

REPORT OF THE COUNTY CONVENTION.

DOVER, N. H., Nov. 3, 1891.

The Strafford County Convention met in convention at 11 A. M. Nov. 3, 1891, at the Court House in Dover, N. H., in response to the call of the County Commissioners which was as follows:

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE COUNTY CONVENTION OF STRAFFORD COUNTY, N. H.

By virtue of authority vested in us, the County Commissioners of said County, under the provisions of the General Laws of New Hampshire, Chapter 23, Section 12, you are hereby notified that there will be a meeting of said County Convention, Tuesday, Nov. 3, 1891, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon, at the Court House in said County for the purpose of taking action by the Convention relative to the funding of the County debt.

The meeting was called to order by the Chairman. The Clerk read the call for the meeting. The roll was called by the Clerk and the following members were present: Messrs Swain, Steele, Roberts, Tash, Jackson, Jenness, Reynolds, Killoren, Langley, Lane, Perkins, Woodman, Fox, Chamberlin, Stanley, Hersom, Shorey, Whipple, Hall, Corson, Spencer, Parsons, Boucher, Chase, Faxon, Foss, and Loughlin; 27 of the 35 members comprising the full delegation. Mr. Edgerly, County Commissioner, called upon the County Treasurer, Mr. Berry, to make a statement of the financial condition of the County, who stated as follows:

He also said that \$10,000 fell due Dec. 1, 1891, when

the new bonds, if you vote to bond the floating debt, will be dated, leaving the entire indebtedness of the County \$190,000.

Mr. Chase of Somersworth offered the following resolution:

Resolved by the County Convention of the County of Strafford:

That the County Commissioners be and they are hereby authorized and instructed to raise the sum of \$70,000 upon the credit of said County for the purpose of funding its notes outstanding, by the issue of its bonds at a rate of interest not exceeding 4 I-2 per cent. per annum, interest payable semi-annually, said bonds to be dated Dec. I, 1891, and payable in twenty years. Principal and interest to be paid in gold coin or its equivalent.

Which was seconded by Mr. Steele of Dover.

The resolution was discussed by Messrs. Chase, Steele and Fox in the affirmative, and by Messrs. Felker(Senator from the Rochester District, by permission of the Convention), Reynolds, Faxon and Chamberlin; after which a letter was read by Mr. Meserve, Commissioner, from the Strafford Savings Bank of Dover, which was as follows:

STRAFFORD SAVINGS BANK.

DOVER, N. H., Nov. 3, 1891.

Will take the loan, whatever the amount may be, advancing the money from time to time as the County may need it, on notes, or bonds, as the County may elect, running 20 years, the County having the privilege of paying \$10,000 each year, the notes or bonds to bear 4 1-2 per cent.

E. R. BROWN, President.

Mr. Reynolds of Dover moved to amend the resolution by inserting \$25,000 instead of \$70,000; which amendment was lost on a viva voce vote.

The original resolution was then put upon its passage and carried.

A call of the yeas and nays resulted as follows:

REPORT OF THE COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

TO THE CITIZENS OF STRAFFORD COUNTY:

Agreeably to the laws of the State, we submit the following report for your consideration; also the reports of the Superintendent of the County Farm and Almshouse, County Physician, Chaplain, County Treasurer, Solicitor, Sheriff, Jailor, Clerk of the Supreme Court and Auditors; also a copy of the Clerk's report of the proceedings of the County convention.

Owing to the change in the Public Statutes, whereby the law requires that County reports shall be made for the year ending December 31st, instead of April 30th as heretofore, twenty months have elapsed since the last report was made. This fact should be kept in mind when making comparisons of expenses with preceeding reports.

FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE COUNTY.

The report of the Treasurer shows that the net debt of the County, Jan. 1, 1893, was \$131,674.11 showing a decrease since May 31, 1891, when the last report was made, of \$25,002.84.

December 1, 1891, by the authority of the County delegation, bonds of the amount of \$70,000 were issued, due Dec. 1, 1911, and bearing four per cent.

interest. These bonds were sold to Brewster, Cobb & Esterbrook, Boston, Mass., at a premium of \$1,344 and accrued interest, or a total of \$71,445.11.

The money received by the sale of the bonds was used in taking up outstanding notes against the County, that were bearing interest at the rate of 47-16 to 6 per cent. per annum.

There was in the hands of the Treasurer Jan. 1,1893, \$48,325.89.

