and 3 thousand dollars. James Bennett and Theresa Herron spoke in favor of keeping our own Town auditors. David Foster amends the motion to delete the phrase* "thus eliminating our own town auditors" which was the final phrase of Charles Bailey's motion. Vincent Bane seconds. Amendment does not prevail on show of hands 41 YES 46 NO. Now the main motion was adopted by show of hands 66 YES 32 NO.
- ARTICLE 34 Charles Bailey moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to award a franchise for the provision of cable television service in Northwood as provided for under RSA 53-C subject to that franchise satisfactorily protecting the interest of the Town. Janet Stanhope seconds. Mr. Jacobsmeyer explained the difficulties of getting a good franchise. Motion adopted by a voice vote.
- ARTICLE 35 There is a pause while the Senior Class of C.B.N.A. held their drawing for a dinner and thanked the Town for their support. Paul Colby was the winner of the drawing. Charles Bailey moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to take action to obtain appropriate property in the vicinity of the Narrows suitable for future construction of a fire station, also incorpor-

ating space for police functions. This authorization to the Selectmen to include authority to arrange contingent purchase and sale agreements to be brought to a subsequent Town Meeting for action. Janet Stanhope seconds. William Calef explained that this was not to have one central station but this would be to replace the Narrows and East End fire houses. Motion adopted by voice vote.

ARTICLE 36 David Behm moved that the Town authorize the Conservation Commission to retain any unexpended portion of its 1983 appropriation, said funds to be placed in the Conservation Commission's Savings Account, in accordance with RSA 36-A:5. Janet Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 37 Sonia Wallman moved that the Town go on record in support of immediate action by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of New Hampshire and to the health and general welfare of the people of New Hampshire. These actions shall include: 1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions, by the year 1990. 2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal. The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the N. H. Congressional delegations and to the President of the U. S. Doris Bennett seconds. Charles Frary states that he has been monitoring acid rain for 15 months and has records showing that our part of the State is in one of the more heavily affected areas of sulfur dioxide fallout. Mr. Frary's complete talk follows this report. Mr. Robert Chandler feels that the effect of acid rain can only be overcome by applying more lime to our land. Keith Lidback points out that it also causes breathing problems from particles in the air. prevailed by show of card 90 YES 2 NO. Town Clerk has sent the

ARTICLE 38 Robert Herron moved that the Town go on record in support of the adoption of a returnable container system for the State of N. H. The record of this vote shall be transmitted to the N. H. General Court. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Frank Mitchell spoke as member of Conserv. Comm. in favor of litter reduction and recycling materials as saving energy and natural resources. Walter Fiander spoke in opposition saying it will cost the consumer more and will not accomplish what the proponents say it will. Several thought it too early to judge Mass.' bottle bill and that they were not prepared to implement it when it passed. W. Calef and V. Bane spoke in opposition as store owners saying it would create storage and health problems. Motion does not prevail by show of hands 46 YES 49 NO.

Rebecca Rule seconds. Richard Cummings as Recreation Comm. Chairman explains that we have four public beaches and the vandalism problem was worse at Lucas Pond than anywhere this past year. Beth Bourrassa asks if we close this because of damage done at night will we be hurting those residents who use it during the daytime. Mrs. Rule asks if there has been a study done of numbers using this beach. Answer:

No. David Behm says it seems a shame to close the beach which has the cleanest water in town. Theresa Herron feels it not fair to make

youngsters bike many miles to another town beach because of vandals at night. Motion to indefinitely postpone prevailed by voice vote. A motion to reconsider made by Chas. Frary and seconded by Helen Frary did not prevail on voice vote. Joann Bailey suggests a committee to solve the vandal problem.

ARTICLE 40 Charles Bailey moved that the Town authorize the Selectmen to convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed by public auction or by advertised sealed bid, or insuch other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 41 Charles Bailey moved that the Town authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, and accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-6. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 42 Charles Bailey moved that the Town accept the report of the Housing Committee, established by vote of the 1982 Town Meeting, as it appears in the Town Report. Geo. Stanhope seconds. Motion adopted by unanimous voice vote.

ARTICLE 43 Marion Knox reminds us that this is the 210th year of our being a Town. Robert Herron moved that we adjourn. Jean Lane seconds. Meeting adjourned at 4:10 P.M.

We have examined the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements of the Town of Northwood, New Hampshire as of and for the year ended December 31, 1983, as listed in the table of contents. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1B, the combined financial statements referred to above do not include financial statements of the General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts which should be included to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. The financial information covering the Fiduciary Funds (Trust Funds) was incomplete and could not be completed at this time and is therefore not included in the combined financial statements referred to above.

In our opinion, except that omission of the financial statements described above results in an incomplete presentation, as explained in the preceding paragraphs, the combined financial statements and the combining fund financial statements referred to above present fairly the financial position of the Town of Northwood, New Hampshire at December 31, 1983, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Our examination was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as supplemental schedules in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the combined financial statements of the Town of Northwood, New Hampshire. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the combined and combining fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the combined financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 1983

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of significant accounting policies employed in the preparation of these financial statements.

A. Fund Accounting

The accounts of the Town are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purposes for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types are used by the Town.

GOVERNMENTAL FUNDS

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Town. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal cr regulatory provisions or administrative action. Included in this fund type are Federal Revenue Sharing, Conservation Commission, and Special Trust Income funds.

B. Account Groups (Fixed Assets)

All governmental funds and expendable trust funds are accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on their balance sheets. Their reported fund balance (net current assets) is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Governmental fund operating statements present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditure and other uses) in net current assets. Accordingly, they are said to present a summary of sources and uses of available spendable resources during a period.

General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the fund making the expenditure. These expenditures are required

to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Asset Group of Accounts for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by other municipal entities in the State, the Town does not maintain a record of its general fixed assets and accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

C. Basis of Accounting

The accounts of the General and Special Revenue Funds are maintained and reported on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, sources of financial resources and assets are recognized when measurable and available to finance operations during the year. Uses of financial resources and liabilities are recognized when obligations are incurred from receipt of goods and services, when assessments are made by the State or in the case of judgments and claims against the Town. Exceptions to this general rule include accumulated unpaid vacation and sick pay.

D. Budgetary Accounting

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the Town's operations. However, contrary to generally accepted accounting principles, it has not been the practice of the Town to adopt an annual budget for all Special Revenue funds; namely the Special Trust Income Fund. The Town budget represents departmental appropriations as authorized by annual or special town meetings. The Selectmen may transfer funds between operating categories as they deem necessary. State Statutes require balanced budgets but provide for the use of beginning fund balance to achieve that end. In 1983, the beginning fund balance was applied as follows:

E. Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures; and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at December 31 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year. The reserve for encumbrances at December 31 consists of the following:

F. <u>Inventories</u>

Inventory in the General and Special Revenue funds consists of expendable supplies held for consumption. The cost thereof has been recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items were purchased.

G. Accumulated Unpaid Vacation and Sick Pay

Vacation and sick pay is not accrued in the governmental funds using the modified accrual basis of accounting. Employees may not accumulate vacation and sick leave.

H. Taxes Collected For Others

The property taxes collected by the Town include taxes levied for the School District and Rockingham County which are remitted to these governmental units as required by law. The ultimate responsibility for the collection of taxes rests with the Town.

I. Property Taxes

Annually, the Town establishes and raises through taxation an amount for abatements and refunds of property and resident taxes, known as overlay. The amount raised in 1983 was \$14,636 and expenditures amounted to \$4,533.

