SUNUNU REMAINS POPULAR, HOLDS LEADS OVER PROSPECTIVE DEMOCRATIC OPPONENTS

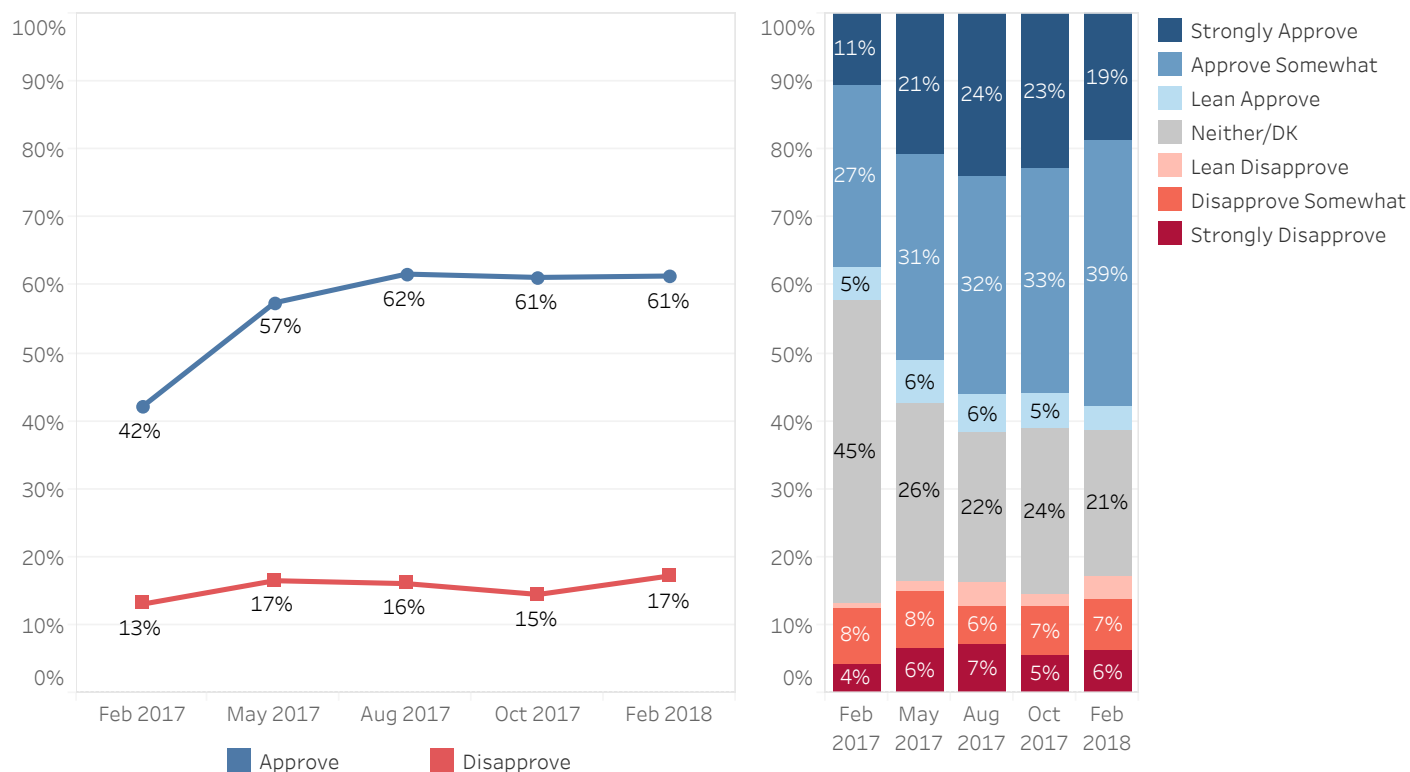
DURHAM, NH – A majority of Granite Staters continue to approve of the job Chris Sununu is doing as governor and he continues to be broadly popular. Sununu holds leads over three prospective Democratic opponents for the Governor's election in the Fall. However, four-fifths are still trying to decide whom they will vote for and many are unfamiliar with three potential Democratic candidates. A majority of New Hampshire residents continue to see drug abuse as the most important problem facing the state.

These findings are based on the latest **Granite State Poll***, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and twenty-three (523) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed by landline and cellular telephone between January 28 and February 10, 2018. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.3 percent. Included were three hundred and eighty-one (381) likely 2018 general election voters (MSE = +/- 5.0%).

Gubernatorial Approval

A year into his term as governor, a majority of Granite Staters continue to approve of Governor Chris Sununu's job performance; 61% approve, 17% disapprove, and 21% neither approve nor disapprove or are unsure. Sununu's job approval is unchanged since the previous quarter (61% approval).

