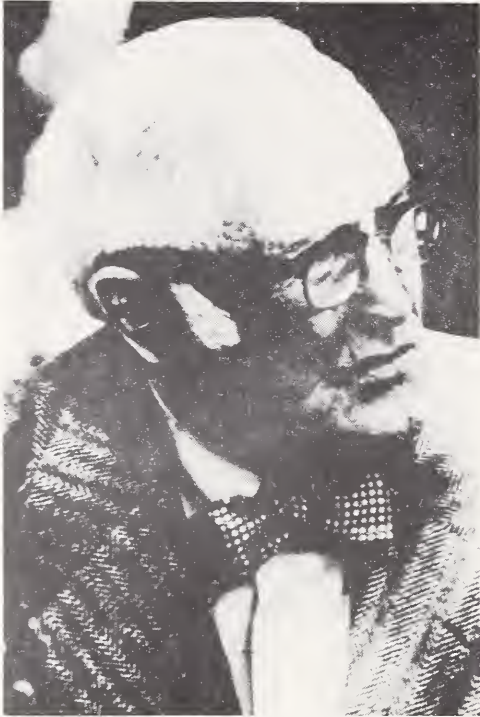
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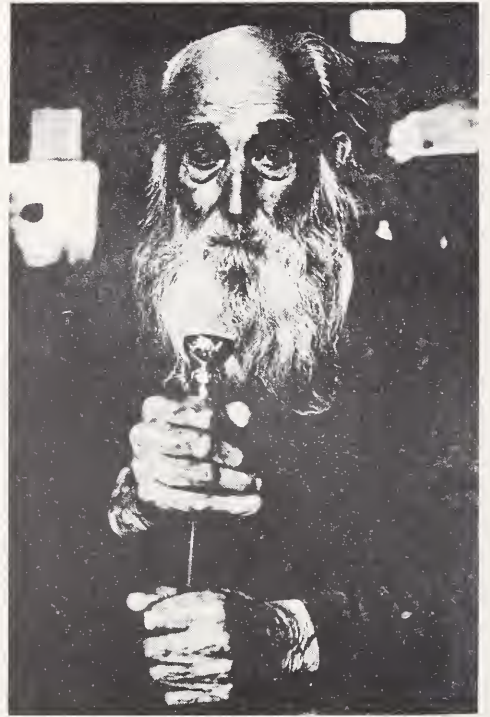

Lack of Information

ARTICLE 32. To Join The Lakes Region Planning Commission.

To see if the Town will vote to become a member of the Regional Planning Commission, now organized and named the Lakes Region Planning Commission. The Commission presently has a membership of thirteen municipalities and has jurisdiction over planning region # 2 delineated by the State of New Hampshire. The objective of the Commission is to plan for and encourage regional planning and analysis, provide concensus on major problems of regional concern, to assist Town Planning Boards and to provide for the effectuation of projects within, and which extend beyond, the boundaries of a particular town.

The Commission will have only the authority conferred on it by Chapter 36:45-53, Revised Statutes Annotated, 1955, and will be an advisory commission to local governments in the region. Members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Selectmen in accordance with State law. Two representatives will be appointed from Tamworth.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

In New Hampshire, forest fire control is a cooperative State-town program. The Town Forest Fire Warden, appointed by the Director, Division of Resources Development upon recommendation of the Selectmen and the State's District Forest Fire Chief is responsible for fire suppression and other related duties. The State shares equally with the town in the cost of most forest fires, except illegal and careless fires, which are charged to the responsible party. The State further provides fire detection services, prevention programs, fire training for town wardens and crews, and back up equipment for fire suppression .

By authority of the State, the Town Forest Fire Warden controls all outside burning in his town except backyard cooking fires. Any person wishing to kindle a fire when the ground is not covered with snow must obtain a fire permit free of cost, from the Town Forest Fire Warden. No permits will be issued for fires between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M. unless it is raining, except for commercial purposes.

Please be careful when using fire, remember it can be an extremely useful tool when under control but once allowed to run wild it can become a disastrous and devastating force. Only you can prevent a forest fire.

ANNUAL REPORT

THE TAMWORTH PLANNING BOARD

Activities of the Tamworth Planning Board have broadened considerably this past year. Ever mindful of its purpose - the health and welfare of the people and the orderly development of Tamworth - ten regular meetings, one special meeting, and one hearing for abutters to a proposed subdivision area have been held to date.

In the area of subdivisions the Board has been active in reviewing developers proposals, in guiding others as to correct procedure, and in honoring the requests of those wishing to procure copies of the Tamworth subdivision regulations. The hearing for abutters proved to be a pleasant and enlightening evening. After due consideration some subdivisions were approved - others discouraged.

A soils map, wet land and 15% and over slope map have been prepared for Tamworth by the Soil Conservation Service in Conway. These maps are valuable in determining the best use of land as questions arise.

Believing that Tamworth can be better served by joining the Lakes Region Planning Commission, application for transfer from the North Country was made to Mr. Alexander Taft, the Governor's Office in Concord. In this the Planning Board was supported by the Selectmen, the Conservation Commission and the Solid Waste Disposal Committee. Approval has been granted. It is important that Tamworth contribute its fair share to the Commission, as other towns are doing, in order that it may reap full benefit from this worth while source.

The subdivision regulations are being revised to more fully meet the requirements of Tamworth citizens.

The Tamworth Planning Board was represented at the following meetings: One called by Mr. Robert Whitaker of the Dept. of Public Works and Highways concerning

a 12' widening of Rt. 25 from West Ossipee to Whittier: a special meeting of the Tamworth Conservation Commission: Annual Public Meeting of Carroll County Conservation District: Chocorua Lake Association Annual Meeting: Tamworth Summer Town Meeting: Public Hearing on the widening of Gardner Hill Road for school bus travel: a special meeting of the Selectmen, School and Planning Board members of five towns, called by the Ossipee Planning Board to explore the potential of present and future school facilities.

Regular meetings are held at the Town House, fourth Wednesday each month at 7:30 p. m. You are welcome to attend.

TAMWORTH CONSERVATION COMMISSION REPORT

As this report is being typed at the end of January The Conservation Plan for the town of Tamworth is finished and is at the printers. We wish to acknowledge publicly our gratitude to the designer of the cover, Don Turner, of Wonalancet, and to the cartographer, Robert Dustin, of Sandwich, who drew the maps for The Plan. Without the generosity of The Tamworth Foundation we would have been hard pressed to find the funds to have The Plan printed and the seven members of the Commission never cease to be appreciative of The Foundation's continuing support of our projects.

The wetlands map of the Town is complete. It is in the Town Selectmen's office and is being used by the Planning Board. This map was made for the Town by the Soil Conservation Service and will be in constant use as an addendum to The Conservation Plan begins to be drawn up by several Commission members and the newly formed addendum committee which includes members at large from the Town. By State law, each commission must inventory the wetlands of the town it serves.

Two fine gifts of land were made to the Commission in the autumn of 1972. The first, called the Kennett Triangle, consists of $6\frac{3}{4}$ acres which are on either side of The Chinook Trail. The Kennett Company by donating this land to the Conservation Commission has assured an unspoiled "forever wild" stretch in The Big Pines Natural Area along either side of this road by Swift River.

The second piece of property of 9.3 acres is off the Jeffers Woods Road in South Tamworth and is a gift of the late Alice Thompson and her husband, Charles. To be known as "The Bearcamp Natural Area" it contains 1650 feet of river frontage along the Bearcamp. In accordance with the wishes of the donors as well as the Commission members this tract will remain an undisturbed reserve.

Seventy tiny trees, made available as part of the State's Arbor Day program, were planted in the Commission's "nursery" - a field loaned by John Hidden - on May 6th. When they are larger they will be planted throughout the Town under the Commission's shade tree program. Both coniferous and deciduous trees were included.

The quite large maple sapling in South Tamworth Village planted by the Commission several years ago died and was removed, roots and all, by John Hidden. It is hoped to try planting a clump of birch trees, which are salt resistant, in the same place in the spring.

Five field trips open to anyone were held in the summer and fall in some of the different areas managed by the Commission. By far the most colorful as well as the best attended one was carried out by canoes and a row boat on Jackman Pond, August 12th. This flotilla was led by Prof. Edward Flaccus of Bennington College to whom we are most grateful. The second largest trip in attendance was one of two led by Herbert Damon, whom we also wish to thank warmly, into The Black Spruce Ponds Reserve. Few people came on the autumn trips. This was disappointing to Commission members as they were asked for specifically by residents of the Town whose summer duties kept them from joining the earlier field trips. Perhaps the fall walks should be discontinued unless there is an increase in attendance.

The Commission members are indebted to the Tamworth Garden Club members who industriously completed the "Lazy Walker's Trail" in The Big Pines Natural Area. This is a short "loop" path which starts beneath the Big Pines Area hanging sign on the Chinook Trail and goes to the footbridge across Swift River. It is a "self-guiding" nature trail and the Commission is the recipient of a handsome, weatherproofed box made and donated by Wallace Card of South Tamworth in which to keep the mimeographed guides to the trail.

The Commission members are pleased that all town roads were designated scenic roads at Town Meeting in 1972.

Commission Chairman, Peg King, spoke at Summer Town Meeting in August and two other Commission members joined her at the State Highway Department hearing on widening Route 25 on May 17th. These three members also attended the Gardner Hill Road hearing in October - the first test of the Scenic Roads law in Tamworth.

Peg King, a member "ex officio", of The Chocorua Lake Foundation attended the meetings of this farsighted and dedicated group with whom we are proud to work as closely as possible.

Four Conservation Commission members from Tamworth went to the all day annual Association of New Hampshire Conservation Commissions meeting on November 5th this year held in Conway.

The Commission supported the Planning Board in its belief that the conservation interests of Tamworth would best be served if the Town transferred from the North Country Regional Planning Commission to the Lakes Region Planning Commission.

A "No Shooting of Bottles" sign was put up this past autumn in the gravel pit adjacent to Jackman Pond.

The Commission members are looking forward - as our Commission begins its seventh year - to involving more members of the community in its newly formed various committees about which more will be written in next year's report.

COOK MEMORIAL LIBRARY

During 1972 Mrs. Marilyn Evans, our librarian for over two years, resigned and Mrs. Jean Ulitz took over at the beginning of November.

Circulation figures for the year show a marked decrease in attendance and books borrowed - with a total of 2726 books issued to 1988 adults and children. As with other organizations and businesses in Tamworth, we were adversely affected by the bridge construction work and realize that is the main reason for the decline in attendance.

Our sincere thanks go to the Friends of the Library for the very thorough sprucing up of the interior of the building in the Spring and for painting the front entrance hall. We are again indebted to our cataloguing committee for their unending labor of love. We are grateful also for the contribution from the Tamworth Foundation. My special thanks go to the donor of the fine typewriter - one of the most useful and practical of library tools.

The Garden Club improved the outward appearance of our library with arrangements in the window boxes of colorful plants in the summer and evergreen cuttings in the winter. In addition, at Christmas time, they placed trees to suit everyone's taste - one decorated with food for the birds in the window box, a tree with attractive ornaments in the adult section and a lollipop tree in the children's room.

Your library is participating in "Outreach to Carroll County Shut-Ins". Volunteers now visit and bring cassettes and tapes into the homes of 15 handicapped & house bound residents of Tamworth. In this worthy program the library serves as a record keeper and central depot for receiving and dispersal of the weekly tapes (which cover local news, music, sermons, school programs, town organizations' programs, etc.) for the Tamworth volunteers.

For the visually handicapped our library offers large print books (from the State Bookmobile) and the monthly Enlarged Type Edition of the Readers Digest. Throughout the year, we purchase new books for young and old and we subscribe to various magazines - in addition to the gifts of magazines and books and book memorials. Several times a year the Bookmobile lends a new supply of State books to add to our shelves (for a total of 1536 books last year). The Transition class of the Pre-School obtains books and the Kenneth A. Brett School strengthens their own library by borrowing substantial quantities of books from our library.

On request, the librarian can borrow special books from the State Library for short loan duration. Cook Memorial Library also issues and honors cards for use in member libraries throughout the state as a part of the New Hampshire Statewide Library Card Program.

We are open Wednesday 1:30 to 5:00 P. M. and 7:00 to 9:00 P. M. and Saturday 1:15 to 4:45 P. M. and - during those hours only - our telephone number is 323-7971. Come in and visit your library - we welcome your suggestions and recommendations.

To the Tamworth Public:

This thirty fifth report and appeal gives notice also of the Annual Meeting at Runnels Hall on Friday, August 25th, at 4:00 P. M. Our past practice of giving further notice by post-card seems an unnecessary expense, but reminders will appear in local papers. Please make note of the date and please come.

As you know, the nearly finished Town offices in the old Willow Inn opposite Remicks store have been our main current effort. Two handsome rooms by the front door, a small connecting conference room in back, two wash-rooms, and a most splendid vault for documents have been attempted now, change of the upstairs and ell awaiting future plans. Adequate space will exist for the Selectmen and other Town officers and, if it seems best at some future time, for the Village Nurse; our impressive series of Town documents, continuous since the founding, can be kept dry and in order; quiet and privacy will be possible, as was not the case in the old office. The property was given to the Town by Mrs. Harry F. Damon; Steve Damon has been the builder and Will Smith the architect; the State bridge-builder now in Tamworth kindly offers his crane to install the cupola, token of officialdom. Items from a journal kept in the 1880s by the proprietor of the Willow Inn, George E. Gilman, are quoted by Mrs. Harkness in **The Tamworth Narrative** (pp. 144-45): "July 4, 1882, about 100 guests. Professor Jonathan Harrington, Ventriloquist, and Dixon & Watson, Comic Vocalists, performed at the Town Hall. 4 men from Exeter caught 300 trout in 2 days. Van Amburgh Menagerie 44 people in about every room and house in village, 5 in one room, 6 in another. E. C. Mansfield arrived drunk. C. F. Carter arrived sober. About 50, mostly

doctors, quartered everywhere. Granite State Baseball Club 10 players, umpire, and 2 scorers. Centennial Jubilee Singers from Harpers Ferry, West Virginia. Shooting match. Capt. A. E. Wiggins team of 19 defeated by Peter Mitchells team of 17." As Mrs. Harkness notes, Tamworth life in the 1880's was not dull. Nor will it be, we hope and believe, in the 1980's when this renewed building will go on performing its important, if less festive function.

Meanwhile, present Tamworth life enlists extraordinary effort, not least the Pre-School, to which we contributed \$4,000. Though, unlike many States, New Hampshire takes no public concern for education before the first grade, it is arguable that children from quiet back roads need early companionship and guidance quite as much as those from crowded city blocks. Fifteen children attended play school, fifteen kindergarten, and seven a transitional class aiming toward the first grade, the former two groups under Nancy Coville and her helpers, the latter under Donna Whipple. Since the founding of the Pre-School performance in the first grade is described as stronger by all and quite transformed on the part of some who formerly might have had trouble. There are few greater mercies to a child than a confident and happy start, and the effort of the Pre-School is admirable. \$500 went to each of three other causes: the Rescue Squad, the school athletic program, and the Youth Center. A word on each. In the year since its creation the Rescue Squad has acquired a vehicle and considerable first-aid equipment; it averages nearly two calls a week, chiefly to accidents on Route 16 but also the fires and sudden illness. Five younger members took part at their own expense in a course of six weekly classes in first aid offered by the Wolfeboro Hospital. The enterprise, which is in the spirit of the Fire Department, does credit to all concerned and to its originator Preston Chase. The athletic program at the school has taken on new life under the direction of the Rev. Jim Kellett; our gift went for gymnasium equipment; effort is well advanced toward creating a second base-

ball field from the thicket back of the school for the little league and soft ball. Finally, the Youth Center has little as yet to show, but our gift helped obtain a larger sum from the Spaulding-Potter Fund; they have a site and a strong older adviser in Percy Olton; another year should bring forth a building. Familiar repeated appropriations jointly amount to \$1050. went to the Tamworth and school libraries, to the skiing and swimming programs, and for baseball equipment. All these gifts for current use, adding up to over \$6500. represent more than half the Foundations usable income from endowment and contributions (as you know, income from Mrs. Whittemore's bequest, of which the Foundation is Trustee, was specified by her as for the Village Nurse and the Chocorua Library.) Bigger projects like the Selectmen's Office are paid for by savings in the years just before and after, as was done in the case of the Wilson wing at the school, the tennis courts, the baseball field, and the dam of Chocorua Lake. The task is to keep at heart both present and future.

We have been greatly blessed by the several bequests of friends of this town and admirers of this countryside and by the large bequests of Miss Wilson and Mrs.. Whittemore. Tamworth life would be very different without this happy fortune. Please be loyal to the Foundation, which from the first has much depended on annual gifts; please give it your thought and advice. Gifts large and small, which are deductible on federal Income Tax returns, will be gratefully received by Charles T. Gallagher, Treasurer, in Tamworth 03886.

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL HEALTH OFFICER

Town of Tamworth, for the Year of 1972

Construction of new dwellings continued to increase during 1972 at about the same rate as in recent years. This means an addition of some 30 to 35 houses per year.

In only a very few cases were difficulties encountered in obtaining the consent of owners to construct septic systems conforming to State Requirements. As of the end of the year 1972, all of these problem projects had been suitably solved.

In addition to supervising the design of septic systems and inspecting construction, your special health officer was frequently called upon to advise citizens regarding the steps to be taken in obtaining State Permits to sub-divide land. This procedure has caused some difficulties and misunderstandings. When a landowner wishes to divide his land among members of his family, it may seem unfair to compel him to apply to the State for the right to do so. However it must be realized that strict adherence to the law is the only way in which development of unsuitable land can be discouraged. The obtaining of subdivision permits is really not difficult — herely time consuming.

For 7½ years, your special health officer (paid a small annual fee by the town) designed all septic systems and obtained permits for construction. This task became more and more onerous as the numbers of projects increased. In mid 1972, this activity was terminated and citizens were asked to engage their own engineers to make designs. The health officer however, still continued to function as State inspector of construction. This second activity was also terminated at the end of 1972, and my resignation as special health officer became complete as of that date.

In the future I shall be devoting professional attention to a smaller amount of sub-division and septic system

activity, mainly focused on the larger type of project which by law may be performed only by licensed professional engineers.

My 8 years as Special Health Officer has been most rewarding, specifically reflected in the good quality and sanitary performance of some 250 new septic disposal systems constructed in the town — added to which are some 100 repair jobs which were personally supervised. I sincerely hope that the pattern has been set for a continuation of this most important work.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL

Open burning dumps such as Tamworth's will be outlawed by 1975. The Committee on Solid Waste Disposal, authorized by the 1972 town meeting, had hoped to bring an interim report to the 1973 town meeting. However, since no one town the size of Tamworth can possibly cope with this problem on its own, as part of a larger planning area Tamworth can move no faster than the whole.

The Lakes Region Planning Commission has employed a firm of consulting engineers, Metcalf and Eddy, to advise towns in this area. After a thorough survey of the existing facilities, their report is now available and the Tamworth committee hopes to move forward during the months ahead in conjunction with one or more of the adjacent towns to find the best solution for citizens of the area.

The TAMWORTH SUMMER ENRICHMENT PROGRAM completed it's fifth summer of activities last year, with registration reaching an all-time high of 135 children.

The Program offered all manner of sports, including the sponsorship of a 13-15 year old baseball team, which completed a 4-3 won-lost record. All kinds of arts and crafts, many special activities including nature hikes, environmental presentations at the Squam Lakes Science Center, bike hikes, and mountain climbing (Chocorua, Paugus, Moat, Osceola, Carrigan, Israel, and Washington) were offered.

The annual picnic to Swift River on the Kancamagus was again a success, with approximately sixty children going.

The program was capped by a multi-arts presentation by the children incorporating bits of drama, music, yoga, and modern dance.

On view in the Kenneth A. Brett School Gym during the last day's festivities were displays of the children's creations and special interests that they had done in the various groups throughout the summer. A large patchwork quilt which was made by the children in arts and crafts was shown. Chances on this quilt were sold and the quilt was subsequently won by Hazel Davis. The children involved in making the quilt voted to have the proceeds of the raffle put aside in a "fund" to buy some type of special arts and crafts supplies for another year.

Once again Dana Steele served as Program Director. The very able staff included Connie Hughes (her 4th year) and Sara Kelley, who brought her many skills and nice way of communicating with children, for the Arts and Crafts group, Nancy Merwin, whose specialty was music,

Sharon Small Broussard (Drama), and Sarah Warner (all sports and trips).

Our volunteers are many, but special mention must go to Dede Cleveland, who offered a modern dance program, and Helen Steele, who introduced Yoga to the Program.

Junior Leaders this year were Steve LaFavore and Laurie Ulitz. They helped any of the senior staff where needed and monitored the use of the telephone and the school building.

In the spring of last year the TAMWORTH SUMMER ENRICHMENT PROGRAM won the first CLARENCE B. SHELLNUT AWARD presented by the New Hampshire Recreation and Park Society and the Office of Community Recreation Service for excellence in a community youth program.

We at T.S.E.P. strive to live up to this award, but could not possibly do so without the continued support of the many parents and friends of the program who contributed in so many different ways. We say thank you and hope you will continue to support us.