Statements regarding the County Farm and crops may be found elsewhere in this report under the Supertendent's report. A number of needed improvements have been made at the Farm since the last report, the approximate cost of which will be found on another page. An open shed 20x80 has been built to furnish store-room for farm wagons, sleds, racks, etc. Heretofore these when not in use have been stored wherever room could be found in the different out-buildings and barn cellars, but a good part always could be found out of doors, exposed to the weather.

There has never been until this season, an ice house at the farm, the ice always having been stored in one of the barns and an old shed. Under this arrangement. nearly double the quantity of ice required, had to be cut, hauled and stored, as about as much would waste in storage as would be used. The timbers in that part of the barn where the ice was stored were found to be nearly all decayed, therefore the Commissioners decided to build an ice house. The building put up is 24x30 with a storage capacity of 100 tons of ice. The "Snell barn" has been repaired by putting in new floor timbers, laying a tie-up floor, clapboarding the gable ends and putting in rolling doors, which makes a warm, comfortable barn of a building that before could only be used for storage purposes. Two floors have recently been laid in the Asylum; also the floors in the cells on the first floor and in the attic. The old floor in the attic has been covered with matched pine boards. The floors in the cells in the attic were laid with great care, the object being to make them water tight if possible, as some of the worst patients in the Asylum are kept on that floor, and the cells often have to be cleaned and washed several times during the day. Eight new cells have been put in the attic during the last year.

These cells are not suitable places for the inmates to sleep, especially in warm weather, but with the present building it seems the best that can be done. The old floor in the first story has been covered with matched hard wood boards; also the floors of the cells. The old floor was badly worn, and in some places was in danger of breaking through. In several places the cracks were so wide that one could look through into the cellar and recognize a person walking across the cellar floor.

The Asylum has been painted throughout on the inside. The work was all done by prisoners and inmates, therefore the cost to the County was only the cost of lead and oil. This building is totally unfit for the purpose for which it is used, the wooden floors soon become saturated with filth and in the cells of the worst patients it is almost impossible to keep the floors so there will be no bad odor from them. Then as the building is wholly built of wood, all the partitions and ceilings being of wood, there is always great danger from fire. The floors in a building used for the purpose which this is used should be iron, both on account of cleanliness and to lessen the danger from fire.

The sewer running through the Almshouse was found to be too small to readily take care of the waste water from the sinks and water closets. It got to be almost a weekly occurrence for the sewer to become clogged up and the water flow back and break through some part of the basement floor. Something had to be done, and it was thought best to take up the drain pipe the entire length of the sewer, and substitute 12-inch for the old 6-inch pipe in use. Since this was done there has been no trouble. The cost was about \$400, but when we consider what a disease breeder the old sewer was, the cost was nothing compared with the epidemic that was sure to follow sooner or later.

Lightning rods have been put on the Almshouse at an expense of \$479.37, the other buildings having been previously provided with rods. Although not believing in the efficiency of rods ourselves, it was suggested by many prominent citizens as necessary for the safety of the building.

There has always been more or less trouble at the farm in regard to the water supply. The source of the supply is a spring located half a mile or more from the building. It is brought to the buildings through a 2-inch pipe. The natural fall of the land brings the water to within fifty or sixty rods of the Almshouse. It runs into a well or small reservoir, and from there it is pumped into a large tank in the upper story of the Almshouse. The pumping until within a few months has been done by a wind-mill, but the wind-mill has never done the work that was necessary to furnish a full supply of water. Although a new mill was purchased some three years ago at an expense of \$600 the tank in the house was rarely full, and often would be down to two or three feet for several days.

For seven weeks in succession this last summer, nearly all the water used for all purposes had to be hauled from the river in hogsheads, but the worst feature would be in the event of a fire in or around any of the buildings. The Almshouse and Asylum are supplied with hose attached to stand pipes in the corridors, and with the large tank full of water, unless the fire had made considerable headway, it could easily be extinguished, but with only a few hogsheads of water in the tank, the chance of putting out a fire would be very small. Knowing these facts, the Commissioners thought it best to provide something that would furnish a sufficient supply of water at all times, with a full tank to use in an emergency. In August last, a steam pump and boiler, with a pumping capacity of 2,500 gallons per hour, was purchased of the Swamscot Machine Co., at a cost of \$357. The small house enclosing engine and pump, digging drain and laying pipe, cost \$115. making the total cost \$472. This

pump is put in operation when the wind-mill fails to keep the tank filled, which usually is two hours a day, two or three days each week, depending of course on the velocity of the wind each day. With a strong wind the wind-mill is sufficient. With light or moderate winds, the mill fails to do the work.

