WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the Town of Tilton, in the County of Belknap, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town, on Tuesday, the 11th day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 1. To choose a Town Clerk, and Town Treasurer for a term of one year, one Selectman for a term of three years, one Road Agent for the ensuing year, one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years, two Auditors for the ensuing year, and one member of the Park Commission for a term of two years.
- 2. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day expense.
- 3. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.
- 4. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of Hospitals.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$110.31 to obtain Town Road Aid from the State, the State to contribute the sum of \$735.39.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting and make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$374.19 which is 1/100 of 1% of the

assessed valuation of the Town, to the Lakes Region Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town in cooperation with other towns in the Lakes Region.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Civilian Defense purposes.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to the Winnisquam Fire Department for the purpose of Maintenance and Operation of the Department.
- 10. To see what action the Town will take in regard to spraying trees, and raise and appropriate money for same.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for new equipment.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for use in controlling White Pine Blister Rust, in cooperation with the Forestry and Recreation Commission.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the Tilton-Northfield Recreation Council. A similar article is included in the Northfield warrant.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 in conjunction with Tilton School, to pave School Lane. The School's share will amount to considerable more than \$500.00.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to allow a discount on early paid taxes.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to allow the Selectmen as agents of the Town to administer or dispose of any property acquired by Tax Deed.

- 17. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all purposes for the year ensuing.
- 18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the reports of its officers and agents.
- 19. To choose any other officers or agents for the ensuing year.
- 20. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

THE POLLS SHALL BE CLOSED NOT EARLIER THAN 6 O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING. THE BUSINESS MEETING WILL BE HELD AT 8 O'CLOCK IN THE EVENING.

TILTON-NORTHFIELD RECREATION COUNCIL

The existence of a Recreational Program in our communities can be directly traced to a request from young people in our towns that more constructive programs be available for leisure time activity. Many voters in Northfield will remember when two high school seniors appeared at town meeting and pointed to the limited opportunities for wholesome pursuits in our two towns.

Investigation showed that a vast majority of towns the size of ours were already providing constructive recreational programs and that many communities considerably smaller than ours were providing more recreational facilities for their youngsters than we were.

A review of two previous attempts to start recreational programs in Tilton-Northfield indicates they probably failed because of dependence on volunteer supervision and extremely limited activity. The present program was established under a paid supervisor and includes many more and different activities than in preceding attempts. We are now beginning our third year of existence.

It was felt that this program could best be started on a part-time basis. It was believed wise to ask for a minimum amount of financial support until the demands of a recreational program could be established and the potential of such a program could be thoroughly explored. The fact that the requested appropriation this year is larger than in the past two years indicates the belief of a majority that a much more effective program could be attained if the services of a full-time supervisor were made available for even more varied activities. The additional appropriation would be a major step toward the realization of the goal of a full-time recreational program for our communities.

A review of this past year's accomplishments indicates a greatly improved swimming program. The Recreation Council hired a school bus so that youngsters could be taken to Northfield Pond five days a week during the summer months. Previously there were only three days a week of swimming. This past year the Recreation Council paid for a Red Cross training course for our two water front supervisors so that these people were not only trained life savers but instructed the children in swimming and water safety.

Through the cooperation of the American Legion, which conducted the activity, a firearm safety program has been inaugurated. This has been greeted with the greatest enthusiasm on the part of the young people. The sizes of the groups have had to be limited because of the general appeal of this activity.

The Council has continued to support programs of little league baseball, boxing, badminton, shuffle board, ping pong, square dancing and social activities. Our impression is that these programs have operated more successfully than in the past. Our director, Kim Perkins seems to be showing an ever growing ability to work with youngsters.

An anticipated winter of skating has not materialized as of the first part of February because of unfavorable ice conditions. Arrangements are now being made for week end skiing on some of our local slopes.

With the interest and support of the people of our communities our recreation program can not only continue but can be developed into a constructive experience for our young people.

There were 137 new and 295 repeat cases that were admitted to the nursing service and 45 new and 184 repeat cases under health service.

Thirty trips were made transporting patients to clinics, hospitals, and specialists.

Toxoid clinics in cooperation with the State Board of Health were held in September, October, November and December. Dr. Archie Grevior and Dr. Frank Robinson alternated as attending physicians at the clinics. Assistants were Mrs. Willa Downar R.N., Mrs. Margery Robert, Mrs. Lurline McCook R.N., Mrs. Mona Hill R.N., Mrs. Ruby Edwards, and Mrs. Lois Caveney. The last two clinics were poorly attended due to the many children having measles, mumps and whooping cough. A total of 90 toxoids and 12 vaccinations were given.