As prescribed by law, the Tax Collector sells at tax sale all uncollected property taxes in the following year after taxes are due. The purchaser at tax sale has a priority tax lien on these properties and accrues interest at 18% per annum. Delinquent taxpayers must redeem property from tax sale purchasers.

Property is sold to the party who will accept a lien for the least undivided interest in the property for payment of taxes and related costs due. If property is not redeemed within the two year redemption period, the property is tax-deeded to the lien holder.

J. Interfund Transactions

During the course of normal operations, the Town has transactions between funds, including expenditures, to provide services. The accompanying fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers.

K. Interfund Receivable and Payable Balances

LETTER OF COMMENTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

CARRI - PLODZIK - SANDERSON

To the Members of the Board of Selectmen Town of Northwood Northwood, New Hampshire

Dear Members of the Board:

We have examined the combined financial statements of the Town of Northwood for the year ended December 31, 1983, and have issued our report thereon dated February 9, 1984. As part of our examination, we made a study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. The purpose of our study and evaluation was to determine the nature, timing and extent of the auditing procedures necessary for expressing an opinion on the Town's financial statements. Our study and evaluation was more limited than would be necessary to express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control taken as a whole.

The management of the Town of Northwood is responsible for establishing and maintaining a system of internal accounting control. In fulfilling this responsibility, estimates and judgments by management are required to assess the expected benefits and related costs of control procedures. The objectives of a system are to provide management with reasonable but not absolute, assurance that assets are safeguarded against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and that transactions are executed in accordance with management's authorization and recorded properly to permit the preparation of financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

Because of inherent limitations in any system of internal accounting control, errors or irregularites may nevertheless occur and not be detected. Also, projection of any evaluation of the system to future periods is subject to the risk that procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions or that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation, made for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph, would not necessarily disclose all material weeknesses in the system. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the system of internal accounting control of the Town of Northwood, taken as a whole.

However, certain conditions came to our attention and are mentioned in this letter for management's consideration. The

matters presented result from observations made during the normal course of our examination and are intended to point out opportunities for improving internal control and certain accounting practices and procedures.

1. GENERAL

Accounting System

Finding

The Town maintains the State prescribed standard manual cash receipt and expenditure bookkeeping system. The bookkeeper is very capable and good accounting controls exist over receipts and disbursements. Year-end adjustments are made by the auditors to set-up the accounts on the accrual basis. Basically the present system is adequate to meet the Town's present bookkeeping needs with regards to the governmental funds.

Recommendation

We have reviewed the report prepared by the Computer Study Committee and concur in general with its findings. Certainly the tax warrants and general accountin records could be computerized with the result of more timely and accurate interim financial reports. Also, we feel that it would be advantageous for the Town to maintain its general budgetary accounting system on an encumbrance-type basis. This would require the issuance of purchase orders for all goods and services, which are then used as a basis for recording obligations against appropriations. This system is suited to computer use.

2. TAX COLLECTOR

A. Unredeemed Taxes

Finding

As of December 31, 1983, there were unredeemed taxes from the tax sales on account of the tax levies of 1980 and prior years totaling \$8,783.

Recommendation

Inasmuch as the two year period provided by law in which redemptions from tax sales may be made has expired on all of these unredeemed taxes, the Tax Collector should deed all of the properites to the Town as soon as possible.

B. Warrants Not Balanced

Finding

At the time of our examination of the Tax Collector's records, which took place commencing January 16 through January 20, 1984, the warrants were not in balance. Uncollected lists on the current year's taxes also had not been prepared. In fairness to

the Tax Collector, because this was a first year audit by the independent auditors, we were advised by the Tax Collector that the early date was the cause for the incompleteness of the yearend tax reports and accompanying uncollected tax lists required to be furnished to the auditors. We noted that the Town has no Deputy Tax Collector.

Recommendation

Legislation recently enacted, effective July 11, 1983, requires that a Deputy Tax Collector be appointed in every Town. The individual would serve during a temporary incapacity of the Tax Collector. The Deputy Tax Collector is appointed by the Tax Collector with the approval of the Selectmen.

We recommend that this position be filled as soon as possible with the individual being available to assist and learn the duties and responsibilities of the position from the present Tax Collector.

C. Supplemental Tax Warrants

Finding

Supplemental resident tax warrants have not been routinely issued to the Tax Collector by the Selectmen for added taxes as required by State law.

Recommendation

The Selectmen should prepare supplemental warrants under seal for all added taxes. In addition, to improve internal accounting control in this area, we suggest that the Selectmen's Office provide a bill to the taxpayer prior to the collection of the tax. In this way, the Selectmen's Office would retain a copy of the bill which would provide a source document for the preparation of all supplemental warrants. The warrants should be issued on a monthly basis.

D. Cash in Tax Collector's Checking Account

Finding

The Tax Collector maintains a separate checking account and deposits all monies received into it and writes a check for deposits over to the Town. In addition to the transfer to the Town during the year, \$649.10 was expended from this account towards postage, registered mail and tax overpayments refunded. There was a balance of \$1,117.15 in the account as of December 31, 1983 which is unaccounted for.

Recommendation

The position of the State Department of Revenue Administration has been that all monies should be deposited into the Town Treasurer's accounts. Further, the Tax Collector may not

disburse funds, as only the Treasurer, with the proper approval from the Board of Selectmen, has this authority. We do concur, that under the present circumstances, it is convenient for both the Tax Collector and the Treasurer to have this account. However, we suggest that the Tax Collector review this situation with the Department of Revenue Administration for guidance and approval.

The balance in the account should be remitted to the Town Treasurer, as in all probability it represents collections made which have not been credited to the tax warrants.

3. TREASURER

Monthly Treasurer's Reports

Finding

We noted that the Treasurer did not file a monthly report for the months of February, March and April. As a result, errors could have gone undetected in the Selectmen's cash books.

Recommendation

The Treasurer should file monthly reconciled Treasurer's reports with the Town Office. Any discrepancies between the two records should be located and corrected immediately.

4. TRUST FUNDS

Finding

As indicated by the audit report, we could not conclude our examination of the trust funds for 1983 and they are not included on the financial statements. A report of trust funds is filed annually with the State of New Hampshire. The report shows the detail individual trusts, including the principal and income balance of each fund. This report is normally used by the auditors for examination purposes. The report for 1983, indicates a fund balance of principal and income of approximately \$207,000. The report of investments submitted to us by the Trustees indicate a total of \$152,019. The discrepancy appears to be in the area of common trust stock investments which do not show any book value.

Recommendation

There is a need to review the entire recordkeeping system for the Town trust funds to insure compliance with the recommended procedures. It was not within the scope of this financial examination to do so. It is imperative that the 1983 report to be filed with the State be accurate and that the total value of the funds listed, agree with the detail investments as indicated by the Trustees. We are available to assist the Trustees in this matter if needed.

REPORT OF THE CEMETERY TRUSTEES

During the year 1983 the Cemetery Trustees and the Cemetery Caretakers met regularly to conduct the business of the board.

The major accomplishment of the year was the completion of the first stage of the land reclamation project at the rear of Pine Grove Cemetery. As there is much more to be done before this part of the cemetery will be ready for lot sale, we hope to be able to carry out a portion of the project each year for the next several years.

Several small housekeeping jobs were taken care of. Among these was the cleaning out and padlocking of the three old burial vaults. A dangerous, partially covered well received a new cement cover.

During the year we had occasion to examine a variety of cemetery policies. All board members recognize the need to resolve some of the questions recently raised and hope to do that in 1984.