There has been no school at the Farm since April, 1892. At the time of closing the school there were but two children of school age at the Almshouse. In Nov. 1891, Rev. Daniel W. Murphy, Rector of St. Mary's Catholic church, Dover, came to the Commissioners and wanted to make some arrangement whereby he might be allowed to take all the Catholic children between the ages of four and twelve years. His object being to get the children away from the bad influences surrounding them at the Farm. After considering the matter some time the Commissioners decided to accept Rev. Father Murphy's offer, and entered into a contract for the period of one year. A copy of the contract is here given:

Memorandum of agreement made this 4th day of March, A. D. 1892, between Dwight E. Edgerly, Frank P. Reeve and Winthrop S. Meserve, County Commisers of the County of Strafford in the State of New Hampshire, and Rev. Daniel W. Murphy of Dover in said County.

It is mutually agreed that the said Rev. Daniel W. Murphy may select as many poor Catholic children as he shall see fit from time to time from the inmates of the County Farm of said County and support the same at

such suitable place or places as he may provide for the term of one year from the date hereof and the said Dwight E. Edgerly, Frank P, Reeve and Winthrop S. Meserve in their said capacity agree to pay him the sum of \$50.00 per year for each and every child supported as hereinafter provided, payable in quarterly payments of \$12.50 each. It is also agreed that the said Daniel W. Murphy shall provide suitable food, clothing, lodging and other necessaries fit and convenient, for the comfortable maintenance and support of all children intrusted to him as aforesaid. That he will cause them to be instructed in the English branches taught in common schools, and that he will upon demand by the parents or either of them, or the legal guardian of any of them, promptly deliver such child so demanded to said Commissioners or their successors in said office. And it is further agreed that the said Commissioners, or their successors, may at any time visit any and all children which may be supported as aforesaid, for the purpose of satisfying themselves that the terms of this agreement are compiled with.

In testimony whereof, we have hereunto set our hands the day and year above named.

Since that time Father Murphy has taken from the Farm 31 children, all of Catholic parentage. The boys have been placed in the Catholic Orphan Asylum at Manchester, N. H., at a cost to him of \$60 per year,

although he receives but \$50 from the County. The girls are at St. Mary's Orphanage at Dover. They are well cared for, and seemingly contented and happy. The Commissioners have been more or less criticised throughout the County for their action in this matter, but if those who have criticised could be at the Farm one week and see to what influences the children are subjected, hear the language the children constantly hear, and know the class of men and women with whom the children are necessarily associated, and then go and see them as they are situated at the present time, and note the change in their manners, language and general appearance for the better, we think they would say the change was a wise one for all concerned.

[The foregoing part of this report was written before the Asylum was burned.]

COST OF SUPPORTING PAUPERS AND INDIGENT SOLDIERS

OFF THE FARM.

There has been a material decrease in the cost of supporting paupers and indigent soldiers off the Farm during the year 1892, as compared with the years 1889, 1890, and 1891.

Believing that the cost to the County of supporting these people could be materially reduced and at the same time be reasonably liberal towards the deserving poor; and also believing that no saving would likely be made under the old system of furnishing aid, the commissioners, in March 1892, appointed in each city and town in the County a special agent to care for the County's poor off the Farm. The Commissioners have been severely criticised for making the change. The critic in every instance, so far as the Commissioners have learned, claiming that the change was made for politicel reasons. The Commissioners take this opportunity to say that the change was made wholly to save the money of the tax-payers of the County, and for no other reason whatever, and we think the result justifies our action.

The following will show the cost of supporting soldiers and paupers off the Farm for the years 1889, 1890, 1891. The two months from the time of settling with the towns in Feb, 1892 to April 1, 1892, and for the ten months from April 1, 1892, the date when the new system went into operation, to Feb. 1, 1893.

COURT HOUSE AND JAIL.

There have been no repairs at Court House worthy of mention. Since the last report the grounds have been graded, and curb stone laid.

The boiler at Jail being insufficient to heat the Jail and House properly, was exchanged for a new steel tubuler boiler, at a cost of \$550. which gives perfect satisfaction.

