THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg, N. H., in the County of Coos, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pittsburg, N. H., on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
- 2. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
 - 3. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to distribute blank inventories, at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
 - 4. To see if the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise money for same.
 - 5. To see if the town will vote to elect a committee, or instruct the moderator to appoint a committee, to set the date and manage the Old Home Day observance.
 - 6. To see if the town will vote to instruct the moderator to appoint any vacancies in the Soldier's Memorial Committee.

- 7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1,000.00 (one thousand dollars) for reshingling and repairs on the town hall.
- 8. To see what action the town will take in regard to sidewalks and appropriate money for same.
- 9. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.00 (five hundred dollars) to build and maintain a skating rink, to be under the supervision of the headmaster.
- 10. To see if the town will vote to extend the road along the south shore of Back Lake, approximately 1800 feet beyond its present limits, and raise and appropriate $_{\Phi 3}600.00$ for the same.
- 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase the spring and water rights, now owned by Afton Hall, for the sum of \$3000.00 (three thousand dollars) same to be paid for out of the cash surplus.
- 12. To see if the town will vote that the Trustee of Trust Funds shall consist of one Trustee only instead of the usual board of three.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to appoint all necessary town officers not listed under Article 14.
- 14. Bring in your ballots for the election of one Selectman for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, and the following officers for a term of one year.

One Road Agent for the Lake District, one Road Agent for the Middle District, one Road Agent for the Lower District, Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Three Auditors, and one Overseer of the Poor.

Polls shall be opened at 10:00 a.m. and not closed before 6:00 p.m.

Superintendent's Report

To the School Board and the Citizens of the School District of Pittsburg:

Foreword

As time goes on with little apparent change in the tense political situation of the world, our attention is focused more and more upon our war potential as compared with that of the countries with a different philosophy of life. If this comparison were to be made from the standpoint of population alone, there would be grave cause for alarm. Our hope for security must lie then in an educational program in our schools of such a nature that the effectiveness of American manpower will be increased beyond that of any other nation. This means that the qualitative capabilities of our young people must be developed to the degree that they will later as adults more than compensate for any quantitative shortage in this respect.

Acknowledgement of this added responsibility of helping boys and girls to develop a competency which will stand them in good stead in case of an emergency. to the many already being carried by our schools. means that educational theory must go beyond the recognition of the importance of the problems, needs, and interssts of the learner. It must help our youth to use the method of intelligence rather than of emotions when they come to grips with the many and varied social problems at different maturity levels. Assistance will need to be given in the clarification of value alternatives and in the understanding and practicing the democratic way of life. In addition it will be necessary to set up learning experience of a type which will best meet these needs, problems and ten-sions of young people; which will best illuminate for them the social realities of our times; and which will

help them most to think through their basic convictions.

In order to provide learning situations conducive to the development of an understanding and appreciation of the experiences had, to the extent that effective and appropriate action may result, two fundamental laws of learning are of significance. First. that material is remembered in proportion as it is meaningful, and second, that learning will last in proportion as it is made significant to the learner. With these two laws in mind, the indications are that the best learning will take place and be remembered the longest when motivation is strong, the purpose clear. and its use thoughtful. And that this learning will be effective only when concepts are used which make it possible to generalize and to standardize.--so that meanings are general because they are applicable in a variety of instances in spite of their differences-and yet they are constant, uniform, and self-identical in what they refer to and are standardized known points of reference.

Teachers

One new teacher has been added to the teaching staff this year. Miss Nancy E. Amey, a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and who has received subsequent training at Plymouth Teachers' College, has been employed to teach Mathematics and Social Studies in the High School.

The school district is very fortunate, as the shortage of teachers continues to be alarmingly critical, to have seven veteran teachers return to work with us again this year. Four of these teachers teach Grades 7-12. Principal Francis C. Wilson teaches Shop, Chemistry and General Science; Helen Barclay teaches English and French; Vera F. Gilpatrick teaches Home Economics; and Mae F. Thibeault teaches Social Studies, Mathematics and Typewriting. In Grades 1-6, Doris G. Fissette, Esther H.