As a board we are pleased with the overall appearance of our six public cemeteries. Much of the credit goes to Caretakers Sherman and Lawrence Elliott, to the taxpayers, to the general public and to board members present and past.

Special and sincere thanks to Don Post for serving so enthusiastically for four three-year terms. During the time he served Don tackled many projects, too many to list here, except to mention the great amount of record keeping and record up-dating he and his wife, Ronnie, took care of. Don's sense of purpose is missed.

NORTHWOOD CONSERVATION COMMISSION 1983 REPORT

1983 was a very busy year for the Northwood Conservation Commission, keeping monthly records of acid rainfall and its effects on Northwood lakes, trees, mountains and people; marking trees for lumbering; negotiating contracts for the disposal of the Berry Elm; and marking boundaries of town-owned property (Giles, School, Deslaurier lots).

Despite cool weather, there was a good turnout for the annual Mountain Day in October. Coe-Brown's BOAC (Bettering Our American Communities) marked the trail and drew up a map and travel guide to Saddleback Mountain for Mountain Day and later use by hikers.

Arbor Day was celebrated with a short ceremony and some new plantings in the town parade. The landscaping of the front and side of the town hall was completed.

A report of possible pollution at Bennett Beach on Bow Lake led to a thorough check by the Commission; a number of samples were taken and tested by the State and more samples will be taken in the spring. The Commission also investigated several dredge and fill permits; monitored Northwood's loons, noting an increase of 3 in one area this year; raised money to send a student to Conservation Camp; and formed a wetlands committee to investigate Northwood wetlands, for which we have 20 maps on file.

NORTHWOOD FIRE DEPARTMENT A REPORT TO THE TOWNSPEOPLE

The year 1983 brought new faces and many changes along with a record number of calls for the Northwood Fire Department. In April, after thirteen years of outstanding leadership, Donald Bassett retired as Fire Chief. Donald will be remembered for bringing your fire department from the days of used oil tank trucks to a modern and well-trained fire department that is respected throughout the state. We all wish to thank Donald for his continued support and assistance in guiding the new administration so that we might continue the fine tradition that he worked so hard to establish.

We hope that 1984 will be the beginning of a new era in Fire Protection for the Town of Northwood. Fire Prevention is being pushed to the top of the priority list for the 1980's. "Learn Not to Burn" shall be the motto for fire safety in this program. In June your fire department inspected the Elementary School and worked through the summer with the school board to see that the many recommendations for fire prevention and safety were carried out. The fire department coordinated and supervised fire drills which were held on a regular basis throughout the fall at all schools in town. A Fire Safety Program was implemented by Fire Prevention Officer Harry Ring and with the assistance of many teachers, they provided in school fire prevention materials and education.

A new standard woodstove inspection program was developed by the fire department in September and is available by calling any officer. These free woodstove inspections should help stem the rising number of chimney fires.

Out of 157 calls last year there were 20 reported structure fires and 14 chimney fires. Due to prompt and professional action by your fire department, not a single person slept away from their home in 1983 because of a fire, a fact that we can all be proud of.

In 1984 we ask that you the residents of Northwood support us in two new projects that we are beginning.

The first is a much needed fire station to replace the outdated station in the Narrows. At Town Meeting we will be asking for \$25,000 in Federal Revenue Sharing Funds to be placed in a Capitol Reserve Account. We hope to build the new station in two or three years for approximately \$75,000 using Revenue Sharing and money raised by the department.

Secondly, we ask you to vote "Yes" for the new large building fire code. This fire code will help the fire department to control costs of fire protection as the town grows in the future. The code is fair, but complete and has been adopted and tested by other towns in the state.

The firefighters, officers and myself wish to thank you for your continued support in 1983 and 1984.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Once again, our cooperative town and state forest fire prevention and control program leads the nation in least acres burned per forest fire. Less than one-half acre per fire statewide average.

At the town level, your Forest Fire Warden is responsible for the prevention and control of all grass and woods fires when the ground is not snow covered.

Forest fire prevention is achieved at the town level by issuing a written permit for every fire that is to be kindled on the ground out of doors when the ground is not covered with snow. Each person wishing to have an outside fire must obtain this written permit from the town Fire Warden before kindling the fire. Any person that does not obtain a fire permit, when one is required, is violating our forest fire permit law and is subject to a court appearance and could be fined up to \$1,000 and receive a jail sentence of up to one year.

No fire permit will be issued between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. unless it is raining. The reason for this is twofold: the fire danger increases steadily between 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., then subsides to a safe level between 2:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. This happens because the sun dries out the fine fuels that are easily ignited and dries the air which permits rapid fire spread. Also during this part of the day fire fighters are not readily available in most communities so an escaped fire could burn longer and cause greater damage before being suppressed.

Your cooperation in burning only when conditions are safe is greatly appreciated.

As Smokey says, "Remember, Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires,"

BRYANT-CHESLEY LIBRARIES

ANNUAL REPORT 1983

The Northwood Board of Library Trustees regretfully accepted the resignation of Librarian Gladys Gardner, effective October 28, 1983. Miss Gardner was appointed Librarian of the Chesley Memorial Library when it opened in 1954 and assumed the additional responsibility of the James E. Bryant Library in 1978. She guided young children towards the joys and rewards of reading, assisted students of all ages in obtaining needed information and was a special friend to many. The Trustees are most appreciative of her years of devoted service.

Christia Glagolev of Deerfield was selected by the Board of Trustees as Librarian and began work November 2.

The Northwood Libraries were fortunate in obtaining matching funds from the New Hampshire Council for the Humanities to present two programs during the year. On May 26, 1983, the Libraries and the Northwood Conservation Commission sponsored the program "Yesterday Again: New Hampshire and Energy Tomorrow" with David Roberts of Shelter Enterprises, Brentwood, as speaker. A portion of this grant enabled the Librarian to purchase more than 15 books about energy and conservation.

The second program funded by the New Hampshire Council on the Humanities was held July 14. R. Stuart Wallace, Assistant Director of the New Hampshire Historical Society, spoke about "Pumpkins and Potatoes: Ethnic Food of Provincial New Hampshire".

The children of Northwood were able to participate in Friday afternoon craft programs at the Bryant Library and monthly film programs at both libraries. Thirty-two youngsters took a part in the summer reading program "The Tortoise and the Hare". A "live performance" for the children in July was given by "The Little Red Wagon" from the University of New Hampshire theater program.

Two groups from the Center School visited the Chesley Library at which time Miss Gardner read stories. Members of the Girl Scout troop worked for a portion of their Community Service Badge at the library during April and the Brownies did a research project at the library in December.

Miss Gardner attended the New Hampshire Library Association Annual Conference in May and represented the Northwood libraries at two Area Library Forums. Christia Glagolev, the new librarian, was able to attend the fall meeting of the State Association. Trustee Jean Johnson attended two workshops sponsored by the New Hampshire Library Trustees Association.

The juvenile and adult collection at the Chesley Library is now cataloged. One hundred twenty-four hours of recorded volunteer time has assisted in this project. The Trustees thank Laurie Lalish, Shirley Smith, Eleanor Merrill and Muriel Moore for their assistance in this project. It was necessary to purchase a second card catalog

and to have an iron base custom made for it by Friendship Forge in order to accommodate these records. The items were paid from Revenue Sharing Funds.

Revenue Sharing Funds were used in the fall to paint the trim of the James Bryant Library and to replace two basement window casings and frames. It is planned to replace the remaining windows in 1984. At the time the trim was painted, the Trustees were informed that the sign at this library was an example of a fast disappearing painting technique. The decision was made to re-hang the sign, seek private funding for its restoration and preservation, and then obtain a weather resistant sign.

