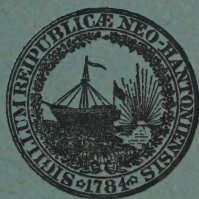

TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Orford, in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Orford, on Tuesday, the 14th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year. Also to choose one Selectman, one Trustee of Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.

2. To hear the Budget of the Town and to raise and appropriate any money recommended therein, or to pass any vote relative thereto.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.

4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to insure Town buildings.

5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of electric lights.

6. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Orford Social Library and Orford Free Library.

7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

8. To see if the Town will vote to dispense with the distribution of inventory blanks until the Selectmen appraise the property.

9. To see if the Town will vote to continue the work of eradicating Pine Blister Rust, and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the Town will vote for the removal of snow from the town roads and to raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the Town will vote to apply for State Aid in road construction, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

12. To see if the Town will vote to turn any unexpended balances of special appropriations into the general funds of the town.

13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to sell any real estate acquired by Tax Deed.

14. To hear reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto, and to transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Board and Citizens
of the Orford School District:

I hereby present my third annual report as Superintendent of the schools of the district.

Instruction

Since my last report two changes have occurred in the teaching staff of the district. Dora E. Theimer of Manchester is teacher at the Mt. Cube school, and Elizabeth Anna Whitcher, of Bartlett, at the East Orford school. Both are graduates of the Plymouth Normal School in the class of 1932, and very promising teachers. In the early fall the two rooms at Orford Street were crowded, but by some adjustments and withdrawals the numbers were reduced to about the capacity of the rooms. An appreciable increase in the school population at any time would be a serious problem as long as the high school occupies the lower floor. As stated in my report of a year ago, I believe that the children of these rooms are getting good instruction and attention in spite of the heavy teaching load.

High School

During the last three full years the total enrollment has been 47, 54, 63, and there will be undoubtedly that number this year. During the same period the number of out of town pupils has increased from 27 to 37, showing that the facilities of the school are being realized outside the district.

Realizing the additional problems in the increased membership, the Normal School appointed Louis Ramsay, of Colebrook, assistant headmaster. He is a graduate of the Keene Normal School, and a very promising teacher.

Basketball has been organized, and the fine spirit of the boys and girls in the game has been favorably commented on outside of the district. Mr. Ramsay has made some minor adjustments in the equipment of the building which are a distinct advantage and improvement. He has strengthened the school materially. The

above arrangement frees Headmaster Twitchell from much of the detail heretofore carried, and gives her more time to give to the executive and administrative direction of the school.

Property

During the coming year the Board plans to paint the schoolroom and hall at Orfordville and cut a door in the rear for an exit in case of fire. It expects to connect fire hoses with the well at Orford Street and partially install automatic fire protection throughout the district. Fire drills have been organized and insisted on by the Superintendent in every school. A fire gong has been installed at Orford Street.

Financial

It was the understanding a year ago that the Normal School would pay approximately \$1,600.00 toward the operation of the high school, \$800.00 already paid, and \$800.00 to be paid during the present school year. This was a temporary arrangement until a more permanent one should be made. At this writing it has not been possible to ascertain what the district can anticipate from this source next year. Regardless of this fact, however, for the ordinary running expenses of the schools the appropriation asked for is approximately \$700.00 less than last year, due to reductions and increased State Aid. The elementary schools were operated at a per capita tax of nearly \$7.00 less than the State median last year, which shows conservative management on the part of the district.

To Supt. McCurdy, Members of the School Board,
and Citizens of Orford:

I am herewith submitting my seventh annual report of Orford high school.

The high school opened in the fall with an enrollment of 58. Four more entered later. Three have moved

away and two have dropped from school, so that our enrollment now stands as follows: 12 seniors, 12 juniors, 19 sophomores, and 14 freshmen. Of this number 5 are taking the college preparatory course, 27 the commercial course, and 25 the English course. As has been stated before, those taking the English course may be admitted to most colleges.

Of those now enrolled 26 are from Orford, 16 from Fairlee, 5 from Lyme, 4 from Piermont, 3 from Vershire, and one from each of the following towns: East Orange, Ely, and Waits River, Vt.

This year Mr. Louis Ramsay, a graduate of the 4-year course at Keene Normal School, has been added to the faculty as sub-master. We were very fortunate in having Mr. Ramsay chosen for this position, not only from the viewpoint of instruction, but from that of athletics and leadership among the boys.

For the past few years the students have wanted to play basketball. Mr. Ramsay has organized a team among the boys, and the cadet teachers from the normal school, among the girls. A few games have already been played in which they did good work considering the length of time they have been organized.

We think that athletics benefits those participating not only physically, but mentally, in that it trains them in alertness, and morally, in that it teaches good sportsmanship. We feel that the student body is showing good sportsmanship and cooperation.

Some new text books and reference books have been added to our library this year. Plymouth Normal School loans us many books, so that we are better equipped with reference material than many schools of its size. The State furnishes us with the following magazines: Popular Science, Geographic, New Outlook, and Current History. The students are encouraged to subscribe either individually or in groups to such magazines as the Literary Digest and The American Observer, a magazine especially for school use. We believe that it is very important that the high school pupils should have a good understanding of the problems of the day.

Mr. Ramsay's general science class has completed the project of wiring the rooms and installing buzzers, which are rung at the close of each period. This is a

much needed improvement.

The senior class gave a play early in December from which they cleared about \$55. A minstrel show will be given in the spring for the benefit of athletics.

Of those who were graduated last June one boy is attending New Hampshire University.