Bean and Eva S. Scott teach Grades 5-6, 3-4 and 1-2 respectively.

School Nurse

With the shortage of nurses just as serious as that of teachers, it means much to have our veteran nurse, Mrs. Ethel S. Sturgis, continue to look after the health of the school children in this supervisory union. Concrete evidence increasingly indicates that the degree of success attained in academic school work, as in physical work, is determined to a very considerable extent by the overall health status maintained by the pupil.

Enrollment and Attendance

The enrollment continues to decrease as there are 109 pupils enrolled at the time of this writing as compared to 122 last year and 133 the previous year. Of this number 28 are in Grades 9-12 and 81 in Grades 1-8. Three tuition pupils are attending the High School from Clarksville. Pittsburg pupils enrolled in schools outside the district include 7 at West Stewartstown Elementary School and 3 at Canaan High School. The average percentage of attendance during the past year was 95.22 in Grades 1-6; 95.37 in Grades 7-8; and 96.24 in Grades 9-12. The average number of tardiness per pupil for the same groups was .13. .16. and .54 res-The excellent attendance record pectively. and small number of tardiness is commendable.

Notes on the Budget

The School Board's Budget for 1953-54 is \$62,424.00 of which \$47,109.00 is for operational expenses and \$15,315.00 for principal and interest payments on the bond and serial note issues to finance the construction and equipment of the new school building. The budget for the curent year is \$59,549.00 of which \$44,019.00 and \$15,530.00 are for operating cost and bond and serial note issue obligations res-

pectively. Since no state aid is anticipated, the estimated income is confined to a possible \$400.00 from tuition which makes the amount \$62,024.00 to be raised by taxes by the town.

Land-Buildings-Equipment

As is known the old woodshed and the Danforth School Building were sold during the summer. With the sale and removal of the former structure plus the purchase of three additional acres adjoining the school grounds on the north side, much needed space has been added for playground use. A small storage building has been constructed on one side of this area in which to keep various miscellaneous items used in connection with the operation of a school, and a considerable portion has been bulldozed and the debris hauled away.

It will be of material help in the overall functional conduction of the school program, if this partially improved new ground can be further improved by grading with gravel so that it can be used throughout the year for playground and recreational purposes. Also, with this additional available space, it will be possible to place the swing units in back of the school building, and to grass over and beautify the lawn in front of it.

New items of equipment added during the past year include an electric mixer, milk cooler, and deep freeze unit for the Lunch Program; two typewriters to provide for the increased enrollment in the Typewriting Course; 50 steel folding chairs for use in the cafeteria room; an electric generator which is installed in the boiler room for use in case of emergency; a heavy duty vacumn cleaner; wood turning lathe and drill for the Shop Course; and various other miscellaneous items. Incidentally, it should be noted that the deep freeze unit was furnished by the School Lunch Program with no expense to the district.

Miscellaneous

With the attention focused upon the physical welfare of the pupil, the regular health supervision program includes periodic examinations, frequent checkups, and follow-up work. Continued emphasis is placed upon the importance of taking advantage of the dental clinic. And tentative plans are now being made to hold a pre-school clinic before the close of the current school year for all children who will be in the First Grade next fall.

The evidence of the continued popularity of the school lunch program is seen in the number of pupils and teachers who buy their meals at the school. This service means a great deal to a group where the majority would have to eat cold lunches, if it were not provided.

With a new Governor and Legislature, and with possible changes being made in both the formula and adjusted valuation of real estate plus steadily increasing enrollments, the amount of state financial aid to education to be distributed to the individual school districts for the next two years is very uncertain.

Conclusion

Again I wish to express my sincere and deep appreciation to the members of the School Board, parents, teachers and citizens for all the help and cooperation received in our work together to keep high standards in our schools.