The mountain ash tree at the Chesley Memorial Library succumbed to the gypsy moth caterpillars and had to be removed. The moisture problem in the basement hasn't been solved and the Trustees are concerned about the condition of the roof (it is the original roof, installed in 1954).

More than 300 volumes were added to the collections of the two libraries through appropriated funds, trust funds, exchanges and gifts. The Libraries receive 33 periodicals.

The Trustees wish to thank the Lion's Club for a donation to purchase medical related materials and the books given by Harvey Lake Women's Club as memorials. They also thank the members of the community who have given books, paperbacks, games and other items to the Bryant-Chesley Libraries.

One public hearing also was held to discuss proposed additions and amendments to the Subdivision Regulations and Ordinances to be presented to the voters of Northwood in 1984 regarding Planning Board approvals on private right-of-ways, lot consolidation/line elimination, and substandard size lot approvals.

REPORT OF THE CABLE TELEVISION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

On 25 August 1983, the Cable Television Advisory Committee recommended to the Selectmen that they award a cable television franchise for the Town of Northwood to Pittsfield Cablevision Company, Inc. The other company originally proposing to provide cable television service to Northwood failed to respond to the committee request for changes to its proposed franchise agreement as recommended by the Town counsel. Soon after, that company went out of business and forfeited its bond with Barrington.

The committee had found that the final proposed franchise with Pittsfield Cablevision Company, Inc. provides a high probability of acceptable initial cable television service for the Town of Northwood, it provides reasonable criteria for extension of service to low density areas not initially served, it provides reasonable means of serving seasonal residents of the Town, it provides adequate protection for the Town and its citizens in terms of provision for enforcement, and it makes a firm committment as to the latest date at which initial service will be available.

The Selectmen approved the Committee recommendation and the franchise agreement was signed by both parties in mid September 1983.

On 21 November 1983, Pittsfield Cablevision Company, Inc. reported on its progress to that date and requested that the Selectmen approve sale of the company to Lakes Cablevision Corp. That firm is owned by the same individuals that have provided cable television service in Laconia and eleven other towns for many years. Lakes Cablevision will be serving Wolfeboro, Alton and probably Barnstead as well as Pittsfield, Epsom and Northwood. Since the sale required Lakes Cablevision to comply in full with the franchise agreement signed with Pittsfield Cablevision and because of the record behind Lakes Cablevision, the Committee recommended that the Selectmen approve the sale.

The committee, based upon progress to date by White Mountain Cable Construction Corp. which will build the system, field work accomplished by Pittsfield Cablevision and subcontractors, and actions which have been completed on pole permits/agreements, believes residents of Northwood will start receiving cable television service by late spring and early summer of 1984. The full initial service as defined by the franchise is to be provided by mid November 1984.

Faced with the above charge, the Committee met to determine whether the pressures of the other towns going to a computer warrants the Town of Northwood computerize its municipal records. What is involved? What will be saved or lost by going to a computer?

The Committee listened to the proposals of the following:

N.H. Municipal Association suggested two gentlemen who provide a computer service - John Lawrence of Hudson/ New London and Jim Ashworth of Canterbury. NHMA also conducted a survey later in the summer which resulted in:

61% of the municipalities (138 out of 225) responded.

- 17% (24) neither had a computer nor used a computer service. Most of these were under 2000 pop. and felt their size did not justify a computer.
- 20% (28) had their own computer.

 One half of these were under 5000 pop.

 Usage by these communities was as follows:

In Summary one can say that the hardware (equipment) may be purchased in the range of \$7000 to \$12000. Software (programs that do the various steps of work for municipalities) is quite limited. Taking payroll as an example, the range we found was from \$290 to

\$3000, whereas Farmington's package was \$460 the first year and \$360 the second year with ownership at that time.

Farmington requested \$14500 from Revenue Sharing to get set up and operating.

To operate a Computer system for a municipality the following Hardware is needed:

(See Article in Section III on using the computer as a "super typewriter"). Form design and Form Letters can create an entirely new system of record keeping depending on the needs.

Analysis of Service Vs. Ownership

Acceptance of computer utilization is a major step for anyone, organization or business. Although several municipalities have started with a service bureau, our observation has been that those involved with processing the information and data prefer to have "hands on" the records, as they have been use to under a manual system.

Service bureaus require much input preparation, days for the transfer of data, and merely return a computer document which has to be checked and approved by the sender.

Furthermore, an office such as Northwood that has good form design, good reference files, and an organized system of processing makes it difficult to recommend computerization. It has been said that the computer is to the typewriter as the typewriter was to the pen. A computer is a popular thing to have. It can only assist its operators by:

Rearranging data fast
Combining data from various sources
File data in several ways
Do lengthy, time consuming calculations rapidly
Do repetitive operations endlessly
Use basic information for multiple purposes
Retrieve information rapidly

If there is no need to do these operations rapidly or in large volume, there is a question as to the need to computerize the records.

If the volume of record keeping is going to enlarge, the computer will contain the costs by not requiring additional labor. It is unlikely the computer will save existing costs in a small municipal office.

If the computer were used to replace the typewriter and in addition provides these other aides, the operator gains confidence in the new "helper".

The "helper" can work endlessly and should not sit idle. It is possible that others could rent time on it and provide the town with additional income.

If needed, the Committee recommends ownership.

What are the major concerns?

- -Acceptance by the staff
- -Software packaging and service, plus updating
- -Compatible software and hardware
- -Hardware quality and servicing
- -Training of personnel at first and on continuing basis
- -No major offsetting savings at present
- -Considerable systems work required and all new systems should be documented for ease of job descriptions
- -Auditing, checking, errors
- -Consistency in record keeping without a computer
- -Northwood has become a 1.5 million dollar business
- -Degree of inflexibility that comes with a computer

Conclusion

After deliberation by the five members of the Committee it is the concensus that:

Federal and State Demands

More and more data is being requested by agencies, particularly in computer format. More labor hours are required to meet the requests. Example: Addresses on voter list.

Containment of Labor Costs

For a town in a growing area of N.H., the computer will not require additional hiring and does not require Social Security, Unemployment comp. etc.

Rental Income from Time Use a Possibility

Example: Andy Turner or Gordon Smart asks for usage some evening when Town Hall is open. 2 hours @ \$20 = \$40. 100 times like this would bring in \$4000.

Key to Computer System for Town is Software & Software Service

Several claim Software packages but few written for municipal use. IBM, Farmington, and Andy Turner of the Committee recommend considering Steve Lotterhand of Hanover, N.H. (Office 646-4447, Home 298-5696). Committee is concerned that he is only one and what is the back up. They are also concerned about bidding versus systems that meet the Town's requirements at a specific cost. Lotterhand's packages are about \$400-\$500 per year for two years. His service is "excellent" per Farmington.

Second Key Computer System is Hardware & Hardware Service

Hardware must be compatible to Software
Hardware should have a good service contract, like a typewriter

Software packages are becoming less expensive and interest earned on balance in Fund might pay for some of these in the second year. Example: \$6000 @ 8% = \$480. \$420 is first year charge for Lotterhand's Software.

THE NORTHWOOD ASSOCIATION FOR STRAY ANIMALS

On March 3, 1983, The Northwood Association for Stray Animals was formed with the approval of the Board of Selectmen to provide a solution to the ever present problem of stray animals within the town.

