TOWN MEETING - MARCH 18, 1978

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Raymond in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Raymond High School Gymnasium in said Raymond on Saturday, the eighteenth day of March 1978, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of same.

2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the board of Selectmen to sell at Public Auction any property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds.

4. To see if the Town will authorize the Board of Selectmen to make application for and to receive and spend up to \$50,000.00 (fifty thousand dollars) of funds that may become available to the town under "The Comprehensive Employment and Training Act of 1973" as amended (CETA) for the purpose of providing federally subsidized training and employment opportunities to benefit both residents of the community and the community-at-large.

5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to apply for Federal Funds under the Provisions of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974.

6. To see if the Town will vote to institute a policy whereby members of the Raymond Highway, Police, Water, and Fire Departments and School and Town Building custodians meet a residency requirement within six (6) months of their date of hire, unless said requirement is waived by the Board of Selectmen because of financial hardship, housing shortage, or health problems.

7. By voter petition, to see if the Town will vote to order a re-evaluation of properties in the Town, to be conducted by State of New Hampshire Tax Commission Assessors.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50,000.00 for the purpose of a re-evaluation of properties in the Town by N.H. Tax Commission Assessors.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$288.00 (two hundred eighty-eight dollars) to assist the Rockingham Child and Family Services, a non-profit organization, in realizing the costs of services rendered to Raymond residents during the year 1977.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 (two thousand dollars) to assist the Seacoast Regional Counseling Center, Inc.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 (two thousand dollars) to assist the Ray-Fre Senior Citizens Center, Inc.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 (one thousand dollars) to assist the Area Homemaker Home Health Aide Service.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 (five hundred dollars) to assist the Newmarket Health Center, Inc.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,286.55 (five thousand, two hundred eighty-six and 55/100's dollars) to assist the Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 (seven hundred dollars) to be added to funds granted by the State of N.H. Department of Resources and Economic Development and to be used for the installation of two dry hydrants and the cleaning of existing fire wells.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,100.00 (one thousand, one hundred dollars) for the installation of a fire alarm system in the Historical Society Building.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 (three thousand dollars) for the purpose of rebuilding and remodeling the second floor of the fire station.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,608.95 (one thousand, six hundred eight and 95/100's dollars) for the purpose of funding the town's membership in the Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission.

19. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 (six thousand

dollars) for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of October 1972.

20. To see if the Town will appropriate the sum of \$7,490.00 (seven thousand, four hundred ninety dollars) for the purchase of fire equipment as follows, and to authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of October 1972: Portable Radio - \$885.00; Rechargeable Hand Lights - \$300.00; Hose - \$1,825.00; Sirens for Army Tank Trucks - \$670.00; Fire Helmets - \$240.00; Fire Coats - \$530.00; Fire Boots - \$240.00; Aire Packs - \$2,800.00

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$32,500.00 (Thirty-two thousand, five hundred dollars) for the purpose of replacing the town's 1968 Hough, financing the same to be through A) the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of October, 1972, or B) the Municipal Bond Act.

22. To see if the Town will vote to widen, gravel, and surface another portion of Green Hills, appropriating the sum of \$10,000.00 (ten thousand dollars) for the purpose.

23. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 (three thousand eight hundred dollars) to remove the knoll on Old Manchester Road to the point of good visibility, at the residence of George Jones and Chester Robbins, and to widen and surface same.

24. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to widen, gravel and surface a part of Green Road. This project of construction will involve approximately one thousand feet from each end of the existing dirt section of the road.

25. To see if the Town of Raymond will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$18,535.00 (eighteen thousand, five hundred thirty-five dollars) to finance the Recreation Commission program for 1978.

26. On recommendation of the Raymond Growth Committee, a committee duly appointed at the Town Meeting of 1977: To see if the Town of Raymond will purchase as Town Forest Area, any parcel or parcels of land, the total cost not to exceed \$8,000.00 from Revenue

Sharing Funds, established under the provision of the State and Local Assistance Act of October, 1972. The purchase of said property to be carried out by a Board consisting of one selectman, one member of the Planning Board, and three members appointed by the town Moderator.

27. To see if the Town will vote to allow smoking in Public Buildings, including the High School Gymnasium, as long as all due precautions are taken. This applies to non-student activities. Persons using the buildings to take responsibility for any damage resultant.

28. To see if the Town will vote that henceforth all minutes of Town meetings and Committees to be kept on record at the Town Library. This will allow the most townspeople to review the activities of our School Board, Selectmen, Planning Board, etc.

30. To see if the Town will vote to raise the annual salary of the Tax Collector by the sum of \$500.00, increasing said salary from \$1,500.00 to \$2,000.00 yearly, and to raise and appropriate the amount necessary.

31. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to finance the Town Manager plan as provided in Chapter 37 of the Revised Statutes Annotated.

32. On petition of Amy Mueller Campbell and others, to see if the Town will vote to send a letter to the General Court urging the Court to pass legislation prohibiting utilities such as the Public Service Company of New Hampshire, from charging the consumer higher electric rates to pay for construction work in progress on facilities that are not yet providing service.

33. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of N.H. RSA 31:105 and to thereby indemnify and save harmless, from loss or damage occurring after this vote, any person employed by the Town of Raymond, and any members of its governing body, Administrative staff, or agencies, including, but not limited to Selectmen, School Board Members, Town Manager, and Superintendent of Schools, from personal financial loss and expense, including reasonable legal fees and costs, if any, arising out of any claim, demand, suit or judgement by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to or destruction of property if the indemnified person at the time of accident resulting in the injury, damage or destruction was acting in the scope of his employment or office.

34. By voter petition, to see if the Town will authorize and direct the Selectmen to re-convey to ENAP Corporation certain real estate which was taken by the Town for 1973 taxes due, in consideration of ENAP Corporation paying to the Town all delinquent taxes, interest, rental fees, and costs.

A motion was made by Mr. Maybury and duly seconded by Wayne Bailey that the Town send a letter to the General Court urging that Court to pass legislation prohibiting utilities such as Public Service Company of New Hampshire from charging the consumer higher electric rates to pay for construction work in progress on sites not yet providing services.

VOTE IN AFFIRMATIVE

Article #33 - N.H. RSA 31:105:

Article #34 - ENAP Corporation:

A motion was made by Mrs. Marvel and duly seconded by Gordon Snyder that the Town authorize and direct the Selectmen to re-convey to ENAP Corporation certain real estate that was taken by the Town for 1973 Taxes due.

VOTE IN NEGATIVE

A Presentation of Gifts was made by the Moderator to Robert and Barbara Clements and Phyllis Gove.

Upon retirement as Town Clerk after 27 years of service, Robert Clement received a lovely pewter bowl from the townspeople and Robert and Barbara Clement were presented with a set of crystal glasses from the Supervisors of the Check Lists.

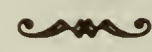

RAYMOND POLICE DEPARTMENT

This is my first report to the townspeople of Raymond as acting Chief of the Raymond Police Department. I moved up to this position from that of Deputy Chief in August, 1978, when former Chief Mark Long resigned to join the Manchester Police Department.

Thanks to the full cooperation of this department's officers and the people in the Dispatch Center, the transition in command was accomplished quickly and with a minimum of confusion. Yet despite my years as Deputy Chief, I hadn't realized many of the time consuming, demanding aspects of this job, and I am grateful to this entire department for their help which resulted in the smoothness of our operation since August.

Former Chief Long's resignation left our department short one regular officer. Fortunately, we were able to fill the gap quickly and bring the department back to its full strength of four regulars by hiring a most able officer, Richard Gendron of Epping, New Hampshire. Dick comes to us well qualified as a certified police officer in the State of New Hampshire. He has completed the Police Academy training course conducted by the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council, and has also fulfilled the requirements for certification as a Juvenile Officer by the State of New Hampshire.

I am also pleased to report a surplus in the Police Department budget for 1978. This surplus is due to careful spending of allocated funds and department income which has been returned to the town. For example, four months of the Deputy Chief's salary remained in the budget when I moved up to Acting Chief. This surplus enabled us to make a few small purchases of much needed equipment such as cages for two of the cruisers and a new antenna for the Dispatch Center. We are hopeful that the new antenna will eliminate some of the "dead spots" in radio communications that we have experienced in certain locations around town.

Our proposed 1979 departmental budget reflects a modest 6% salary increase for full-time officers and also includes a week's schooling for each man to keep this department up-to-date on the newest enforcement and protective policies and practices.

