THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Andover, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Andover, on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways and bridges.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the use of the town library.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of defraying expenses of the town health department.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for lighting the streets.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for trunk line maintenance.

10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate towards paying for the cement road at the east end of the town.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for taking care of the town poor.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the police department.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate money for the same.

14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute locally the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of a light snow plow.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,065.81 to apply on the town debt.

18. To transact any business that may legally come before this meeting.

Several "First Aid" demonstrations were given to the Girl Scouts, as well as to the members of the New England Power Co.

Two very successful clinics were held: Dental clinic with Dr. McKee of Franklin as dentist. Baby clinic with Dr. MacKenzie as examining doctor, assisted by State Maternity Nurse Mrs. Carrie Price and District Nurse Mrs. Maynard.

There were five school children operated upon for tonsils and adenoids. The money to pay for these cases was given by individuals and the Andover Red Cross.

One child was taken to the Balch Hospital in Manchester, for a hare-lip operation which proved very successful.

The little house which was given to the nursing assocation, has been completed. It will be known as the "Andover Clinic House". It is to be used for supplies and the nurse's general records.

The interior of the house has been finished in blue and white, with furniture to match, the latter having been given by individuals. The money used for this house was raised by rummage sales.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of the School District of Andover:

I submit herewith, my fourth annual report as superintendent of schools:

I have purposely made my report briefer than usual in the interests of economy.

May I call your attention to the figures in the first table that represent the averages, total and aggregates for the year 1931-32. These are somewhat better than those of the preceding year. There were more sessions, a greater daily attendance, and less tardiness per pupil than in 1930-31.

The program of studies of the Girls' School is still in the transition stage and will be until such time as a fourth year has been established. However, the studies taken are those found in any of the standard high schools of the state. The school has met all the requirements of the State Board of Education and holds a certificate of approval, and both teachers hold New Hampshire State certificates.

Because of the increase in the equalized valuation of the town, there will be no State Aid available for the year 1933-34. This means that the so-called five dollar tax which must be raised so as to qualify for aid, is in excess of the proposed expenditures for elementary schools. The State Aid received this year is a little over one thousand dollars.

The budget as printed does not call for the raising of any money for major repairs. It may be well to suspend for at least a year the program of repairs other than those that are actually necessary.

I feel that all concerned are working for the interests of Andover boys and girls.