The facilities at the town dump have long been grossly inadequate, offering minimal protection from the weather, and difficult accessibility for the animal control officer. Most important, Dr. George C. Cilley, the State Veterinarian, cited the location to be totally unsuitable in every way.

Learning of this, and after extensive research, the organization realized that the cost and maintainance of a suitable shelter, even if proper land were available, would be prohibitive in cost to the Town. Further investigation into a possible nearby facility that could resolve the problem took place. Many shelters in the area were contacted, and finally it was decided that The Granite State Humane Society in Dover, a private boarding facility, could best handle the matter.

Stray dogs picked up by the animal control officer are taken first to the holding area in the vicinity of the Town Hall, where they are sheltered, fed and watered. Within 12 hours a representative of The Granite State Humane Society collects the dogs and transports them to the shelter in Dover. If the dog is not claimed by its owner, it is then put up for adoption if it is considered suitable. If not, it is put to sleep humanely. The cost of care is recovered from the owner when the dog is claimed. Any unclaimed dog is paid for by the Town.

REPORT OF THE LAMPREY REGIONAL SOLID WASTE COOPERATIVE

The Directors of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Cooperative are pleased to report that the incinerator/energy recovery plant located on the University of New Hampshire campus is operating on a continuous twenty-four hour, seven day a week schedule.

The day-to-day operation is carried out under the supervision of the Cooperative's Administrator, under the general supervisory control of the three-member Operations Committee from the Joint Board of Directors. The plant personnel, in addition to the Administrator, includes two mechanics, a truck driver, two daily shifts of 12 hours each involving 8 persons, plus a daily cleanup crew. This organization operates the incinerator system, maintains records, and coordinates with the University's Power Plant staff to monitor the boiler and steam production elements of the plant. The Cooperative's organization also handles the collection of refuse from the transfer stations of five communities, and handles the ash removal and its transfer to the landfill site.

In our report of 1983 you were informed that the Cooperative was moving toward electrical generation as a means of utilizing the excess steam production capability during the summer months. Since the 1983 report the University has received a grant for the rapid construction of a new science building. The designers of the building are investigating the possible use of steam for air conditioning. If the excess steam can be used for this purpose, the Cooperative will have a market for the steam which will not require a large capital investment as would electrical generation.

Arrangements were finalized with the New Hampshire Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission and the Office of State Planning which provided a grant of funds to replace the bituminous concrete tipping floor at the incinerator with a reinforced concrete floor. In return for the much improved tipping floor, the Cooperative will incinerate oil spill debris from oil spills in the Seacoast area.

During mid-summer the plant was shut down for a period of about three weeks while the new concerete floor was installed and considerable maintenance, particularly of the ash conveyor was accomplished.

Our previous annual report stated that the town of South Berwick, Maine, had voted to join the Cooperative as a member. Legal problems concerning a Maine town joining a New Hampshire Cooperative appear of such magnitude that South Berwick will continue as a customer as opposed to joining the Cooperative.

Recently a contract was signed with the town of Derry wherein Derry will also become a customer and will guarantee to deliver approximately one hundred tons of refuse per week to the Cooperative during the colder months when the additional tonnage is most desirable.

The Directors of the Cooperative wish to express their deep appreciation for the assistance given their efforts by the University's staff as well as the officers and personnel of the cooperating towns. Every effort will be continued to keep the residents of the region informed of the progress in the collection, processing and disposal of the waste which is being handled at the plant.

REPORT OF THE

NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER

The Newmarket Regional Health Center completed its twelfth year of service in 1983. The Health Center operates two medical offices, one in Newmarket and the other in Raymond, the Lamprey River Clinic. Both facilities provide general medical care, preventive health services, community outreach, social services, and short term counseling with referral to area mental health agencies.

In 1983, Joseph Fuller, M.D., a family practitioner, joined the staff. The Health Center offers a Prenatal Program, under the direction of Maude Guerin, M.D., which includes prenatal, delivery and postpartum care. In addition, the Health Center offers nutritional counseling and prenatal classes.

Other members of the medical staff include Sarah Oxnard, M.D., Michael Lewis, P.A.-C., Barbara Janeway, M.S.N., A.R.N.P., and Anne Fawcett, A.R.N.P. The medical team also includes registered nurses, medical assistants and community health workers. For more information, or to make a medical appointment, call 659-3106 in Newmarket, 895-3351 in Raymond, or toll-free in Newmarket at 1-800-582-7279.

The community health workers coordinate a school health program and preventive screening clinics to detect potential health hazards. They hold informative workshops and act as liaisons between the medical providers and patients.

In November, 1982, the Newmarket Regional Health Center initiated a Self-Care Program for the Elderly in conjunction with the Occupational Therapy Department of the University of New Hampshire. The purpose of this program is to enable the elderly to stay in their home setting as well as to maintain a quality of life and independent status within their community. The focus of the program is to provide self-care skills before disability occurs and to anticipate problems with functional activities. The Newmarket Regional Health Center continues to operate the Senior Citizen Transportation Program. Three of the four busses are equipped with hydraulic lifts to provide services to the handicapped. The transportation service enables senior citizens to remain independent, self-sufficient and active by providing the needed services, including medical, food shopping and recreational trips. RURAL DISTRICT HEALTH COUNCIL, INC.

ANNUAL REPORT - 1983

The Rural District Health Council, Inc. has a dynamic, highly qualified professional staff of nurses, physical, occupational and speech therapists, and social workers. The professional staff is complimented by experienced home health aides, who provide warm, compassionate care to those they serve. Nursing staff members make home visits to persons recently discharged from hospitals, nursing homes, rehabilitation centers and to those who have developed health problems at home. In addition to assessing the over-all health needs a person may have at a given time, the nurses may provide direct services such as dressings, injections, administration of certain medications or may teach a family member to give the medication. There is a nurse available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Nurses may also change catheters, help families arrange necessary medical follow-up, arrange for and coordinate ordered therapy, social worker, and aide services.

The office duties are performed by an experienced and efficient administrative assistant.

The therapy or rehabilitation staff inclusive of physical, occupational, and speech therapists, assist those with physical disabilities to regain maximum functions. Range of motion exercises, gait training, instructions and supervision of patients in transfer activities are among the activities carried out by the physical therapists.

The occupational therapist teaches persons daily tasks that most take for granted. Skills needed to carry out dressing, eating and other necessary functions sometimes have to be relearned. Fine coordination activities and energy conservation measures are areas in which the occupational therapist works to assist those with respiratory dysfunctions or energy limitations.

The speech therapist has much to offer the person with functional limitations. Diseases such as Parkinsons, M. S., and strokes can effect communicating skills, eating habits, swallowing abilities and energy levels. Assessments carried out by the speech therapist can result in a plan of care that includes regular exercises to strengthen weakened facial muscles and structures involved in the respiratory process, assisting disabled persons to be able to command assistance through the telephone to draw attention to the fact that help is needed are responsibilities of the speech therapist. With loss of speech as may occur with post-brain, trauma relearning speech patterns and helping individuals re-establish thinking are important speech therapist priorities.

The medical social worker have a vital role in assisting families with acute or pending crisis. Often times they may help young families with parenting skills and also help the elderly with seeking financial aide, food stamps, fuel assistance, etc.

Home health aides are vital members of the health care team and quickly become helpful members of families where personal care assistance is needed. Health aides perform those tasks that a family member might be taught to perform. Bathing, dressing, ambulation, range of motion under the direction of the therapist are all tasks home health aides perform. One of the most important things they provide is their caring presence. They are able to assist families until they are capable of resuming total responsibilities. These are direct services provided to all residents of the nine towns served by the Rural District Health Council. Many of these services are covered by Medicare, Medicaid and third party insurance. However, services are not refused to anyone regardless of ability to pay. A request for payment according to ability to pay is accepted.