I am certain that with this department's full cooperation, we will experience little difficulty in

operating within our proposed budget for 1979 while providing the Town of Raymond with the high quality, efficient police protection it has come to expect. I for one, realize that much of this department's current efficiency and effective procedures were made possible by the dedicated efforts of two former chiefs - Mark S. Long and J. Henry Greenwood. It was these men who acquired much of the equipment we now use and who set up the policies and procedures which make it possible for this department to function properly and efficiently. We all owe them a vote of thanks.

It has been a busy year for the Raymond Police, particularly for the Special Officers who have worked well over 1200 hours. They are a necessary and welcome addition to this department's total strength. As in the past, additional training schools will be available to these men through the New Hampshire Police Standards and Training Council. I am hopeful that as many as possible will attend these sessions as they become available even though this represents an additional time commitment to men who also hold down full time jobs outside the Police Department. It is this constant training and updating of their police skills that enables our special officers to continue doing in the future, the good job they have always done in the past.

During the past year, this department has had to call on outside agencies for assistance in such things as a homicide, and armed robbery, and several burglaries at the Shopping Center. Speaking for myself and the department, I would like to thank the State Police, the Rockingham County Sheriff's Department, the Raymond Fire Department, the Raymond Ambulance Association, and Civil Defense Agency for their quick response to our requests for aid. In fact, over the past few years, I have observed an excellent working relationship between this department and Raymond's Fire Department, Highway Department, Ambulance Association and Civil Defense Agency. It is relationship of which all can be rightfully proud and I foresee a continuance of this fine cooperative spirit well into the future.

Our priorities for the coming year will focus on our two biggest problem areas: the youth of our town and crimes against property. We will con-

tinue working toward a better understanding of our young people and their special problems. Our goal in this area is setting up a two-way communications so that our youth may begin to understand some of our special problem areas too. Then perhaps we can work together on solutions that will satisfy all. In the area of crimes against property, the townspeople themselves can be our biggest help. We urge you to be aware of what is going on in your own neighborhood. Report anything of a suspicious nature to this department immediately. We would rather answer twenty unnecessary calls than miss the one necessary one. Close cooperation between neighbors can do much to reduce this area of crime. Finally I would like to thank the Selectmen for their support and I urge the townspeople of Raymond to give serious consideration to an article submitted by them in the Town Warrant. This article proposes that

the position of Chief of Police be an appointed rather than an elected position. I favor this proposal for the following reasons: (1) to be assured that a qualified person hold the position of Chief of Police, conscious of the specific needs of the Town of Raymond, (2) to continue a smooth and efficient operation within the department, which can only be beneficial to the town, (3) to maintain security to the position of Chief of Police.

In closing, I would like to thank the regular officers, the special officers and the dispatchers. Their fine cooperation and support enabled this department to function smoothly, efficiently and effectively during this past year.

The Dispatch Center was initiated in April of 1974 to become the central communications center for the Police, Fire and Ambulance Departments. Operating at the start with a portable radio and a notebook, it now utilizes three console radios, seven telephone lines, three plectron systems, a burglar alarm board, a micro film plate registration system and a recording system for all complaints and incidents. With the volunteer labor of Police Department members, the new dispatch area was constructed in the rear of the Fire Station. The compact office is protected by security doors and

windows.

The center employs three full time dispatchers, five regular part-time dispatchers and is operational on a twenty-four hour basis. The Dispatch Center is responsible for the handling of all emergency and business calls for all departments. During the first year, the Center logged 3031 incoming calls and for the year 1978 this figure has increased to 18813. The activity and efficient operation of the center have shown it to be essential and of important service to the town. The Dispatch Center has communications with the State Police in Concord and Troop A, the Rockingham County Sheriff's Department, neighboring town departments, and the York, Maine Police Department. Our local departments include Police, Fire, Ambulance, Highway and Civil Defense. We are also dispatching the Fremont Fire Department and in the future a number of other fire departments will be added to this list. These adjacent towns are paying a yearly fee for this service.

The Dispatch Center would like to thank all the departments and the public for their continued cooperation and support.

REPORT OF THE FIRE CHIEF - 1978

The following is a report of the activities of the Raymond Fire Department for 1978. We answered a total of 273 calls as follows:

The estimated value of buildings involved in fire was \$317,564.00. Estimated loss was \$74,856.00.

This has been my first full year as your Fire Chief. It has been a busy year for fires and without the help of the greatest bunch of firefighters anywhere, we would have had some serious injuries as well as losing some valuable buildings.

During the year we installed a Dry Hydrant at the bridge over the Lamprey, and have the material to install a second one on Onway Lake- it is hoped that funding will be voted at Town Meeting. We had applied for Title IV fundings, but didn't receive as much as we had hoped; this year's request to the townspeople is for \$500.00, and another application for Title IV will be made. If successful, the Onway Lake hydrant will be installed by early summer, 1979. Our goal is to install one or two dry hydrants per year.

Another project this year was the remodeling of the second floor of the Fire Station, accomplished entirely with volunteer labor and a \$3,000.00 appropriation. The meeting hall is now enlarged and includes a kitchen. We invite citizens to stop by and see what a nice job was done.

The department participated in a "Junior Firefighters" program during 1978, with six boys

ranging in age from 16 to 17. All passed an eight hour forestry training program, and all were a great help in fighting brush fires as well as in completing the other duties assigned them. To date, four of the six have turned 18 and have been appointed regular call firemen. We owe thanks to each of the boys and to John Callaghan. The program will be continued in 1979.

I'd like the people to know about how much time the firemen have spent on training and on calls for the department. A total of 4,145 man hours were spent on fire calls. 550 man hours were spent in training. There is no accounting for the number of hours spent on activities other than these. The eleven men who attended valuable and vigorous training schools throughout the state, did so on their own time, and then returned to train the rest of the men.

It will be noted from the town report that the Fire Dept.'s budget is slightly in the red. This is due to a brush fire off Route 107 near the Deerfield line in which approximately 5 acres was burned. The fire was difficult to get to as it was a mile into the woods and the cost of suppression was \$3,571.51. Nearly half of the cost will be reimbursed by the State, but it was an unforeseen emergency. The towns of Epping, Fremont and Candia contributed mutual aid, and without them the fire would have been much more serious.

I thank all the town departments for their cooperation during the year and offer a special thanks to the firemen for a job very well done. Also, a thanks to the wives and families of our firefighters, who have had many a special occasion interrupted.

REPORT OF DISTRICT FOREST FIRE CHIEF AND YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and suppression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United States.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community

governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,800 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire suppression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to suppress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000. or a jail term of up to one year or both.

Before closing I would like to thank all the people that donated to the "Dog Kennel Fund". \$500.00 was raised, but not near enough to build it as is necessary. The kennel has been winterized for this winter and I will continue in the Spring, with the current Dog Officer, hoping to finish it as originally planned.

I want to take this opportunity to thank the Police Department, the Selectmen, and all others who assisted me during the last eight years, especially, to all the fine citizens that are concerned about "Man's Best Friends."

RAYMOND PLANNING BOARD
Report for 1978

During the 1978 year the Raymond Planning Board received 17 applications for subdivision of land. Fourteen of these subdivisions were approved and three subdivisions carried over from 1977 were approved. This created 60 new lots. Ten of these new lots are commercial. There are three subdivisions which are awaiting completion of the subdivision procedures. Ten plans for "Recording Purposes Only" were also approved.

Three Proposed Changes to the Zoning Ordinances were presented to the voters for their consideration. Public hearings were held December 5, 1978 and January 9, 1979 at the Raymond High School. These hearings were poorly attended by the public and the Planning Board did not receive much input regarding these Proposed Changes to the Zoning Ordinances.

On November 17, 1978, the State Supreme Court ruled on the Building Moratorium. The Court ruled "...At this time and under the circumstances of this case we uphold the validity of this zoning ordinance only as a temporary emergency measure to allow the town two years at most to develop a master or comprehensive plan for phasing in growth and providing therefore."

Under the New Hampshire statutes, a plan is written by the planning board, using whatever outside help they desire. A good system used

locally in recent years, is the "sounding board," with professional planning assistance.

The sounding board ideally is an official sub-committee of the planning board. It is made up of a cross-section of the citizens of the town, some 30 to 60 in number. It sets goals for the town.

Professional planners meanwhile inform the sounding board of the scientific and statistical facts of the area and the town: the projected growth rate, the uses of the various soils, the important natural areas and facts of economic life of a more densely populated municipality. Also, near the end of the process, the variety of ordinances and regulations that might be employed to achieve the goals decided on are explained.

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission has already met with the Board of Selectmen and the Planning Board and have prepared a preliminary proposal for a master plan along with an estimated cost of \$20,000. If the money for the master plan is approved by the voters, a sounding board will be formed. The Planning Board feels that this is the right direction for the town to follow and urges that work on the master plan begin.

REPORT OF THE SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION

The Southern New Hampshire Planning Commission is a voluntary organization of local governments serving a common region. Member communities have many common problems which affect each other and can more effectively be solved on a cooperative, areawide basis. Because of the economies of scale offered by areawide programs, many of these problems can be dealt with through the Commission at less cost to the taxpayers.

The Commission is established under state law and its Board is made up of Commissioners appointed by local elected officials from the member communities. These Commissioners control all decisions made by the Commission...decisions which are voluntarily implemented by the participating governments.

The Commission has accepted the challenge to look to the problem of coordinating the planning, and the development of many units of government within the region. In doing so, it does not usurp the function of the local planning boards, rather it supplements their work and efforts by serving as a "clearinghouse" agency, or a "ready alert" group that can warn local units of impending problems for all which may flow from a decision of a single municipality, the state or the federal government. We can provide advice on how a common problem might be met through joint action.

During the past year, the Commission published three major documents of areawide significance. The Land Use Plan 2000, Southern New Hampshire Subregion and A Housing Plan For The Southern New Hampshire Subregion have been, and will continue to be important references and resource materials for communities wrestling with growth and development problems.

A Rural Transit Development Program For The Southern New Hampshire Subregion, published in September, could result in substantial savings for participating school districts that are currently paying dearly for special student transport services. This program is also designed to extend transit service to the rural transportation-disadvantaged, particularly the elderly and the handicapped.

Direct Local Assistance Services

A representative sampling of staff services provided to the Town of Raymond during the year includes:

- . Provided Town officials with information regarding the Municipal Law Lecture Series, a Capital Improvements Program seminar, and the Commission-sponsored Community Development Block Grant, Small Cities Program workshop;

- . Prepared two preapplications for Community Development funds for water system improvements at the request of the Water Department and the Board of Selectmen;

- . Provided the Police Department with Town road maps;

- . Prepared, at the request of the Board of Selectmen, a proposal for a master plan contract;

- . Provided the Planning Board with the following material and documents:

 - Planning Board Notebooks

 - Land Use Plan 2000, Southern New Hampshire Subregion

 - A Housing Plan For The Southern New Hampshire Subregion

 - The Land Book

 - Growth Management (2 volumes)

 - Town base map with road names

 - Soils condition overlay map

 - A complete set of aerial photo prints providing Town-wide coverage, with index map, at a scale of 1" - approximately 220'.

- . Staff is currently researching criteria for subdivision review for the Planning Board;

- . Obtained for the Selectmen and Planning Board, brochures prepared by the Office of the Governor on four (4) potential oil refinery sites in Raymond;

- . Provided data and resource material for oil refinery proposal evaluations;

- . Completed a housing condition survey of 278 structures containing 386 dwelling units in the Raymond Village area.

RAYMOND WATER DEPARTMENT
Annual Report of Commissioners

The following is a brief summary of the activities of the water department for the year 1978. This does not necessarily include minor repairs or replacements. We installed 13 new services at the following locations:

- Sesame Street - 3
- Sun Hill Drive - 1
- Route 101 - 3
- Essex Drive - 1
- Main Street - 2
- Epping Street - 1
- Harriman Road - 2

We also installed 4 new hydrants and 6" gate valves.

We removed the hydrant on Main Street located in front of the Exeter Co-op Bank.

We tapped an 8" line at the station and installed $\frac{3}{4}$ " corporation for the new clorene machine.

We installed a new butterfly valve shutoff at the station to replace the old check valve which was plugged with rust, etc.

We installed a 1" valve for the pumps.

We installed a 1" valve vacuum tank drain.

We cleaned out #1 pump, check valve, lines, etc.

A 12" main was installed from the existing 12" main on Route 101 to the Texaco Station on Route 101. Also an 8" main and casing were installed under Route 101 to the McDonalds building site plus about 1000 feet of 8" main on Essex Drive.

As many of you are aware, we are trying for a federal grant which would enable the town of Raymond to hook up to the much needed new well. We wish to take this opportunity to thank the water users for replying so promptly to the survey which was a requirement by the government concerning this grant.

We also hope to paint the interior and exterior of the tower located on Orchard Street during the coming year.

We wish to express our thanks to all those concerned people who have provided assistance, suggestions, and timely advice.

Circulation and new borrowers are still increasing. To gain a clear record of our patrons, re-registration will be conducted beginning in January, 1979.

RAYMOND RECREATION COMMISSION ANNUAL REPORT

The Raymond Recreation Commission had another successful year; many projects were accomplished. Matching funds from The New Hampshire Commission on the Arts Grant were applied for and received by the Director and used to provide a concert series on the band stand at Lyman Park.

The Summer Playground Program made the move from the High School site to the Elementry School. Since the Elementry School is much more suitable for the elementry age child and possible construction at the High School would cause problems in the running of the program there. Over 200 children registered and participated in the summer activities which included eleven field trips to places like a Red Sox game, Cannon Mt., Aerial Tramway, The Flume, The Basin, The Isle of Shoals via The Viking Queen, Sunapee State Park, Plowshares Farm, Bensons Animal Farm, Canobie Lake Park, and Pawtuchaway State Park.

Some of these field trips were possible through the help of a CETA Grant applied for by the Director. This Grant being over \$500. enabled the Recreation Department to hire additional transportation to handle the large number of children going on the field trips.

The Summer Swimming Program had 160 children taking part in the swimming lessons that were offered throughout the summer.

There were also many improvements made at the Beach a new sign was built and set up, a lifeguard stand, and raft were also built and placed there.

These projects were completed with the help of a CETA Grant written by The Recreation Department's Director for maintenance people and laborers.

Other projects completed with the help of CETA were the installation of lighting and a ceiling on the band stand at Lyman Park. CETA

also provided us with SPEDY children to help with the Summer Program.

Signs for the Fitness Trail at the Elementry School were made up during the summer as were signs for the Community Recreation Development Project.

A Jeep was acquired from Government Surplus and restored by CETA workers to be used for maintenance of park areas.

Maintenance work areas and a Recreation Department Office were established at The "Little Red School House", at the High School. This area is in anticipation of the Community Recreation facility planned for the High School site and provides improved work area for the school maintenance supervisor.

Many new programs were begun during the year. The Recreation Department has helped establish the Senior Citizens News Letter, which is put out monthly and helps keep the lines of communication open for many Seniors. A Day Trip Program was also begun for seniors with one very successful trip through the Kangamangus Pass during the height of the foliage season.

The Commission has also worked on the establishment of Cross-Country Ski Trails on private lands.

An agreement was also signed by the Selectmen making the Commission responsible for the establishment, maintenance and controls of park area in town.

Much support to the Community by The Recreation Department came from the School, the Selectmen, Senior Citizens, Service Clubs. The Department offers the community services in a very wide range of people.

The Commission looks for continued growth by The Recreation Department to the extent that the Community demands it.

I have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Raymond for the year ended December 31, 1978, listed in the foregoing table of contents. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

The financial statements of the Trustees of the Trust Funds for the year ended December 31, 1978 have not been included in the accompanying financial report, as the Trustees did not submit their records to me for examination.

The records of the Tax Collector were incomplete and not reconciled to the warrants issued. Specific deficiencies are disclosed in my separate report on material weaknesses in internal accounting control (page A-19). The effect of such differences in the Tax Collector's records upon the financial statements of the Town, taken as a whole, were not readily determinable. However, based upon tests made during my examination, it did not appear that such differences would materially affect the financial position of the Town.

In my opinion, subject to the effects of any adjustments to the financial statements resulting from the matters discussed in the preceding paragraph, the financial statements listed in the foregoing table of contents present fairly the financial position of the Town of Raymond at December 31, 1978, and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

I have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Raymond for the year ended December 31, 1978, and have issued my report thereon dated February 21, 1979. My examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as I considered necessary in the circumstances.

In connection with my examination, I also (1) performed tests of compliance with the Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Acts and regulations as required by Sections II.C.3. and III.C.3. of the Audit Guide and Standards for Revenue Sharing and Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Fund Recipients (Guide) issued by the Office of Revenue Sharing, U.S. Department of the Treasury, and (2) compared the data on Bureau of Census Form RS-9 with the audited records of the Town of Raymond as required by Sections II.C.4. of the "Guide."