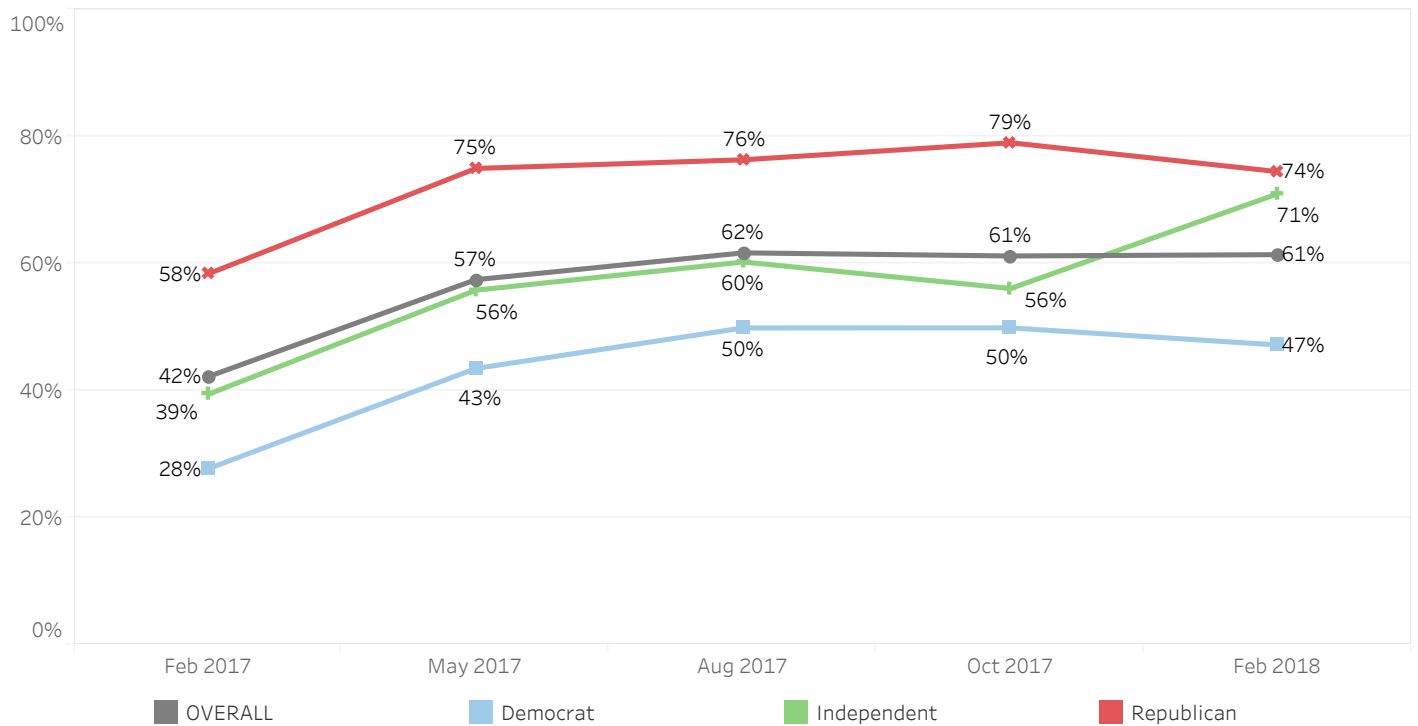
Gubernatorial Approval - Chris Sununu

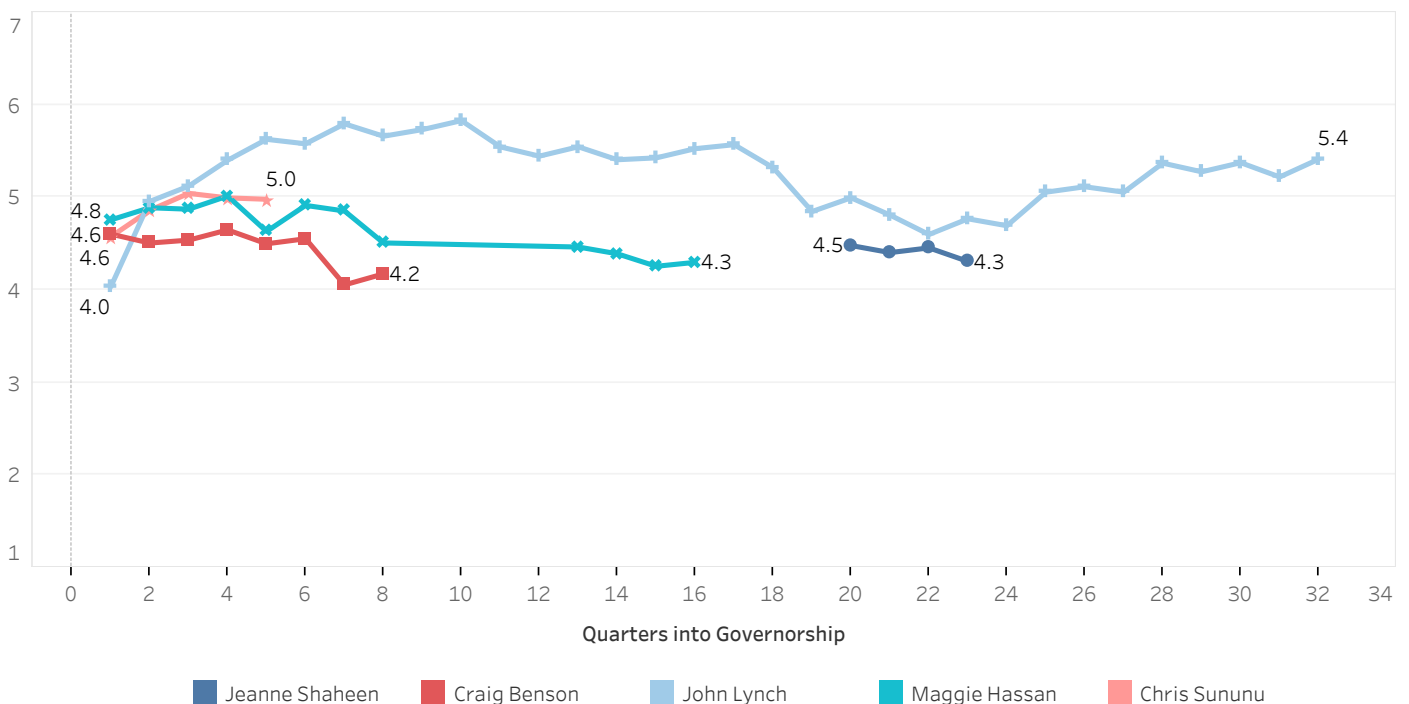
Sununu enjoys relatively high levels of support among Granite Staters of all political identifications. Nearly three in four Republicans (74%), 71% of Independents, and 47% of Democrats approve of the job Sununu is doing. Support for Sununu among Independents (71%) has increased substantially since October 2017 (56%).