Grant monies and town appropriations are received to help with payments; also State Council on Aging and United Way funds. A bequest to the Council may be made either for unrestricted use in furthering the general purpose of the Rural District Health Council or for such special or restricted purposes as the donor may desire. All gifts to the agency are deductible for estate and income tax purposes. The Board of Directors would like to thank the family of George and Helen Slack for the bequest granted the agency from the estate.

The Rural District Health Council also provides a maternal child health program to all member towns. This includes children from 0-6 years of age. Physical examinations, immunizations, growth and development, counseling, and as appropriate referrals are made to other community and state agencies for direct service or for counseling in parenting skills as needed. The agency also provides immunizations for school children through the school nurses.

The agency has an elderly maintenance health program provided in the senior centers. This program includes health counseling of medications, monitoring blood pressure, weight checks and diet teaching for weight loss. This year flu clinics were added and found to be a great success.

This year the agency is anticipating an increase in services with decreased reimbursement from Medicare and Medicaid, due to the new diagnosis related groups systems. The Board of Directors voted to increase the per capita cost by .15¢, a result of \$3.25 per capita for fiscal year 1984.

During the 10 months the Council has made for your town 312 nursing visits, 131 home health aide visits, and 164 therapy visits. There have been 43 child health home visits and 151 children have attended the child health clinics.

1983 SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING REPORT MARCH 19, 1983

The meeting was called to order at 9:10 a.m., by Moderator Robert Johnson. Mary Ann Sisk, Music Director for Coe-Brown Academy and the Elementary School, opened the meeting with the Elementary School Band playing the National Anthem. Moderator Johnson thanked them, then proceeded to read the School Warrant.

ARTICLE 1 To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one million three hundred thousand dollars (\$1,300,000) for the construction of an addition to and renovation of the Ridge Elementary School, for originally equipping said addition, for architectural and other service fees, for site development including a new septic system and for any other items incidental to and necessary for said construction; to determine whether said appropriation shall be raised by issuance or sale of bonds or notes on the credit of the Northwood School District in accordance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 33 as amended; to authorize the School Board to invest said monies and use the interest earned thereon for said project; to authorize the School Board to obtain State or other aid which may be available; to authorize the School Board to determine the time and place of payment on principal and interest, fixing the rate of interest, the provision for the sale of notes and bonds, and all other matters in connection therewith; or to take any other action relative thereto. (Recommended by the Budget Committee) Charles Bailey made a motion that we accept this article as recommended by the Budget Committee. Seconded by Richard Corning. Madson explained the overcrowded conditions and the need for more space. He introduced Superintendent Barry Clough, who also spoke on the need for this Article. Richard Corning, Chairman of the Building Committee, explained the plans for an eleven room addition to the present building. After general discussion for 2 hours, Moderator Johnson called for a YES NO ballot vote on the Bond issue. The polls opened at 11:35 a.m. for voting and were closed at 12:52 p.m. Total Votes cast were 545, YES-249 NO-296. A Motion was made by Mike Barker TO RECONSIDER THE VOTE, seconded by Gary Smart. Moderator Johnson called for a vote by ballot....YES-147 NO-91 - A total of 238 votes. A vote to reconsider passes. The meeting was recessed until Saturday, April 9, 1983 at 9:00 a.m., Coe-Brown Academy. Motion was made by Richard Corning and seconded by Charles Bailey. Motion passed.

APRIL 9, 1983...

The recessed meeting of March 19, 1983, reopened at 9:10 a.m. by Moderator Johnson.

ARTICLE 1 The original motion was made by Charles Bailey and seconded by Bunny Behm. Richard Lilly moved to amend Article 1, "to see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$991,440 for the construction of an addition to and renovation of the Ridge Elementary School, for originally equipping said addition, for architectural and other service fees, for site development including a new septic system and for any other items incidental to and

necessary for said construction; to determine whether said appropriation shall be raised by issuance or sale of bonds or notes on the credit of the Northwood School District in accordance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 33 as amended; to authorize the School Board to invest said monies and use the interest earned thereon for said project; to authorize the School Board to obtain State or other aid which may be available; to authorize the School Board to determine the time and place of payment on principal and interest, fixing the rate of interest, the provision for the sale of notes and/or bonds, and all other matters in connection therewith; or to take any other action relative thereto. This was seconded by Bunny Behm. Richard Lilly explained the new plans. These plans call for 8 classrooms, an addition to the present building, whereas the original plans called for 11 classroom addition to the present building. hours of general discussion, Moderator Johnson called for a YES NO ballot vote on the amendment. YES-247 NO-169 1 Blank vote = $\frac{1}{417}$ Motion was adopted. Questions on the main motion as votes cast. amended (\$991,400.) with some general discussion. A vote was taken to see if the majority wished to continue the debate, by ballot YES-38 NO-207, Motion did not pass.

Moderator Johnson called for a vote on the Bond issue. The polls opened at 12:26 p.m. and closed at 1:30 p.m. Total votes cast = 471. YES-268 No-203 (a 2/3 majority was needed) Motion DID NOT pass. George Stanhope asked for a reconsideration vote. Seconded by Charles Bailey. Moderator Johnson ruled "reconsideration vote OUT of ORDER." Mr. Don Post asked to appeal the decision of the Moderator. Seconded by Robert Bailey. Moderator Johnson appointed and sworn Acting Moderator John Lane. After some discussion called for a vote by cards, to consider Robert Johnson's "out of order for a reconsideration vote." YES-140 No-69. Mr. Post's motion was accepted. Acting Moderator Lane called for a YES NO ballot vote as was requested by Herbert Sherman, for a reconsideration vote. Total number of ballots casts were 246, YES-158 NO-88. Motion passed. John Lane turned the meeting back to Moderator Johnson. Richard Lilly moved that the motion be taken up again Saturday, May 7, 1983 at 9:00 a.m. at Coe-Brown Academy. This was seconded by George Stanhope. A vote by show of cards YES-85 NO-41. The

meeting was recessed at 3:20 p.m.

MAY 7, 1983

The recessed meeting of April 9, 1983 reopened at 9:30 a.m., by Moderator Johnson who explained the parliamentary procedure. The amended Article 1 by Richard Lilly and seconded by Bunny Behm, to see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$991,440 for the construction of an addition to and renovation of the Ridge Elementary School, etc. Charles Bailey moved the article as read. Seconded by Bunny Behm. Tom Madson made a motion to amend the total to \$847,000. "Strike out addition to, and add Separate Building to be located in the lower field." Seconded by George Stanhope and Charles Bailey. Tom Madson made a presentation of the new plans of another Building Committee and R. C. Foss Co. Keith Lidback asked if \$847,000 was just for the building cost? Tom Madson stated that \$10,000 of that would be for the "Clerk of the Works". Fred James asked for a financial comparison

of the three proposals. Tom Madson asked if we could have a Straw vote for one of the three plans. Bob Bailey explained the advantages of the R. C. Foss Building. After general discussion, Moderator Johnson asked for a hand vote on the 3 different proposals: 1. = Separate Building YES-24; 2. = Addition - 8 classrooms YES-26; 3. = Addition - 11 classrooms YES-37. Tom Madson said, "the straw vote wasn't conclusive, Let's vote, we need space." Moderator Johnson restated the parliamentary procedure. The amendment was made to change \$991,000 to read \$847,000 and omit the words (in addition to) and say "separate building in the lower field". A YES NO ballot vote on the amendment, only, 234 votes were cast. YES-111 NO-122 1 BLANK. Motion does not carry. Adoption of the original motion, which will require a 2/3 vote for a bond issue. This motion is for \$991,440 for the construction of an addition to and renovation of the Ridge Elementary School, etc. pleaded for space and urged people to vote for this motion. ballot vote began at 12:00 noon. At 12:45 p.m., Phil English was sworn in as Moderator Pro-tem to relieve Moderator Johnson. Polls closed at 1:05 p.m. 326 Votes were cast, YES-179 NO-147 A necessary 2/3 vote was 218, therefor the motion did not pass.