Based on these procedures, I noted only one instance of noncompliance with the regulations, in that Antirecession Fiscal Assistance funds (\$288.44) were not appropriated or obligated within six months of their receipt. There were no material differences between the data on the Bureau of Census Form RS-9 and the records of the Town of Raymond for the year ended December 31, 1978.

I have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Raymond for the year ended December 31, 1978, and have issued my report thereon dated February 21, 1979. As part of my examination, I made a study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent I considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purposes of such evaluation are to establish a basis for reliance on the system of internal accounting control in determining the nature, timing and extent of other auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements and to assist the auditor in planning and performing his examination of the financial statements.

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurances as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgments by management.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgment, carelessness, or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by management either with respect to the execution and recording of transactions or with respect to the estimates and judgments required in the preparation of financial statements. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal

accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

My examination of the financial statements made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, including the study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control for the year ended December 31, 1978, that was made for the purposes set forth in the first paragraph of this report, would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system because it was based on selective tests of accounting records and related data. However, such study and evaluation disclosed the following conditions that I believe to be material weaknesses.

Accounting and control procedures implemented by the Tax Collector are inadequate for the requirements of the Office. Weaknesses in such procedures have exposed the funds and equitable interests of the Town to possible loss. The records of the Tax Collector were incomplete, in that the Collector's journal of cash receipts did not reflect all monies which had been received and remitted to the Treasurer. It was not possible to reconcile these non-recorded receipts through alternative records; accordingly, a \$3,955 variance exists between the monies deposited into the Tax Collector's account and the monies accounted for by the Collector in the annual Summary of Warrants report.

The Report of Collector's Sale of Real Estate was not filed with the Register of Deeds on a timely basis, as required by RSA 80:27. This report, when properly filed, records the lien on property for unpaid taxes sold to the Town by the Tax Collector.

The Tax Collector failed, on occasion, to remit collections to the Treasurer on a timely basis, as required by RSA 41:35.


Procedures for the calculation and collection of interest on delinquent taxes were not applied on a consistent basis. Over or under charges of interest were not, however, material in dollar amounts.

Procedures to insure the allocation of Federal Grants (Antirecession Fiscal Assistance Funds) within prescribed limitation periods were lax.

The Town Officers' surety bonds were not available for me to examine during my audit since they had not yet been approved by the Department of Revenue Administration. Inaccuracies in the dates and amounts of bond coverage caused delays of nearly a year, from the date the Officers were elected, in getting proper approval.

The foregoing conditions were considered in determining the nature, timing, and extent of audit tests to be applied in my examination of the financial statements, and this report of such conditions does not modify my report dated February 21, 1979, on such financial statements.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies of the Town of Raymond conform to generally accepted accounting principles as applicable to governmental units. The following is a summary of the significant policies.

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The modified accrual basis of accounting is followed by all funds. Modifications to the accrual basis consist generally of:

1. Revenues are recorded as received in cash except for -
 - (a) revenues susceptible to accrual and
 - (b) material revenues that are not received at the normal time of receipt.

2. Expenditures are recorded on an accrual basis except for -
 - (a) disbursements for inventory type items, which may be considered expenditures at the time of purchase;
 - (b) prepaid expenses, which normally are not recorded;
 - (c) interest on long-term debt, which should normally be an expenditure when due; and
 - (d) the encumbrance method of accounting.

GENERAL FIXED ASSETS

General fixed assets purchased are recorded as expenditures in the general fund or appropriate special fund at the time of purchase. No depreciation has been provided on general fixed assets.

GENERAL LONG-TERM INDEBTEDNESS

In recording long-term debt, the Town of Raymond conforms with guidelines set forth in the National Committee on Governmental Accounting publication Governmental Accounting, Auditing and Financial Reporting (GAAFR). The GAAFR principle, which is a component of generally accepted accounting principles, requires that general obligation bonds and other forms of long-term debt supported by general revenues are obligations of the Town as a whole and not its individual constituent funds. Therefore, such long-term liabilities should not be carried as specific liabi-

lities of any fund, but should be set up in a separate financial statement of the Town.

TRUST FUNDS

Trust funds in the custody of the Town's trustees are accounted for on the cash basis. Such accounting is consistent with applicable regulations regarding funds held for investment by trustees of trust funds.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Raymond Water Department prepares its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. Since the Department maintains its records on such a basis, the preparation of accrual basis financial statements is not readily possible.

Fixed assets purchased are recorded as expenditures at the time payment is made. There is no provision made in these financial statements for the capitalization and depreciation of fixed assets.

NOTE 2 - HYDRANT RENTAL

The Department receives an annual appropriation from the Town of Raymond General Fund for the rental, by the Town, of the water hydrants.

2/3 majority vote.

Hughin Holt explained to the voters present that a 2/3 vote was necessary on this Article to apply to the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation (BOR) for reimbursement of the \$16,000.00 or any portion that the BOR would provide in matching funds for the property that was voted on in Article 5. Mr. Holt explained that if an affirmative vote was declared on Article 6, the School Board would then apply for BOR funding. If a negative vote was declared on Article 6, the School Board would not apply for BOR funding and the School District would still own the land by virtue of the voting in the affirmative on Article 5.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT. IN THE TOWN OF RAYMOND, COUNTY OF ROCKINGHAM AND STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE, QUALIFIED TO VOTE IN DISTRICT AFFAIRS:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Community Gymnasium in said District, on the third day of March, 1979, at seven o'clock in the evening to act upon the following articles:

1. To choose school district officials for the ensuing year.
2. To choose agents and committees in relation to any subject embraced in the warrant.
3. To hear reports of Auditors and pass any vote relating thereto.
4. To see if the District will authorize the school board to accept on behalf of the District any Federal or State Funds, including Manpower Administration funds and Department of Resource and Economic Development funds, or gifts from either private or public sources, designed to improve educational opportunities; further, to see if the District will authorize the school board to make application for such funds and to expend the same for projects as it may designate. (Recommended by Budget Committee)
5. To see if the District will vote to allow smoking in the Raymond Community gymnasium and the Lamprey River Elementary School gymnasium/cafeteria facilities for non-school sponsored activities, subject to school board regulations to protect persons and property.
6. To see if the District will direct the elected representatives of the Raymond-Epping area to the General Court to support responsible legislation which holds parents responsible for vandalism and other acts of their minor children; and further, to direct the Raymond School Board to prosecute children committing acts of vandalism.
7. To see if the District will vote to authorize the Raymond School Board to expend all interest earned on funds invested by the District in the 1978-1979 fiscal year, totaling approximately Nineteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,900.00) for carrying out and furthering the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation Program previously approved by the

District. Further, that the school board be authorized to expend all money that may be received as gifts for such project. (Recommended by Budget Committee).

8. To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to contract with a qualified independent auditing firm or the Department of Revenue Administration for the fiscal year financial audit, in accordance with the laws of the State of New Hampshire (RSA 197:14, revised). Said authorization to remain in effect until such time as the District votes to elect local auditors as provided by State statutes.

9. RAYMOND SCHOOL DISTRICT SUPERVISORY UNION FIFTEEN

Report of the Chairperson of the School Board

This report, perhaps lengthy, is intended to focus on some of the issues of interest or concern to members of your school board. All positions are not necessarily 'board consensus'; some may be quite contentious. It is hoped that this statement may precipitate public interest and a response helpful to our community, schools and students:

'Proposition 13', Etc.

Any politician implying that any 'Proposition 13' type tax reduction proposal has any relevancy for New Hampshire is either a demagogue or is ignorant of the facts. Unlike California, there is very little state support of social services in N.H. No state contributes less to local education than N.H. Poorer communities such as Raymond are almost as totally dependent upon their limited tax base for school funding as wealthier towns are. It would be in our interest to have our state senator and three representatives advocate tax sources which would relieve the regressive property tax.

Per Pupil Cost VS Program Quality

While the quality of education doesn't necessarily improve in direct proportion to the amount of money spent, schools absolutely do not become better the less money is available. It takes 80% of our local tax dollar to provide our schools a sum of money per Raymond pupil which is about the lowest in the state. The state commended Raymond in its elementary school evaluation report and unofficially expresses amazement at the diversity and quality of the Raymond grade one through twelve program considering the limited dollars we spend. There must be other factors which account for our relative success.

Teacher Salary Level and Competency

During the difficult several years when our schools were jam-packed with students followed by the five years when our students received a

shortened school day and the time since while inflation and local growth have eroded our budget, there were two factors which helped prevent greater deteriorations of program and standards: We've had a good number of competent and committed staff who have 'hung in there' with us, in effect, subsidizing our system as the local salary level slipped slightly relative to others. We have maintained a beginning teacher salary slightly higher than that of our nearest neighboring school districts; while there are more candidates for many job categories than there are positions, there is, however, no abundance of good teachers.