On a scale where "strongly approve" equals 7 and "strongly disapprove" equals 1, Sununu's average approval score (5.0) in his fifth quarter has remained unchanged since October 2017. His support is slightly higher than that of Maggie Hassan (4.6) and Craig Benson (4.5) at this point in their governorships, but is slightly below John Lynch's support (5.6) in his fifth quarter.

(7=Strongly Approve, 1= Strongly Disapprove)

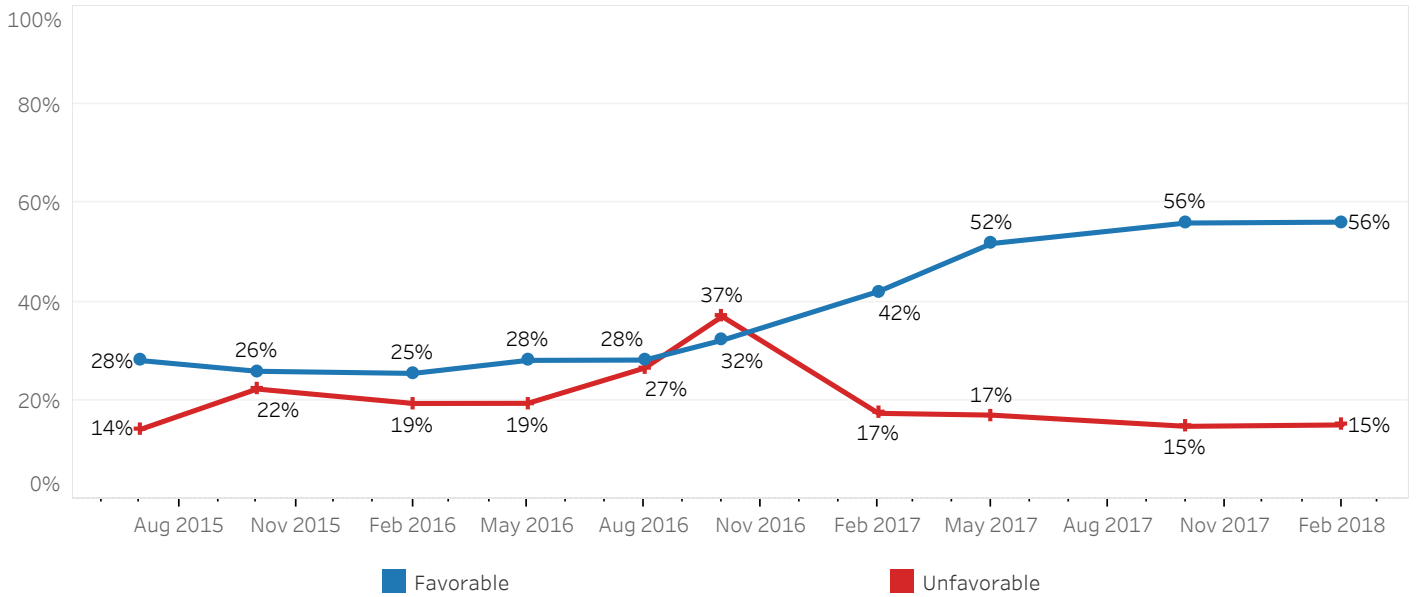


Favorability Ratings - Governor Chris Sununu

Sununu also remains quite popular personally among New Hampshire adults; 56% say they have a favorable opinion of him, 15% have an unfavorable opinion, and 14% each are neutral or don't know or are unsure.

Frequent conservative radio listeners (81% favorable), self-identified Republicans (73%), those who voted for Donald Trump in the 2016 election (73%), self-described conservatives (72%), those who attend religious services once or twice a month (68%), and those aged 50 to 64 (67%) are most likely to have a favorable opinion of Sununu. *Boston Globe* readers (39%), self-described liberals (39%), self-identified Democrats (44%), NHPR listeners (44%), and Connecticut Valley residents (45%) are least likely to have a favorable opinion of Sununu.