ARTICLE 2 To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six thousand five hundred sixty-three dollars and twenty-five cents (\$6,563.25) for professional services rendered by Banwell, White and Arnold, Inc., Architects in conjunction with the Northwood Elementary School addition referred to in Article #1 above. A motion to accept this article was made by Tom Madson and seconded by Bunny Behm. Bob Bailey asked if the Architect has been paid, yet? Tom Madson replied, "yes-4,000.00." A vote was taken by show of hands, YES-45 NO-53. The motion did not pass.

ARTICLE 3 To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto. Tom Madson made a motion that the reports in the Town Report be accepted as read. Seconded by Bunny Behm. This motion was passed by a verbal vote.

ARTICLE 4 To see if the School District wishes to raise and appropriate the sum of eight thousand nine hundred dollars (\$8,900.00) for the purchase of a parcel of land belonging to the Estate of Ruby Hutchins, comprised of two and nine tenths (2.9) acres more or less, with a three hundred seventy foot (370) frontage on Upper Bow Street and bordering on School District property. Tom Madson made a motion that we accept this article as read. Seconded by Bunny Behm. Phyllis Thomson asked "why is it necessary to purchase this property?" and Tom Madson stated that it would give the School District more protection and more to work with in the future. A Vote by show of hands was taken, YES-61 NO-44. Article was accepted.

ARTICLE 5 To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to receive and expend during the current 1982-83 school year, unanticipated special education tuition in the amount of nine thousand one hundred forty dollars (\$9,140.00). (Supplemental article - recommended by the Budget Committee). Charles Bailey moved the article,

seconded by Richard Lilly. Tom Madson amended the amount to read \$9,890.00, seconded by Richard Lilly. Tom Madson explained that we have accepted 2 Nottingham children, rather than sending them to the Strafford County Learning Center for the same tuition rate, that they would pay Strafford. The families would have to pay for the busing. A verbal vote was taken on the amendment and PASSED. A vote on the main motion as adopted, a verbal vote passed and the motion was accepted.

ARTICLE 6 To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate, in addition to the original 1982-83 appropriation a sum of nineteen thousand eleven dollars (\$19,011) to be made available to the School District prior to July 1, 1983 in order to meet unanticipated obligations by Special Education expenditures. (Deficit appropriation - Recommended by the Budget Committee.) Moved that this article be accepted as read. Seconded by Bunny Behm. This was passed by a verbal vote. Article - adopted.

ARTICLE 7 To see what sum of money the School District will vote to raise and appropriated for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, for capital construction, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the District. Tom Madson asked to have this article tabled until after we take up ARTICLE 8.

ARTICLE 8 To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) for a contingency fund as provided by the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 198:4-b. Ronnie Post moved that we accept this article as read, seconded by Tom Madson. Mr. Madson explained the need for this article, example: the break at the Elementary School, last Saturday, will run over \$4,000.00. Our insurance won't cover the first \$1,000.00, which we'll have to come up with; also, emergency furnace breakdowns, and roof repairs. A verbal vote was taken and passed.

Taken from the table. Tom Madson moved that \$1,479,085.00 be raised, seconded by Richard Lilly. Mr. Madson asked to break it down into 4 categories. (\$1,154,085.00 being the regular budget): 1- for renovations on the main building (the old building) - \$175,000.00; 2- The renovations on the present Modules - \$65,000.00; 3 + 4- for two (2) other modules at \$80,000.00. Mr. Madson explained that \$1,496,000. was removed from the original budget of \$2,650,085.00, which made a new total of \$1,154,085.00, and to that figure \$320,000.00 was put back into the budget, which made a new total of \$1,479,085.00. Keith Lidback questioned the total figures. Mr. Madson stated it should be \$40,000.00 for 1 module, as 1 module is already figured into the main budget, so amended his figure to \$1,449,085.00. Alan Thomson questioned that total, Mr. Madson amended it, again, to read \$1,434,085.00. Don Post made three amendments: 1.- from line item 1200, to remove \$1,100.00 for teachers bonus. Seconded by D. Tasker. Barbara Smart stated it's not a bonus, but it's longevity pay. Tom Madson stated that it was for only those who have been here more than 10 years. A verbal vote was taken and Mr. Post's amendment was overwhelmingly rejected; Mr. Post's second amendment was to remove from line 2220

the amount of \$2,347.00 for Dental Health Insurance, seconded by Ronnie Post. A Verbal vote was taken, and again, was overwhelmingly rejected. Mr. Post's third amendment was to remove from line 1102
the amount of \$1,200.00 for Head Teachers Salaries. A Verbal vote was taken, and again, overwhelmingly rejected. George Stanhope made an amendment to reduce the total by a figure of \$80,000.00 (2 modules) to read \$1,354,085.00, seconded by Bob Bailey. Lois DeTrude asked if we could rent modules, so we won't be locked into keeping them? Tom Madson stated the rate might be on a 3 - 5 year situation, but preferably, a year situation. A show of hands vote was taken on Mr. Stanhope's amendment. YES-20 NO-76. The amendment did not pass. Moderator Johnson, "question on the adoption of the main motion, that the sum of \$1,434,085.00 be raised and appropriated." A Verbal vote was taken and passed. The motion is adopted.

ARTICLE 9 To see if the School District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of money not to exceed five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) from the unencumbered balance at the end of the 1982-83 fiscal year. Said sum of money will be deposited in a Capital Reserve Fund in accordance with the provisions of RSA 35 for the purpose of financing capital improvements as well as all or part of the cost of new construction for the School District. Tom Madson moved that this article be accepted as read. Seconded by Richard Lilly. A Verbal vote was taken and passed and the article is adopted.

ARTICLE 10 To see if the School District will authorize the School Board to make application for and to receive and expend, in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government and/or State agencies; private agencies and/or other sources in accordances with the provisions of RSA 198:20-b. Tom Madson moved that we accept this article as read. Seconded by Richard Lilly. A Verbal vote was taken and Passed and the motion was adopted.

ARTICLE 11 To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant. Tom Madson moved that this article be indefinitely postponed. Seconded by Herbert Sherman. A Verbal vote was taken and passed to indefinitely postpone the article.

ARTICLE 12 To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting. Moderator Johnson recognized Joann Bailey, who directed her question to the School Board in regards to Article 2. Tom Madson, "it was our understanding to put this in the budget only if it's by the vote of the Town. We have no intent of paying this amount of money to them." (the Architectural Firm of Banwell, White and Arnold, Inc.). Tom Madson eulogized Larry Woodward, the School janitor, who died suddenly following the discovery of the vandalism at the Elementary School, last week-end. We was well liked and dedicated to his job and a friend to all. He will be greatly missed. The Clerk was asked to send condolences to the family from the School District. Tom Madson made a motion to adjourn the meeting. Seconded by Richard Lilly. Time: 3:25 p.m.

In addition there are 8 pupils attending Coe-Brown Academy's EMR Program; l-Latham School; l-Rochester Child Development Center; Strafford Learning Center Programs include: l-TIP; l-PEPExtn; l-ASE and l-TAC.

I believe the year 1983 will be remembered as a significant one for the American public school system. As is the case with many social forces, public dialogue concerning education moves in cycles with the importance and performance of our schools receiving varying degrees of emphasis and visibility. As a result of the numerous national reports concerning the state of education in our Nation, we are exposed to a trend in the media of focusing on deficiencies in education. We read of teacher shortages, use of poorly qualified teachers, decreasing achievement test scores, declining pupil interest in math and science and calls for a longer school day and year and merit pay for teachers. It is interesting to note that in 1947, a New York Times article written on the quality of science teaching in the United States stated, "This country can easily loose its leadership in science achievement unless it seeks and trains those who can maintain it." I believe the dilemma facing education in the country is not a new one, but rather composed of challenges similar in scope and focus to previous periods of educational crisis. There is no question in my mind that: a) we are faced with teacher shortages; b) we are forced to employ less than fully qualified teachers in certain critical areas; c) we have experienced a trend of declining interest in science and math among our student population; d) we are underpaying the majority of our teachers who are highly qualified and dedicated; e) we are not placing sufficient importance or value on the role of the principal as an instructional leader; and f) our elected leadership has placed very little importance on education in the last ten years. In order to design a response to the warning signs confronting public education identified by national experts and leaders, we have to understand the forces that have placed us in our present position. Albert Shanker in one of his recent New York Times articles aptly identified at least one of the key forces which has contributed to the present state of education when he quoted Donna Kerr, a noted university expert on teacher education in the United States. She wrote: "A society's political and economic forces determine in what pursuits intellectual virtuosity will be rewarded. Neither with status nor with prestige nor with money do we reward teaching...there is a disturbing duplicity in a society that itself fails to create the conditions that would foster teaching competence and then complains of incompetent teachers. Our teaching corps can be no more competent than we make it." While I believe that Kerr's

evaluation is valid, the present state of affairs in education is not simply the result of society's failure to place importance on improving standards for teacher preparation or maintaining respectable teacher salaries. In many respects, I believe trends and practices have existed which have made inefficient use of the resources available to our school system. American society must renew its commitment to excellence in all areas of school endeavor; administration, instruction, program development and evaluation, school/community communication and the agendas of our elected leaders.

Within the context of the above comments, I am pleased to report that we have consistently placed priority on instructional excellence and quality in School Administrative Unit #44. During the course of the last eight years our basic instructional program, based on Science Research Association test results, seems to be very strong. We have compared the averages of the past four years versus the previous three years in the areas of math, reading and language arts and find that the School Administrative Unit average at the eighth grade level showed an average gain of 19 percentiles between the two periods of time for the areas of math and reading, which is considered statistically significant. Language art scores at the eighth grade level over the same period of time reflected an increase of 22 percentiles. I believe our emphasis on developing a core curriculum six years ago has played a significant role in the present strength of our basic instructional program.

One of my many objectives for the Unit in past years has been to design and develop programming for the more academically accomplished student. I am pleased to report that our school boards voted to accept the recommendation of this office to establish a Summer Institute program. Our first Institute became a reality this past year. The program involved approximately 66 students and 19 teachers and was designed to give the children exposure to the development of higher level thinking skills. The program seemed to be well received by all involved and has been formally approved by our school boards for the coming summer. I am extremely pleased with the development of this program and the support given it by our school boards.

While there are many aspects of the educational process in Northwood which should make us proud, there are areas of need and as I have stated in previous reports, I believe it is the responsibility of your Superintendent to keep the system's needs in focus for the voters. I believe the primary need for the school system at the present time is the improvement of the library facilities.

In summary, we wish to express our appreciation to the members of the school board, the teachers, pupils and citizens for the cooperation exhibited during the past year. We look forward to a long and productive relationship in which our mutual goals will continue to be the best possible education for our young people.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

1983 - 1984

We have opened our 1983-84 school year with a totally renovated school. The students and staff are very pleased with the improvements to the main school.

Some of the more noticeable improvements are in the classrooms where the Kalwall has been removed and new walls placed
along the whole back side of the building. Our hallways have been
carpeted and the ceilings lowered. The school has taken on a
totally new appearance. The noise factor has decreased markedly,
and the students have exhibited a great deal of pride in the school.
New roofs have been placed on the whole complex, including our old
modules.

We have our two new classroom modules in place and they are a pleasant addition to our plant. The modules are over 900 square feet in each section and we are housing two fourth grades in these units.

Some of the major areas of improvement educationally are in decreasing the classes to the standards established by the state.

We have a full library area for our students; this has been a great addition to our program. Students have an area to go to for independent study, and we also house one of our computers for the advanced students in computer education.

A full-time Reading Specialist funded by Chapter I is in place and servicing many of our youngsters in all of the grades. Last year we had an aide in this program, but with the increase in our federal allotment we were able to put on a full-time specialist.

The results from the S.R.A. testing which was completed last Spring indicate that our youngsters are well above the national norms, and our graduating 8th grade class scored higher than any other class that graduated from this school since we initiated this testing program.

We still have active programs in athletics and music which our youngsters enjoy very much.

In closing, I would like to thank the citizens of Northwood on behalf of the staff and myself for their support of education in the community, and in particular the wonderful improvements to the school which have made this year a much more productive year. Also, I would like to express my thanks to the Supervisory Union for their continued support, Mr. Barry Clough, Superintendent of Schools and Mr. Leon Worthley and Mr. Bernard Davis, Assistant Superintendents of Schools, and Mr. Paul Campelia, Director of Special Education. Finally, a special thanks to the Northwood School Board, who have put in countless hours of their time toward the improvement of education in the Town of Northwood.

SCHOOL HEALTH REPORT

1982 - 1983

The Health Program for the year 1982 - 1983 was carried out in the usual manner with an annual physical inspection of each student by the nurse. This involves vision and hearing screening, inspection of the teeth, tonsils, cleanliness, scoliosis and blood pressure. When defects were noted the proper referral was made.

DENTAL PROGRAMS - Because the State of New Hampshire is not funding the Matching Funds Program, the money donated by the Harvey Lake Women's Club, Northwood PTA and many local organizations, was used for the Cleaning and Fluoride Program. One hundred thirty-three students participated in this program. Mrs. Linda Sawyer, Epsom, was the participating hygienist. This clinic is held annually in September. Through a program sponsored by the N. H. Bureau of Dental Health, students in grades 1-5 were given the opportunity to participate in a daily dry brushing program and weekly fluoride rinse program. This has been an on going program for several years.

IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM - Through the generosity of the Rural District Health Council, students are able to receive free immunizations. This is a very beneficial program and I would like to express my gratitude for this generous program. This year a total of 9 doses of vaccine were administered to three students.

COMMUNICABLE DISEASES - Most childhood diseases are now eliminated through an on going school monitored immunization program. However, scabies and head lice continue to make an appearance and generally parents are very cooperative in treating these health conditions.

HEALTH EDUCATION - Weekly visits were made to grades 1-5. Appropriate health related lessons and activities were carried out. The Family Living and Human Sexuality Curriculum is enthusiastically received by students and parents. As part of V. D. and substance abuse education for the Jr. High students, lectures, film-strips, guest speakers and discussion periods were planned and carried out. The Sixth grade students completed the Red Cross, Basic First Aid Course.