Accountability: Teaching Skill and Pupil Performance

Every parent is entitled to have information about their child's skills. Such skills should be those determined to be important by Raymond parents and teachers and tested locally. We should be concerned for the real motives of persons who wish to determine how capable specific teachers are and how 'good' certain town's schools are based upon tests dictated by the state. There are many factors involved in pupil achievement: the learning potential of the student(s); teacher - student ratio; instructional materials available; etc. The politician who would deny responsible state foundation funding to less wealthy districts but who would compare schools by a state-wide test might be presumed to be uninformed or having a malicious intent toward public school students.

The end result of a good local accountability plan will be in revising local curriculum objectives, better supervision and training of teachers resulting in improved pupil performance.

Teaching 'Basics' VS. Teaching Values and Attitudes

It is not now, nor has it ever been necessary to consider having the schools either teaching reading, 'riting, and 'rithmetic or teaching courtesy, kindness, helpfulness, honesty, respect for the rights and property of others, etc. Talk about the 'back to basics' movement might cause the public to surmise that the focus of local instruction ever 'left' the '3 R's'. In fact, Raymond student average performance compares very well with national grade level expectations. Frankly, more student, parent and community concern is expressed to school teachers,

administration and school board regarding the behaviors of some students and the presumed diminished standards in the values and attitudes of many students than about 'basics'.

Upon real consideration of the matter it is reasonable to conclude that we really can't teach basics without teaching values and vice versa? Can anyone really recall having a teacher who successfully taught subject matter who is not regarded as having made as great an impact upon oneself for the values and attitudes represented and 'taught'? Both 'basics' and values are taught by teachers in schools and parents in homes. The teacher or parent who doesn't personally implement and exemplify the values and attitudes we'd hope that a pupil might learn is unlikely to 'teach' them.

Building Condition

No Raymond school building since World War II has been done at a cost much above the minimum per square foot 'going rate' at the time.

Most represent good initial value received but much is cheaper construction requiring more expensive maintenance. Because of the priorities of the past decade much maintenance has been irregular and minimal. The 60 year old wooden portion of the Junior-Senior High School is in particular need of extensive renovation. Insulation is needed, windows are loose, heating and ventilation poorly controlled, ceilings high, plaster, woodwork and blackboards worn. It is hoped that a federal energy grant might help us get started on a 'catch up' maintenance effort and that we can establish a regular annual schedule in a few years.

School Grounds

Limited building project funds and necessary priority to essential classroom needs have caused us to neglect site development in building. Annual budgets, have seldom had money for fertilizer, loam, shrubs, sidewalks or maintenance of playfields, etc. Some funds were diverted this year and will be next year to improve the situation. Beyond its esthetic value it is hoped that students, staff and citizens will take greater pride in a more 'completed' looking facility. A rolled rock playground is neither safe for the bodies nor clothing of children and the absence of black top play area and adequate equipment promotes playground 'roughhouse' and bad in-school

behavior. The Raymond Community Outdoor Recreation Project will provide relocated, improved and more extensive leisure-time facilities for students and Raymond citizens of all ages.

Recreation Department: Community and School Collaboration

The School Board endorses the concept that the school facility be extensively utilized by Raymond citizens. Pioneering in this is the Community Learning Group which demonstrates that learning is a lifelong process. With priority to governmental and civic events, the town Recreation Commission through its Director has responsibility for scheduling usage of indoor and exterior school district facilities. Use agreements between School Board and Rec Commission and Board of Selectmen and Rec Commission are models for more extensive cooperation among those interested in a better Raymond community for all.

Obviously, there are extra costs involved in school usage by the 'non-student' population. This is reflected in the school budget heat, light and custodial categories, etc. A guideline of priority indicates when use is free, when user payment for kitchen or police security is required and when private or primarily non-civic profit-making require rental payments.

An example of sensible cooperation is in utilization of vehicles for town, school and community purposes. Certainly, in these times it makes no sense to use a fleet of cars when one large or medium-sized bus or van will do a job of transporting a group of band members to Durham, senior citizens to the mountains, fourth graders to Strawberry Banke, girl scouts to Boston or high school students to the Exeter Vocational Center. Further, to have vehicles on 'downtime' evenings, weekends or vacation times is not cost effective. A 'school owned' vehicle may be used in recreation department cleaning of the town beach or Common. A town vehicle may be used in the Community Outdoor Rec Project construction on the school grounds.

Each agency provides for the maintenance of the vehicles it owns and the fuel consumed in the use of anyone's vehicles with insurance costs provided through the most economical policy arrangements available by town-school cooperation.

Theft/Vandalism and Attitudes

Theft or wanton damage to the personal property of students or teachers or involving school district facilities is on the increase. This is intolerable anytime and at this time it results in diverting funds to maintenance and replacement which should go for educational purposes.

Some say that vandalism results from changed societal values. This provides a meaningless 'cop out' for individuals doing nothing. 'Society' is police and the courts, school administrators, teachers and School Board, parents and students, citizens and taxpayers and, if there is going to be any change, a responsible effort by each of us is going to be necessary; pointing the finger of blame at others is useless.

It is agreed that very few persons actually vandalize, but all of us at times, perhaps, have attitudes which have the effect of providing an atmosphere wherein the minority is encouraged to behave irresponsibly. Is there enough concern by all of us to consider what might be done to improve things?

Teacher Contract Negotiations

State law mandates that school boards and teacher organizations negotiate contracts regarding salary and related issues. Beginning, by law, early in the school year, the process may last until spring or longer, occupying the time of board members and administrators and teacher negotiators and distracting all parties from doing what is supposed to be the primary function of each: The board, in setting policy and providing necessary direction; administration, in providing supervision and management to implementation; teachers and staff, in instruction and providing feedback to administration and board.

Negotiation, under legal guidelines, is a right which the teaching profession should not have needed but possibly did require given the lack of good faith response by some school districts to their teaching staffs. We believe that a good relationship has existed between the board and professional staff and we believe that the best possible education will be provided to Raymond's students and reasonable salary and conditions for teachers result if school board, administration and teachers respect the traditional and legal prerogatives of the others in mandated negotiations. Input from staff is welcome and communication among all those who are motivated to help improve our schools can only help.

Parental and Community Involvement

Continued development of our schools can most expeditiously proceed from continuing support from parents and citizens. None of us - parents, teachers, administrators or board members - have all the answers, nor are we infallible. The best attitude in contacts is to regard others as being well intended and having a need to be heard and for being responded to constructively.

The board is pleased with the support of the Lamprey River P.T.O. and for the contribution of so many community groups and persons to our schools. To mention any, specifically, would necessarily omit many. Thanks to all. Similarly, we express sincere appreciation to administration and all our staff - teachers, specialists, aides, kitchen and custodial personnel - for their commitment and effort.

Relationships: Selectmen; Town Departments; School Board

The Town is heavily dependent on citizens to serve on the many appointed boards and commissions and committees and to run for the elective offices which help keep Raymond afloat. In no case is the amount of pay or status adequate to attract persons, without a personal axe to grind, unless public service is the prime motivation. Raymond has public-spirited public-servants, but the town came late to many of governmental functions needed in contemporary times and there are few enough persons who are willing to try to help rather than criticize those who are trying 'to do'.

Town departments and boards and school department and committees need to pull together to make our community a better place; to communicate constantly and not to be lead into confrontation at time of crisis. The School Board wishes to participate in joint leadership to that end.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT RAYMOND SCHOOL DISTRICT

During the past several years, one of my major concerns for the Raymond School District has been its rapid school growth. This enrollment has slowed somewhat in the last year but not to the degree that other surrounding communities have experienced, especially those communities located in the south central and southeastern parts of the State.

From 1966, we have seen an increase in the total enrollment of 630 students to a present enrollment of 1,213 students. Enrollment figures have doubled over an eleven year period. It would be a simple task to say that our predicted increase would be a certain percentage each year but unfortunately too many variables enter into the calculations such as inflation, number of homes being constructed, family growth rates and current decisions made by planning and zoning boards. Present and future study committees must take growth rates into consideration as one of the major ongoing problems of the community in relation to needed facilities and programs. The school administration has kept open lines of communication with State and Federal legislators to see what assistance they may have to offer Raymond in the future.