Since this report was begun the burning of the Asylum at the County Farm has occurred. The public are familiar with all the details attending this terrible fire and loss of life. As to the cause of the fire, the Commissioners havn't any doubt but what the LaFountain woman had a match in her cell and purposely or accidentally set the fire. The Commissioners have always considered Mr. Driscoll, the keeper, a very efficient man for that place; he has filled it under three different Boards of Commissioners and has always been highly recommended by the retiring board. Charges of drunkenness have been brought against him since the fire. No member of the present board of Commissioners has ever seen him when he showed in the least that he had been drinking. While away on a brief vacation at two different times he confessed to the Commissioners on his return that he drank while away, he proved at the time by competent witnesses that he was not under the influence of liquor when he returned and we never could learn that he ever drank when on the Farm or ever came to the Farm when in drink. It has been proved beyond a doubt that he was not away from the Farm during the day and evening of the fire and also that he was perfectly sober at that time. Whether or not he did all he could when the fire was discovered to save the lives of the inmates the public is as competent to judge as we are; some other man might have done more, we do not doubt but what he did as much as the average man would have done under the same circumstances and that when he got clear of the LaFountaine woman, when she was on his back in the corridor, that the fire was beyond his control.

The cost of support per week for the inmates at the Almshouse and Asylum has been reduced since the last report was made, from \$2.29 to \$1.63. The Commissioners wish to say that no small share of the credit for this is due to the Superintendent and Matron, Mr. and Mrs. Demeritt, for their economical management of the farm and almshouse.

In making up the above account for cost of support, one item that should properly go into the debit side of the account was not included. The Commissioners have paid no taxes due the City of Dover from the County for the year 1892, and for the following reason: The Commissioners received no inventory blank from the Assessors, neither were they ever notified to render to the Assessors a memorandum of taxable property belonging to the County. The first notice the Commissioners had was when the Tax Collector presented his bill for the taxes. As the amount was n uch more than it had ever been before, the Commissioners asked him to give them a memorandum of the property taxed and the valuation of the same. It was found to be follows:

The buildings at the Farm are exempt from taxation by the laws of N. H., therefore the amount of valuation

for the Farm is for the land only. The Court House and Jail have never been taxed before the year 1892. The Commissioners considered the valuation excessive and appeared before the Assessors and asked for an abatement on the ground of excessive valuation. The Assessors refused to reduce the valuation, and then the Commissioners refused to pay the tax, but offered to pay the Collector under protest \$1,000 on account, which he refused to receive. The Assessors then gave the Commissioners notice that they would reduce the valuation on the Farm to \$15,000, but the Commissioners thinking that there should be a further reduction on the Farm, and that the valuation of the Court House and Jail should be reduced quite an amount, still refused to pay the tax, and there the matter stands. If this item had been included in the Farm account it would make the cost of support \$1.65 per week.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF STRAFFORD COUNTY:

Gentlemen :--- Viewing the year from the official standpoint of County Physician, very little has transpired foreign to the usual routine of professional duties to which it seems necessary to direct your attention in the report. The very favorable hygienic condition of the main house, that so much has been said about in the former reports, could be greatly improved by the addition of traps to the waste pipes that are not already trapped and the relaying of the main sewer that leads through under the basement kitchen and out at the southwest corner of the building, for the one already here has proved a constant source of annovance and trouble the past summer, having to dig up the greater part several times. This of course endangers the health of the inmates as well as those in attendance, for the gases and foul odors that arise while the work of digging up is being done are extremely nauseous. It would not be a very expensive job to replace this sewer by a pipe that would be sufficient to carry off the waste water and cause no more trouble. It has been surprising that we have not got any sickness arising from this source.

We have had no epidemic at the Farm the past year and I think it has been exceptionally healthy. During the epidemic of la grippe last winter we had about two hundred inmates but not a case of la grippe. I think this is partly due to the excellent water supply of the institution, the splended location of, and last but not least of all to the excellent care and attention paid the inmates by the Superintendent and matron. I feel they have done all in their power for the comfort, health and happiness of the inmates and looked after their many wants as but few could do. They have a good, wholesome, nutritious diet and enough of it, as all the inmates show they are well nourished.

About the usual number of chronic cases existed through the year requiring constant care and attention. I have also had four fractures and several minor surgical cases to treat during the year.

Respecting the proper care of the more unfortunate class of paupers, the insane, there has been quite an improvement at the Asylum during the year in the addition of storm windows to the whole building, thus in cold weather making the room much warmer and a great deal more comfortable for those that have to be confined to their rooms.

I think it not out of place here to say a few words in regard to heating. The system of heating with overhead pipes through the corridors keeps the upper strata of air in the corridors very warm while near the yoor and in the rooms it is cool or cold. This is a very unsatisfactory means of heating especially for the insane and should be substituted by proper radiators so that the heat will be more equally distributed.

The privy at this house should be abandoned and water closets substituted, for in hot weather it is impossible to keep the privy of an institution like this free from offensive odors.

I have to report two cases of confinement during the year.

There have been thirteen deaths in the institution during the year as follows:
