THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bridgewater in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town House in said Bridgewater on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the town will vote to petition the State tax commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise \$3,000 to finish paying for the New Deisel snow tractor and give three notes of \$1000 each to be paid in one, two and three years respectively and appropriate the same.

5. To see if the town will vote to accept the provisions of the law in regard to Class II State Aid Construction. If this aid is desired, it must be expended on the River Road, and the State will contribute \$3,252.00 provide the town raise \$1,626.00 or will vote to raise Class V highways, T. R. A. so-called, the town must raise \$306.96 and the State will contribute \$1,227.84. No town may receive both Class V and Class II aid in the same year.

6. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of Class V Highways and Bridges (Town roads).

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Winter Roads.

8. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for oiling the Whittemore Point Road so-called and to elect an agent to expend same.

9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$55.00 to the Lakes Region Association.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$26.00 to the Newfound Region Association to aid in advertising in cooperation with other towns of the Newfound Region.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise \$20.00 for Memorial Day, \$10.00 to go to Ashland and \$10.00 to Bristol Legion boys for the decoration of graves in said town of Bridgewater and appropriate the same.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise \$65.00 for Old Home Day and appropriate the same.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for fire protection and appropriate same.

14. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Old Age Assistance.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Blister Rust Control.

16. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Town Poor.

17. We the undersigners want this issue put into Town Warrant to vote, to raise the money for Mrs. Archie La Plante for the transportation of her children, which was promised to her by three school board members, \$360.00 at \$10.00 a week.

18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and deliver inventory blanks when assessing.

19. To transact any further business that may legally come before said meeting.