The district nurse appreciated the privilege of using the modern and conveniently located American Legion Hall for these clinics. Mrs. Lurline McCook, R.N., substituted for the district nurse while she had her vacation.

The nurse assisted Mrs. Kay Hewitt, R.N., the school nurse, in buying, wrapping and distributing gifts to children of the towns of Tilton and Northfield at Christmas time. Money and gifts were generously given by the Rotary, Business and Professional Women's Club, the teachers of both schools and individuals.

About 30 were remembered by money or a Christmas dinner by the American Legion, Salvation Army, the Elks, Odd Fellows, the St. Anne's Society and the Church of the Assumption.

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance

- 9. To see if the school district will vote to hereafter use a check-list for the election of its officers, beginning with the 1959 annual district meeting, and will adopt as its school checklist the Town check-list, as provided in RSA 197:12a, as inserted by Laws of 1957, chapter 57.

REPORT OF TILTON-NORTHFIELD SCHOOL BOARD

We have held several long meetings to discuss the 1958-59 school budget. We have postponed many items of equipment and renovations to future years in order to keep tax rate at the lowest point possible and still maintain the excellent school system that our towns have enjoyed.

We believe that we should continue the school lighting improvement program by the installation of modern lighting for the second floor of the high school and the gymnasium. The district has purchased the fixtures for

the latter from the present budget.

Our proposed budget for 1958-59 shows practically the same amounts as last year with a few exceptions. The only real increase is for principals' and teachers' salaries, this amount being necessary for securing and retaining our best teachers and maintaining a salary schedule. Repairs and replacements have been reduced from \$16,715.00 to \$6,200.00. Reduction of state aid by approximately five thousand dollars increased the school tax rate.

The people of the two towns will be very pleased to have the playing surface of Veterans' Memorial Field completed and in use. The new backstop will probably last twenty-five years.

We used the funds provided by the people for the new oil burner, painting of six rooms, renovations of ceilings, painting the fire escape, new lighting for the first floor of the high school, hard surfacing, and minor

improvements.

May we thank the Journal-Transcript for its excellent policy of developing the annual and permanent funds for the annual award of scholarships to pupils of Franklin and Tilton-Northfield. We thank all individuals who have contributed and the families who have authorized memorials for their departed loved ones.

We extend our appreciation for the funds contributed by the veterans, the clubs and organizations, and individuals for the completion of Veterans' Memorial Field. We thank all the individuals who contributed personal labor and time.

The appreciation of the district goes to the Special Committee of Mr. Brackett Hill, Chairman, Mr. Ernest Decato and Mr. Chester Davidson, who worked with the Board in the naming of the new school.

The Parent-Teacher Association and the Room Mothers have done outstanding work annually in making the schools better by their active support and cooperation.

We wish to express our appreciation to the organizations and individuals who have provided scholarships and prizes for our pupils, and those who have contributed special gifts during the year.

Our work is to establish policies for the schools that will continually improve them, and to spend economically and wisely the money provided by you. We have tried our best to see that every dollar receives a dollar return in value, and work to save money by competitive bids.

We are your chosen representatives to operate the schools for the best interests of the children and the community. We welcome your constructive suggestions at any time for mutual school advancement.

- 1. Maximums to be increased with \$100 increments to maintain salaries at state averages for elementary and for high school teachers of degrees and masters' degrees, said increase to start the September following actual award of degree.

VETERANS' MEMORIAL ATHLETIC FIELD

More than three years ago a project was started to build an athletic field in the area directly behind the high school. A group of interested persons investigated means of raising money with which to complete the project and found that funds which had been set aside for a "Welcome Home" to returning veterans were available. Various organizations, which had contributed, were contacted and all agreed to use this fund for the completion of the project in conjunction with funds available from the school district.

Work was begun and time, materials, equipment and construction skill was generously contributed by many companies, organizations, and individuals and the project was completed last fall, producing one of the best athletic fields in this section of the state.

The field was dedicated during the past year and given the name "Tilton-Northfield Veterans' Memorial Field" in memory of our service men.

Because of the large number of individuals, companies and organizations who have contributed greatly to this project, it is impossible to thank each individually but I wish to extend my appreciation to everyone who in any way contributed to the completion of this worthwhile project. From this generous response we now have facilities for our programs of physical education and athletics in our schools and a place for public use by our townspeople.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Members of the School Board:

The Tilton-Northfield School Board took the following actions during the past year to improve the schools:

- 1. Restored general shop to the school curriculum for Grades 7-12 inclusive by securing a qualified teacher.
- 2. Supported Polio Clinics for elementary and high school pupils through cooperation of Dr. Archie Grevior and Dr. Frank Robinson.
- 3. Sponsored Tuberculosis Patch Test Clinic, with 423 elementary and 275 high school pupils taking the tests.
- 4. Authorized Pre-School Clinic for first grade children, held at Legion headquarters through the cooperation of American Legion Post No. 49.
- 5. Dedicated Veterans' Memorial Field on May 17, with ceremonies in charge of Mr. Charles Dwinal, General Chairman of all local organizations supporting the project.
- 6. Filled the eight elementary teaching vacancies with experienced personnel, including one man to direct the playground at the elementary schools.
- 7. Operated a summer playground program at the Union School, directed by Miss Barbara Wheaton and assisted in the mornings by George Bridges and Irene Plourde.
- 8. Sent Mr. Thardix Pisczek and Mr. Edward Florence, High School custodians, to school custodian workshop at Keene.
- 9. Unanimously voted with special committee of Brackett Hill, Chairman, Mr. Ernest Decato and Mr. Chester Davidson to name the new elementary

- school the Channing T. Sanborn School, in honor of a former highly-esteemed Superintendent of Schools.
- 10. Installed an oil burner and 6600-gallon oil tank at the high school, enabling the district to avoid the costs of additional custodian help and providing more sanitary conditions, painted gymnasium entrance.
- 11. Additional hard surface at the back of the Union School and the front of the Sanborn School to improve the playground.
- 12. Purchased a new mimeograph and five new typewriters for the high school commercial department.
- 13. Renovated cement steps at the high school and the Union School, had plastering repaired, painted eight classrooms, renovated old ceilings at the Union School, painted fire escape.
- 14. Purchased 30 pupil desks and chairs for the high school and 40 desks and chairs for the elementary school.
- 15. Installed modern excellent lighting for the entire first floor of the high school, and purchased for future installation modern lighting for the high school gymnasium.
- 16. Approved Art Workshop for elementary teachers and Guidance Workshop for high school teachers in cooperation with four other towns of Supervisory Union No. 59.
- 17. Approved Music Appreciation Course and Contemporary World Affairs extension courses from Plymouth Teachers College.
- 18. Continued Saturday morning recreation program for grammar school boys, under the direction of Mr. Richard Hamilton, Physical Education Director.

- 19. Approved the much-needed Debating Team at Tilton-Northfield High School, with the school receiving unexpected honors at the University of Vermont, Concord, and the University of New Hampshire through the excellent work of Mr. Charles Lane, English teacher.
- 20. Adopted a program for better library facilities at the high school, with a school for Library science under the direction of Mr. Charles Lane.
- 21. Continued the policy of bids for school equipment, fuel, renovations, and supplies.
- 22. Supported best-attended Open House for all schools during American Education week.
- 23. Continued Driver Training Instruction for high school pupils with a Plymouth car from the Piper Motor Co., Franklin, under the direction of Mr. William Powers.
- 24. Cooperated with the Sanbornton School District by accepting their Grades 7 and 8 pupils while their new addition is under construction.
- 25. Authorized local churches to use classrooms for instruction during the summer vacation.
- 26. Adopted a high school curriculum that provided six years of science, six years of mathematics, six years of English, six years of history, six years of home economics, six years of shop, four years of commerce, four years of agriculture.
- 27. Approved weekend Hiking and Mountain Climbing organization for high school pupils, under direction of Mr. Charles Lane.
- 28. Adopted new salary schedule for Tilton-Northfield teachers, with purposes of retaining good teachers, securing excellent replacements when necessary, and rewarding teachers for outstanding teaching and extra curricular or special duties.

- 29. Purchased two large commercial stoves for school lunch program.
- 30. Improved home economics department by transferring two stoves from school lunch and accepting gift of new stove from Public Service Company.

Balanced Budget

The school district completed the 1956-57 school year with a balanced budget and all bills paid, and a \$6,-839.12 surplus which was used to reduce the 1957 tax rate.

Competitive Bids

The policy of competitive bids was continued, with great savings to the taxpayers for school supplies, oil, renovations, and equipment.