The Raymond School District makes special efforts to meet the needs of the physically, intellectually, and emotionally handicapped students as required by Federal and State laws. At present, 69 students have been determined to need specifically designed programs due to educational handicaps. Most of these students take advantage of special programs such as speech, language, reading and guidance. This year has seen the development of a new

resource complex at the high school. This program can meet the needs of many students with learning disabilities, emotional problems and other difficulties that interfere with learning. There are still several students whose needs are too severe or different to be dealt within the district. These students are assigned to special programs at other public/non-public schools in the area.

In the past year, the Raymond School District has adopted broad goals which will influence the community in their aspirations for education for the students. In conjunction with these goals, there has been developed a local planning group which is in compliance with the State Department of Education's Accountability Plan in which they have recently completed the preliminary phase of its charge, a design which outlines implementation procedures and timelines for the completion of the required steps involved. The four fields for which testing has been mandated by the State Department of Education are: English, Language Arts, Mathematics, and History and Government of both the United States and the State of New Hampshire. Members of this committee are comprised of members of the community, staff members, administration and school board. This is an on-going task and will need several years before full implementation is achieved.

I would like to extend my thanks to the Raymond community, school board, administration and staff for their support of the educational system at the Raymond Schools.

Principal**

TO: The Superintendent, School Board, and the School District:

About ninety percent of the states now require some form of teacher recertification, with many moving away from the "back to college" method. New Hampshire is one of these with its "Staff Development Plan." This is geared more to meeting local needs through the inservice route. This is practical because it saves high tuition costs, reaches more teachers for less money, and deals specifically with local needs, as determined by periodic survey. We have just completed our first three year plan which will be reported elsewhere in this report.

We feel that we have come of age this year in the area of special needs. This is an area which has been more than amply taken care of at the Elementary School level. However, up to now, when a student graduated to the upper levels he lost the support services he had grown accustomed to having at the lower levels.

Currently we have a special needs area which consists of the following: (1) a resource room; (2) a "learning lab" for students with learning disabilities; and (3) a center for students with emotional, behavioral, and adjustment problems. In the resource room students receive an individualized learning program consisting of reading, mathematics and survival skills. Where there are problems with learning the special needs teacher works with the classroom teacher to monitor progress and to provide appropriate support. In the learning laboratory the program provides individualized prescriptive learning for every student while encouraging continuous progress toward realistic goals and objectives. This is a diagnostic/prescriptive center designed to meet the needs of the student based on prescriptions and goals as recorded in the Individual Education Plan. Each student has a daily task folder which directs him/her to the lessons for that day.

Progress is recorded each day, and new prescriptions are assigned. Much support is given the student in his regular subjects. In the center for the emotionally handicapped a very structured learning environment is provided, where each student's progress can be closely

monitored. Individualized plans are designed to remediate academic difficulties, and to enable the student to function within his/her range of abilities.

We are presently housing the Southeastern Regional Education Service Center's Life and Learning Adjustment Program for the more severely emotionally handicapped. To initiate placement in this program there must be : (1) Diagnosis by a qualified examiner; (2) Recommendation by the local evaluation placement team after completion of SERESC Request Form (including: Psychological Reports, School reports, other records); (3) LLAP Team reviews and recommends to SERESC Director; (4) If the LLAP Team feels referral is appropriate, the parents and child are invited to visit the program; (5) This is followed by a staffing and a recommendation is made to the SERESC Director regarding acceptance/non-acceptance; (6) The SERESC Director notifies the local team accordingly; (7) If placement is recommended, the approval of the Superintendent and the School Board must be secured; (8) The parent, and hopefully the student, must approve the placement; (9) This must be followed by a statement of intent; (10) The SERESC Director notifies the receiving school Principal; (11) The student is officially enrolled by filing the following: (a) Annual Statement of Placement, (b) Cumulative record, (c) Letter of assignment by his/her Superintendent of Schools, (d) I.E.P. (Individual Education Plan).

We have three students in the LLAP Program which represents a savings to the Raymond School District of several thousand dollars.

During this school year the State of New Hampshire has unveiled a State Accountability Plan which provides for a process of reporting to the public what the schools are doing. The State Board of Education is making local boards responsible for developing local plans of accountability. The Raymond School Board has designated the Curriculum Council, with additional community membership, as the local planning group number one, responsible for developing the Raymond School District's Accountability Plan by January 1979.

Section 6 of the "Power and Duties of School

Boards" is the basis of authority for the establishment of the New Hampshire Accountability Plan. It states: "School Boards shall, in consultation with the Superintendent and in accordance with statutes and regulations of the State Board of Education determine the educational goals of the district, develop long-range plans and identify measurable and attainable short-term objectives. The school board shall require the appropriate review of such programs and make public the results of such investigations."

"Thus, the State Department of Education, in cooperation with all school districts, embarks upon the following planning and student competency program in an effort to constructively improve our utilization of the total investment of New Hampshire's citizens in the education of children."

"By June 1981, each local school district must utilize the process developed in their pre-planning phase to complete each of the following steps:

1. Develop essential student outcomes for both state mandated and locally designated fields of learning.
2. Develop performance indicators for all essential outcomes.
3. Design and carry out sound assessment procedures.
4. Analyze the assessment data.
5. Report assessment results to the State Department of Education and the local community.
6. Develop a management plan based on assessment results."

The fields of learning must include, but need not be limited to:

- (1) The English language arts.
- (2) Mathematics.
- (3) United States history and government.
- (4) New Hampshire history and government.

During this school year we were privileged, through the New Hampshire Commission on the Arts, to participate in the Artists-in-the-Schools Program. We had two artists in residence during the second semester - a writer and a sculptor. Each artist was involved with twelve to fifteen students who had shown an interest. We feel that there were some very positive outcomes from this program. We believe that Artists-in-the-School fostered creativity among students. The artists were excellent in their encouragement of same. They demonstrated that self-identity, self-knowledge,

self-discipline and self-confidence can grow in a program such as this. "Passive" and "problem" students made positive academic gains.

Also during the second semester we became involved in a resident outdoor school program for our sixth grade known as "Nature's Classroom." Outdoor education is the use of the out-of-doors to facilitate the total educational process through experiences not easily conducted in the classroom. What better way to learn about the natural environment than to live in it, accept its challenges and therefore develop a greater awareness through exploring it first hand. There can be no question but that a youngster comes away with a better understanding of man's dependence on nature, and his quest to control it, to his everlasting benefit.

Nature's classroom attempts to relate the natural environment to the man-made environment. It attempts to unify learning. It tries to improve the personal relationship between the classroom teacher and student by making them co-workers (for one week) in natural surroundings where they live, work and play together.

The results are not readily measured on an achievement test but the effects on attitudes are boundless.

Released Time

Being of the firm conviction that staff planning is an essential part of a good educational program, we applied to the State Department of Education for planning an in-service time for teachers on alternate Wednesday afternoons. Since, the number of school districts in New Hampshire which are implementing in-service training projects is increasing, presently thirty-three are involved; and since this does not violate minimum time standards our request was granted, with the proviso that we forward an evaluation of this program to the Department at the end of the school year.

Curriculum development and coordination, in-service training for teachers, and planning for the special needs of students are but a few of the activities deemed beneficial to the entire school system.

Our pre-school workshop for teachers this year centered on school board policy and administrative detail. Consequently, we enjoyed one of the smoothest openings in my memory. Our staff was alert and ready, and our students were excited and happy. One nice thing about this business of education is that each year is a new beginning, an exciting challenge that never

seems to vacillate.

Our enrollment increase seems to have abated to about three percent due in large part perhaps to the building moratorium.

We have initiated budget planning for 1979-80 very early this year. Hence, we have given much time to acquainting the staff with the intricacies of line item budgeting, and the rationale for same.

We have also given time to familiarize the staff with the newly adopted "Goals" of the district. We have done this with regards to both staff

development plans, and the new push for accountability.

ELEMENTARY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The current year began September 6. We opened with an enrollment of 538 students, grades 1-5. The enrollment has risen to 553 as of January 15, 1979.

The curriculum work noted in last year's elementary principal's report is continuing. We now have a curriculum guide stating what is taught, grade by grade, in language arts, mathematics, social studies, science, and library skills. The curriculum guide is now in effect and is being monitored at all grade levels.

Over the past three years, we have updated textbooks in all of the subject areas. Our children are therefore working with good educational materials with recent publication dates.

The enrichment program for students of high scholastic ability was resumed in January 1979. The staff inservice training and planning project has also been continued with excellent results. The curriculum work mentioned above has been accomplished because of the time made available on Wednesday afternoons.

In terms of building space, this year has been manageable, although in the 3rd and 5th grades, class sizes are larger than desirable.

We have added no new staff positions this

year. However, we now have the part-time services of a school psychologist and an occupational therapist on a contracted basis.

Last year's report called attention to the excellent services made available to children with special needs. This year, the New Hampshire Department of Education, Division of Special Education, conducted an evaluation of our special services program. The program was highly commended by the evaluators. Mr. Crepeau, our assistant principal, directs special services. He and his staff have done an excellent job.

The elementary school continues to strengthen its position as one of the better elementary schools in New Hampshire and one in which we take great pride. The high quality of our staff, the low staff turnover, the aforementioned special services, continuing program improvements, the school board's commitment to education, and you, the people of Raymond, are responsible for this.

REPORT ON RAYMOND CURRICULUM COUNCIL Local Planning Group for Accountability

The Curriculum Council was established to act as the representative school district organization in the area of curriculum development. All school district requests which involve the following must be approved by the council prior to school board approval:

- I. Require additional teachers
- II. Require the coordination or cooperation of two or more grades or both schools
- III. Initiate new courses
- IV. Change the graduation requirements
- V. Involve textbook purchases that
 - a. Are for new courses
 - b. Involve more than two grades with the same discipline
 - c. Are not supplemental in nature
 - d. Are not minor revisions of an older similar text

As a result, one totally new course has been added to the 1978-1979 academic school year at Raymond High School. It is a voluntary elected

course, Media Studies, for those students selecting an English major. Also, an achievement of the council during this past calendar year has been the development of long needed Raymond School District goals. These goals have been approved by the Raymond School Board and will be in effect for years to come to serve as guidelines for district activities.

The New Hampshire Commissioner of Education has required all school districts to develop an Accountability Plan. Therefore, in August, 1978, the Raymond School Board decided that the Curriculum Council would also function as the Local Planning Group to develop the district's Accountability plan.

The group has been meeting on a weekly basis and decided the purpose of the Raymond School District's Accountability Plan is to:

1. Promote student growth
2. Promote more effective instruction
3. Improve individual student performance
4. Direct the improvement of curriculum
5. Inform parents and the community of

student learning

6. Provide competency based education
7. Promote consistency and improvement of standards

The intended purpose of the results is not to compare students, schools, districts or to evaluate staff members.

Student knowledge of "Academic Skills" and "Applied Life Skills" will be tested in the following areas:

1. English language arts
2. Mathematics
3. U.S. History and Government
4. New Hampshire and government

"Academic Skills", refer to those fundamental skills and knowledge expected to be learned in

school and "Applied Life Skills" refer to those practical skills which are expected, necessary and used in everyday life.

The plan must be implemented by 1981 and at that time student test results will be published for public inspection.

We are in hopes that our Accountability Plan will give us input as to the direction of our curriculum plans and to better inform the public about their children and their schools. RAYMOND CURRICULUM COUNCIL END OF YEAR REPORT

June 1978

The Raymond Curriculum Council, authorized by the Raymond School District Policy IC officially met for the first time on October 25, 1977.

Early council meetings were devoted to the election of officers, review of pertinent school board policies and general operating rules and guidelines.

It had been agreed upon by council members to hold approximately two meetings per month and then shift to one meeting per month after operational procedures had been established. As a result of this decision, meetings averaged one to two per month during the school year.

By-Laws are developed very early during the council's formation and required several meetings in order to finalize them to the satisfaction of the group. Copies of these regulations were submitted to the school board. A series of forms have been developed; i.e., agenda item request form and curriculum proposal form. The curriculum proposal form serves as a vehicle for initiating changes in the present curriculum format. As a result of its use, several new and modified portions of courses of study have been achieved both in the elementary and high school level.

Most modifications during the past school year have been minor in content. However, one totally new course has been added to the 1978-79 academic year at the Raymond High School. It is a voluntary elected course in Media Studies

for those students selecting an English major.

The single greatest achievement of the council during the past year has been the development of long needed Raymond School District goals. These goals have been approved by the Raymond School Board and will be in effect for years to come to serve as guidelines for district activities.

In addition, the Raymond Curriculum Council reviewed available achievement test results for all levels of education. They have completed a review of the status of curriculum in the areas of Language Arts, Social Studies, Health, Primary Mathematics and Industrial Arts. Based upon this compiled data, currently on file with the council, it is expected that the 1978-79 academic year will provide for even greater achievement in curriculum development and refinement.

Presently, the Raymond Curriculum Council has an ongoing subcommittee entitled, "Advisory Committee for the Selection of Officers". Election of new personnel to vacant positions will take place in September 1978. These new members will serve for the ensuing 1978-1979 school year on the Raymond Curriculum Council.

HIGH SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

To the Superintendent and the School Board:

The duties of the high school nurse are widely varied. She assists the school doctor in doing physical examinations required for athletic activities including soccer, basketball, track, baseball, cross-country, and cheerleading. Any problems noticed in these exams will be followed up with the parents by the school nurse. Vision and hearing tests are also done on grades 6, 8, 10 & 12 and are done on any student needing them for a particular reason.

As of January 1979, there have been no epidemic illnesses. Notices were sent to parents early in the fall regarding three cases of scabies at the elementary school, but there were no problems with this at the high school. Also, this year, I have obtained Culpak kits from the State Diagnostic Laboratory and am able to screen

students and faculty for strep infections when indicated.

The school nurse sees quite a large number of students each day - usually 15-40, many of whom require first aid. Parents are notified by phone of any major problem or need for dismissal. The school nurse provides transportation home in cases where parents are unable to come for a sick child. School personnel are also treated when necessary.

Individual teaching of hygiene, nutrition and good health practices are done as required on a daily basis; also guidance referrals are sent out when indicated by a student's individual needs.

LAMPREY RIVER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

(1) Preschool registration of 124 four and five-year old children for vision and hearing problems were screened with the aid of the New Hampshire Division of Public Health On April 18, 1978.

(2) Heights and weights, vision and hearing tests were completed on grades 3-5 by January 1979.

(3) First aid was rendered to the students and staff

The fluoride mouth-rinse program is again being offered this year. Sponsored by the Bureau of Dental Public Health, New Hampshire Division of Public Health, this free program includes a dental hygienist examining the children, a film and lecture, a weekly fluoride rinse, and daily tooth brushing throughout the year. The dental

hygienist returns to reexamine the children in the spring.

Dr. Stevener's dental hygienist has been made available on Wednesdays for cleaning teeth of students, grades 1-5. This has been available at no cost and transportation has been provided.

Requirements for immunizations do not always remain the same. Some physicians are now reimmunizing children who received their measles and rubella shots before 15 months of age. Parents should check with their family doctor to see if their child requires these or any other immunizations.

HEALTH EDUCATION PROGRAM REPORT

The Health program in the Raymond Schools this year is basically an extension of last year's program in the Junior-Senior high school; and in the elementary grades, a new physical health program has been implemented.

At the senior high level, the two courses open to 11th and 12th graders are more or less the same. Health I-Contemporary Family Life - focuses on such topics as personality, emotions, dating and friendship, engagement and marriage, and family living. Health II - Physical Health deals with topics relative to a healthy mind and body. Examples of areas of discussion include FirstAid, Drugs, Alcohol, and Smoking, Heart Disease and Cancer, and Nutrition.

At the Junior high level, the course focuses on aggressive behavior. Topics discussed include personality, friendships, peer and family relationships, adolescence, groups, aggression and violence, and use and abuse of drugs, alcohol, and tobacco. The course helps the student look at himself in relation to others and the worlds, the problems, how to cope.

In the elementary school, both physical and mental health are discussed. The physical health area is new this year and covers areas relative to a healthy body and good grooming. The mental health program centers on developing a healthy mind, and personality.

REGION #18 VOCATIONAL CENTER

Since last year's report, the Region #18 Vocational Center has become a reality. Last fall, a Wakefield Construction company was contracted to begin work on the facility which will serve approximately 1,000 students from 17 communities.

In spite of some funding difficulties, which were resolved, the center will open in the Fall of 1980, and offer a wide variety of programs to students who choose to enter gainful employment upon graduation from high school. Our students will be able to attend the center at Exeter for a portion of the day to gain specific career work skills and be at Raymond High School for the balance of the time for non-vocational courses and cocurricular activity.

The facility will also be available for adult vocational programs that will provide job upgrading and business and industrial educational needs. These programs will be operated during the evening hours and during the summer months. Operational costs for these programs would be offset through tuition paid for by the students.

Interested citizens may view the new complex now under construction on Front St. in Exeter adjacent to the Exeter Area High School.

RAYMOND BUDGET COMMITTEE

As a result of action taken at the 1977 and 1978 town meetings, budget preparation for the town and school district is now the responsibility of a Municipal Budget Committee established in accordance with the provisions of RSA Chapter 32.