Favorability - Chris Sununu

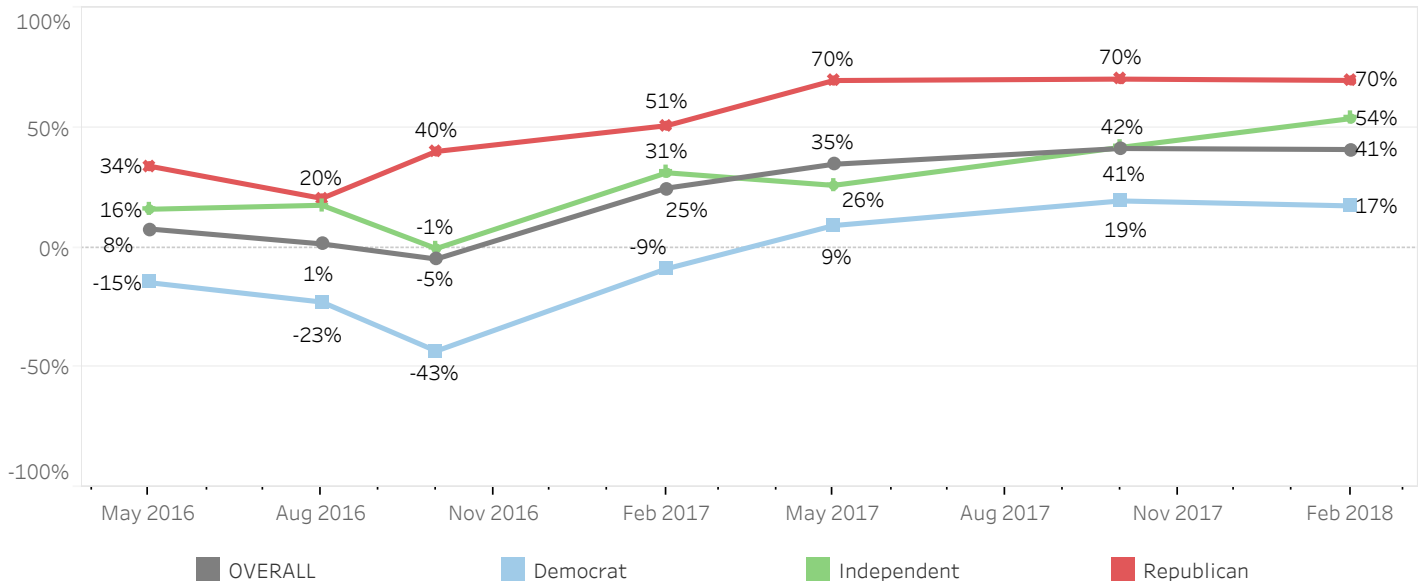


Net Favorability Rating - Governor Chris Sununu

Sununu's net favorability rating (+41%), the percentage of people who have a favorable opinion minus the percentage who have an unfavorable opinion, is unchanged since October 2017 (+41%). His net favorability rating has remained steady among Republicans and has slightly increased among Independents in the past quarter.

Net Favorability = (% Favorable - % Unfavorable)

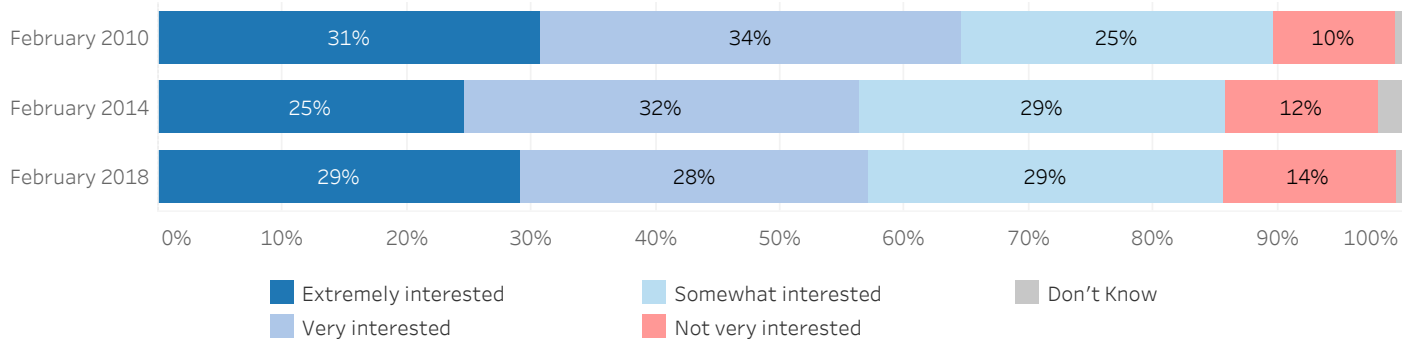


Interest in 2018 General Election

Twenty-nine percent of New Hampshire residents say they are extremely interested in the 2018 general election, 28% are very interested, 29% are somewhat interested, 14% are not very interested, and less than 1% don't know or are unsure. Interest among Granite Staters is slightly higher than at the same point in the 2014 election cycle, but slightly lower than at this point in the 2010 cycle.

Conservative talk radio listeners (82%), NHPR listeners (77%), those who have completed postgraduate work (76%) or have a college degree (71%), and those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016 (69%) are most likely to say they are extremely or very interested in the 2018 general election, while those with a high school education or less (43%) and those aged 18 to 34 (36%) are least likely to say so.

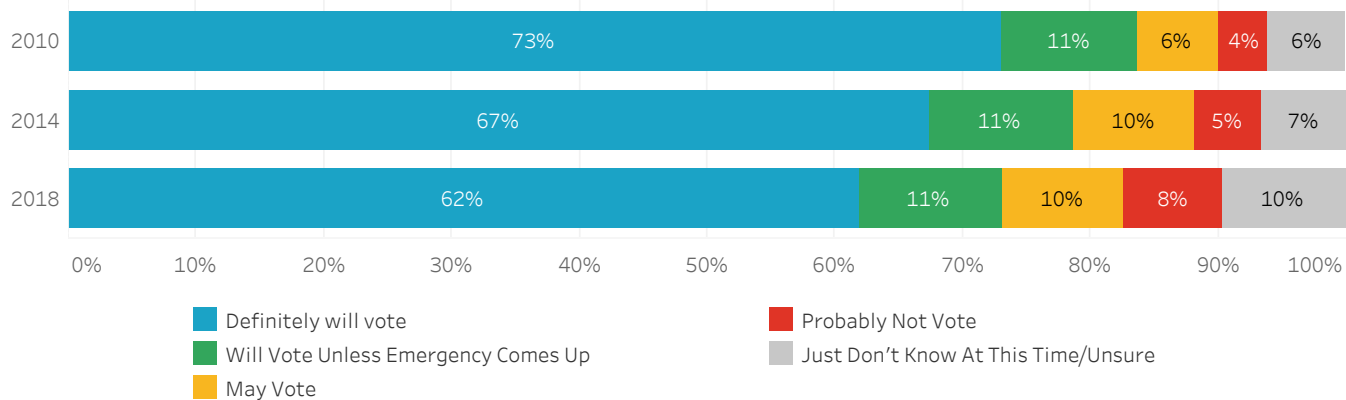
Interest in Recent Mid-Term General Elections



Nearly two-thirds of respondents (62%) say they definitely will vote in 2018, while 11% say they will vote unless an emergency comes up, 10% say they may vote, 8% say they probably will not vote, and 10% say they just don't know at this time. However, historically far fewer people actually vote in mid-term elections than say they plan to in polls.

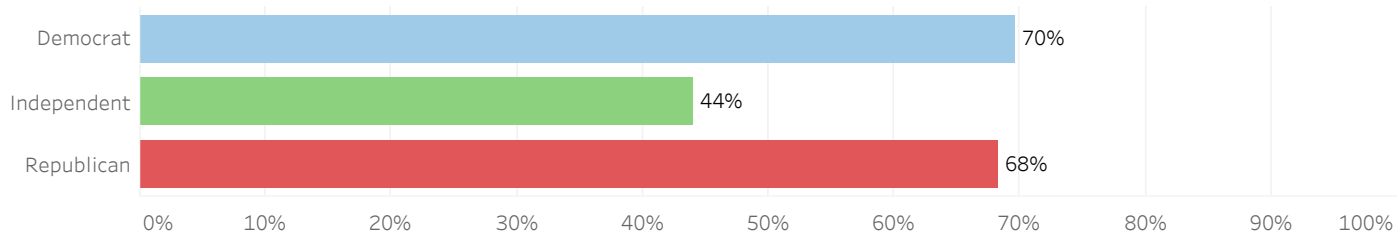
A slightly larger number of respondents in 2014 (67%) and in 2010 (73%) said they would definitely vote in the forthcoming election than this year (62%).

Democrats (70%) and Republicans (68%) are equally likely to say they definitely will vote in 2018, while Independents (44%) are much less likely to say so.

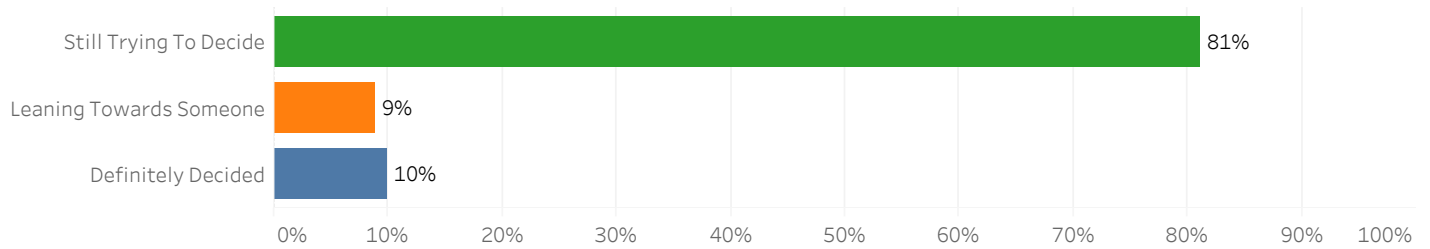
Definitely Will Vote Intent in 2018 General Election - by Party



2018 Gubernatorial Election

The gubernatorial election has not yet attracted the attention of Granite Staters. Eighty-one percent of New Hampshire likely voters say they are still trying to decide whom they will vote for in the New Hampshire Governor election in 2018. Nine percent say they are leaning towards someone and 10% say they have definitely decided.

NH Governor Race

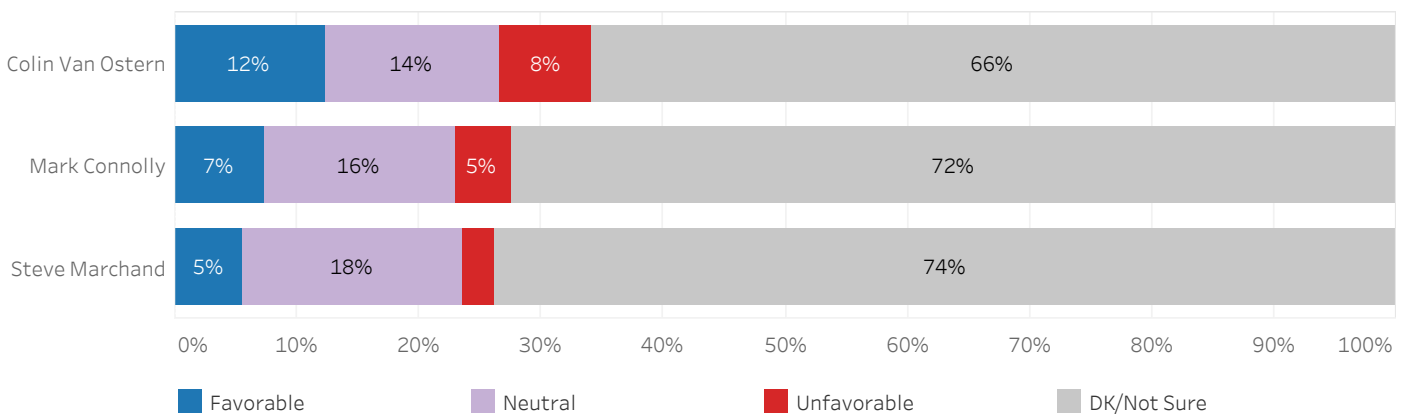
Former Portsmouth Mayor Steve Marchand is the only Democrat who has declared his candidacy for the governor's race. Colin Van Ostern, the 2016 Democratic nominee, and Mark Connolly, who also ran for the Democratic nomination, have been mentioned as possible candidates again in 2018.

Despite having run in 2016, only 12% of New Hampshire adults say they have a positive opinion of former Executive Councilor Colin Van Ostern; 14% have a neutral opinion, and 8% have an unfavorable opinion. Two-thirds of respondents (66%) say they don't know or have never heard of Van Ostern.

Seven percent of respondents say they have a positive opinion of former New Hampshire Securities Director Mark Connolly; 16% have a neutral opinion, and 5% have an unfavorable opinion. Seventy-two percent of respondents say they don't know or have never heard of Connolly.

Despite having campaigned since April 2017, only 5% of respondents say they have a positive opinion of former Portsmouth Mayor Steve Marchand; 18% have a neutral opinion, and 3% have an unfavorable opinion. Nearly three-quarters of respondents (74%) say they don't know or have never heard of Marchand.

Prospective 2018 NH Gubernatorial Matchups

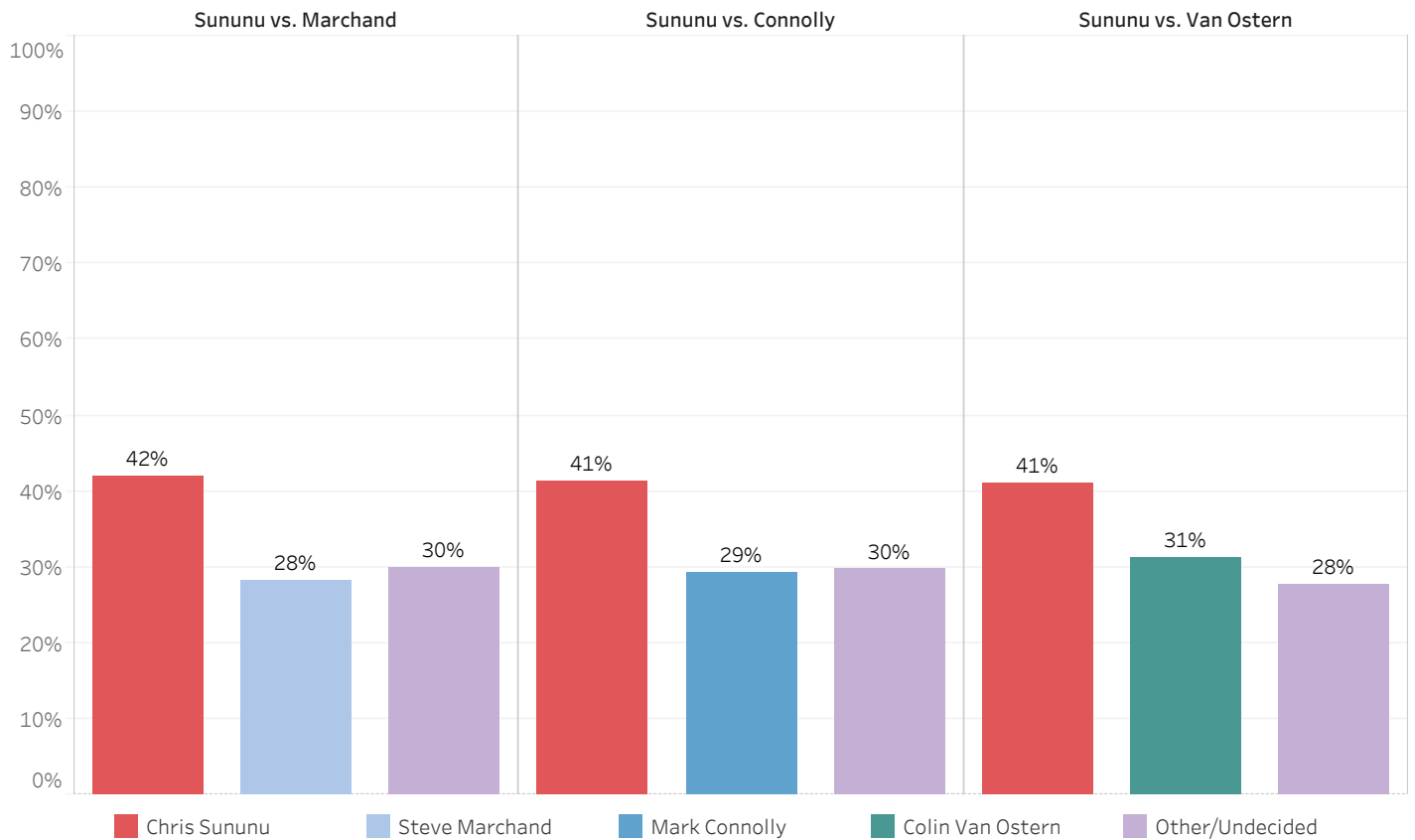
Governor Chris Sununu holds leads over three prospective Democratic challengers when respondents are asked for whom they would vote if the 2018 Governor election was being held today.

In a matchup between Sununu and Steve Marchand, 42% of 2018 likely voters say they would vote for Sununu, 28% would vote for Marchand, and 30% are undecided or would vote for another candidate.

In a matchup between Sununu and Mark Connolly, 41% of 2018 likely voters say they would vote for Sununu, 29% would vote for Connolly, and 30% are undecided or would vote for another candidate.

In a matchup between Sununu and Colin Van Ostern, 41% of 2018 likely voters say they would vote for Sununu, 31% would vote for Van Ostern, and 28% are undecided or would vote for another candidate.

Currently, Sununu holds leads over these potential Democratic opponents among Independents and receives support from around one in ten Democrats.



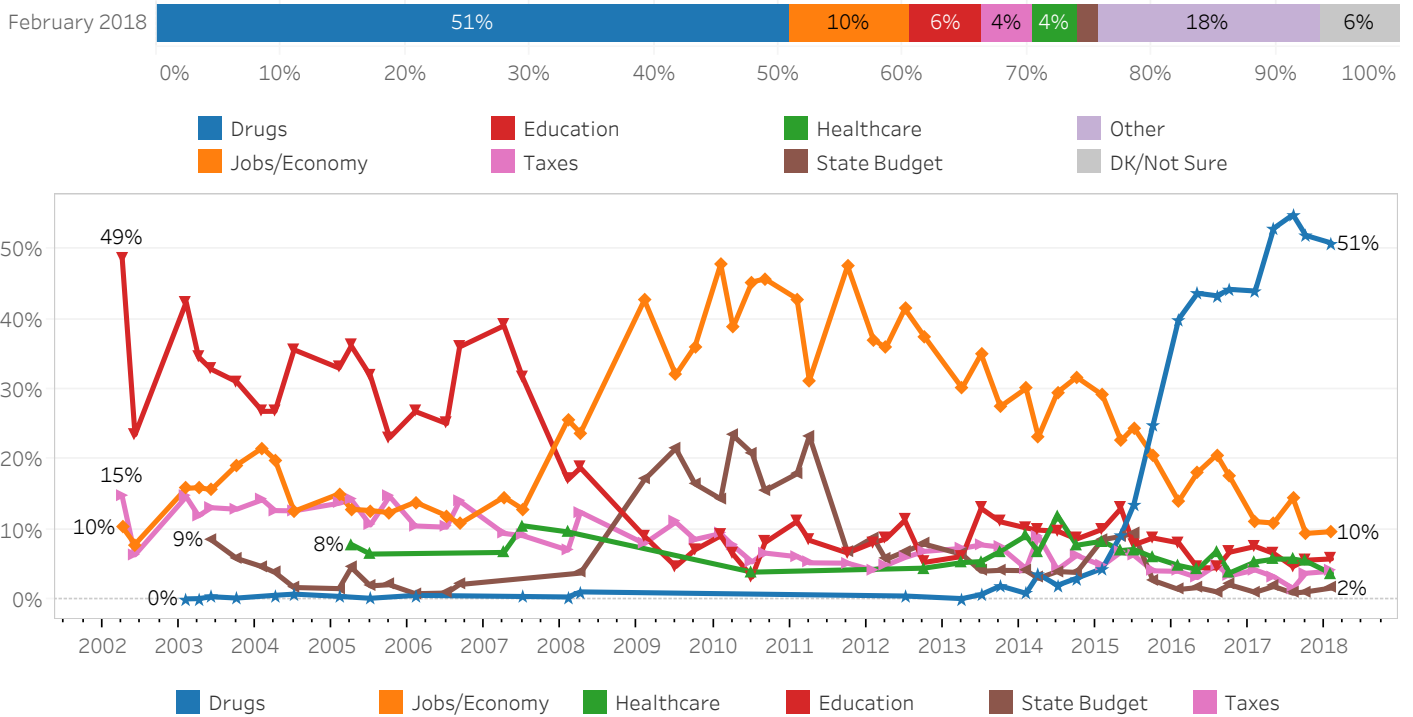
Self-identified Republicans, self-described conservatives, those who voted for Donald Trump in 2016, conservative radio listeners, and those who attend religious services one a week or more often are more likely than others to say they would vote for Sununu in each of these three matchups.

Self-identified liberals, *Boston Globe* readers, those who voted for Hillary Clinton in 2016, self-identified Democrats, NHPR listeners, and Seacoast residents are more likely than others to say they would vote for the Democratic nominee in the each of these three matchups.

Most Important Problem Facing New Hampshire

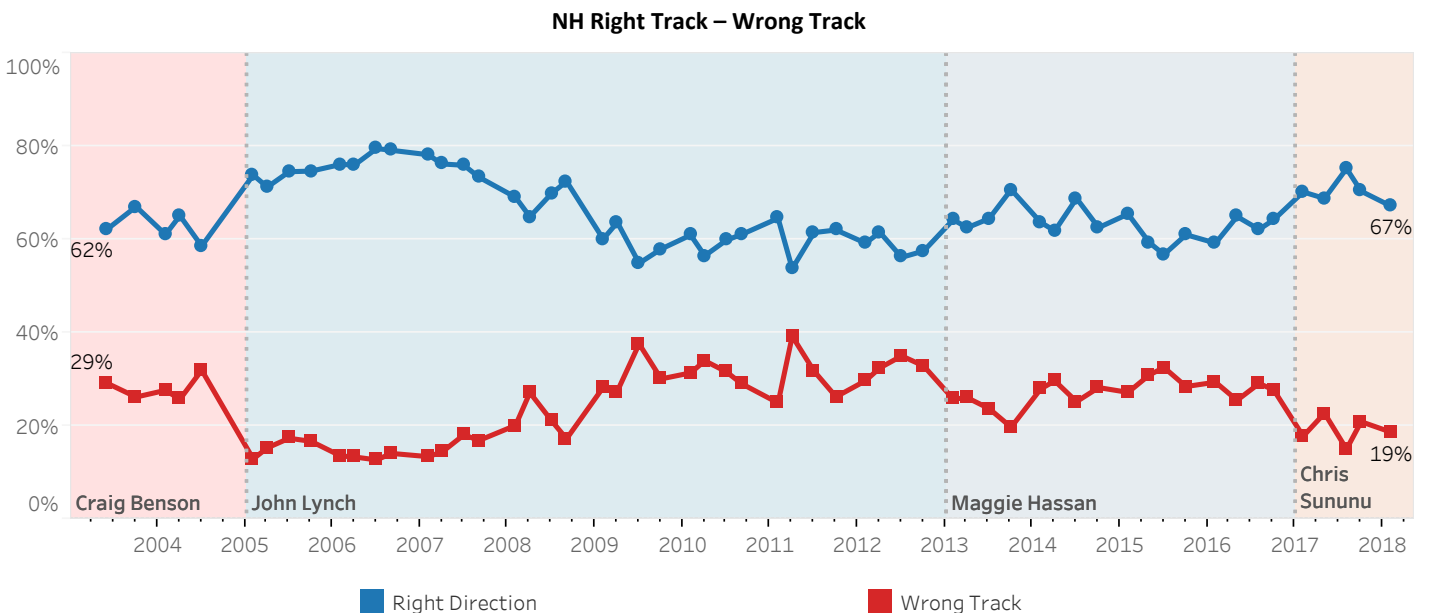
For the fourth straight quarter, a majority of Granite Staters (51%) believe the drug crisis is the most important problem facing New Hampshire. Ten percent of respondents cite jobs or the economy as the state's most important problem, 6% cite education, 4% mention taxes, 4% mention healthcare, 2% mention the state budget, 18% cite another problem, and 6% don't know or are unsure.

Concern over the drug crisis is bipartisan: 59% of Republicans, 54% of Independents, and 46% of Democrats feel drugs are the state's most important problem.



NH Heading in Right Direction or On Wrong Track

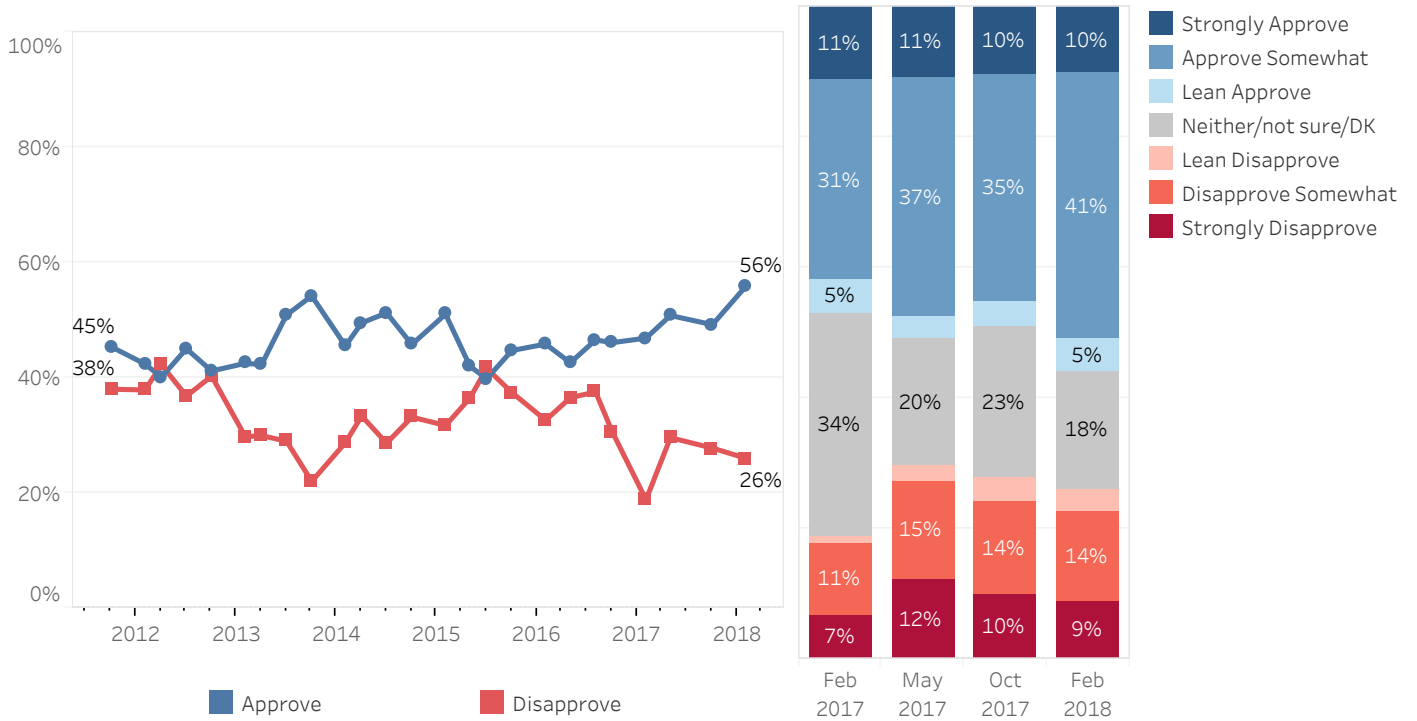
Optimism about the state's outlook remains high but has fallen slightly over the past two quarters. Two-thirds of Granite Staters (67%) say things are generally going in the right direction in the state, 19% say things are seriously off on the wrong track, and 14% don't know or are unsure. Optimism about the state's future is bipartisan: 78% of Republicans, 71% of Independents, and 58% of Democrats feel the state is headed in the right direction, though Democrats have become less positive over the past two quarters.



NH Legislature Approval

Fifty-six percent of Granite Staters say they approve of how the Republican-controlled State Legislature is doing its job; only 26% say they disapprove while 18% neither approve nor disapprove or are unsure. Approval of the legislature has slightly increased since October 2017 (49%) and is at its highest ever point.

Approval of the State Legislature is bipartisan: 62% of Republicans approve of the job the legislature is doing while 53% of Independents and 54% of Democrats agree.



Granite State Poll Methodology

These findings are based on the latest Granite State Poll, conducted by the University of New Hampshire Survey Center. Five hundred and twenty-three (523) randomly selected New Hampshire adults were interviewed in English by landline and cellular telephone between January 28 and February 10, 2018. The margin of sampling error for the survey is +/- 4.3 percent. These MSE's have not been adjusted for design effect. Included were three hundred and eighty-one (381) likely 2018 general election voters (MSE = +/- 5.0%). The design effect for the survey is 1.3%.

The random sample used in the Granite State Poll was purchased from Marketing Systems Group (MSG), Horsham, PA. MSG screens each selected telephone number to eliminate non-working numbers, disconnected numbers, and business numbers to improve the efficiency of the sample, reducing the amount of time interviewers spend calling non-usable numbers. When a landline number is reached, the interviewer randomly selects a member of the household by asking to speak with the adult currently living in the household who has had the most recent birthday. This selection process ensures that every adult (18 years of age or older) in the household has an equal chance of being included in the survey.

The data have been weighted to adjust for numbers of adults and telephone lines within households. Additionally, data were weighted by respondent sex, age, education, and region of the state to targets from the most recent American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. In addition to potential sampling error, all surveys have other potential sources of non-sampling error including question order effects, question wording effects, and non-response. Due to rounding, percentages may not sum to 100%. The number of respondents in each demographic below may not equal the number reported in cross-tabulation tables as some respondents choose not to answer some questions.