It is the function of this committee to review all requests for funds, the purpose for these funds, to hold public hearings on proposed budgets and to present these budgets to the voters at the town and school district meetings. It is further the responsibility of this committee to review all special or petitioned articles involving the expenditure of funds, to hold public hearings on them and to either recommend these articles be passed, recommend they not be passed or submit them to the voters without recommendation.

In addition to a membership of three as voted at last years town meeting, the law provides that a member of the Board of Selectmen and a member of the School Board be appointed to the committee. Thus at this time the committee membership is five. We have found that the scope of the work is such that a larger committee is necessary. We have recommended that the committee be enlarged to six elected members plus the two appointed members. This additional personnel, sharing the work load, will more nearly insure a more effective control over budgetary activities in the town.

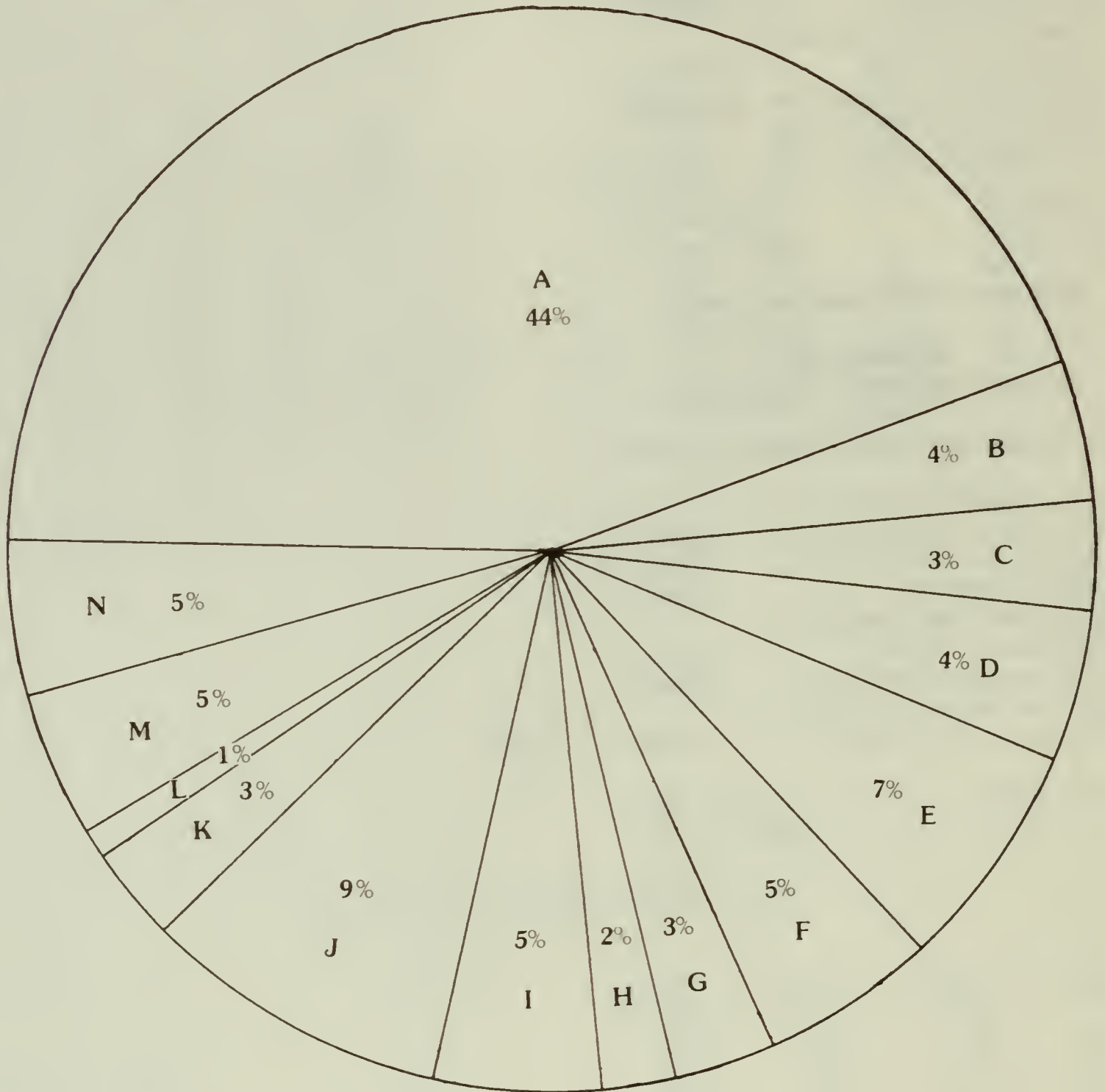

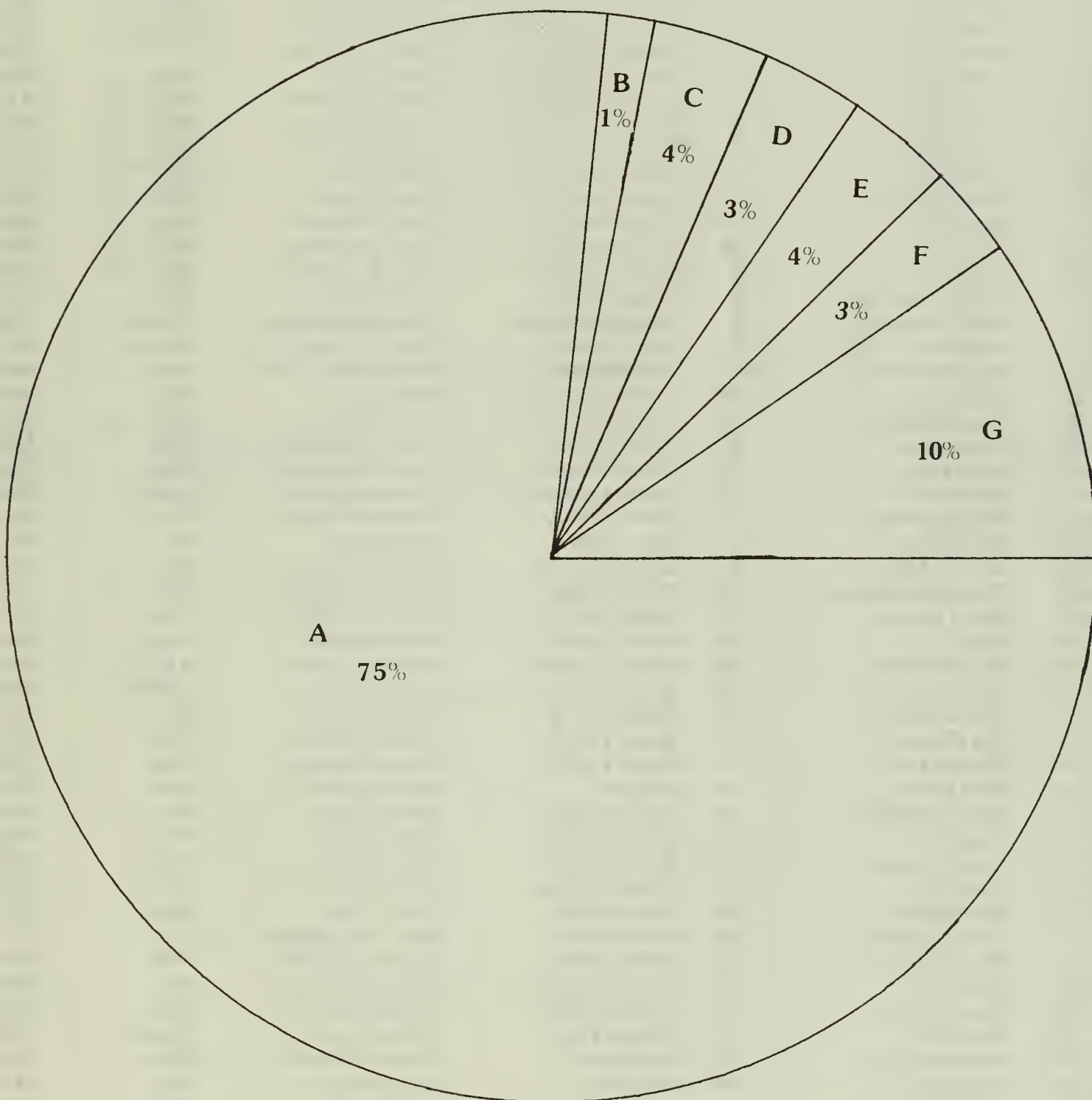
